





A guy can be a no angle do gooder who really is out to do a good job in the public office. But from somewhere a malcontent will begin scoffing at the man's good intentions, and inferring the do gooder must have an ulterior motive. Placing Scheel in the very heart of the village's nervous system should short circuit any future comments about the good intentions of the guys

Monday afternoon we dropped in at Scheel's headquarters to see how he's weathering his first day as an employee. Having been self-employed these many years we wondered how he would fit into his new role. In the brief time we were there the fire chief, the building commissioner, and other village employees dropped by with village problems.

Unlike a newcomer, Scheel moved into his chair with an accustomed ease, and quietly discussed the problems at hand. He has the respect of the village heads who he'll be dealing with, and the relationship between himself and other village people should be harmonious.

Among the immediate plans he would like to undertake include improving the purchasing practices of the village as well as updating personnel data.

Obviously, running a \$2,000, 000 corporation such as the village, requires a full time chairman who can oversee policy. Running such a large ship,
with only the part-time crew Evanston
Niles had, was not only less Glenview
than economical, but was cer Lincolnwood



Over All Park Development Primary Interest

Park Commissioner Lou Schreiner, exasperated by the petty requests from residents at Tuesday's park board meeting, told the Board it was time to get going on the recent park planning study. After sit-ting quietly and listening to resident Ray Devlin tell about his area's concern over Ballard Park, then hearing residents from the Notre Dame area complain about water which does not drain from the field there. followed by contesting opinions about NICO Park, Chesterfield Gardens Park and an area behind Wright Tr. in east Niles. Schreiner said the over-all park development and land acquisition should be the primary interest of the park

Schreiner pointed out nothing has been done on the \$10,000 Alper study which was completed in recent months. He said he did not think the creation of another swimming pool was of prime importance but acquiring land was paramount, and action must be taken soon, or the Alper study will prove

Park Board president Jack Leske said no date was included in the report and the Board has to get the "faith of the public" before attempting any referendum. He said a great deal more planning would have to precede any action and even the park commissioners have not yet submitted their opinions on the Alperreport, even though it had been requested many

In other actions the park board reported a single tennis court will be completed in NICO by June of 68. A horseshoe pit will also be completed there by then. Re-surfacing in the park is schedule for September of 1968. Leske said Niles present parks need upgrading and a schedule for such efforts will be reported from time to time.
