



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



From The Left Hand

Sitting in on last week's park board meeting you couldn't help but wonder if the Board didn't have what might be called a group "death wish". While residents constantly peek away at the Board its members seem to get into the spirit of things by doing its own pecking, both at residents and at itself, causing a hopeless futility to be cast over the room, long before the meeting ends. When the final gavel adjourns you feel three hours just went down the drain, with nothing accomplished.

Park Board president Jack Leske seems to exemplify the "good guys finish last" thesis. In trying to be a good guy Jack gets hammered pretty good from all sides. While residents complain about park board inactivity, Jack has to handle park commissioners like Ray Eagan, who swings in all directions to little avail. When a lady from Ozanam Avenue merely asked about a backstop in the Oakton Park Eagan began berating residents who carp about the park in their home area. The lady, so taken back by the unusual retort, told the Board she understood why the Board accomplishes so little and why so few people turn up at these meetings, when they're mistreated in such a manner. While Eagan quickly apologized, the Park Board lost one more resident whose support they can ill afford to lose. The meeting, which never got off the ground, seemed to be going downhill for the rest of the evening.

The problems surrounding the park board are quite evident and we're not sure a great deal can be done to overcome them. To begin with, Niles has a pathetic group of parks. And because of the size and limited facilities, the recreational aspects of each park are limited. While past park boards might have to share its responsibility, residents in the district who turned down 6 out of 7 park referendums are the primary culprits for the present state of the district. In past years voters said "No" to a park where Lawrencewood now stands, and twice voted against a park between the Oak and Notre Dame Schools. In past years they also rejected local kiddie parks and most recently rejected the proposals surrounding the TAM area. Thus, while the park board can be faulted for not being attuned to the feelings of the community, the community can be criticized for not making its wishes known to the Board.

It is always very easy to simplify a problem. We've often thought the park board has a public relations problem. But this is really not true. Most Nilesites, sitting behind their brick walls have little or no contact with the park board except on voting day. And since they voted "No" everytime but once they are obviously not sold on the propositions presented to them. While all referendums can use the help of a well-organized selling job, what seems to move the voters to checking



Preliminary Plans To Be Drafted For Maine East Additions

Board of Education of Township High School Dist. 207, at a board meeting Oct. 16, approved the drafting of preliminary plans for additions and renovations at Maine Township High School East for an over-all design concept to house an instructional program for 3,500 students on an eight-period day. The school architect was instructed to proceed with these plans.

Dr. Short, Superintendent of Maine High schools, stated that the greatest influx of students can be expected at Maine Township High School East, with the student enrollment to reach about 4,474 by the 1970-71 school term. He further commented that it is hoped that the Maine North facility will be operable by the 1970-1971 school year, to take care of the overload of students at Maine East. According to the Board of Education and school officials, the year of 1971 should be the absolute opening date for Maine North.

The superintendent also stated that all available resources, leading to an evaluation of student population to be anticipated for subsequent school years, had been surveyed by members of the administrative staff and recently tabulated in an up-dated form.

Total student enrollment in the three Maine high schools (current and estimated) was reported as follows: 1967-1968 (actual) 9,940; 1968-1969 (esti-

mated) 10,530; 1969-1970 (estimated) 10,889; 1970-1971 (estimated) 11,240; 1971-1972 (estimated) 11,630. Ralph J. Frost, Assistant Superintendent, stated that all indications point to the eventual need to accommodate at least 14,000 students and that available facts further indicate that the total population served in the high school district will have reached 200,000 by 1980.

John L. Means, board member, Des Plaines and Dr. Short commented that a shift in school boundaries would be inevitable as additional high school facilities were added to the school district complex.

The board approved the appointments of two professional teachers and four new members of the office and/or custodial staff as recommended by Frost and Harold Markworth, school district business manager. Further items of board action related to the approval of the resolution for the sale of bonds as prepared by Allyn J. Franke, attorney and approval of the annual report and Application for Recognition of Township High School Dist. 207 for the 1967-1968 school year.

John W. Wilkins, Des Plaines, chairman of the finance committee, stated that a "target expenditure" of about \$7,000,000 was anticipated for the additions and renovations to the existing three high schools and that about \$7,500,000 to \$8,000,

000 could be anticipated for the construction of Maine North.

Board president E. Hoy McCannell, Park Ridge, called on Maine East Principal, John J. Clouser, to answer questions as presented by Mrs. Frank M. Voght, 9527 Greenwood dr., Des Plaines, (a citizen in the audience) related to a recent possible emergency situation during a homecoming assembly held in the Maine - East fieldhouse. Mr. Clouser stated that proper emergency plans and precautions were executed at all times and that staff committees consistently reviewed these plans and adopted changes as practical and in the best interest of all residents of the school facility.

Clouser concluded by commenting that the boy who had set fire to one of the 11 homecoming floats during the assembly period presently was in the custody of his parents and not in school, and that the school officials were continuing their investigation of the problem so that any future recurrence would be avoided.





Notre Dame Dons Defeat St. Edward's 47-13

Notre Dame pulled the plug on the St. Edward's Greenwaves' hopes of an upset, by trouncing the winless St. Ed's team, 47-13.

The Dons coasted to their 4th consecutive SCC win last Sunday.

St. Ed's kicked off to Notre Dame. The "Green Machine" went into gear, aided by three St. Ed's offensive penalties. Fullback Greg Luzinski bulled his way for seven yards, and the first of many Notre Dame touchdowns. After an illegal procedure penalty against the Dons, Greg booted the extra point.

After Notre Dame booted to the St. Ed's squad, the Greenwaves went into the shotgun formation. That is, the quarterback was the lone running back in the backfield about 10 yards from the line of scrimmage. The shotgun formation greatly facilitates the passing attack of a team.

The stout Don defense held and the offense took over at their own 42-yard line. Jim Lannon grabbed a Tom Lange pass for a 22 yard gain to the thirty six yard line of St. Ed's.
