We had a room addition added to the rear of our house last year and have had nothing but trouble with it. Water leaks in from the roof and snow blowing against the door will force it open. I have contacted the Ken-Ron Company several times and while they sent a man here he was unable to rectify the problem. We also telephoned the village but were told they only issued the permit but could not force the company to come out again. Since I've spoken to the president of the company, as well as many other people there, with little satisfaction, I'm hoping maybe BUGLELINE can help me with my problem.

BUGLELINE contacted Niles Building Department and was told Building Inspector Al Martin had written a letter to the company October 31.

While BUGLELINE would like to take some credit Mrs. Maziarz telephoned two days after first speaking to us and said the company had sent a workman to her home, apologized for the delay, and promised the errors would be corrected promptly.

We live in the townhouses on Nordica and we are having trouble with rats. We believe they are coming from the Forest Preserve area and would like something done about it. The Niles Health Department comes out but they can't go near the Forest Preserve area. We are all afraid for the children playing outside. Can't the Bureau of Forestry spray something so we can get rid of these? Thank you.

Mrs. L. Cohen, 7725A Nordica

Tony Guarnaccio, Niles Health Inspector, told BUGLELINE Niles has this problem in the Nordica area and in the Grand-Dempster area. He attributed the problem to the high density area. He said there are many transient people in the areas. He said the only answer to these areas is for the people themselves to police them. When newcomers move in, the residents themselves should explain the need for garbage being properly covered, he said in one area he has already given 12 tickets, but this means is not the solution. He noted the areas do not have civic organizations and do not have any leadership which might help solve this problem.

Guarnaccio noted a rat poison has been used in the forest preserve area, but it will take time to eliminate them. He also noted a cubic yard garbage container is used in some of the apartment buildings in the Nordica area and he would like to see a village ordinance created which would insist large apartment dwellings have these containers.

For a long time we have noticed a County Sheriff's police car which is parked in front of an apartment building in the 8600 block on Milwaukee Avenue. Is this the policy of the County to permit official cars to be taken home? Shouldn't cars be used around the clock to give the county residents better protection and police service?

Captain Newman, who is head of Division 1, which is located on Milwaukee Avenue, told BUGLELINE "some men within the department are allowed to take police cars home with them." He explained officers with the rank of lieutenant on up are so qualified. The Milwaukee Ave. station has 3 officers in this category. He said the "Tactical Unit", which is comprised of 5 men, also take home cars. These men are on 24 hour call. He also told BUGLELINE there are 24 cars assigned to the Niles station, thus, 8 out of 24 cars go home with the officers from this station.

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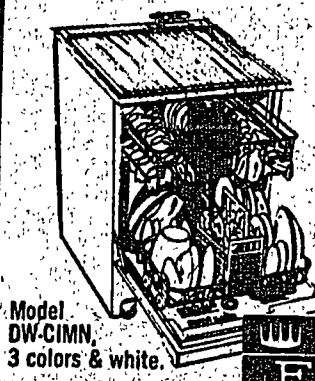
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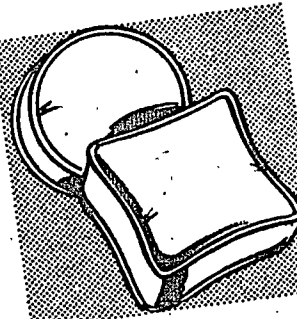

Postmaster Robert R. Lutz said today that parents and teenagers should be aware that willful damage to mailboxes or mail receptacles is a Federal Crime. The Federal law provides that anyone who willfully or maliciously injures, tears down, or destroys any mailbox or other

receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the mailbox, or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited in the mailbox may be fined \$1,000 or imprisoned for up to three years.

Postmaster Lutz Tells Residents To Start Mailing Christmas Parcels & Cards

spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "Excellent" according to Mr. Lutz. Every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with increased volume because of the continuing strength of the economy, we are hoping to see that same fine cooperative spirit again.

Postmaster Lutz offered these mailing tips:

1. Put ZIP in your Christmas mail. Add Zip Codes to address and return address.
2. Airmail cards and parcels should be mailed to Ser-

vicemen overseas no later than December 11.

3. Gift parcels to distant States should be mailed by December 4th, and those for local delivery by December 13.

4. All gifts should be packed in sturdy boxes, wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning is important.

5. Each parcel mailed should include a slip showing the person to whom addressed and a list of the contents. In case outer wrapping comes loose, your gift will still be delivered.

6. Greeting cards with a 5¢ stamp (first class) may be sealed and contain writing. They are given priority in delivering and forwarding. Those sent

third class (4¢) are afforded none of the above advantages.

7. You can help the Post Office by separating greeting cards into local and out-of-town bundles and using labels provided.

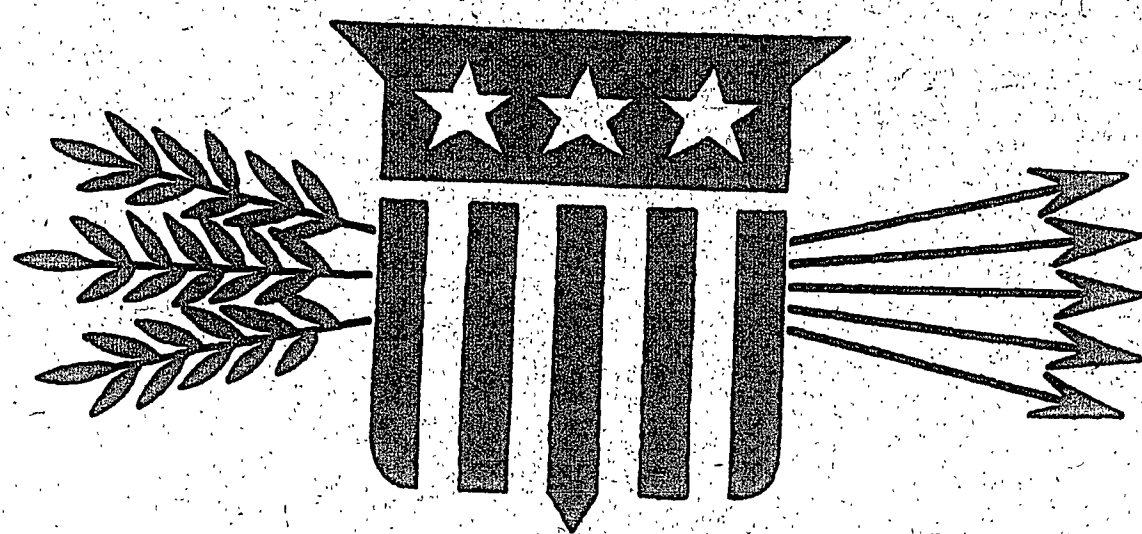

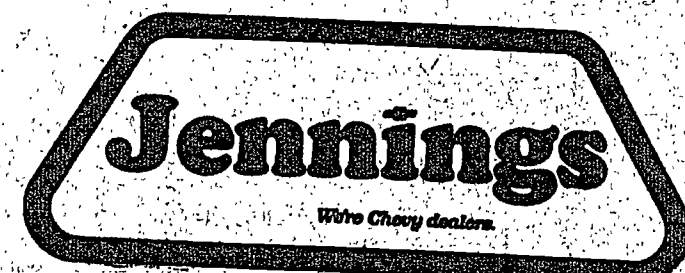

Students, Teachers Occupy New Washington Addition

Students in the intermediate level and nine teachers are now housed in the recently completed 10 - room addition to Washington School in East Maine School District No. 63.

Construction of the addition was completed on schedule on Oct. 29 with teachers, custodians, children and Principal Milo Hellman working over the weekend to make the move.

"This addition transforms Washington School into one of

the most effective educational plants in this district, if not in this entire area," Superintendent Hugh E. McGuigan commented in describing the new addition.

With a design somewhat similar to the Melzer School addition, the new addition to Washington School was built to provide optimal conditions for team teaching and a nongraded system.

The addition is sectioned into

two units, each containing five standard-size classrooms (with interlocking partitions) and two seminar rooms. The fifth classroom can be sectioned in half for two small-size classrooms. The addition also contains two teachers rooms and several storage areas.

"This kind of structure provides flexibility," Superintendent Hugh E. McGuigan said, "to allow teachers to divide students into groups of 15 to 25, depending upon instruc-

tional requirements. A teacher can now make this decision, uninhibited by the structure of the building."

Three teams of three teachers each will instruct some 225 students in large groups, small groups or on an independent-study basis.

Teachers and students were housed temporarily in the gym and the library until the addition was completed. During this time, the teachers worked

closely together in teams.

Principal Milo Hellman in describing the feeling of teachers and students, repeated the comment of a young student gleefully moving his books into the new addition. "This is the most exciting day of my life," the youngster cried, as he made his second trip.

Morton Grove Woman's Meeting About Vietnam

What began as an ordinary monthly meeting for the Morton Grove Woman's Club Thursday, November 9, in Hackney's Restaurant on Lake, Glenview, actually turned into one of the most soul-stirring afternoons in the fourteen-year history of the club. President Mrs. Philip Johnson, 9108 Marmora, conducted her business meeting as usual, and introduced her thirteen honored guests in recognition of Morton Grove Woman's Club annual Reciprocity Day. Eight presidents from neighboring women's clubs visited Morton Grove this year, and the club was especially thrilled to have representatives from Illinois Federated Women's Clubs: Mrs. Chauncey W. Olson, 1240 Raleigh Road, Glenview, President of tenth district, Mrs. William Egan, 8300 Elmwood, Niles, Vice-President Elect of Northern Region, and Mrs. Robert Rickerts, 1890 Old Briar Road, Highland Park, who is the state Publicity and Press Chairman.

The real excitement this afternoon began when Lt. Allen Wilder, Troop Commander with the United States Army at Fort Sheridan, presented a program on the subject of Viet Nam. Lt. Wilder, who is 24 years old, married, and the father of one child, has served in the Army since 1961. He originates from Carleton, Georgia. He was wounded in his fifth month as a commander of a group of men serving in the infantry in Viet Nam, and won the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart. He spoke honestly and freely of his experiences, his impressions of the people of Viet Nam, many of whom thought a bar of soap was something you ate and of the many diseases that propagate in insect-infested, unsanitary, and swamp-like living conditions. He spoke of the pleasures the servicemen receive from anything they can use to heat up a can of "C" Rations and make a cup of instant coffee three times a day. When the men don't have sterno or heat tablets to warm up their food, they are delighted to have the mosquito repellents the club has been sending, which they then use, ignited, as an instant stove. Another item we take for granted that can be put to limitless uses is an ordinary plastic bag. Especially during the monsoon season when everything gets drenched, and the men's feet turn raw from walking in perpetual moisture, and even the sleeping bags and blankets aren't dry, plastic bags

Lt. Wilder answered questions the women asked about many problems that we here in the states can pursue as we watch our men being sent to Viet Nam. Lt. Bob Schilling, son of Mr. E. Mrs. Robert L. Schilling, 5424 Washington Street, M.G., who recently returned from Viet Nam with Two Bronze Stars, the distinguished Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, and a Purple Heart, and Corp. Jerry Stern, son of Mr. & Mrs. Gerald Stern, 8840 Mansfield, who also recently returned after serving one year as an artillery Forward Observer in Viet Nam, were guests in the audience. Lt. Wilder invited the men to join him and Morton Grove Woman's Club had the thrilling experience of hearing three men with varied experiences in Viet Nam each reveal candid and personal thoughts and all answer queries. The men's feelings were unanimous that we should be fighting in Viet Nam, and they felt we should escalate "and really give the North Vietnamese a good left and a right to the jaw." Mrs. Thomas Mick, 9120 Marmora, Operation Viet Nam Chairman asked that all of us here in Morton Grove remember the men in Viet Nam on Thanksgiving Day and that the people of our community ask just a few words in prayer that the war may be ended . . . soon.
