## From The Left Hand

When we review back issues of THE BUGLE for preparing the "You Read It In The Bugle" column we always hold a one-man post mortem by asking ourselves, "Why wasn't this done, or that done when Niles had the opportunity?"

Many years ago we were told the village had a golden opportunity to purchase the Bunker Hill area when it had a very desirable golf course. And while you'd have to go back perhaps 20 years in Niles' history we often thought the old golf course at Milwaukee and Dempster, which is now part of the Maryhill cemetery, would also have been a very desirable acquisition for village purposes.

In those days Niles did not have any park district (the present one began in 1954) and whatever recreational needs the community had were fulfilled by voluntary efforts, or had to be provided by the village. And since Niles did not have a great deal of funds fulfilling these needs was likely beyond its capacity. While a referendum might have aided in the park-less, library-less community the very small village obviously did not feel the need for such purchases. Only when the community burgeoned, and when a younger group demanded such services were they filled.

Today, there is one glaring piece of property on Milwaukee Avenue south of Oakton Street, which is sitting idle. While it is now very expensive property the village and (or) the park district could very well seek the

The tentative schedule for team practice is assigned at Oak School Gym 2 nights a week. There will be one hour of practice during the week between the hours of six and nine P.M.

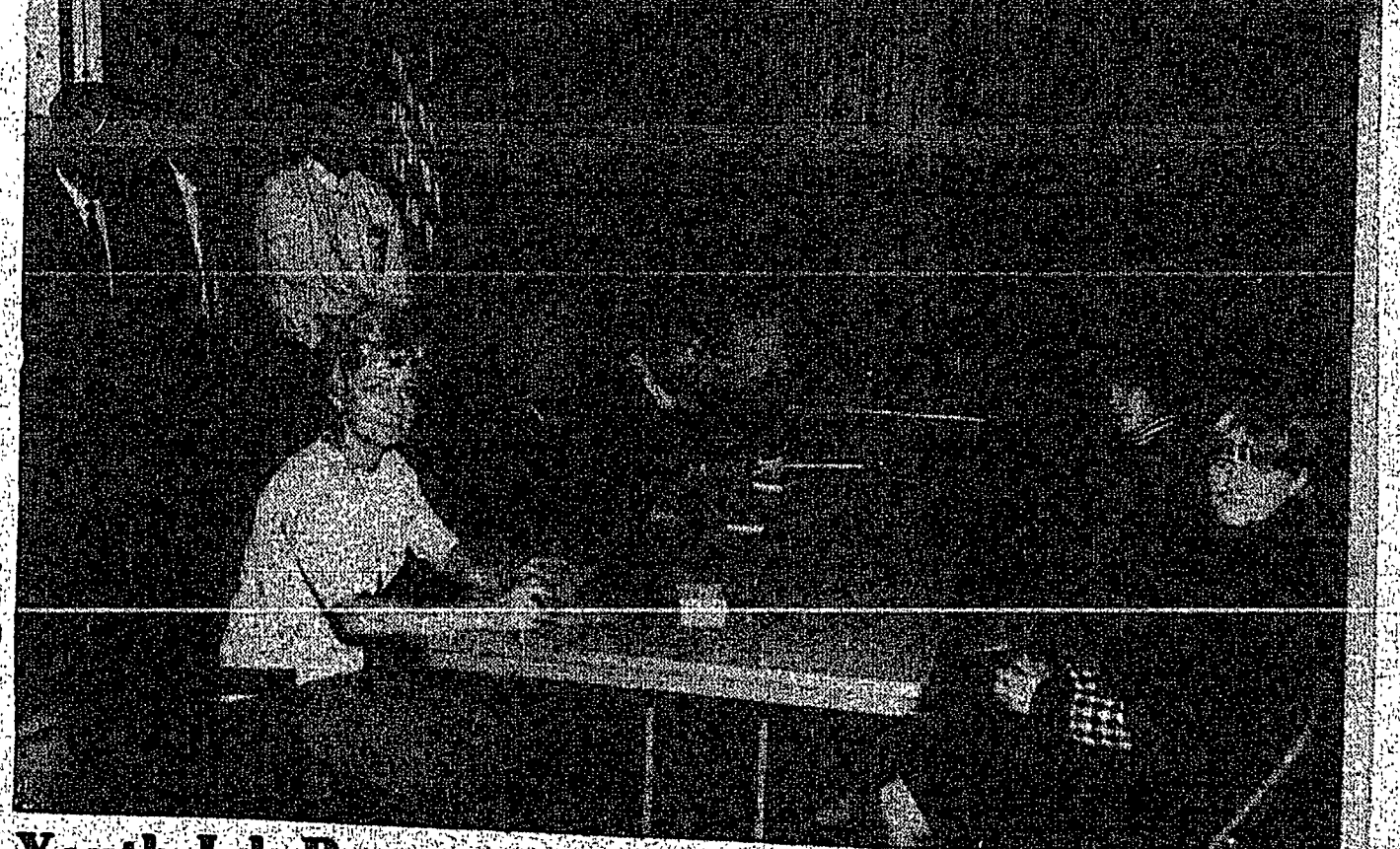

## You're On The BUGLELINE

Read where the reserve police force in Des Plaines has ceased operations because of a recent court decision which outlaws such departments as now constituted in many Illinois cities. What is the disposition of the Niles police reserve?

Police Chief "Whitey" Emrikson told BUGLELINE Niles police reserve is under the Civil Defense Corps and only serves Niles police force in an auxiliary fashion. He said he made a careful study of the case which concerned a court decision of the reserve unit in the village of Justice. They have an elected fire and police commission and the village officials appointed policemen without going thru the F & P Commission, usurping the latter's elected authority. Here in Niles the men appointed to the reserve are used only in auxiliary positions, relieving regular officers for law enforcing duties. No reserve policeman has ever issued a ticket and no reserve officer has ever appeared in court representing the village. He said Niles ordinance will probably have to be amended to specify this distinction. Emrikson also noted Niles police force has 46 full time officers and 30 reserve policemen.

There is a building going up on Oakton Street just east of Foremost Liquors. Is this a commercial building, and if so, what type of business will be there?

A 7-11 store will be built there, Building Commissioner Al Martin told BUGLELINE. Footings for the new building are expected to be made this week. Occupancy in the new building can be expected in about 2 to 3 months.

We've seen many autos which drive over the curb when they make a left turn off Milwaukee Ave. and seek parking in areas which are separated from the street by the high curbing. Since the drivers are confused, as proof of this axle-breaking turn, why doesn't the state or the village paint the curbing yellow?

We have seen this problem enacted in front of our office several times a week. It is very hazardous since people walk or wait for cars to pick them up on the walk there. Commissioner Martin suggested a luminous yellow be painted on the side of the curb forewarning drivers of the high curb which is obviously not discernible by many drivers.

## St. Luke's United Church Of Christ Celebrates 10th Anniversary

On Sunday, December 10th, St. Luke's United Church of Christ will be celebrating its 10th Anniversary. On Sunday, December 8, 1957, the young congregation received its charter from the old North Illinois

Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and 87 charter members were received into the fellowship of the church under the pastoral guidance of Rev. Armin Munz.

Rev. Munz spent about 2 and a half years at St. Luke's and then the congregation called Rev. Paul Stock of St. Louis. Under the guidance of Pastor Stock, the present facilities were constructed and the congregation grew. Pastor Stock resigned in January of 1963 and in July of 1963 the present minister, Pastor Charles Ross came to Morton Grove. The

congregation has continued to grow and will embark upon an extensive building program in the spring of next year.

On Sunday, December 10th, the Rev. Paul Stock will be present at the Anniversary celebration and will deliver the sermon at both services of worship, 9:30 and 11 a.m.

The ceremonies will conclude with a banquet that evening at the Pyramus Restaurant. The Rev. Dr. William Rest, Conference Minister of the Illinois Conference, United Church of Christ, will be the main speaker.

## Contract Awarded For Stevenson School In Dist. 63

A \$839,325 contract was awarded to Ragnar & Olson, Inc., 6050 North Keystone Ave., Chicago, for the construction of the Adlai E. Stevenson School at Ballard Road and Woodview Lane in East Maine School District No. 63 at the regular Nov. 14 meeting of the board of education of District 63.

Trimming wherever possible, the Board managed to cut \$59,285 from the original bid by accepting some 15 deductive proposals on the original plans and specifications. The changes were all eliminations or substitutions of esthetic features not affecting the practical function of the building.

Ragnar & Olson, Inc., was the low bidder among seven original bidders.

Construction on the new team teaching, nongraded school will begin immediately. The contractor estimates that classrooms and office areas of the building will be completed by August 1, 1968, with the remainder to be completed by August 15, 1968.

Superintendent Hugh E. McGulgan noted that in drafting the educational specifications of the Adlai Stevenson School, extensive research on the kinds of school buildings constructed in recent years was undertaken in order to "bring to the people

of the community an excellent educational facility which at the same time is within the community's financial means."

He praised the Board for "exerting a great deal of influence on the architect to reduce the cost of the building without reducing the effectiveness of any portion of the educational facility itself."

The new school, to be constructed to facilitate team teaching and the nongraded approach in education, will combine features of the Shelley Nathanson School and the Washington and Meizer school additions found to be educationally practical.

The final design provides for five instructional areas, two double kindergarten rooms, an all-purpose room, an instructional resource center (library) and a special large-group instructional area.

Four of the instructional areas contain four classrooms with movable partitions and adjacent seminar rooms each; a fifth instructional area contains two classrooms with an adjacent large-group instructional area. Total capacity of the building will be 700 children.

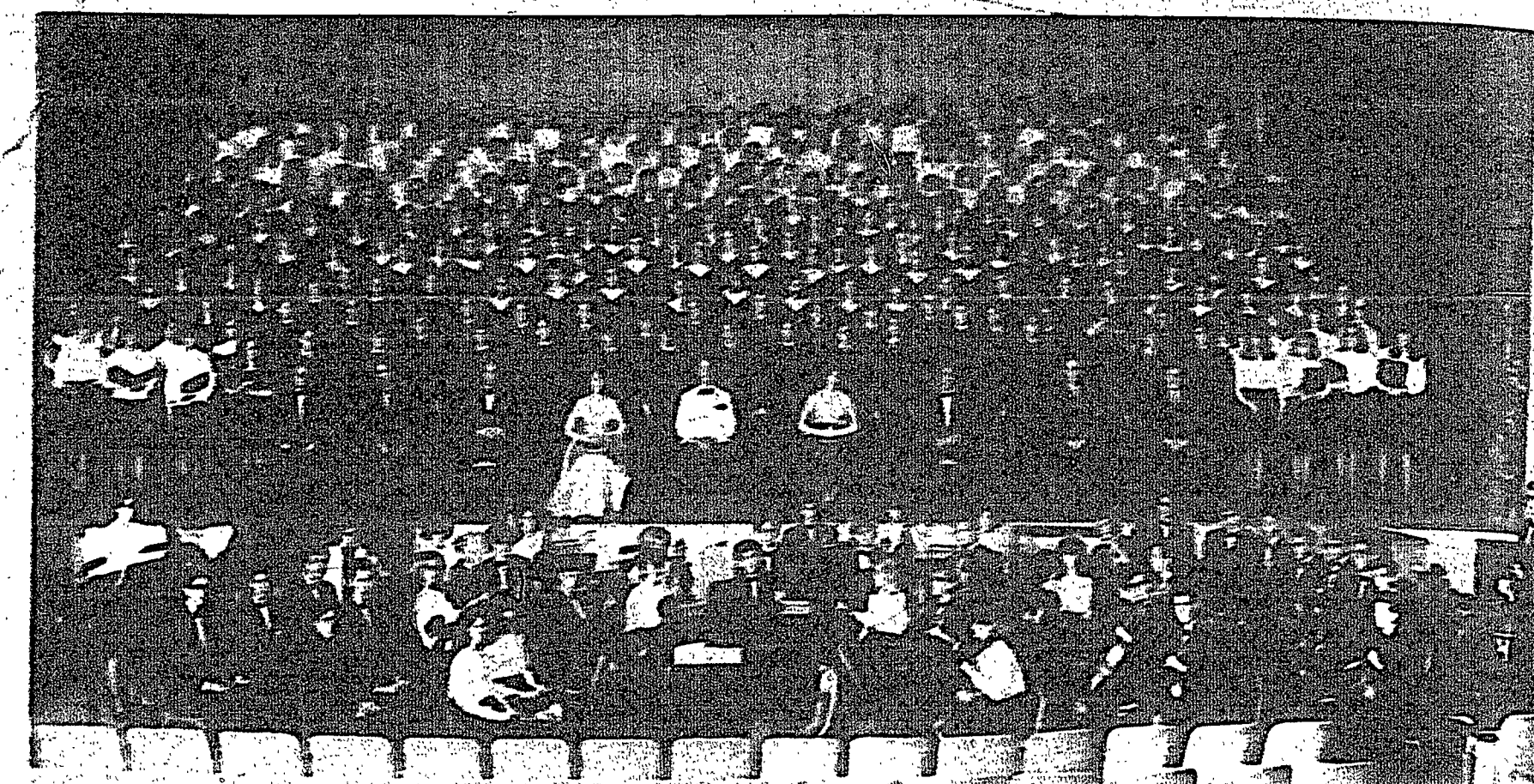

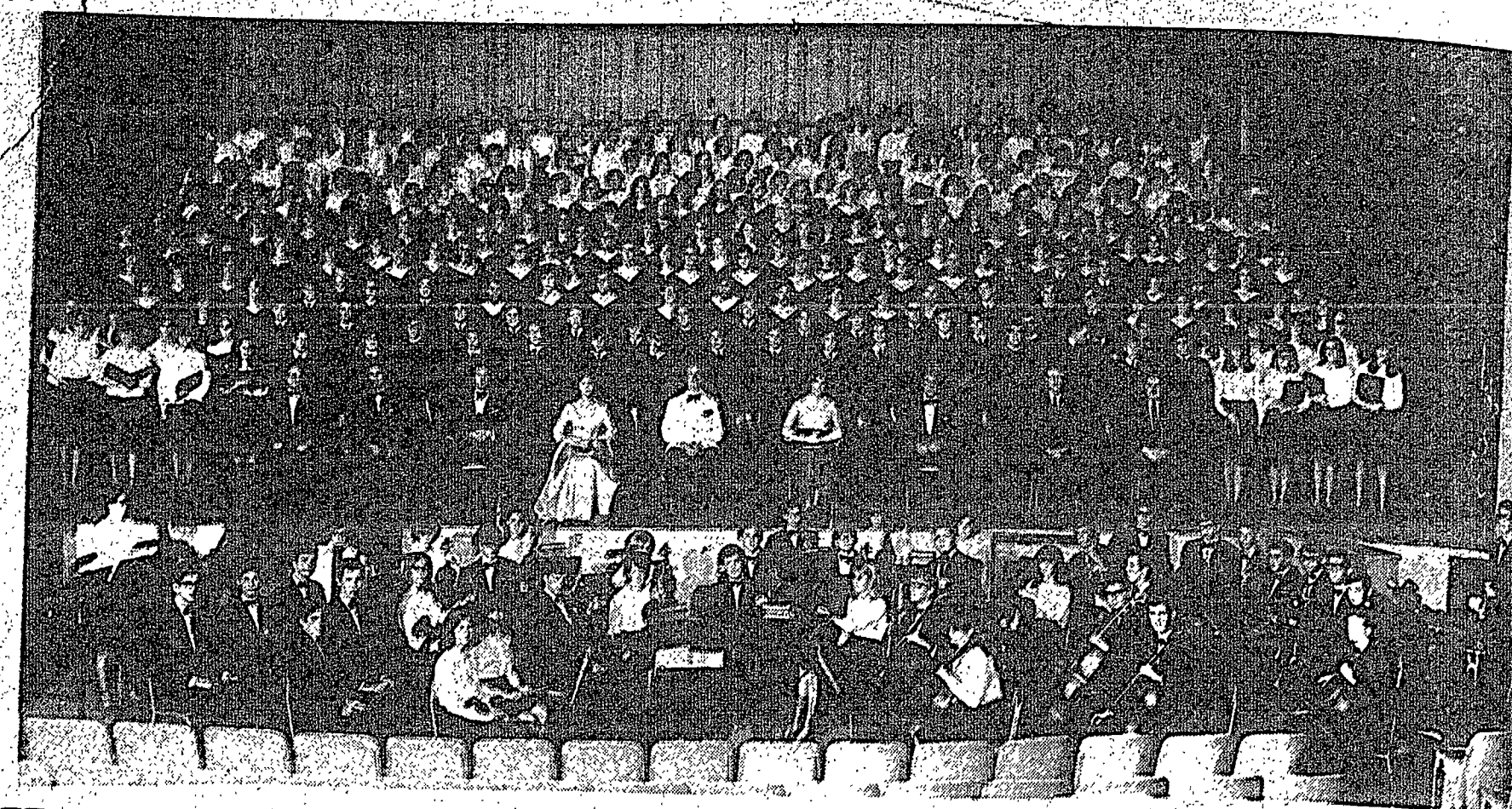

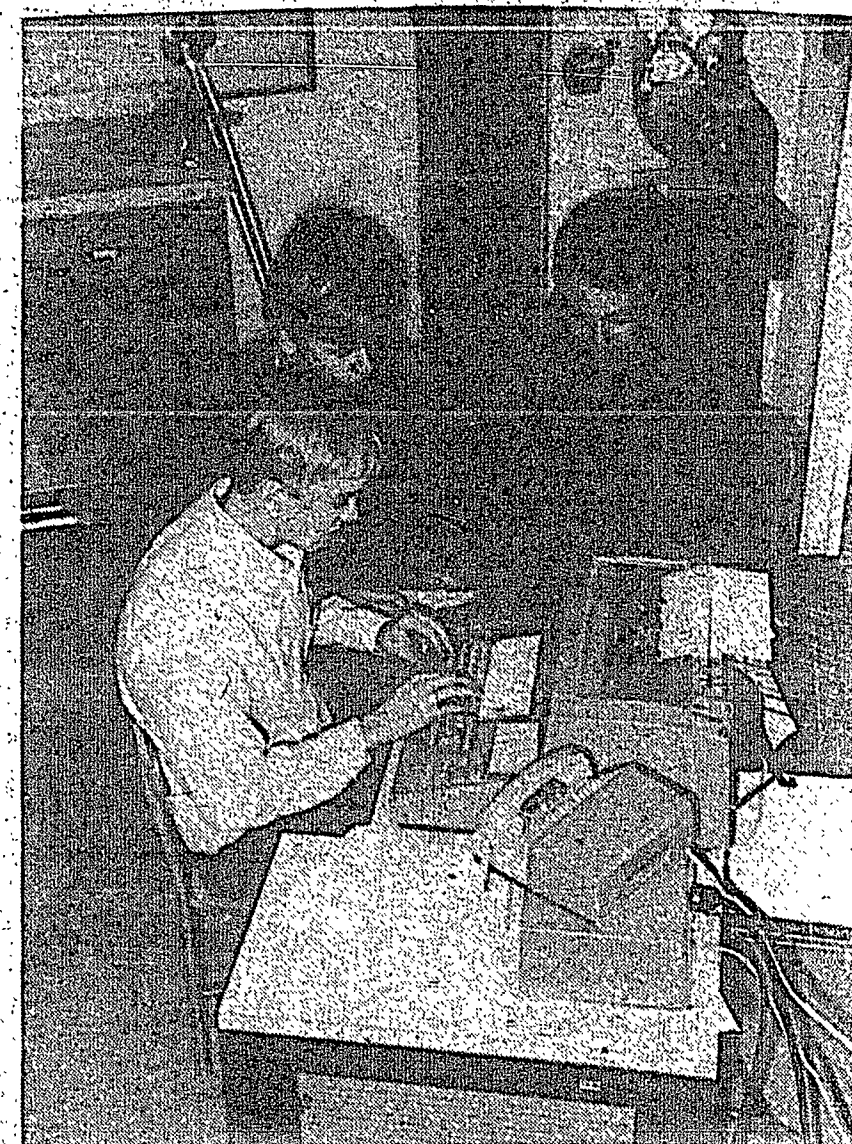

## Niles Safety Council Gives Pointers On Night Driving

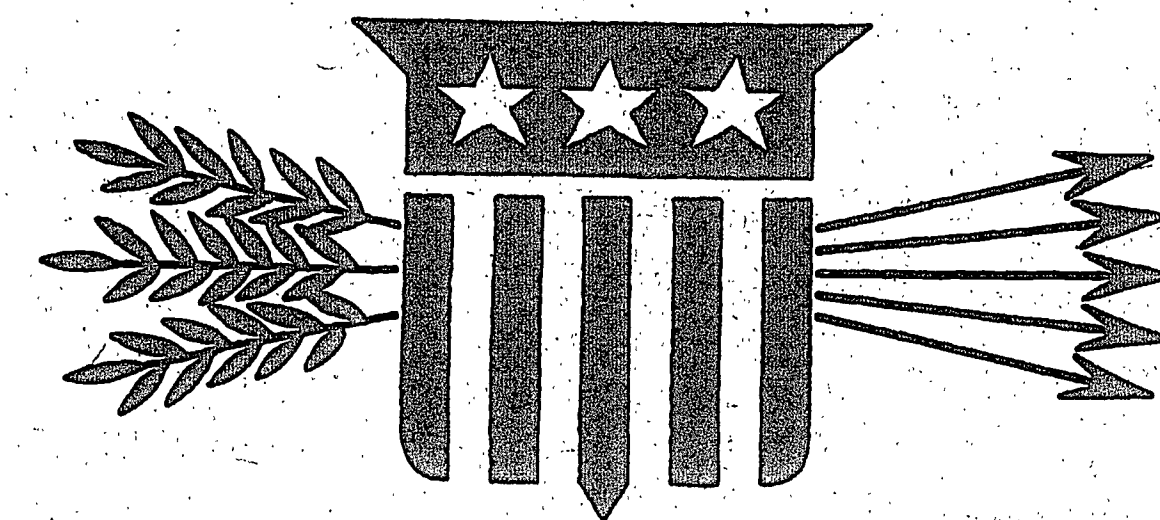
observe the following rules while driving at night:

- \*Drive at least 10 mph slower than you normally do in daylight.
- \*Never overdrive your headlights. Remember, it takes just as long to stop as in the daytime but you can't see as far ahead. Adjust your speed to this condition.
- \*Pull out of parking spaces and side streets more cautiously. Look behind your car before you back out of that driveway. There may be a pedestrian in dark clothing in your path.
- \*Stay well behind the car ahead and watch for his signals. Remember, he may not signal before making that left turn in front of

- you. Be ready for him.
- \*Avoid glare blindness by keeping your eyes on the shoulder or lane and edge line markings. Never stare into the direct beam of headlights.
- \*Use your headlights, not parking lights, when in motion. (Illinois law requires headlights and prohibits parking lights for night driving or when visibility is so limited that lights are required for safety.)
- \*Never wear sunglasses at night and keep your headlights, windows and windshield clean. Dirty headlights will further reduce your visibility.
- \*Always watch carefully for advance warning and information signs at night so you can avoid making snap decisions and sudden maneuvers that will take other drivers by surprise.
- \*Dim your lights when meeting or following another car. Remember, headlight glare works both ways.
