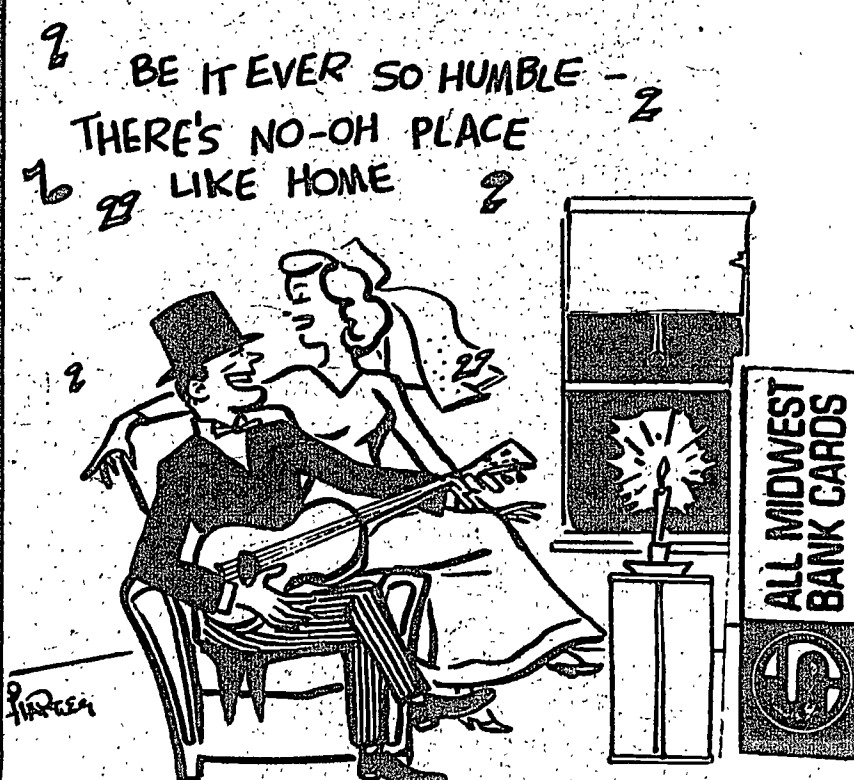
Notre Dame Alumni Plan Annual Christmas Dance

RESIDENTS MUST REQUEST PARK FOR CHESTERFIELD AREA

Gabriel Berrafato, Attorney for the Niles Park District told the Board Tuesday night, "If the people living in Chesterfield Estates area would show some interest in the Chesterfield Park site, we would try to release the park."

According to Berrafato, a representative of the Chesterfield Homeowners Assoc. appeared at a past meeting stating that he would circulate a petition de-

claring interest in the park.

Obviously it would be easier for the Village to maintain this park and to possibly, in the future perhaps, add lighting, and a park is much more desirable than another townhouse unit.

Mr. Berrafato concluded by saying if the people do nothing we can assume that they do not care and the Board will have no

other alternative than to abandon it.

Donald Ketchum, Supt. of Recreation, expressed annoyance that it is a shame that the park district has to rent school facilities for their basketball program, since there is now a definite need for a complete gymnasium in the park district.

ward to 1968 as a year of greater growth not only to the Jaycees but of continued service to the Village of Niles and surrounding communities. Rounding out the year in a

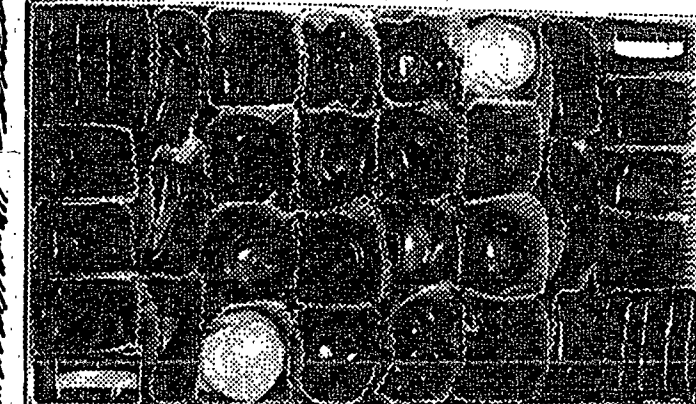

Purchase Flame Retardant Artificial Christmas Trees

flame retardant tree is so marked,

— Have a Fire Safe Christmas —

There seems to be some controversy over the report concerning the hazards of artificial Christmas Trees which was issued by the Niles Fire Prevention Bureau.

A number of trees were tested by this department to determine the flamespread of the artificial trees. It was found that Polyethylene does ignite and burn readily. However the P.V.C. (Polyvinyl Chloride) or flame retardant type tree will not support combustion or contribute to the spread of fire.

Among the trees tested was the "Mr. Christmas" — line which is manufactured by Mr. Christmas, Inc. This firm manufactures a variety of artificial trees and in talking with Mr. Brown, Vice-President of the Company, we are assured that the trees distributed in Niles are of the flame retardant type. Our tests on the "Mr. Christmas" offered for sale in Niles indicate that they are of the flame retardant type.

However, there are untreated artificial trees which will burn readily and Niles residents are cautioned to purchase the flame retardant type. It was found that the container of the

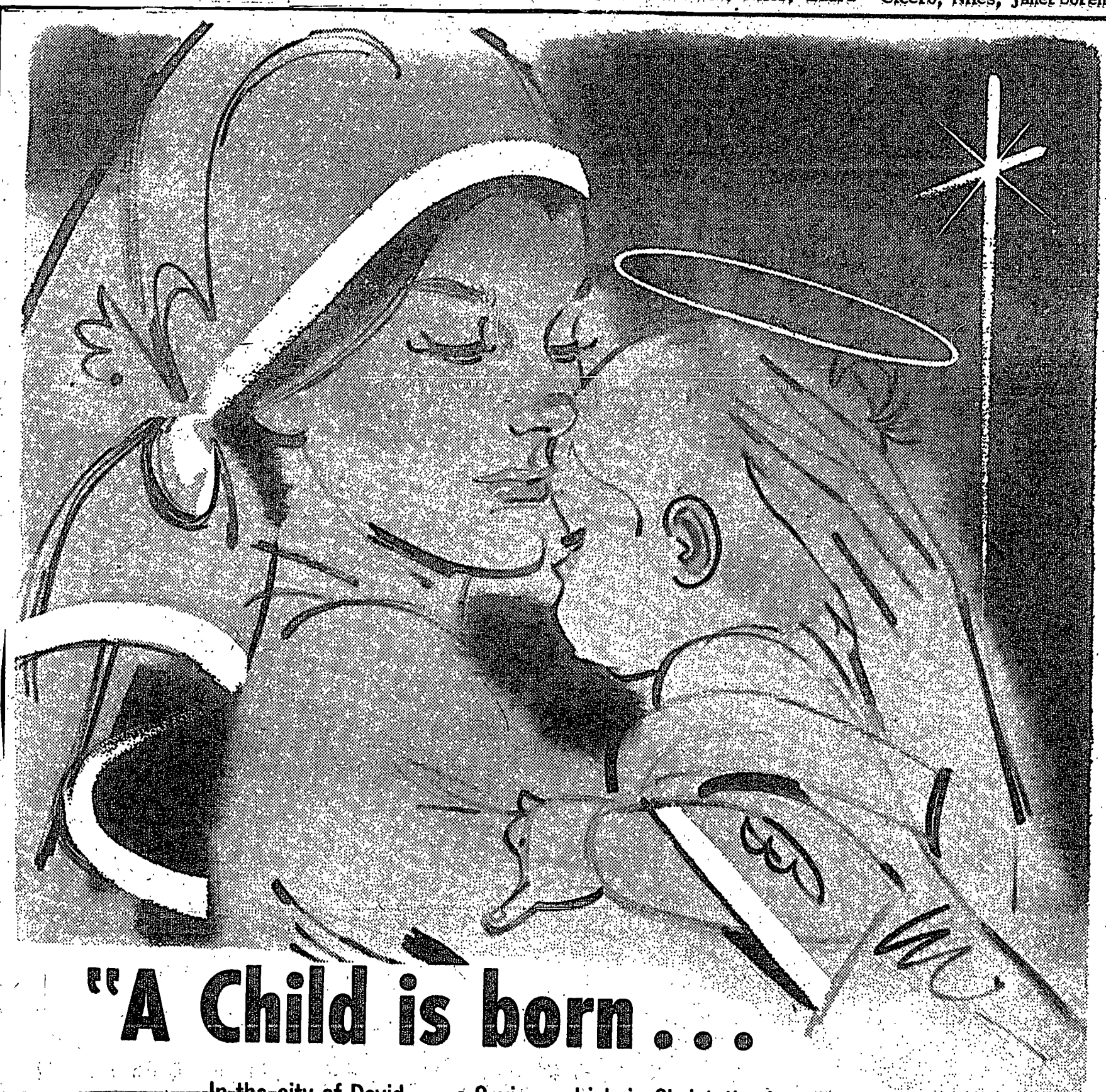

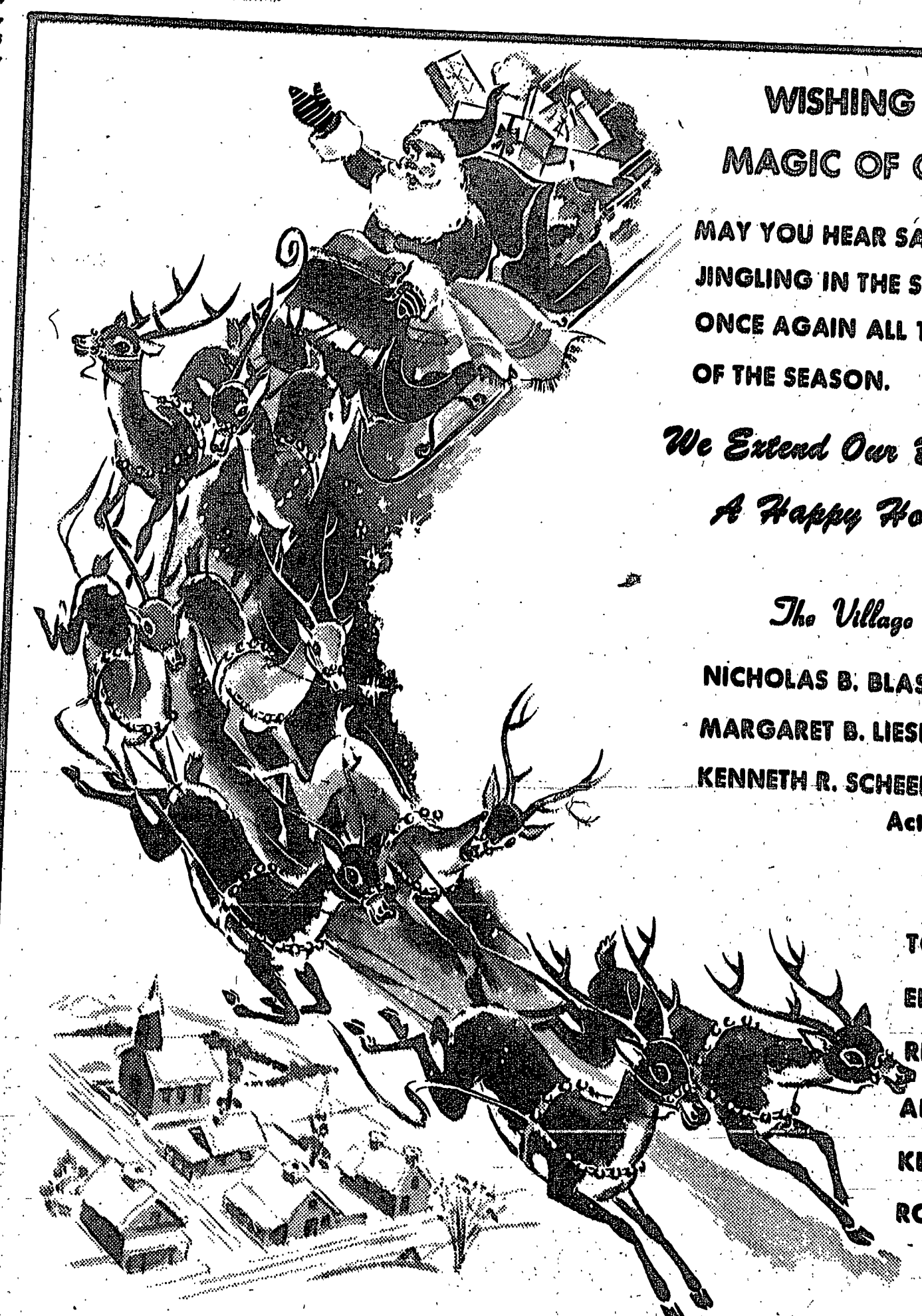

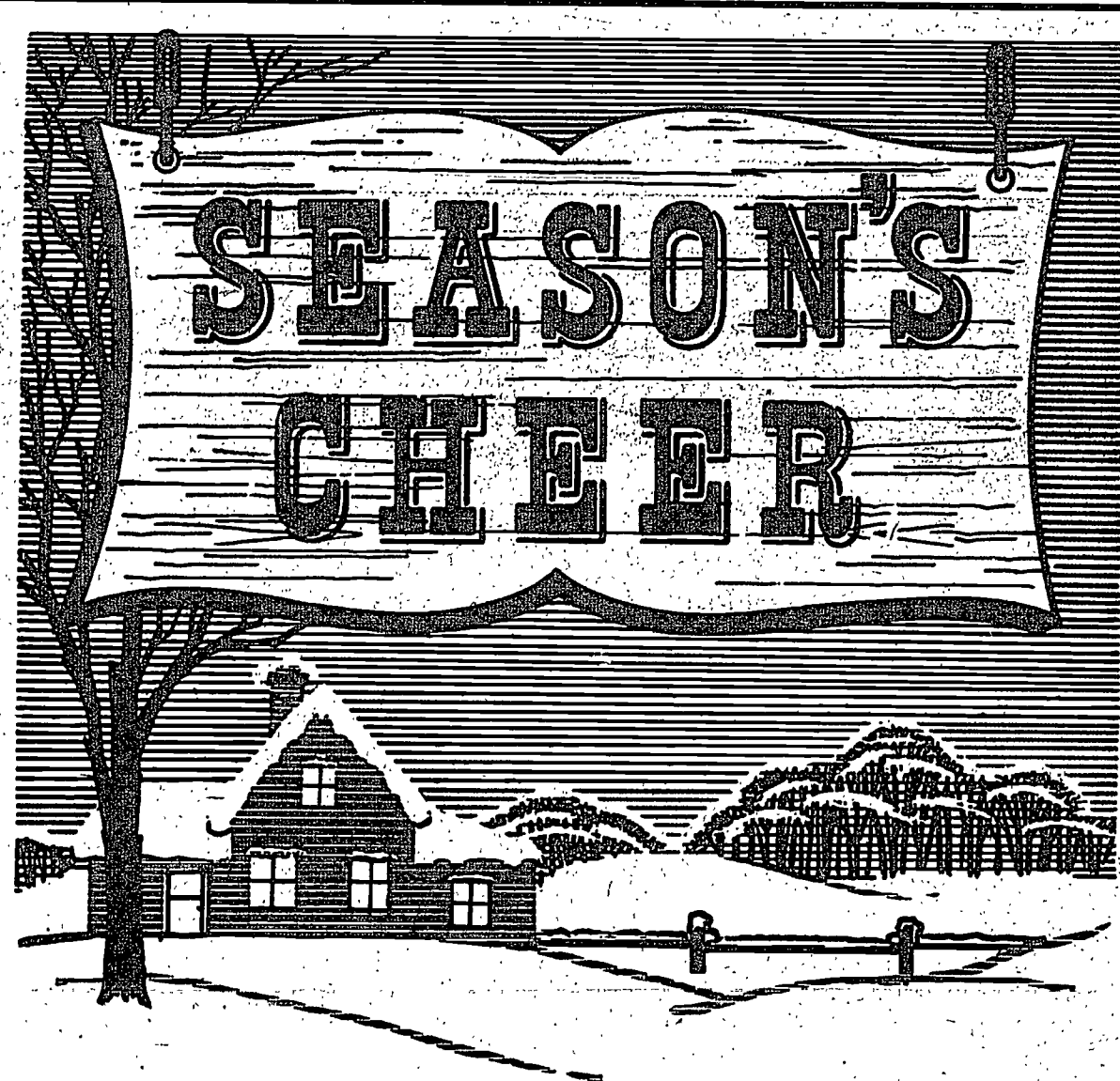

Niles Safety Council Suggests To "Dry Up The Office Party"

One of the best Christmas presents a company can give its employees and their families is

help in keeping them together for the holidays—and a good way to do this is to dry up the office party.

Many companies have learned the hard way that liquor at the office celebration has resulted in one or more of their employees spending the holidays in the hospital instead of at home with their families.

"The employer has a moral responsibility toward his employees and their families," says Howard Pyle, President of the National Safety Council. "And we receive gratifying reports every year that more and more companies are living up to this responsibility by cutting out liquor at their office celebrations."

"If the party is 'wet', however, the company should certainly provide some kind of safe transportation home for the celebrants—perhaps taxis or chartered buses."

Special studies made by the Council show that more than half

the drivers involved in fatal accidents during past Christmas seasons had been drinking. But the problem is not confined to the drinking driver. One-fourth of all motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas holiday season involve pedestrians.

To help reduce the annual Christmas traffic toll, the Council is asking support from religious and civic groups and traffic officials, as well as its 9,000 business, industrial and governmental members.

"Motor vehicle deaths can be reduced considerably this holiday season if people partake of their Christmas 'spirits' only at home and remember not to drive afterward," says Pyle. "The Christmas spirit itself, however, should not be confined to the home. It should prevail on the highways, too."

"Drivers can show good will toward men' by obeying the rules of the road and practicing common courtesy and good sense at all times."

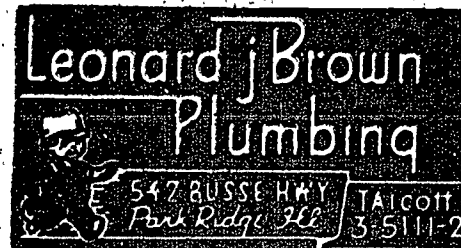

cerebral palsy according to Arthur Rubloff, Chairman of the Board of United Cerebral Palsy of Greater Chicago. The "march" will take place on Sunday, January 14, 1968.

Mrs. Reid, in accepting the chairmanship, said that fine cooperation had been given by local residents in the past. She said, "United Cerebral Palsy needs the generous support of our community again—not only in money, but in volunteer help as well".

A goal of \$500,000 has been set for Cook, Lake, DuPage and Kane counties. There are now more than 21,000 children and adults with cerebral palsy in the Greater Chicago area. The funds collected on the march support the Agency's program of direct services, research, and education. Direct services include a Child Developmental Center, summer camp programs for children and adults, adult activity groups and family counseling. In the last year

allocations totaling \$98,162.00 were made to support research projects and professional training in the state of Illinois, at such leading institutions as the University of Illinois, Chicago Medical School, Cook County and Michael Reese Hospitals.

Cerebral palsy usually strikes near or at the time of birth. It is a crippling condition caused by damage to the motor control centers of the brain. The "53-Minute March" theme is significant because it is estimated a child is born with cerebral palsy every 53 minutes.

There is no known cure and the person with cerebral palsy lives a normal life span with this condition; however, they can be, and are, helped to achieve a more worthwhile life through the services provided by United Cerebral Palsy.

District 63 Children Learn Through Nature

The old adage that Mother Nature is the best teacher is gaining new respect from a number of educators around the country, including those of East Maine School District No. 63, who believe it contains more than a small amount of truth.

Miss Delores Nied and her class of sixth grade students from Oak School in District 63, in fact, turned to Mother Nature this week for some lessons termed "perhaps the most extensive and meaningful single educational opportunity these children will ever experience."

The students lived and "went to school" Dec. 18-21 on the 340 acres of the Outdoor Educational School in Rockford, operated by the public school system of Rockford, on the ground where old Camp Grant was once located.

No part of the regular curriculum was excluded. The children studied arithmetic, for instance, by measuring the circumference of trees and finding wind velocities, social studies by reviewing the history and geography of the Camp Grant area, language arts by labeling and identifying specimen, science by making weather observations and identifying birds.

Art, health, hygiene, safety, music and physical education were included in the curriculum in other ways.

In addition to almost all forms of natural habitat characteristics of the area, the 340-acre school ground contains a trapper's cabin and local cemetery with the graves of men and women who died during the Blackhawk Indian Wars.

Hubert Moran, principal of Oak School, believes such an outdoor educational trip can provide a culminating experience for the students: an in-depth meshing of information, concepts and relationships studied earlier in textbooks in the classroom.

In addition to basic curriculum studies, Mr. Moran says students benefit from an opportunity for independent action and social interaction, observing the practical aspects of conservation, actual contact with the growing extinction of animals and their natural habitat and the associated social problems of air and water pollution.

"The children learn much more," Mr. Moran says, "when education is based on first-hand experience. Grounding an educational program in reality is the most difficult thing a teacher has to do."

The children ate family style and slept dormitory style at a residence center, Atwood Lodge, at the school. Two specially trained outdoor education teachers assisted Miss Nied creating a ratio of eight students per teacher. A nurse was on 24-hour call.

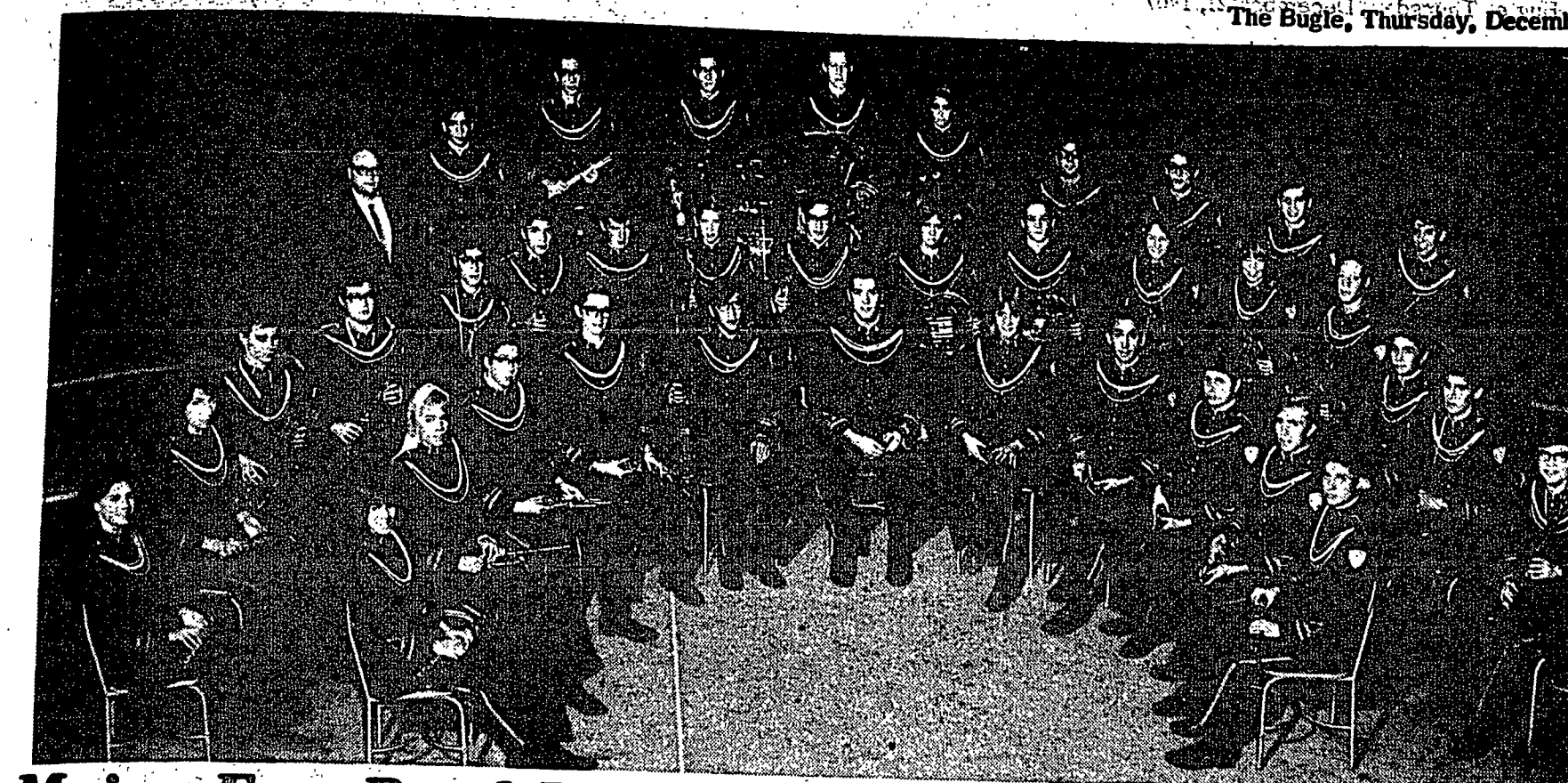
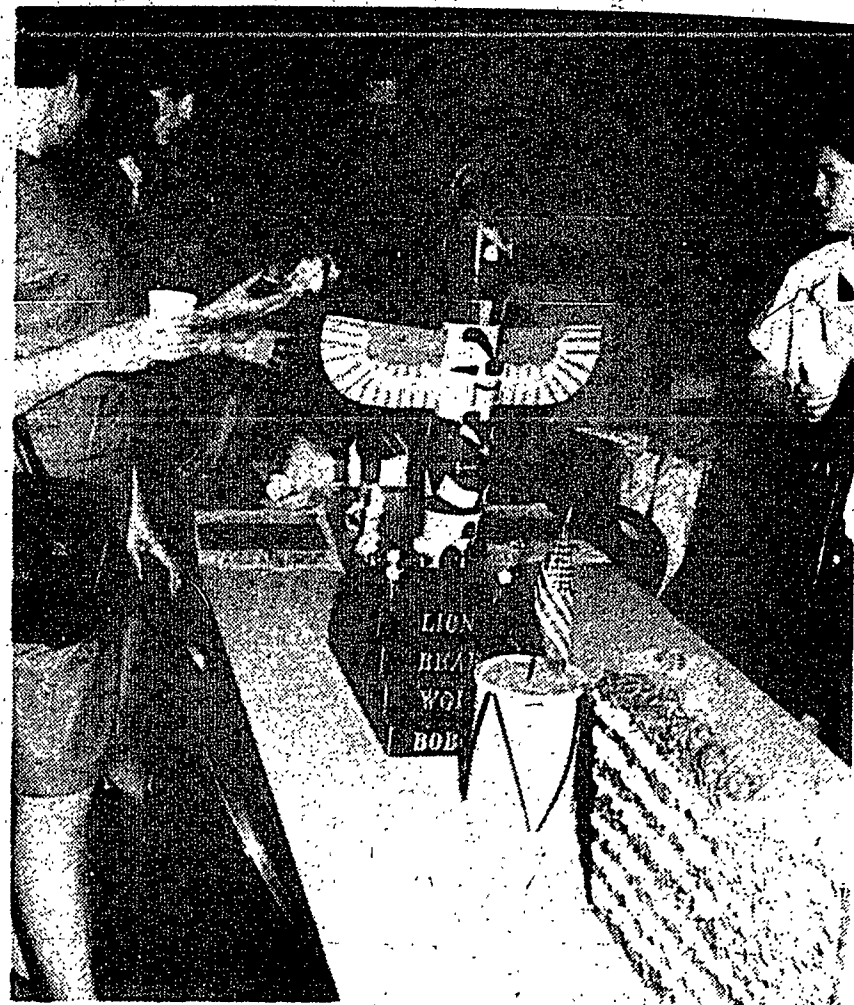
Miss Nied attended a three-day outdoor education workshop during the summer sponsored by the Cook County Forest Preserve District in preparation for the week in Rockford with her class.



From viewing my seven brother's and sister's lives I can say we are not "frustrated" - we have grown instead to respect our neighbor's privacy and property.

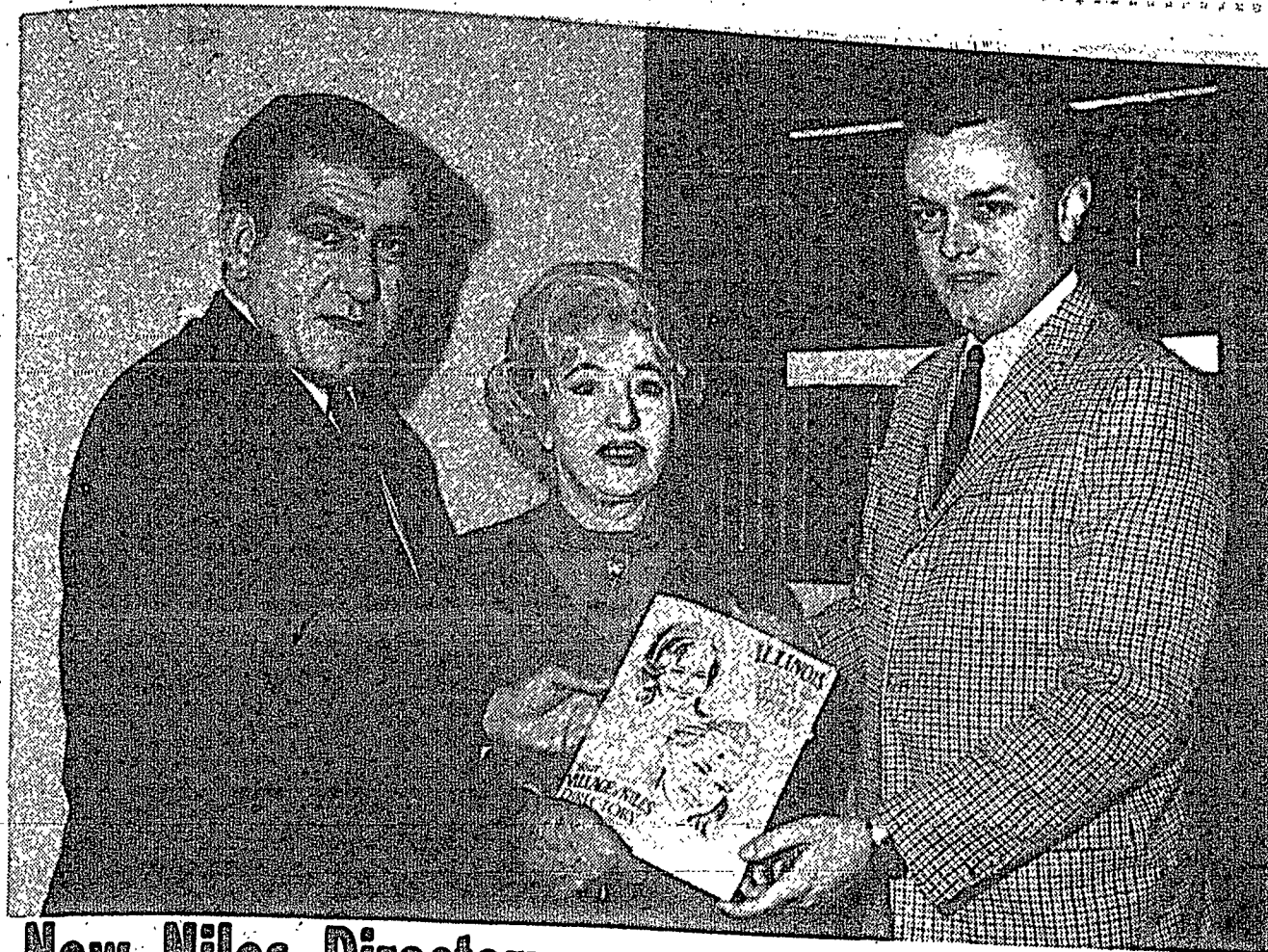
