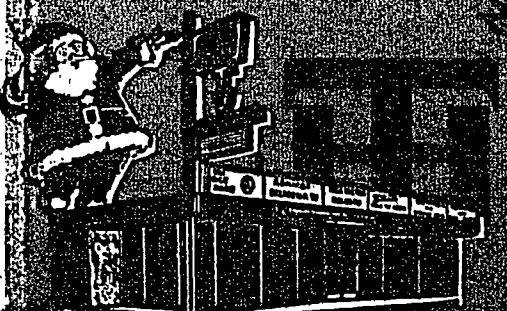

Approve Family Service Bureau For Niles

Niles trustees unanimously approved an ordinance Tuesday night which will create a Family Service Bureau exclusively for the village, a plan which will aid families with personal problems. Patterned after a similar bureau in Oak Lawn, the Niles facility will have a full time executive director and secretary and will have at least one full time case worker who will contact Nilesites in need of help. Psychologists and other specialists will be retained on a consulting basis. Presently such a service is now available for Niles Township residents who utilize a service based in Evanston, but the back-log of cases prompted Niles to initiate its own service.

Nort Goodman, 7023 Carol, was chosen as temporary chairman for the 7 man commission which will be set-up as the result of the new ordinance. While no specific figures were used it was mentioned Oak Lawn had an

VNA Meets Health Needs Of Community

The Visiting Nurses Association of Skokie Valley is providing vitally needed professional nursing care in the home to all residents of Skokie Valley, regardless of age, color, race or financial status. Skokie Valley residents aided by the VNA are in the area of Golf, Skokie, Niles, Morton Grove and Lincolnwood.

The VNA is certified as a participating Home Health Agency for Health Insurance under Social Security. It provides the services of a fully certified registered nurse, physical therapist and speech therapist as well as the newly added services of Homemaker and Home Health Aide.

All of these professionals - the registered nurses, therapists, homemaker and home health aides give service under your doctor's orders to return the patient to health and comfort.

From January through November 1967, a total of 2,469 visits were made by our registered nurses. Our physical therapist made 589 visits while our speech therapist helped through 292 visits. The Homemakers service was just added on December 1.

The purpose of the VNA is to bring bedside nursing to the home of residents. With the addition of the Home Care Service and the enactment of Medicare Legislation, our service has been further expanded. Through services formerly restricted to hospital care the VNA ensures an earlier hospital discharge for many patients. Through the therapists we stress rehabilitation. The Home Health Aide administrators to the patient under the supervision of the registered nurse while keeping the home and household running. The Home Health orders are available through contractual relationships with Child and Family Services. Through similar contractual arrangements with the Illinois Association of Crippled and the American Cancer Society, special equipment and care are provided. Every-

one who can, is expected to pay for VNA nursing care. Where help is needed adjustments can be made since the VNA is a beneficiary of the United Crusade.

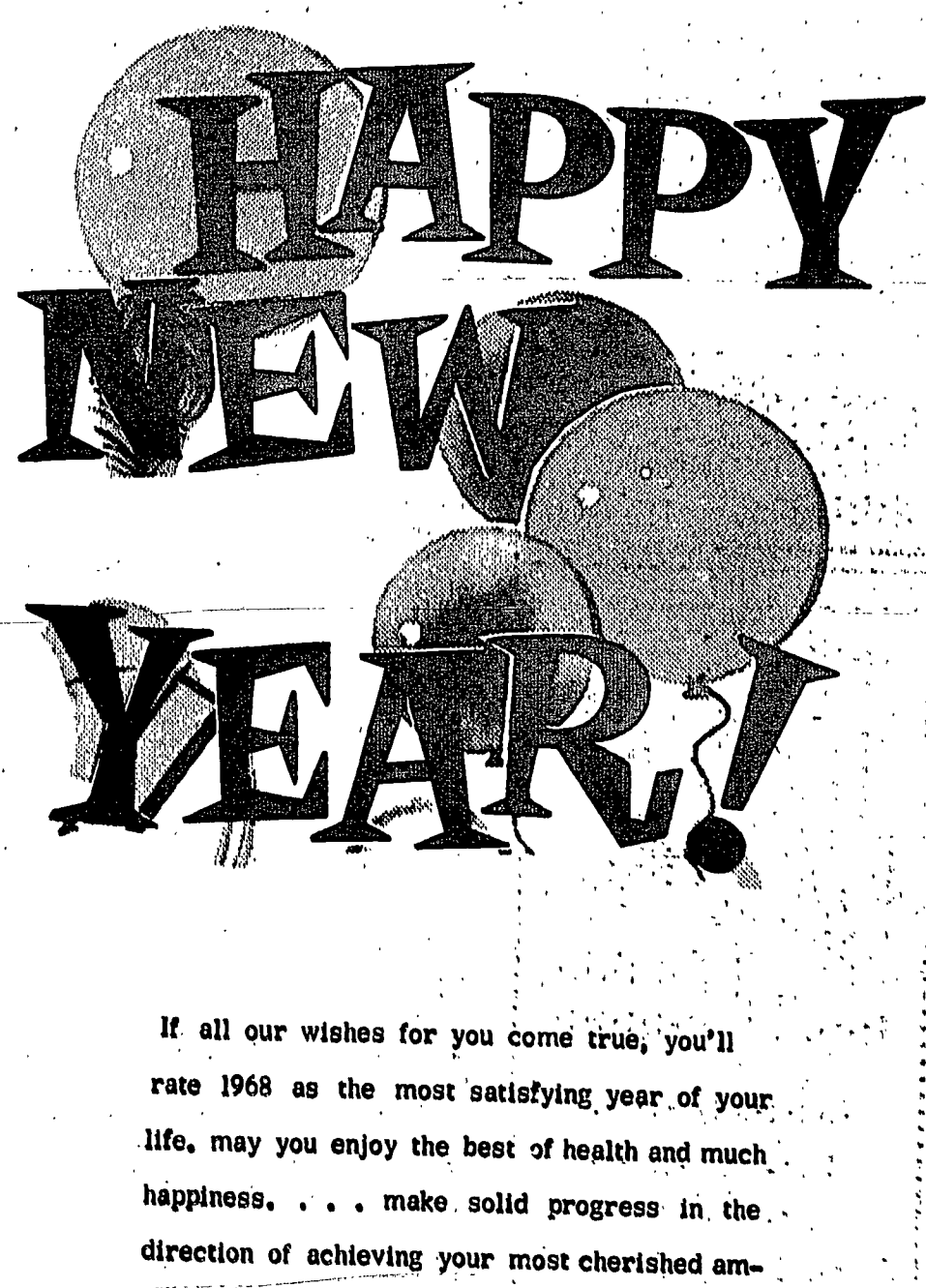

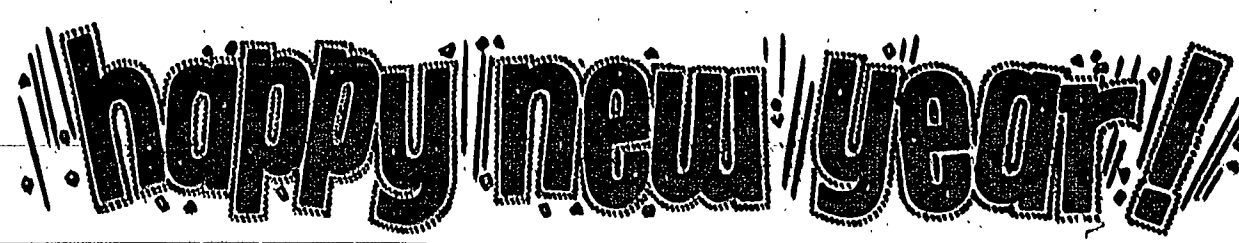

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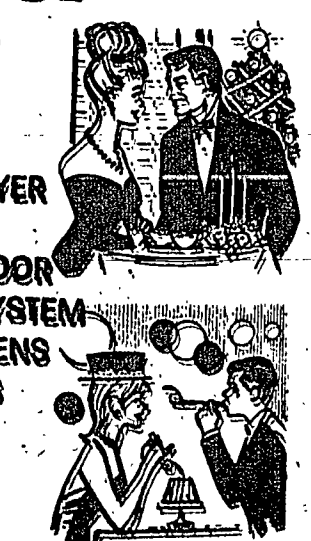
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Lutheran General Hospital Reviews '67 Highlights

The past 12 months was a year filled with progress for Lutheran General Hospital, reports administrator Robert J. Nast.

Here are some of the highlights of the year:

January: Plans for a virus laboratory were announced by the hospital.

February: A new type of volunteer service—patient aides—brings extra comfort and attention to patients at the hospital.

March: Teen-age patients now have a section of their own with the opening of Lutheran General's unique Teen Department.

April: Roman Catholic mass is now being said every Sunday in Lutheran General's chapel as part of a precedent-setting educational program with Divine Word Seminary at Techny.

May: Ground breaking was held for the hospital's \$2,200,000 rehabilitation center for alcoholism, the first of its kind in the nation.

June: A painting in honor of the hospital's Service League was unveiled.

June: A new educational program has been set up at the hospital for dietetic externs.

July: A capacity crowd thronged the O'Hare Inn Convention hall for the second annual mid-summer Gala to benefit the hospital.

August: The largest graduating class in history received diplomas at graduation ceremonies of the Lutheran General and Deaconess Hospitals School of Nursing.

September: Volunteer hours topped the 100,000 mark for the first time, a report to Service League members stated. A total of 103,022 hours was provided to the hospital.

October: New educational programs, offered by the hospital's department of pastoral care, are being made available to area clergymen of all denominations.

November: A two-year renewal grant of \$289,375 was made to Lutheran General for its hyperbaric oxygen research program. The grant was made by The John A. Hartford Foundation of New York City.

December: A capacity audience attends a program on "Teen-age Tensions," another in a series of educational programs presented by the Men's Association of Lutheran General.



Foreign Librarians Tour East Maine Jr. High

The library of East Maine Junior High School in East Maine School District No. 63 was selected as the junior high school library in the Chicago area was visited Tuesday, Dec. 12, by 7 foreign librarians participating in a four-month cultural exchange program administered by the American Library Assn. and sponsored by the U. 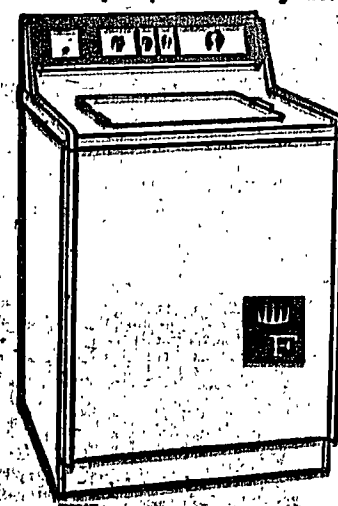

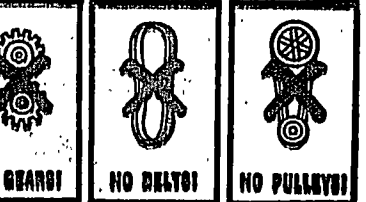

There has been much discussion about term of duty for servicemen to be eligible for membership in the American Legion, Morton Grove Post #134. Membership Frank Selzer, 8931 Mansfield, would like to list the requirements so they are familiar to everyone in the community. He may be reached at 966-8154 for further information.

Selzer states membership in the local Legion would be a nice present, especially with the forthcoming holidays calling for special ideas. He will be happy to discuss eligibility requirements with anyone who wishes clarification.

Most everyone realizes any veteran honorably discharged from any branch of service from World War I, World War II, the Korean War or Viet Nam service is eligible to become a Legionnaire.

Selzer reports, however, "A change recently made states: 'any person who has served on active duty in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Air Force of the United States at any time on or since August 5, 1964, even if the service was for only one day, may now be accepted for membership in the American Legion, provided his period of active duty has been terminated under honorable conditions. Service in the Viet Nam area is NOT a requirement of membership.' Also if the person served at any time during the period of eligibility of the wars, even though com-

tinuing to serve now without ever having been discharged or otherwise separated from active duty, he is also eligible for membership."

Concluding he states the form showing termination of any period of honorable service on or after August, 1964, will be accepted as evidence of eligibility for those who called six month trainees. This person is in the same category as the draftee or person enlisting for 2, 4 or 6 years."

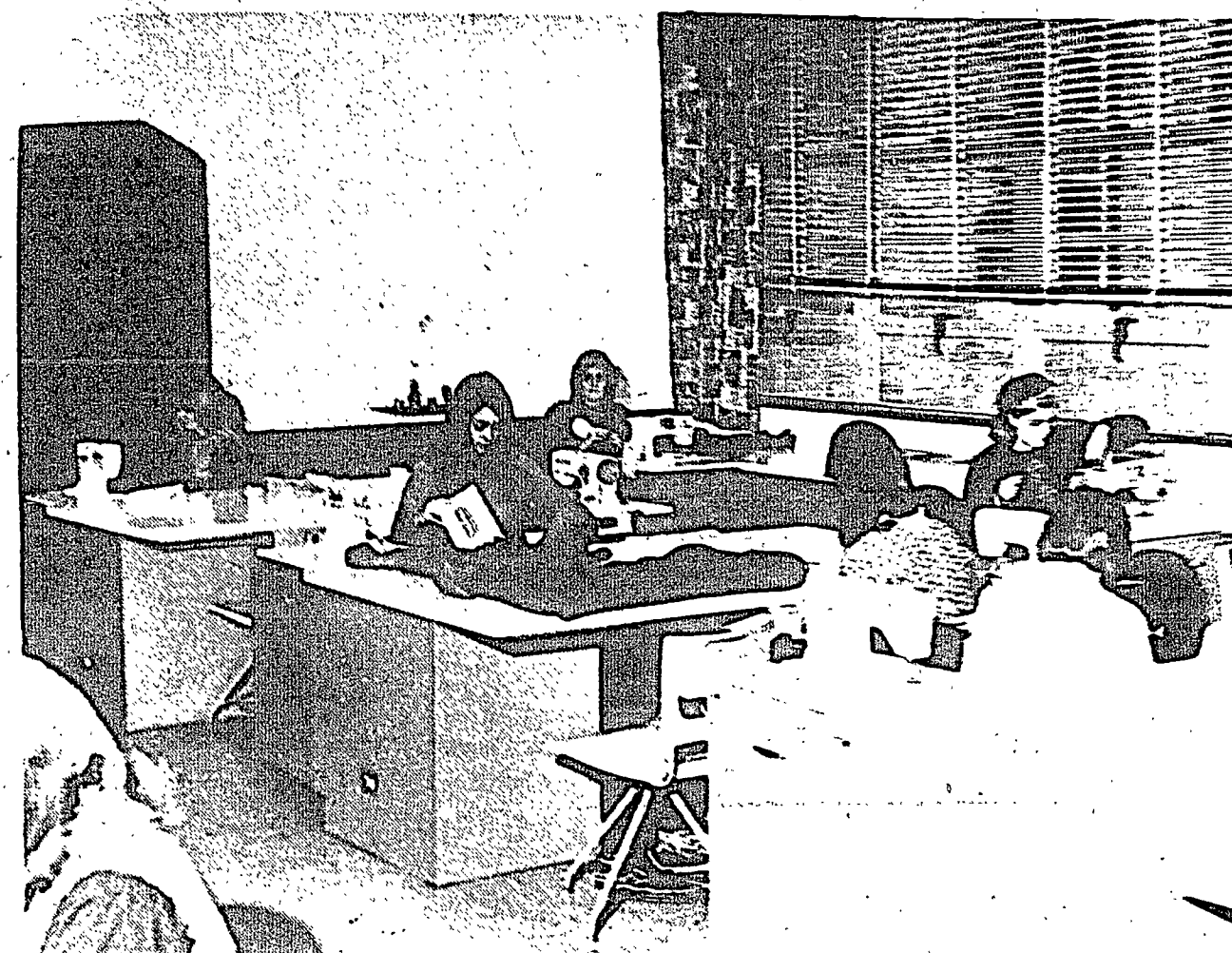

Initial budget of \$25,000 for its
project and now has an annual
budget of \$50,000 for its bu-
reau.

The new bureau will be con-
trolled by the commission which
will be appointed by the village
board. It is expected as many
as 4 church representatives will
be included on the new board.
Two persons will be chosen for
2 years, two for 3 years and 3
will be selected for 4 years. The
permanent chairman will be
elected by the commission it-
self from among the members
selected for the 4 year period.

Trustee Ed Berkowsky, who
spearheaded the drive for the
new program, said the success
of the program will result in
its complete independence from
any political action, or any in-
terference from the municipa-
lity.

Goodman told questioners

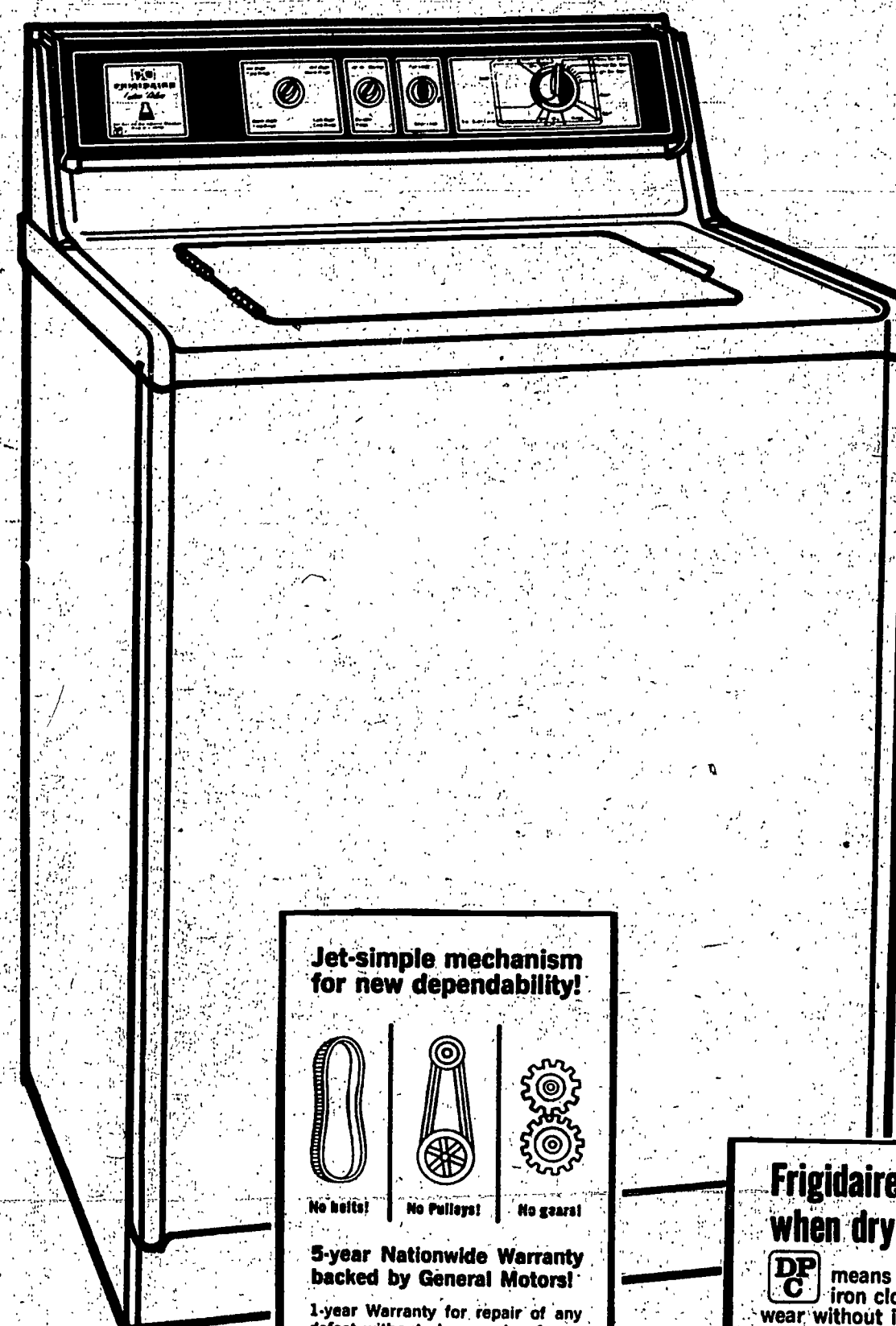

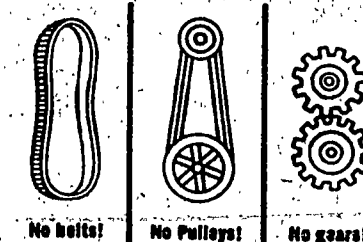
