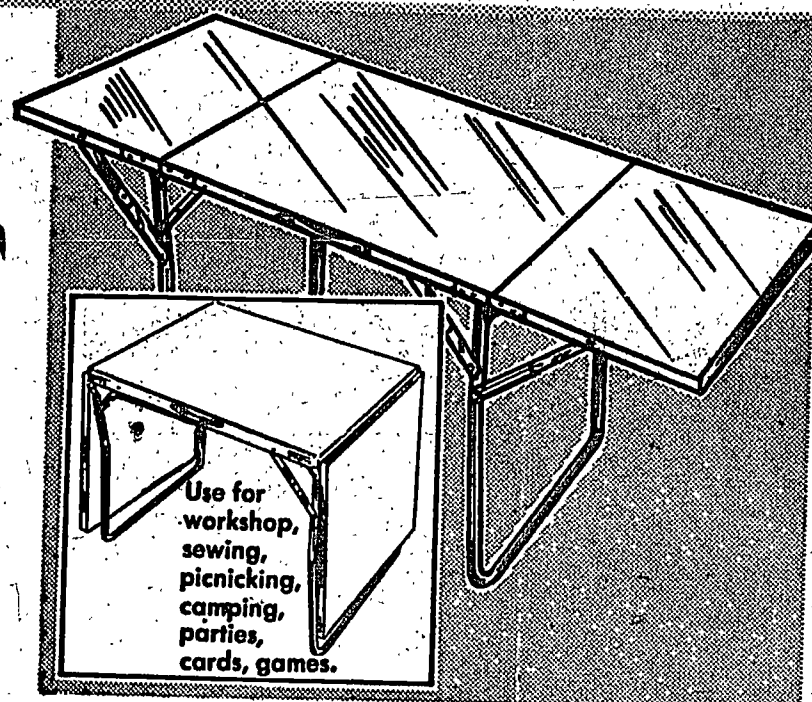

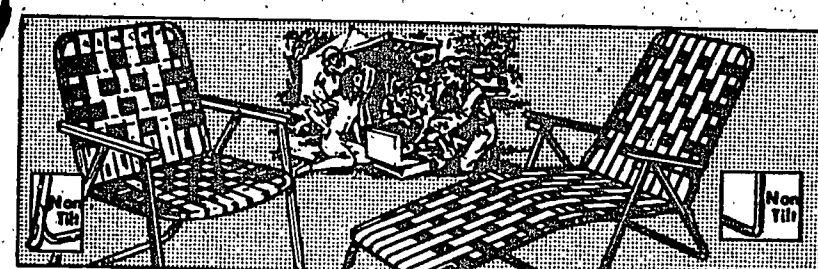

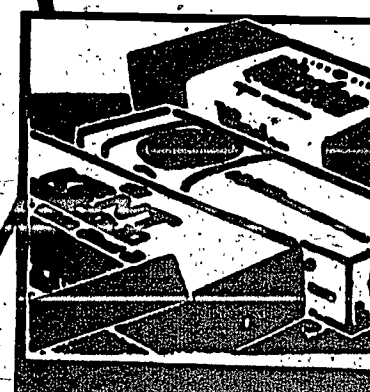

From The Left Hand

Nilesite Jim Kramer is a guy who'd like to build a hospital in Niles. It sounds like a great idea. And the man behind the idea is well-qualified to pursue a project. He's got the know-how, in experience, knowledge and financial backing. But so far he's been stymied.

Jim is quite a benefactor, contributing handsomely to many causes. And because he's a Nilesophile (a lover of this town) he'd like to make a handsome effort on behalf of his hometown.

In the money markets Jim is a grain broker. His side duties include directorships of 3 hospitals. The combination points to his being well-qualified in pursuing a hospital in Niles.

Previously, he sought to receive an okay to build a hospital on the Oakton-Milwaukee tract of land south of the Sinclair station. He was opposed by local hospital representatives, as well as residents who live in Jonquil Terrace, who live in back of the proposed location. Former trustee Sam Bruno, who also lives there, works for Blue Cross, which is owned by medicos. The combined opposition of the residents plus the neighboring hospital representatives put the kibosh on Kramer's plans.

While we're not informed about the politics of the inner-workings of the medical profession we're suspect a great deal of self-interest among doctors and hospitals can pressure and control hospital supervisory groups which decide whether or not hospitals can be built.

It seems germane to ask whether or not there is a necessity for additional hospital beds in our area. And based on crowded conditions in neighboring hospitals it would seem additional facilities are needed. Noting the building additions on these same hospitals plus the ever-expanding population here, more bed space seems obvious.

The second question, which also necessitates asking, is whether Kramer and his friends are qualified to build and administer a hospital. Since they have been involved with major hospitals in Chicago for many years it would seem they are most able.

Proposal Before Trustees

Niles Open Housing Talks Next Week

The proposed ordinance prohibiting certain practices of discrimination in the sale, lease, rental or financing of housing accommodations because of race, religion, color, national origin or ancestry by real estate brokers and real estate salesmen in the Village of Niles, is slated for discussion at the Tuesday, May 28 meeting of the Niles Village Board of Trustees.

According to acting Village Manager Ken Scheel during his monthly press conference Monday, there will also be a presentation of an American flag to the village by representatives of the Niles Youth Congress, hopefully a discussion of the proposed appropriations ordinance, probably a reappointment of various department heads and "a few surprises too."

Scheel also told news media representatives Monday that the Niles VFW is planning a Memorial Day parade and observance to begin at 11:30 a.m., Thursday, May 30 at Birchwood and Milwaukee. The parade would then proceed down Milwaukee ave. to St. Adalbert cemetery, where a ceremony would be held.

Other items discussed at Scheel's conference included the progress of the new fire station; footings have been poured for the basement and forms are going up for the basement walls. It is hoped the new station will be ready for occupancy this November.

Rev. Mitchell, Negro minister from the burned out west side of Chicago, will speak at the East Maine Baptist church, 10500 Milwaukee ave., Friday night, May 24 at 8 p.m.

Rev. Mitchell puts Americanism and Christianity to work. In addition to pastoring a church, he is the President of the North Star United Missionary Workers of America. Since July 1967 he has helped place over 1500 men and women in steady jobs. He has taught young and old to respect the laws and the police. The burned out victims were given food, clothing and furniture. And all was done without government support, financial or advisory.

When Dr. Martin Luther King came to Chicago and the disorders began, Rev. Mitchell re-

ceived city wide publicity in Chicago by such comments as these: "He ought to stay in Alabama" and "If he wants to march on the west side, let him come in with rakes, brooms and grass seed."

Rev. Mitchell contends that Communist elements in our society are successfully stirring up racial hatred between blacks and whites. He will tell why he opposed the March on Washington, the civil disobedience doctrine of liberal ministers and the drive for forced housing laws.

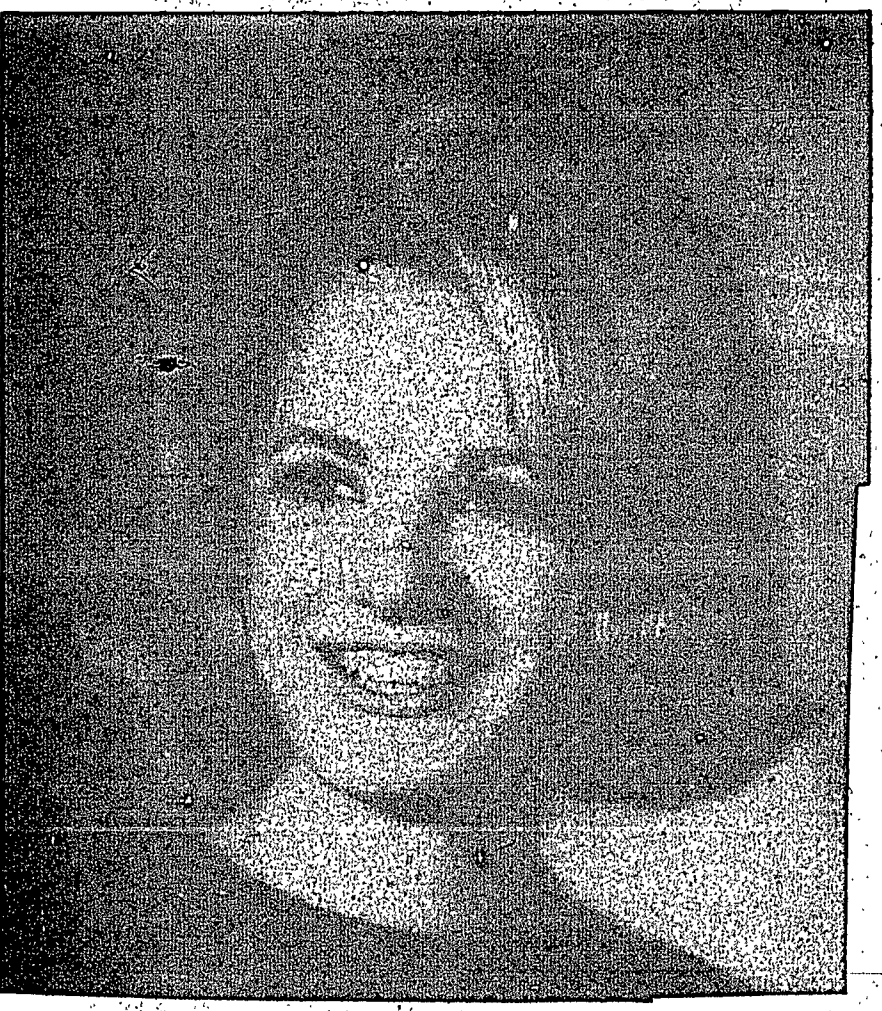
Valuation Was "An Estimate" Says Parker

Niles's Superintendent Dr. Clyde Parker has responded to news published recently about high school district's assessed valuation being higher than expected.

"Our current school budget," he said, "was prepared last Spring, which means that this year's assessed valuation had to be estimated a year in advance. Estimating this far in advance, as we always have to do in planning school budgets," he explained, "makes accuracy impossible." He said estimates

are based on an average percentage of increase in past years.

Asked if the higher assessed valuation would affect in any way the district's need for a referendum to increase the ceiling of the educational fund rate, Dr. Parker gave an emphatic "no." He pointed out that the district's needs in the educational fund far exceeded the amount of money which could be raised by the recent change in assessed valuation.

Notre Dame Senior Is Ford-FSA Winner

Kenneth Biba, Notre Dame student, was one of the 20 senior high school students in the United States and the only one from Illinois named national award winners in the Ford-Future Scientists of America competitions.

The Ford-Future Scientists of America program recognizes and encourages students with scientific interests by providing an incentive to engage in scientific research and reporting. A student may work in any area of science or mathematics. Each of the National Awards Winners receives a college assistance scholarship.

Biba, a senior at Notre Dame and a graduate of St. Juliana's grammar school, was directed in his project by John T. Norris of the Notre Dame science faculty and newly appointed head of the science department.

Earlier this year Biba's research earned him a trip to Washington and the National Science Fair as one of the 40 national winners in the Westinghouse annual Science Talent Search.

The Ford-FSA awards program is administered by the National Science Teachers Association.

Biba's project, "The Photometric Analysis of the Cepheid Variable, Zeta geminorum," involved the measurement of the light fluctuation of a variable star, Zeta geminorum. In conjunction with this measurement he determined through the use of a spectroscope the temperature fluctuations as the light was varying. He then used these determinations to gain a knowledge of the physical structure of the star and the cause of its light fluctuations.

Dr. Parker resigns at the end of June after about 40 years in education, the last nine of which have been as superintendent of the Niles Township High Schools.

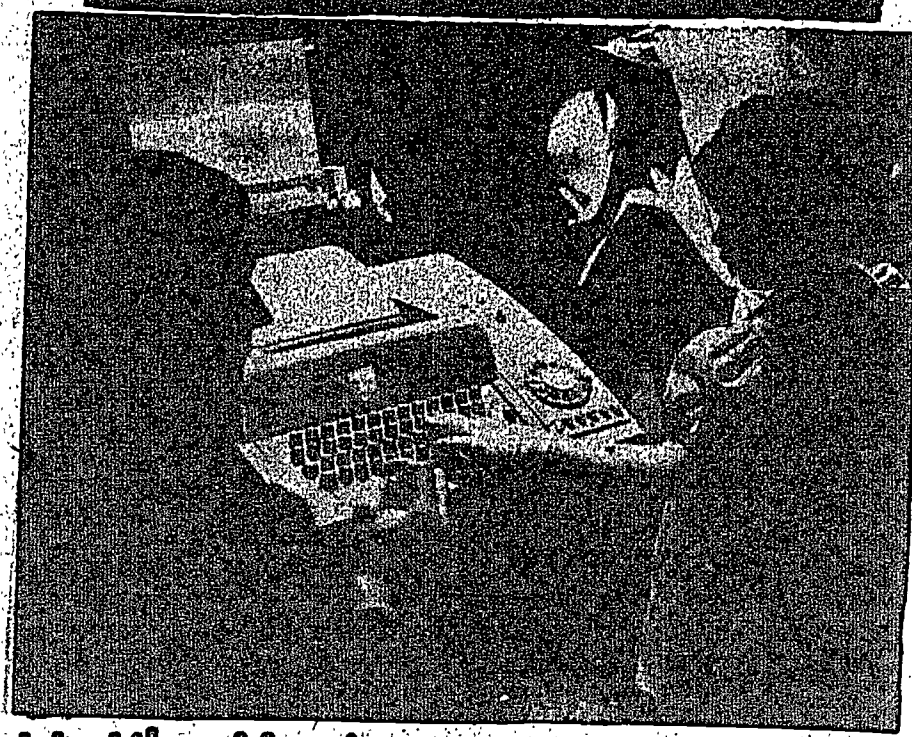

Richard Zembron, the district social worker and counselor, was held to a triple. He has starred in previous years at the bat.

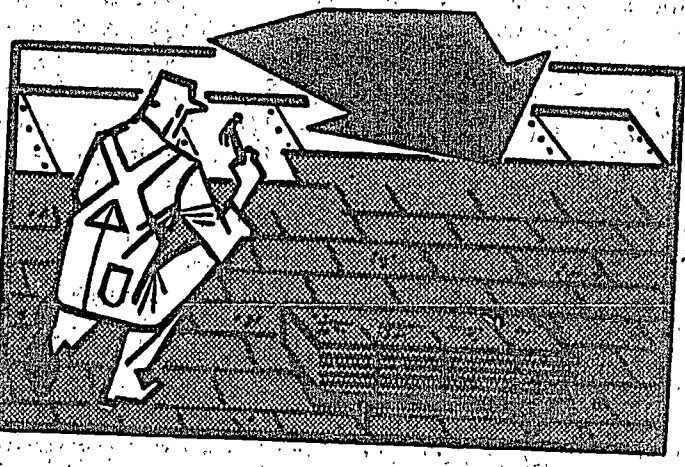
