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



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

To show you what an independent newspaper you're reading, we'd like to express an opinion which is in disagreement with a feature written on Page I in last week's BUGLE.

The article asked the question as to how responsible Democratic committeemen Blase and Krier were in the downfall of the Democratic ticket in the just past election. It contrasted the old breed politics of Ray Krier in Niles Township with the new breed politics of Nick Blase in Maine Township, Our opinion of the whitewash job done in the article is sheer 'hogwash'.

Prior to the convention Blase and Krier asked for voters' support so they allegedly could represent them at the Democratic convention. But when they arrived at the convention their expression, given to them by those who voted for them, was silenced, as Mayor Daley took over all their votes. Dear Mr. Les:

In a recent issue of the LIFE Newspaper an article appeared which referred to the Niles Baseball League and its association with the Niles Park District. The article erroneously gave the impression that there was conflict between the two organizations, and that the Niles Park District was the victim of an over-zealous Niles Baseball League win the inference that the Niles Baseball League was always on the "receiving end" and the Niles Park District always on the "giving end" of their association with each other. Such is not the case and I would like to offer my comments to correct and to dispel any misconception anyone may have of the operations of the Niles Baseball League and the effect on the Niles Park District therefrom, if any. A little background information of the Niles Baseball League may serve this purpose.

In the Spring of 1952, a group of concerned Fathers in Niles, decided to provide their restless sons with some energy burning activities to keep them busy and out of mischief during the long hot summers away from the rigors of school life. With this in mind, the embryo of what was to become the "Niles Baseball League" began to take shape.

Twenty boys were recruited from the small population of Niles at that time to create the firstteams of the "Niles Little League", its first name. Uniforms consisted of a 'T' shirt with the name "Niles Little League" prited thereon, and a baseball cap, which the players could keep.

The Niles Park Diatrict was not in existence at this time. The Village of Niles provided a Recreation Department to furnish the growing population with outdoor recreational facilities. Through the efforts of these concerned Fathers, and the Recreation Department of the Village of Niles, ball fields were constructed at the sites now known as "Jozwiak Park" and "Grennan Heights Park". This activity brought into focus-the real need for a Park District in Niles which later resulted in the formation of the present Niles Park District.

Dist. 64 Absentee Ballots Available Now

Absentee ballots for the School officials also point to in-School Dist. 64 referendum on Dec. 3 are now available at the district's business office. 400 S. Western, Park Ridge, according to Russell Miller, secretary to the Board of Education.

The referendum on Dec. 3 is to increase the tax rate of the Building Fund by 12 1/2 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The present rate of the building fund, which pays the costs of school maintenance and upkeep, is 25 cents. The proposed increase would bring the tax rate. of this fund to its legal maximum of 37-1/2 cents.

The building fund has been levied at the present rate since 1961. The fund has been accumulating a deficit since 1965 and it is now in the red about \$180,000. The projected deficit for the current school year if the proposed increase is not approved, will be approximately \$195,000.

School officials blame the problems of the building fund on inflationary pressures. Salaries of custodians and maintenance men must be competitive to attract and hold reliable and competent men. More than threefifths of the building fund budget is earmarked for these salaries. The maintenance staff was also reduced for the current school year, and a number of projects necessary for the maintenance of the District's school buildings deferred.

Mr. Miller explained that applications for absentee ballots must be submitted not less than 3 days before the referendum on Dec. 3. For the Dec. 3 election. the last day for making application in person in Saturday, Nov. 30. The Dist. 64 business office will be open that day from 9 a.m. to noon just for absentee

Both application and ballot may be secured at the same time at the business office. Regular hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The business office will be closed on Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, and on Friday, Nov. 29.

In order to vote an absentee ballot, a voter must be out of the county on the day of the referendum or physically incapacitated, Mr. Miller emphasized. To be eligible to vote in the referendum, he must be a registered voter at his present address who has lived in Illinois for one year, in Cook County for 90 days and in Dist. 64 for 30 days.

Absentee ballots can also be made by mail. Delivery of ballots by mail for this referendum must be on or before Wednesday, Nov. 27. The affidavit must be notarized and returned to the business office prior to the issuing of a ballot.

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





State Says Dist. 63 Bus, Book Rental Fees Are O.K. does not (and legally can not) the already overburdened edu-

A representative from the State Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, following a visit to East Maine school Dist. 63 has indicated that the district followed the right procedure in returning a money order made out to the district for combined bus and book rental fees by Yale Stein.

Mr. Stein, whose two suits against Dist. 63 challenging IIIinois laws regarding school transportation and book rental fees have been thrown out of court, had requested an "investigation."

Reimbursement would amount to only \$16 per pupil (actual cost currently being \$62.50), he said. The deficit, if the district were to provide "free" transportation, would have to come from

The board also heard an audit report by E. Allan Epstein, auditor, for the financial year ending June 30, 1968, which found the district's accounting operations to be in order. The board moved to retain Mr. Epstein to do the audit for the 1968-69 fiscal year.



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

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles as follows:

SECTION 1: That it shall hereafter be the sole responsibility of each property owner wherein said lot or parcel of real property has sewer and water lines running to it, to repair at its own cost and expense, any leaks, breaks, or malfunctions in said sewer and/or water lines from the Buffalo Box located on the said lot or parcel of Real Estate to the house, building or structure located on said lot or parcel of real estate.

SECTION 2: That upon notice given to said real property owner that a water line is in need of repair, said property owner shall forthwith proceed to repair and/or replace said water line as expeditiously as possible in order to avoid a loss of water from said defective water line over an extended period of time.

SECTION 3: That in such case that the sewer or water line repairs are not made as required in an expeditious manner, then the Department of Public Works be and the same is hereby authorized and directed to go upon the said property to repair said defective water and sewer lines for the account of the owner of said real

SECTION 4: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conlict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5: That this Ordinance be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.
