of the school district, is now in the red about \$188,000. It is projected this deficit will be about \$195,000 at the end of this school year in spite of drastic cuts in staff and expenditures.

"Inflation affects the schools just as it affects the budget of homeowners and businessmen," stated Dr. Jerry Seidel, chairman of the board's ad hoc committee for the referendum. "Not only does everything cost more, but our schools are approaching an age when maintenance and repairs will be more serious."

"The situation is rapidly becoming desperate," Dr. Seidel added.

The tax rate for the Building Fund is a one-purpose tax, he pointed out. It is solely for the maintenance and operation of the school buildings and property now in existence. Dr. Seidel

emphasized that no new school or classroom construction is planned. He also added Oakton school is not for sale, regardless of any rumors to that effect.

The referendum was scheduled for Tuesday, he explained, in order that voters who are out of town or busy with errands on Saturdays would find it easier to vote. Also, he said, Tuesday is a traditional election day.

Polling places will be located in the 10 elementary schools (see map). Polls will be open at 10:30 a.m. and will close at 9 p.m. The late closing will allow commuters to vote after work or dinner.

Absentee ballots are also available at the business office of the Board of Education, 400 S. Western, Park Ridge. The office will be open on Saturday morning, Nov. 30, the last day on which application can be made for an absentee ballot. The business office will be closed on Thanksgiving Day and on Friday, Nov. 29. A voter must be absent from Cook county or incapacitated in order to cast an absentee ballot.

In order to vote in the school referendum, a voter must be registered at his present address, lived in Illinois for one year, in Cook county for 90 days and in the Dist. 64 for 30 days.

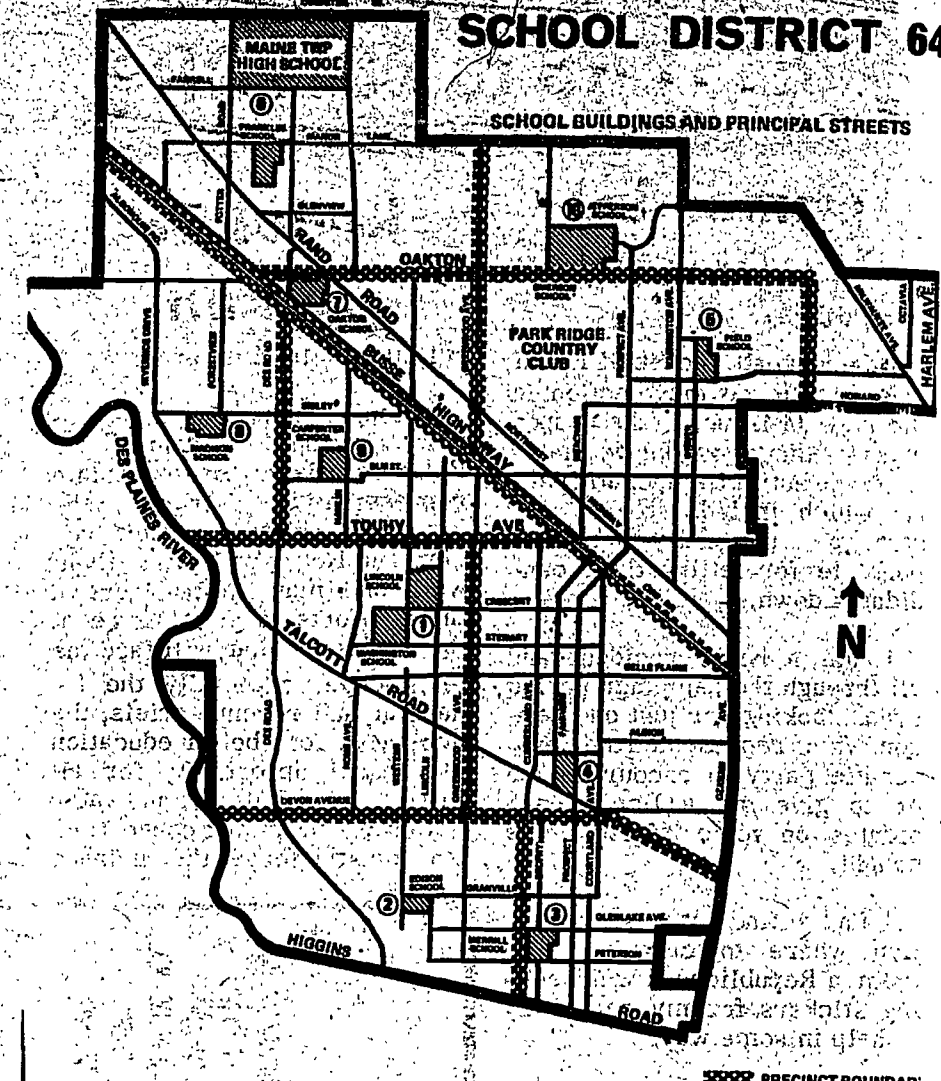

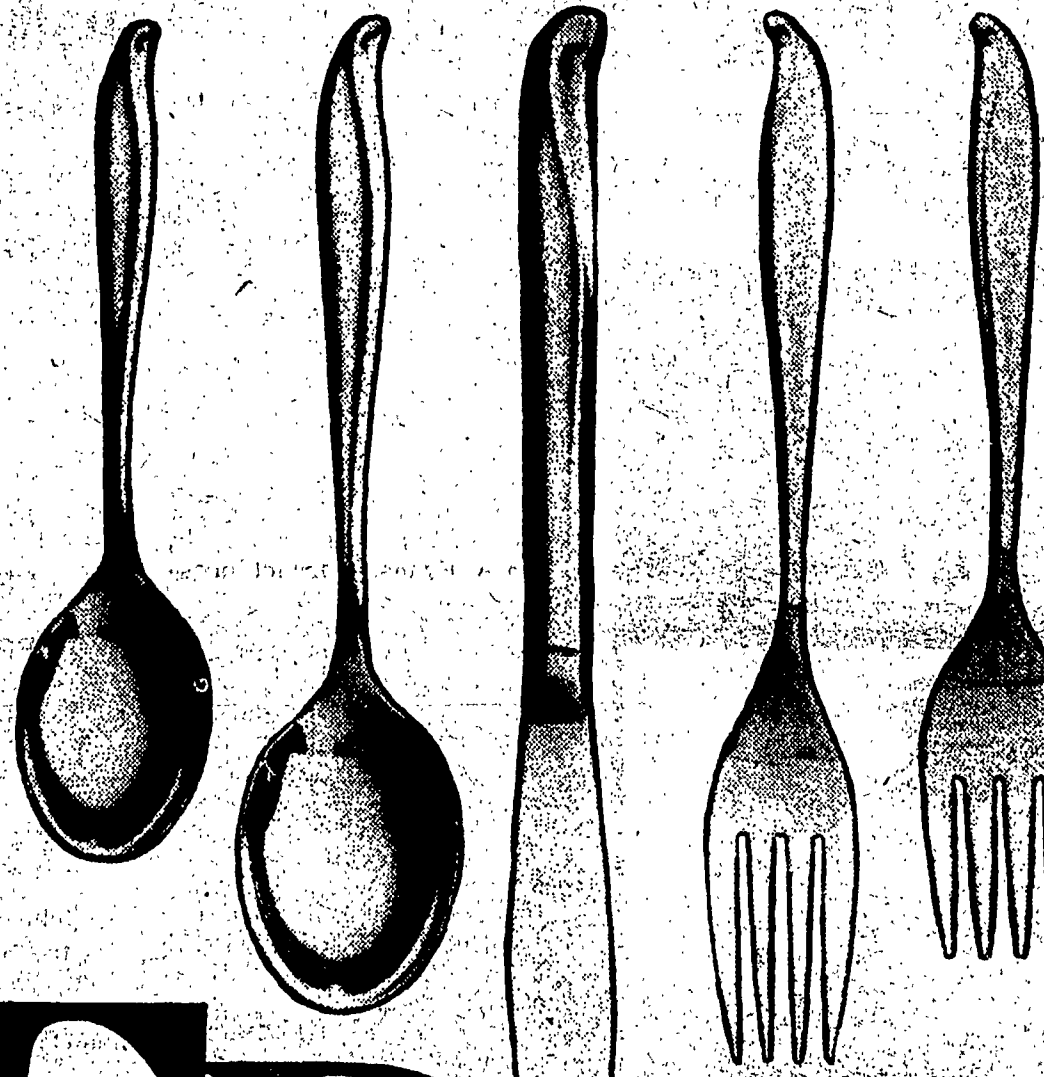

Led by varsity veteran John Kardzonik, the Dons piled up a total of 77 points to Quigley's 44. Other members of the starting squad for N.D. included

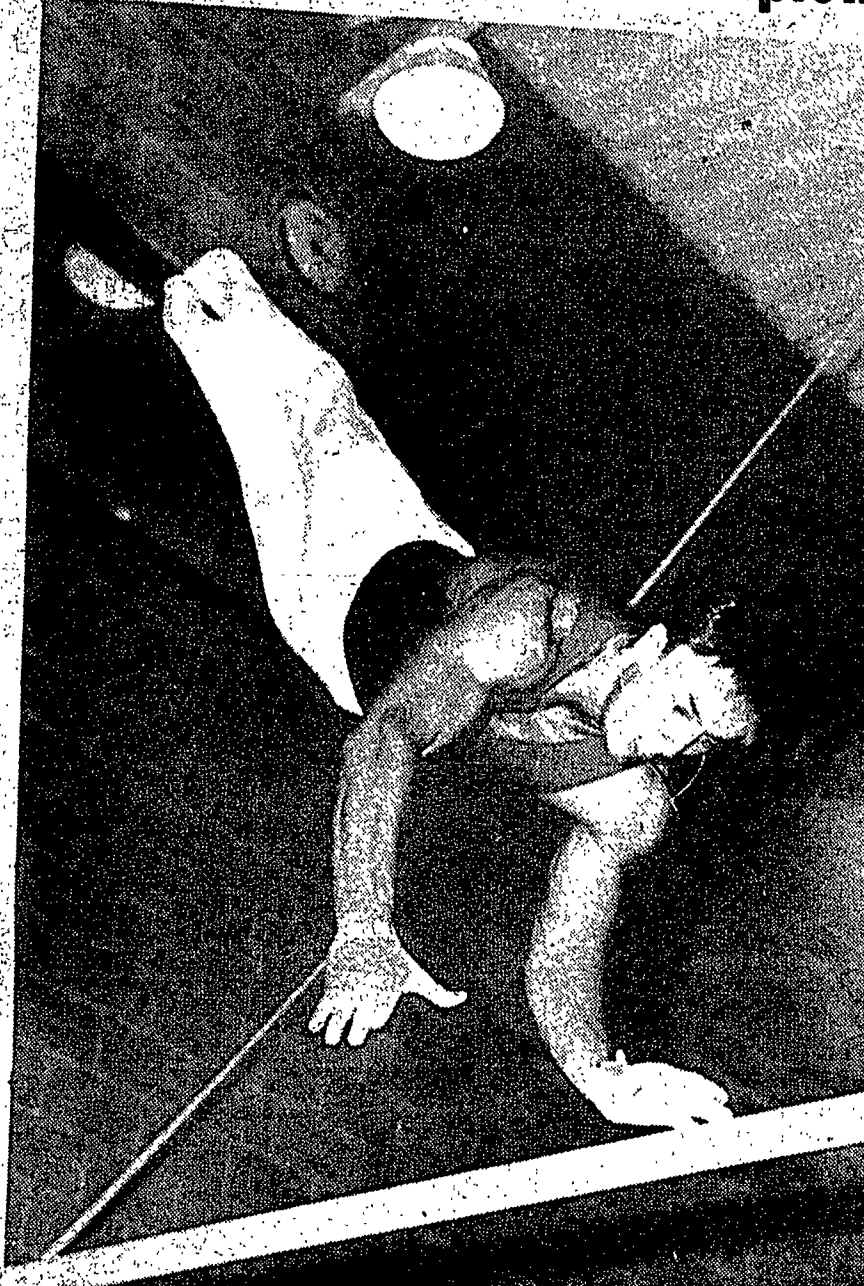
senior Rick Levin, and juniors Kevin Kachan, Gabriel Eaton, and Tom Reckert, a 6'4" transfer student from Quigley North.

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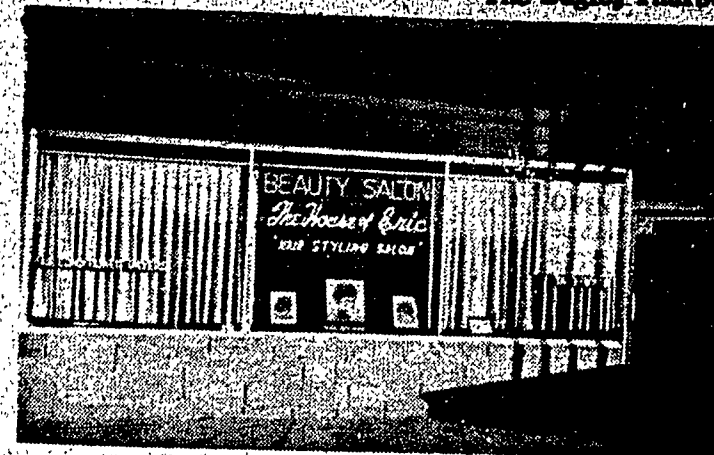


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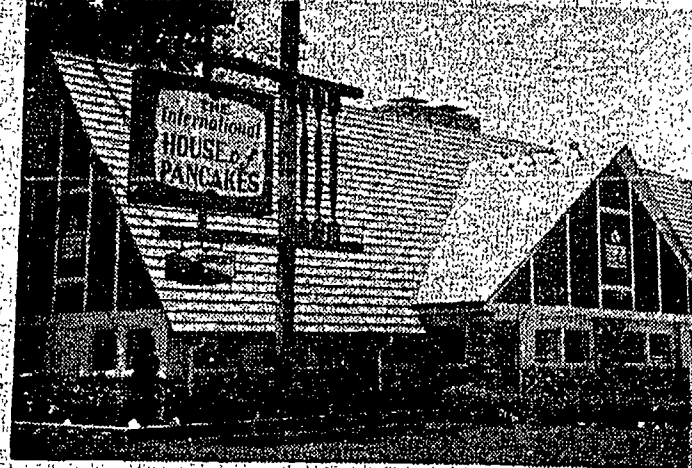
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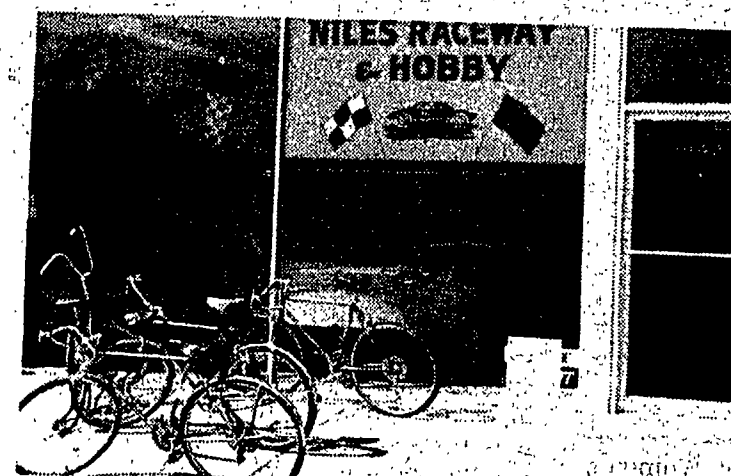
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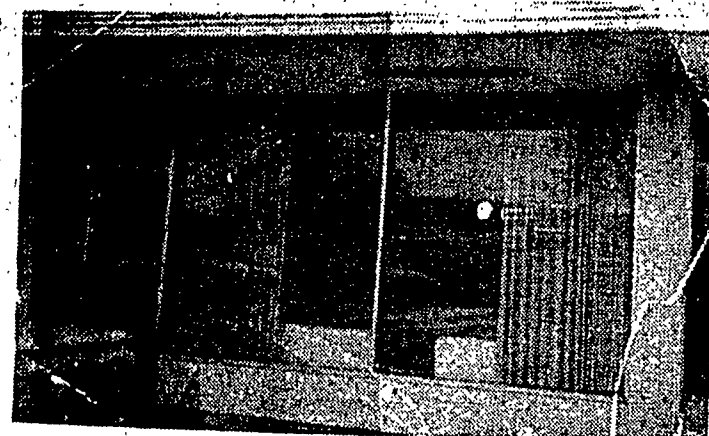
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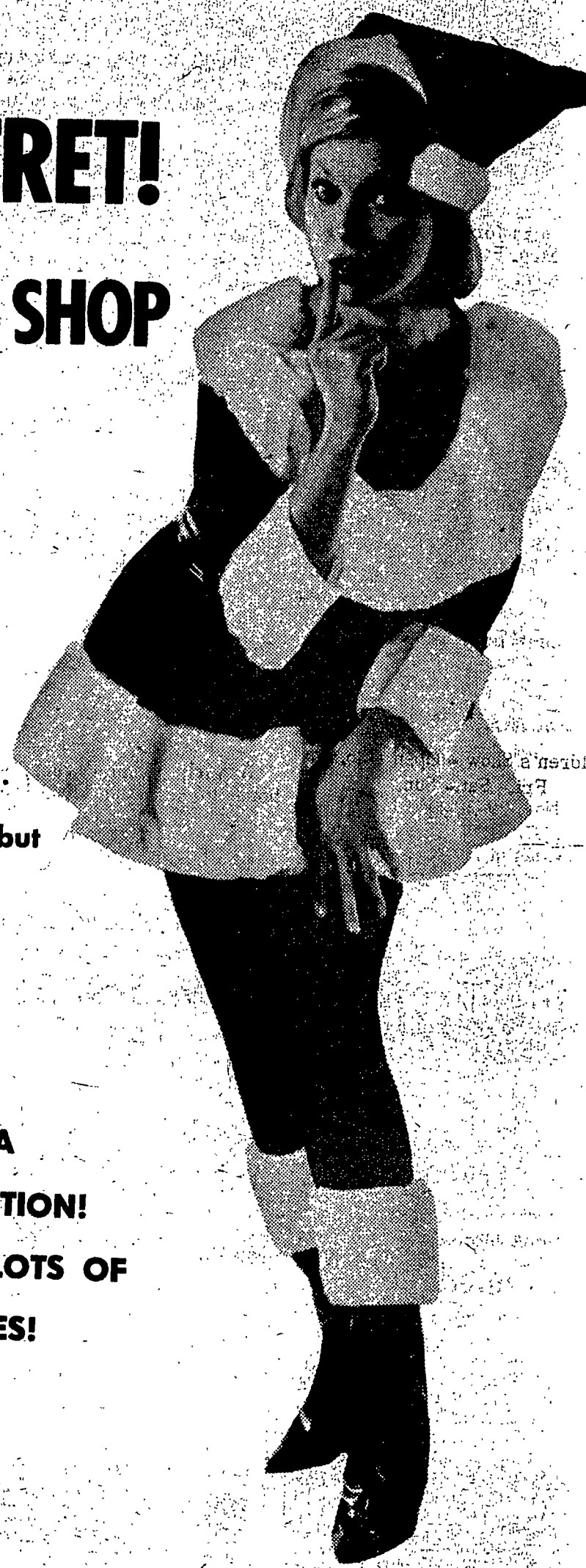
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Bode Heads M.G. Christmas Seal Drive

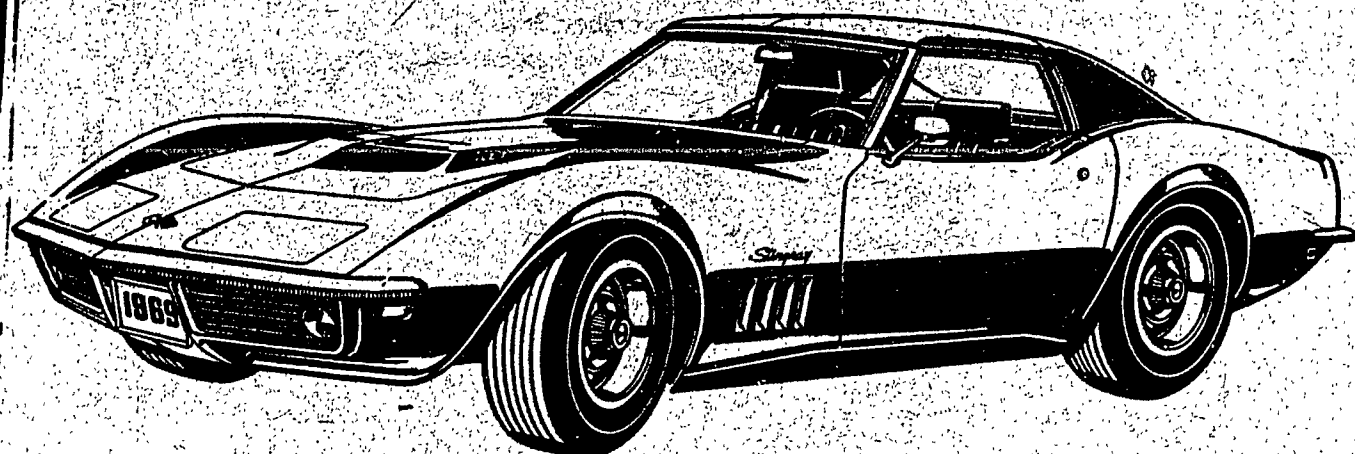

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Educational Crisis In Maine Twp. High Schools

The Maine Township high school system may suffer a ten year deterioration in its tradition of quality education for the young people of Maine Township if the proposal to increase the present taxing power for the Educational Fund is not increased from \$1.42 to \$1.63 by the voters on Saturday, Dec. 14, 1968, according to John W. Wilkins, Board member and chairman of the Finance Committee.

"Financial Crisis" was the major topic during the recent Township High School District #207 Board of Education meeting held on Monday evening, Nov. 18, at Maine East High School.

To further simplify the voting process on the Educational Fund Tax Increase Referendum the Board took positive action on using only the three high school facilities as polling places instead of the usual 30 precinct locations throughout Maine Township.

Mr. John L. Means, Board member and chairman of the Public Relations Committee, stated that the use of the three high school buildings as polling places would afford both parents and voting citizens an opportunity to become acquainted with the physical facilities and give voters further opportunity to realize what the high schools are doing for the student population.

Harold Markworth, Board secretary and business manager of the high school district, indicated that with the voting date being Dec. 14 it would be virtually impossible to secure 90 precinct judges who normally man the polling places. Markworth also stated that using the three high school facilities as polling places, with fewer judges required, would effect a saving in referendum costs.

Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of Schools for District #207, stated that members of the teaching staff from the three Maine high schools had volunteered their time and cars to transport citizens on election day to the high school serving their community. If transportation was a problem, other means of transportation could also be provided if necessary.

In his report on the financial condition of the high school district, Mr. Wilkins stated that District #207 is in serious financial trouble and that this condition would become more acute if additional taxing power is not approved immediately.

He commented that a projection of the cost of operating the high schools for the next few years had been recently completed, with the projection being based on operating costs (Educational Fund) since the 1961-62 school year. Increased student enrollment and assessed valuation were considered in the study... no extra programs had been added... only a continuation of the present type and quality of educational program.

Wilkins continued: "The Educational Fund debt as of July 1, 1968, was approximately \$1,200,000. At the end of the current 1968-69 school year the debt will be about \$2,400,000. Projections indicate a \$3,900,000 deficit in 1969-70, and \$6,100,000 in 1970-71. By 1971-72 the debt could not be increased the required amount to continue operation. The school would have reached its maximum legal borrowing of the 50 states.

power, with this limit not to exceed 75% of the total amount levied for the Educational Fund.

If the Maine high schools were to operate within the projected taxing power for 1969-70, they would have to reduce current pupil expenditure by 14%. This would be equivalent to eliminating one out of every seven teachers. In 1970-71 there would be 19% less money to spend per student, thus eliminating one out of five of the present teaching staff.

Mr. Markworth then read a resolution which formally established Dec. 14, 1968, as the official voting day, with polling hours to be set for 9 a.m. - 7 p.m., with the three high school facilities to be used as polling places. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Roy Makela, Board member and chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee, stated that construction and renovation projects at all three high schools were progressing on schedule and that the bid opening date for Maine East Phase II additions was scheduled for Monday, Nov. 25, 1968, at 7 p.m., at Maine East.

Other items of business included:

Approval for Township High School District #207 to serve as the administering district for an E.S.E.A. Title I project for a Maryville Academy Tutorial Center and authorized the Superintendent of Schools and the Secretary of the Board of Education to make application to the Federal Government for \$21,998.00 to finance the project.

Approval for the continuation of the existing program in Title II Public Law 89-10 (audio-visual films, etc.) and authorize the Office of the Superintendent of Schools to file applications on or before Dec. 31, 1968.

Approval for the acceptance of the audit made by Walton, Joplin, Langer and Company, and place it on file as the official audit for Township High School District #207 and the Student Activities Corporation.

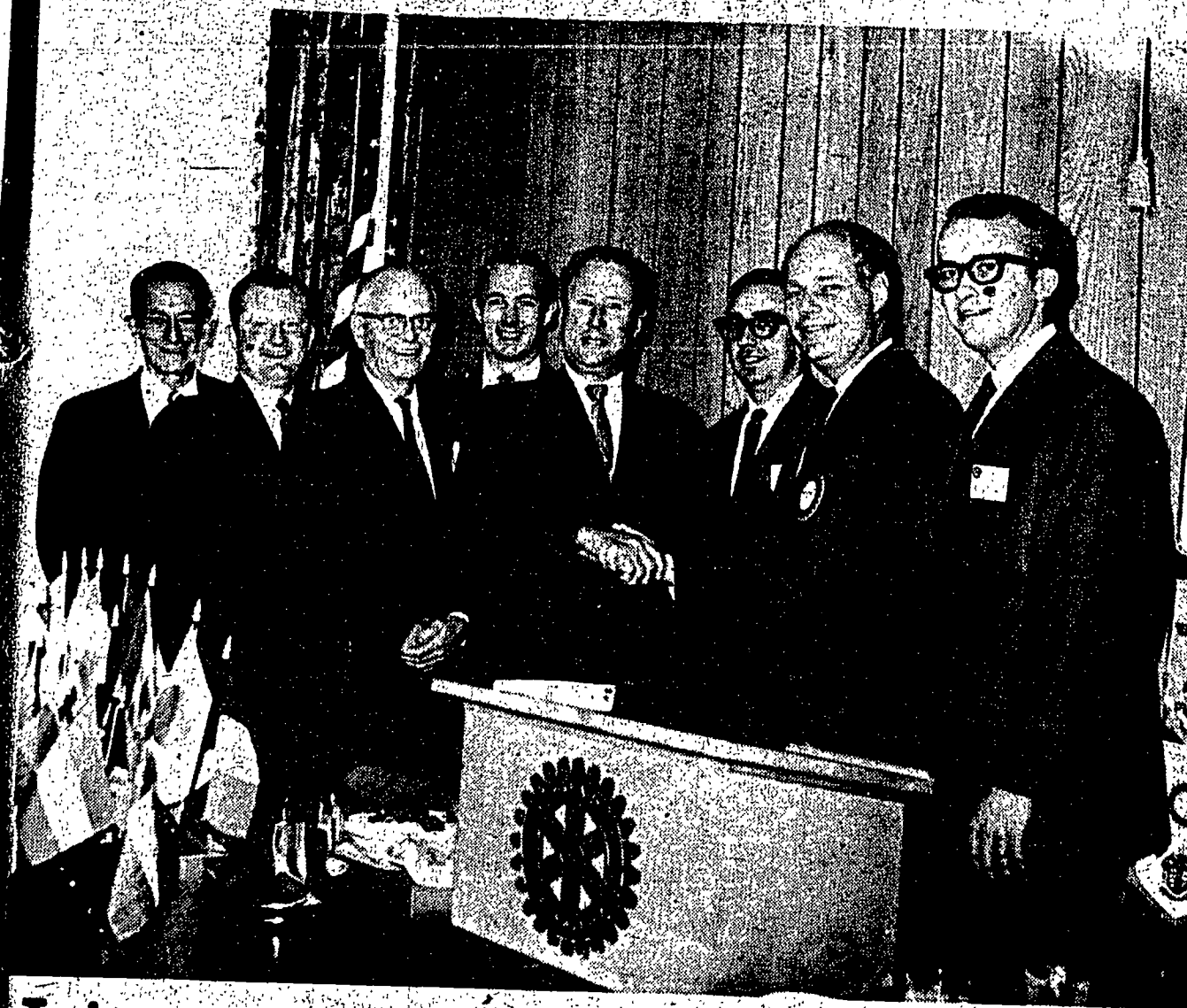

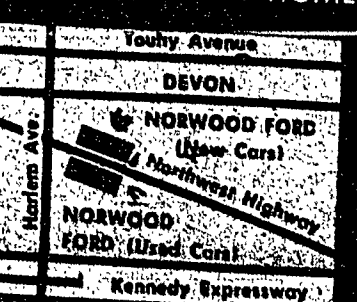

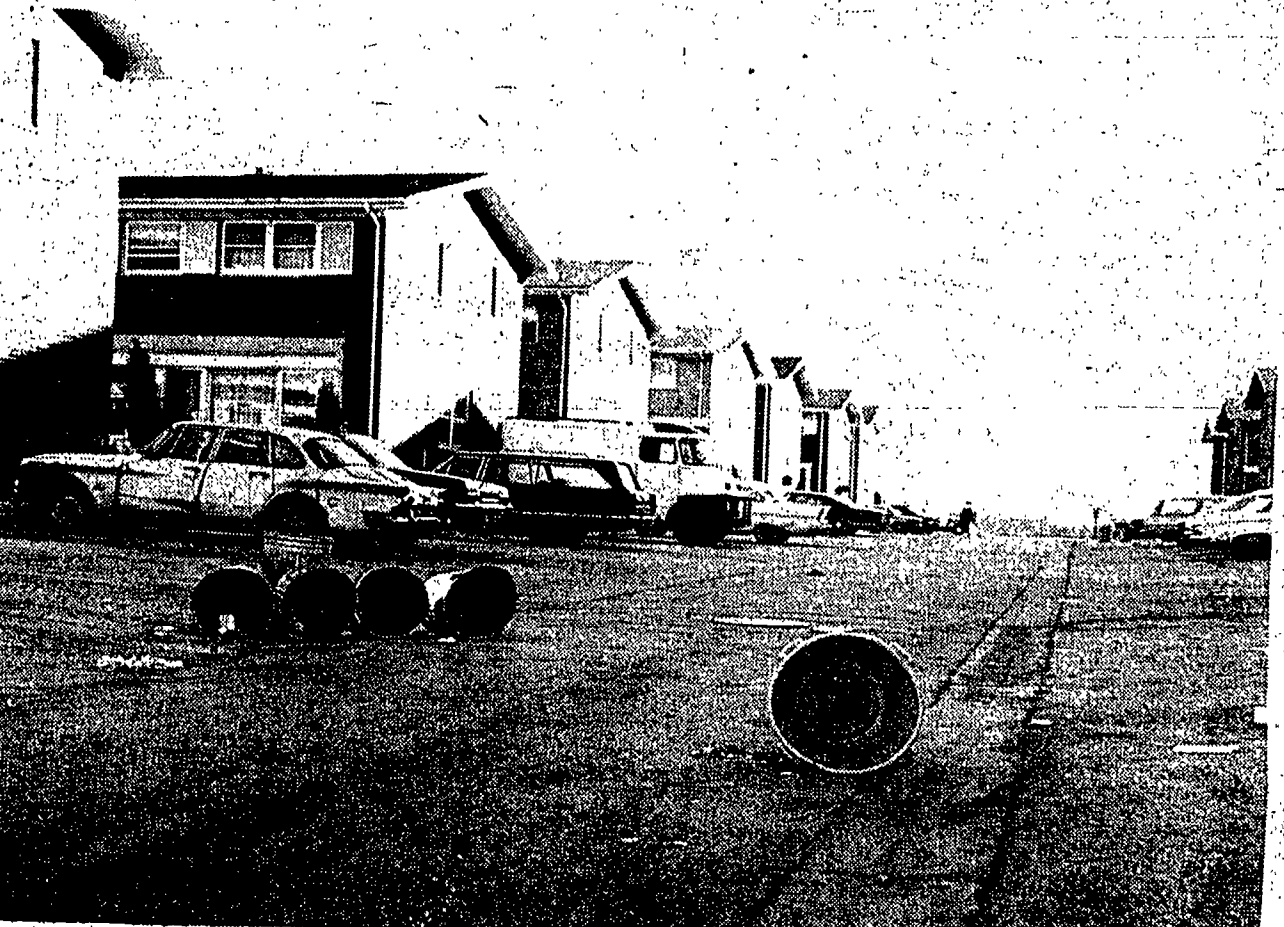

The Adult Evening school program of the Niles Township High School will conduct a review class to help people prepare for a state-sponsored test which must be taken for the General Education diploma.

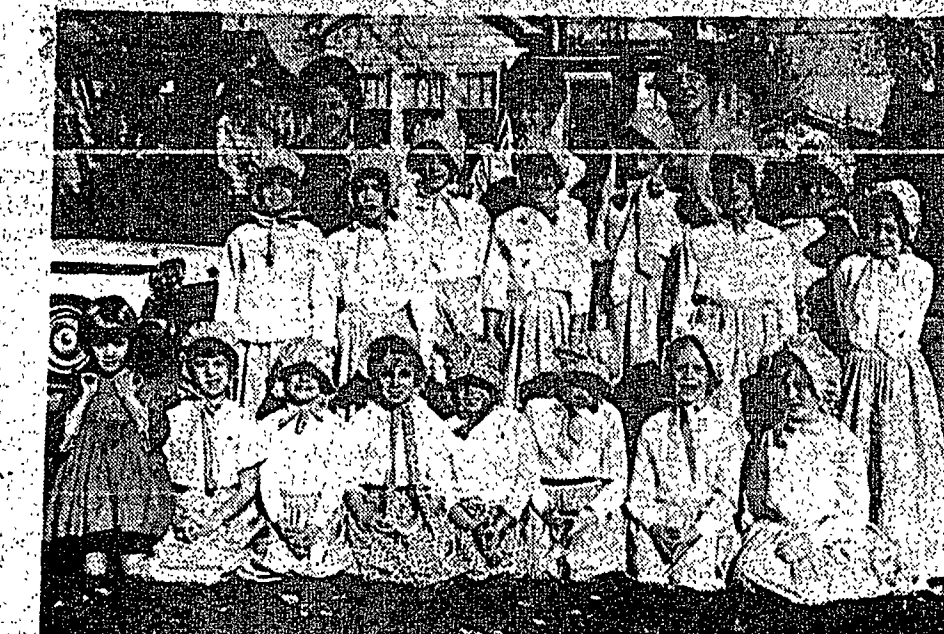
This high school equivalency certificate is valuable in meeting requirements for college.

Yuletide Safety Rules

Chief Christ Hildebrandt today issued the following safety precautions for the Christmas Holiday season. Since many people begin their Christmas shopping right after Thanksgiving, the Chief felt that now was a good time to remind people of some of the hazards of the Holidays.

1. Select your electrical appliance gifts with fire safety in mind. Choose only those electrical toys and tree decorations (lighting sets) which are approved by the Underwriters Laboratories. Look for that label on the device when making your purchases. In case of doubt, ask your Fire Department if they are approved.

2. Avoid toys operated with flammable liquids. Nitrocellulose (which looks like celluloid or plastic) toys burn with surprising ferocity. Some imported toys in the past have been cheaply made of these flammable materials.

3. Pretty lights are the "heart" of the trees beauty! Never use wax candles on a tree - they are as outdated as the horse and buggy. Use only electric lights and see that all wiring is in perfect condition. Do not buy or use any light set that does not carry the approval and label of Underwriters Laboratories.

4. Do not use cotton, paper or flammable material for the decorating of the tree or around the base of tree. Do not place electric trains or other electrically powered devices around the tree because metallic tinsel can fall across the track, cause a short circuit and start the train transformer burning.

5. Purchase a freshly cut tree which has been stored outdoors. Keep tree outside until needed. Do not set up until a few days before Christmas - preferably on Christmas Eve.

6. A container which holds water in its base is the best. If cut end of tree is grooved and placed in water (be sure

to add water daily) the drying out of the tree is slowed and possibility of burning thereby reduced.

7. The location of the tree is of vital importance whether it is in the home, hotel, church, hospital or any other place of public assembly. Do not place near stairway or elevator, as these act as flues and carry the fire to upper floors. If tree is located near doors, be sure that these doors are closed. An inspection of the tree should be made every morning by a responsible person to determine if it is safe to turn the lights on again that day.

8. Locate the tree in the coolest part of the room. If necessary, shut off any nearby radiator or hot air register. This will permit the tree to remain green longer. Do not place tree near a stove or fire-place or other source of heat or direct flame.

9. Anchor the tree at top with wire to keep it from falling over.

10. If purchasing new lights for the tree, purchase only the sets with fuses in each set (usually in the plug). Locate the fuse in your fuse cabinet which controls the tree lights (this must never exceed 15-amps size). If this fuse blows when you turn on the tree lights, you must remove other electrical appliances from that circuit for the holidays to prevent overloading the circuit (NEVER INSTALL A LARGER FUSE TO CORRECT THE PROBLEM ... THAT DOESN'T CORRECT IT, IT JUST TRIPLES THE FIRE HAZARD).

11. From time to time inspect the tree to see whether any of the needles near the lights have started to turn brown. If they have, relocate the light causing it. Remember! It takes the average tree only about 60 seconds to completely burn.

12. Turn out the lights when the family leaves the house unattended or when the office is closed for the night. Never leave children alone in the house when the tree is on display.

13. Never place lighted candles in windows. Sentiment and flame do not mix! Keep curtains or other flammable material at windows pulled back at least six (6) inches from any electrical candles or wreathes.

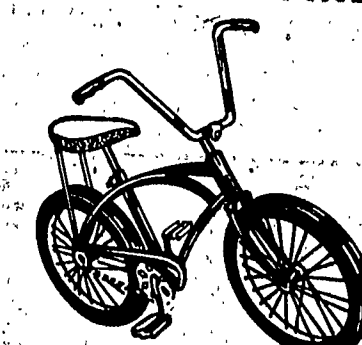

Demo Group Director -- "We Have 2 Parties In Maine Now"

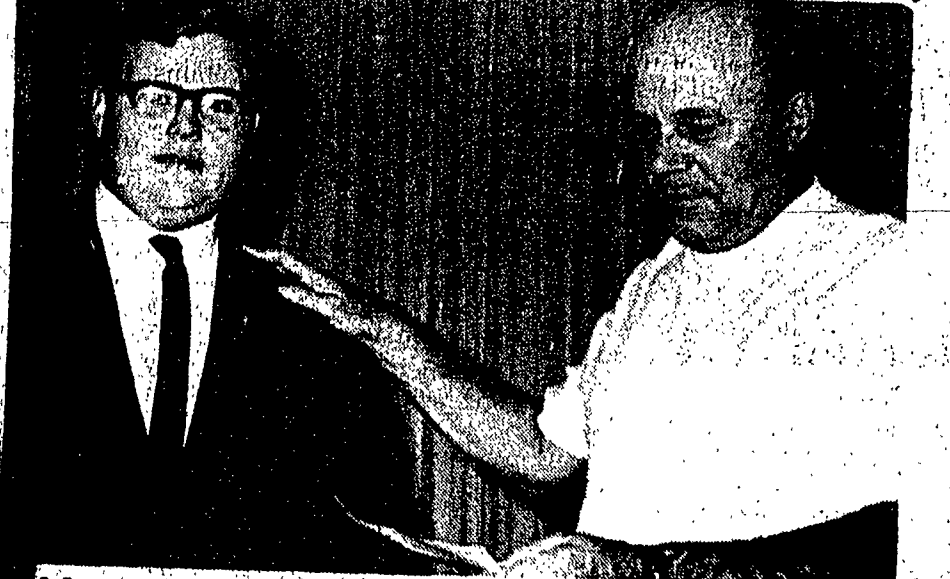
Rico, Wat For Dinner
