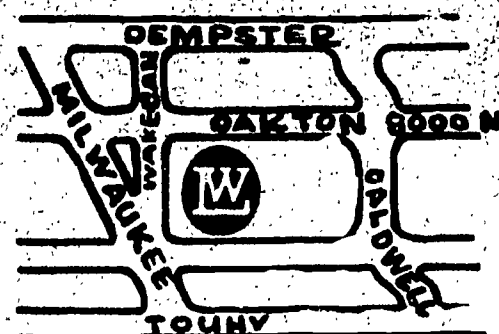




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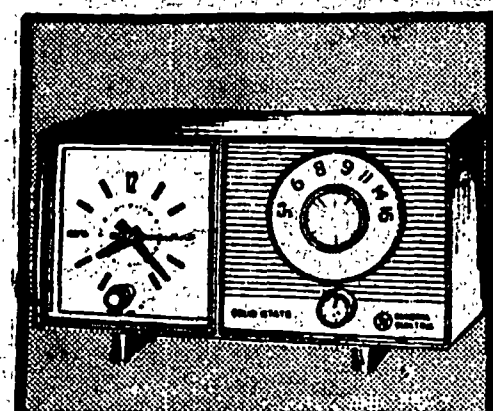
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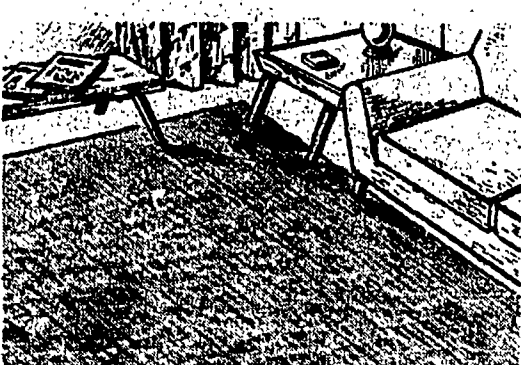
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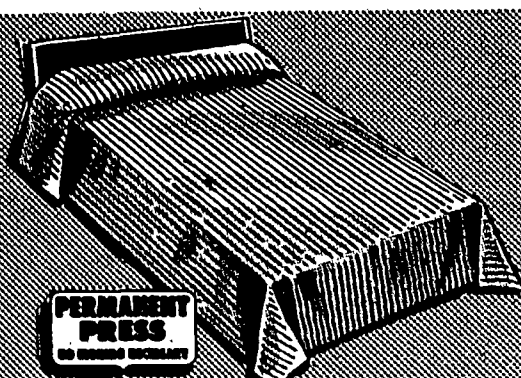
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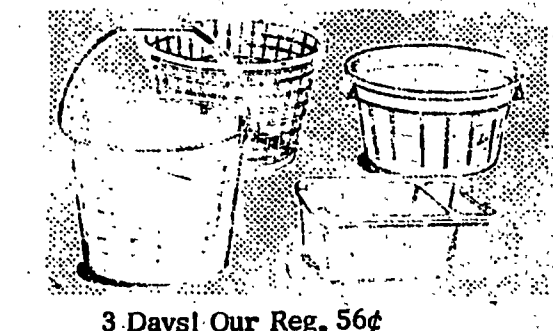


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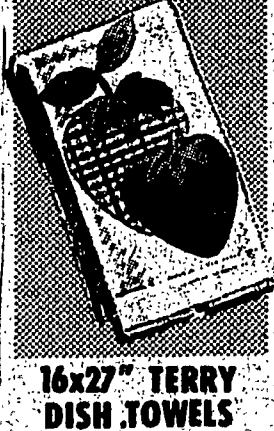


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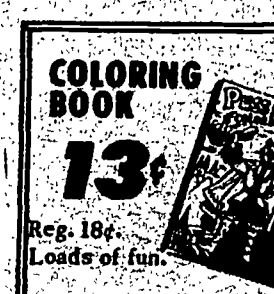
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4-Hour Public Hearing Held On Proposed Maine-Niles Twp. Junior College Dist.

Organized opposition was virtually non-existent last Thursday night at the public hearing called by the Illinois State Junior College Board to gather evidence on the question of whether to establish a Maine-Niles Township Junior College district.

Almost 100 interested persons were present as the hearing began but about 4 hours and 15 witnesses later, just a handful had stayed on. State

Rep. Juckett testified without committing himself either pro or con.

Juckett's purpose in testifying was to present budget figures which, he indicated, might mean the state will some day fail to supply the 75% of junior college land and building costs and about 50% of operating costs now authorized in state laws.

If that happened, an event Juckett declined to predict would

happen, local junior college districts would have to either curtail programs or raise taxes or fees.

Most of the evening was taken up by a parade of witnesses presenting facts, figures, and authoritative opinions to show that a Maine-Niles township junior college district is needed, is educationally feasible and would be financially sound.

Although the state board's hearing officer, Kenneth H.

Lemmer, must still study the transcript of the hearing, prepare a summary and recommendation, and present it to the Junior College Board for action, there was little doubt at the end of Thursday's meeting that Maine and Niles township voters will be asked to vote on the proposed district in a referendum. The most likely time is March.

The proposed district would encompass all of Niles township, except that part within the Evan-

ston township High school district, and all of Maine township except the area south of Kennedy Expressway (which legally cannot be included because it is not contiguous with the rest of the township).

The proposed area -- one of only a few areas of the state not yet in a junior college district -- was described as covering about 3 1/2 to 5 miles by not over 10 miles. Witnesses continued on page 22

"Political Football"--"Wente"

Village Board Gives Okay To 1st Step In New City Hall Remodeling

Although Trustee Bob Wente termed the new village hall, its remodeling and all facets of the project as "political football" at the Tuesday night meeting of the Niles Village Board of Trustees, a vote was taken and plans approved by the board for the outside remodeling of the former A&P store at Milwaukee and Howard, which will soon become the new Niles Village Hall. It was study #2 which was finally accepted after Mayor Nicholas Blase had to cast a vote to break the deadlock.

Wente urged the board to postpone any decision or action on the village building until after the election, telling board members at present he believed the whole thing was being used to get votes and that maybe a new administration might not want things the way the board was now planning.

Bids will be let on this phase of the remodeling so that hopefully work can begin in the very near future.

Tr. Ed Berkowsky announced Tuesday night the selection of Larry Renetzky as director for

the Niles Family Service Dept., beginning Jan. 20. He will be introduced to the board, press and public at the Jan. 28 village board meeting.

Renetzky, 34, married and the father of 2 children, spent 2 years at McCormick Theological Seminary, has been a lay preacher for 16 years and has also been a social worker.

Tr. Todd Bavaro told the board, members of the Niles Youth Congress and Youth Commission, working together last Saturday, collected over \$400 for the March of Dimes.

In other business Tuesday night the village board approved an ordinance rezoning the Candlelight Theatre property at Milwaukee and Oakton from B1 to B2 (front portion); approved an ordinance rezoning Olympic Estates property (rear portion) from B1 to R2.

Adopted Niles Safety Council recommendation that 4-way stops signs be placed at Normal and Lincoln in, and no parking or stopping signs be placed along Cumberland next to Ballard school at Ballard and Cumberland.

Referred to the Plan Commission a request by a nursing home that its zoning be changed to R3 special use; approved the dedication of the Washington Township property to the Niles Township Library; and approved a resolution which would be referred to the Niles Township Board of Trustees for their consideration of the proposed Niles Township Sentinel Missile site by the

Hold Rites For Former Niles Police Chief Romey

Funeral services were held last Saturday morning from Koop Funeral Home to St. Juliana church for one of the more controversial figures in Niles' past, Robert Romy, who was a member of the Niles Police Dept. for 29 years and Niles Police Chief for 27 of those years. He resigned that post of May 31, 1961 after the New Era Party, headed by Nilesite Nicholas Blase, ended the 20-year reign of Frank Stanekowicz as Mayor of Niles.

Romey, who was 69 years old, died at Swedish Covenant hospital. He and his wife, Cecilia, his sole survivor, resided at 6921 Niles terr., Niles. Since his retirement from the police force, Romey has been working with his sister-in-law in a small manufacturing firm.

Former Chief Romey was a life member of the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police Inc., the Illinois Police Association.

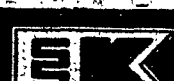

TV Census Survey Here

A sample of residents in this area will be asked about the television sets in their households as part of a nationwide survey the week of Jan. 20, director Theodore F. Olson of the Bureau of the Census Regional office in Chicago announces.

The questions are aimed at determining the proportion of households in the U.S. with television sets, the proportion with color sets, and the proportion with sets which can receive UHF. Answers to these questions help government and business in decisions affecting the establishment of new broadcasting facilities.

The survey is taken annually. Last year's figures showed that approximately 94 per cent of the households in the United States had at least one television set. Approximately 19 per cent of the households had a color set and 42 per cent were equipped for UHF reception.

The TV questions supplement the Bureau's regular monthly employment survey which provides data to the U. S. Department of Labor for updating national employment figures.

The identity of households in the survey is confidential, and the information obtained will be used for statistical purposes only.

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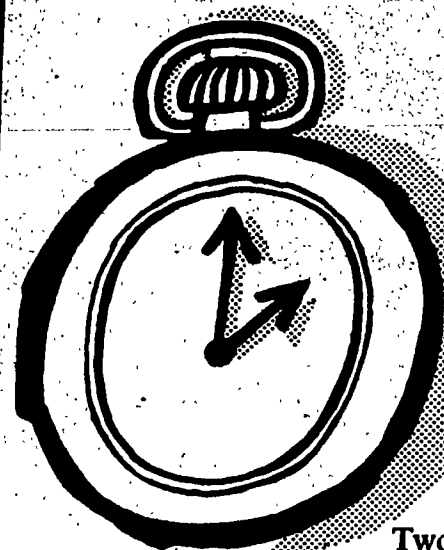
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Deaf Aid Unit To Meet

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Chief Hoelbl To Direct Illinois VFW Lite-A-Bike Campaign

Niles Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl has been named to direct the Illinois Veterans of Foreign Wars Lite-A-Bike Safety campaign.

Chief Hoelbl was named to this post by commander Thomas Russell, head of the Illinois contingent of the veterans organization. The state group involved 16 districts, with over 100,000 members in 400 posts.

The Lite-A-Bike campaign is a nationwide effort by the VFW to tag bicycles with red and white reflective tape which shows up at night. Its purpose is to reduce needless deaths caused by auto-bike accidents. The tape is distributed free to the VFW posts by the 3M Company.

The Niles Fire Department, under the leadership of Chief Hoelbl, was one of the first groups to spark the drive, using the personnel and facilities of the department to tag almost all of the bicycles in Niles.

As a result of a tremendous publicity campaign, in cooperation with the local schools, directional brochures and descriptive literature was distributed. To date, nearly 16 million bikes have been tagged by more than 5,000 posts nationwide.

Chief Hoelbl said that he hopes to make the state-wide campaign 100 per cent effective by using the same methods which worked so well for the Niles Fire Department. Chief Hoelbl has long been an active member and officer of Post 7712.

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Maine Twsp. GOP Declares Support Of Israel In Lebanon Crisis

The Republican Party of Maine Township adopted a resolution Friday night (Jan. 10) declaring support of Israel in the crisis stemming from the Israeli raid on the Beirut airport.

The resolution condemned communist influence in the Middle East and the Soviet supply of arms to Arab states as a threat both to the freedom of Israel and to world peace. Also hit was the recent United Nations declaration that criticized the Israeli action.

Floyd T. Fulle, Maine township committeeman, said the resolution called the U.N. declaration "symptomatic of a hypocritical double-standard by which Arab raids and atrocities are ignored while whatever Israel does in defense is condemned."

Fulle said copies of the resolution of support will be sent to the Israeli foreign office and to U Thant, secretary-general of the UN.

Maine township calls itself "the most Republican township in the United States," claiming to produce a larger Republican plurality than any other township in the nation.

Copies of the resolution also will be sent to the Republican Central Committee of Cook county, the State Central committee and the Republican National committee. Copies will be made available to any other organization that wishes to adopt a similar expression of support, Fulle said.

The resolution noted Republican dedication "to the preservation of peace and freedom

in the world" and opposition to the "encroachment of communism on freedom as a threat to global peace."

It blasted the failure of American foreign policy in the Middle East for leading "not only to undue communist influence in that area but also to direct aiming of Arab states by the Soviet Union."

These developments threaten the freedom and independence of Israel and raise "the danger of regional conflict which, in turn, menaces world peace," according to the resolution.

The resolution called for "a policy of permanent peace in the Middle East and for public acknowledgment by all nations of the sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence of every State in the area and of its right to live in freedom and in peace, within secure and recognized boundaries."

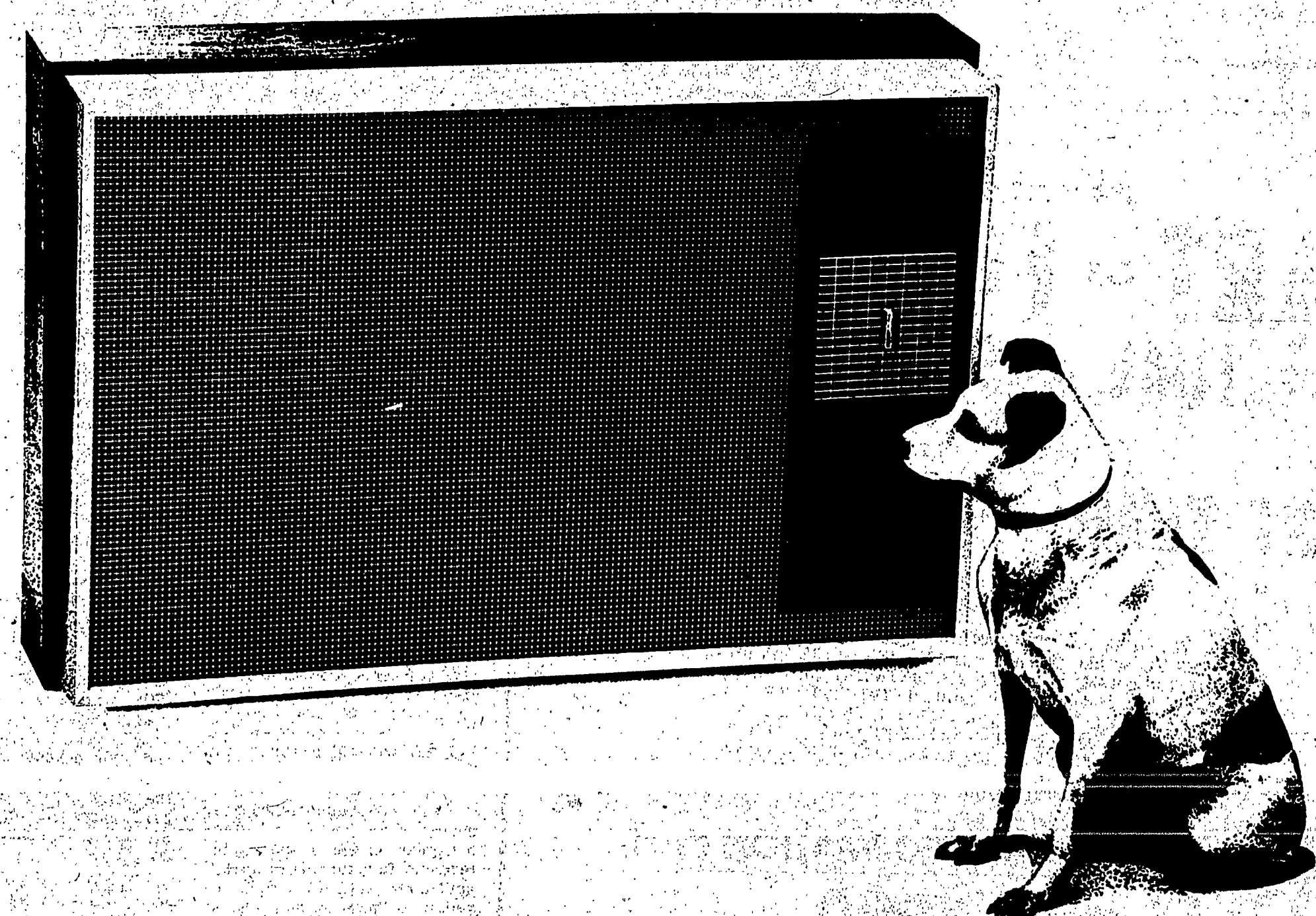

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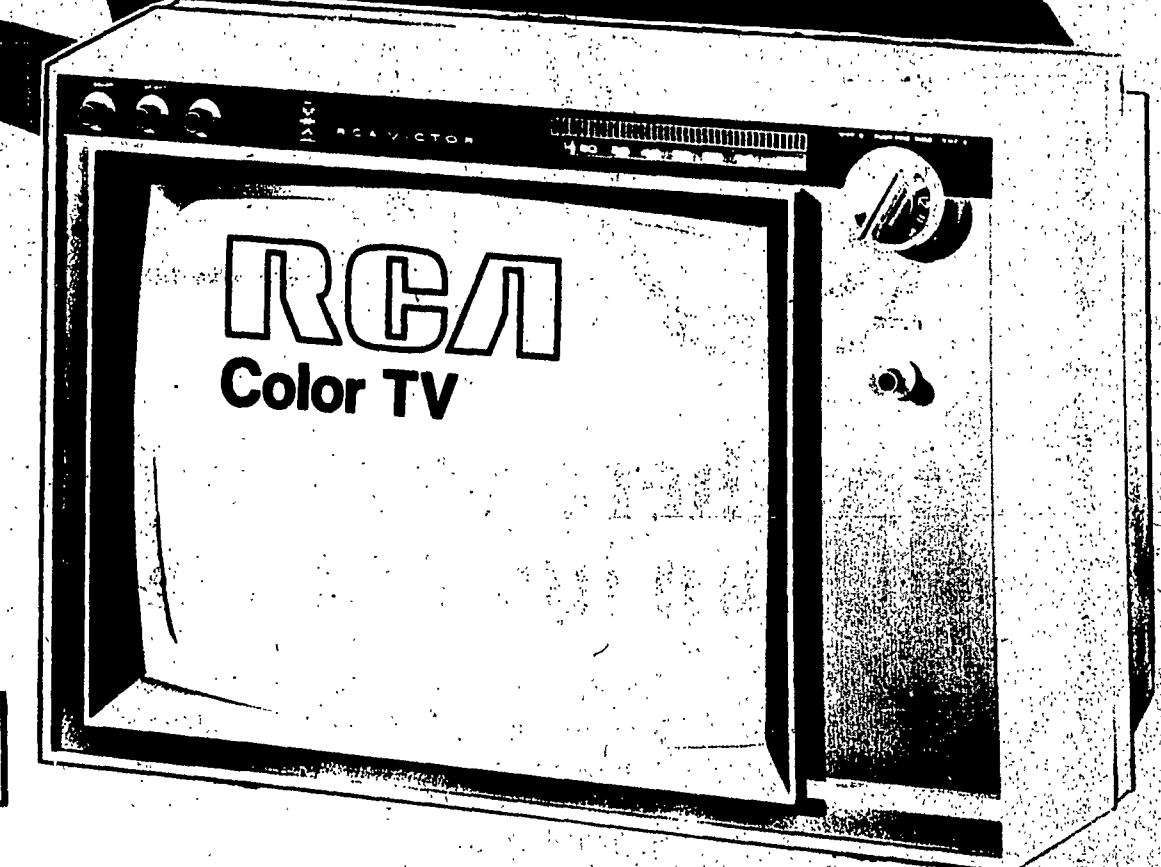

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M. G. Park District Notes, News Vision Screening

On Jan. 27 and 28, the Morton Grove Park District will conduct its fourth annual Pre-School vision screening program, but this year it is announcing a big change in policy. In previous years the vision screening was available only to the Pre-Schoolers enrolled in the Park District's Pre-School program. This year an invitation is extended to all Morton Grove Pre-Schoolers, three and one half to five years old, to take advantage of this free offer which is being extended for the first time in any village.

The Pre-School vision screening program will be held in cooperation with the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Illinois State Department of Public Health. It will be held Jan. 27 and 28 at the National Park fieldhouse at 9325 Marlon, Morton Grove. Children enrolled in the Pre-School Program will be assigned an appointment time by their Pre-School teacher.

Donald F. Lutz, Director of Parks and Recreation urges all parents of Pre-Schoolers who are NOT enrolled in the Pre-School Program to come into the main office at 6250 Dempster st. on Jan. 20 and be given an

assignment of time to have their child's vision screened. At the same time parents will receive a "game" to play with the child previous to the screening so that the Jan. 27 and 28 screening can be conclusive.

Certified, trained technicians from the staff of the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness will do the actual vision screening. Children who fail this screening will be referred to their own ophthalmologist or optometrist for further diagnostic testing or treatment.

Each year that the Park District has held the vision screening the results ran about the same. Out of 250 children scheduled, about 200 went through with the screening, 8 were referred to doctors. Out of the fifty who did not appear, statistically two or three children will go on into grade school with low-vision (amblyopia) undetected. Remember the child with amblyopia does not know how he was meant to see, so he cannot complain about a visual problem. Could your child be one of these? The Morton Grove Park District strongly urges you to take advantage of this vision screening which it offers as a public service. For further information call Mrs. Ablon, PA 4-3657.

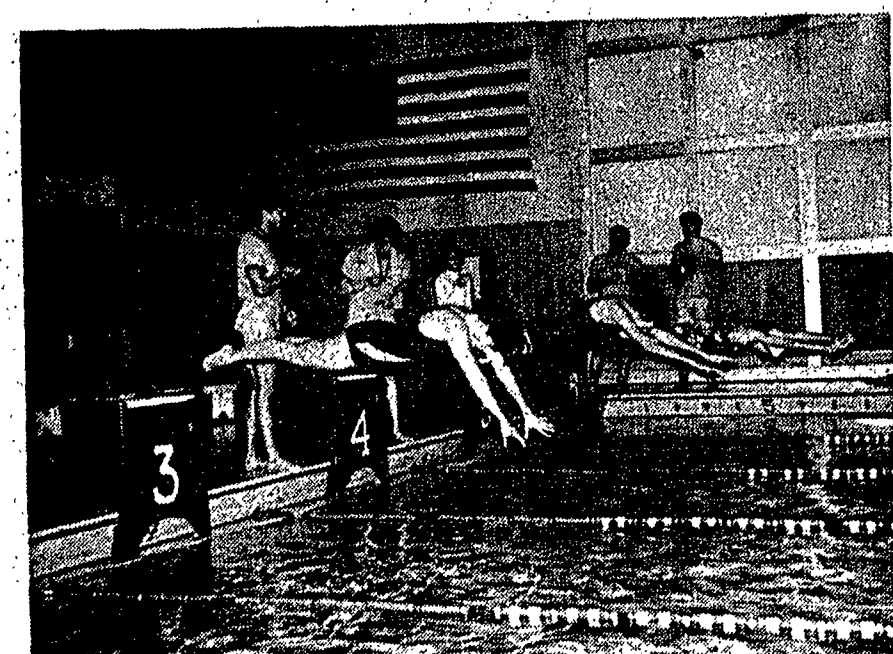

M. G. Park District Notes, News Vision Screening

On Jan. 27 and 28, the Morton Grove Park District will conduct its fourth annual Pre-School vision screening program, but this year it is announcing a big change in policy. In previous years the vision screening was available only to the Pre-Schoolers enrolled in the Park District's Pre-School program. This year an invitation is extended to all Morton Grove Pre-Schoolers, three and one half to five years old, to take advantage of this free offer which is being extended for the first time in any village.

The Pre-School vision screening program will be held in cooperation with the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Illinois State Department of Public Health. It will be held Jan. 27 and 28 at the National Park fieldhouse at 9325 Marion, Morton Grove. Children enrolled in the Pre-School Program will be assigned an appointment time by their Pre-School teacher.

Donald F. Lutz, Director of Parks and Recreation urges all parents of Pre-Schoolers who are NOT enrolled in the Pre-School Program to come into the main office at 6250 Dempster-st. on Jan. 20 and be given an

assignment of time to have their child's vision screened. At the same time parents will receive a "game" to play with the child previous to the screening so that the Jan. 27 and 28 screening can be conclusive.

Certified, trained technicians from the staff of the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness will do the actual vision screening. Children who fail this screening will be referred to their own ophthalmologist or optometrist for further diagnostic testing or treatment.

Each year that the Park District has held the vision screening the results ran about the same. Out of 250 children scheduled, about 200 went through with the screening, 8 were referred to doctors. Out of the fifty who did not appear, statistically two or three children will go on into grade school with low-vision (amblyopia) undetected. Remember the child with amblyopia does not know how he was meant to see, so he cannot complain about a visual problem. Could your child be one of these? The Morton Grove Park District strongly urges you to take advantage of this vision screening which it offers as a public service. For further information call Mrs. Albion, PA 4-3657.

Legion Auxiliaries Support Gift Shop For Hospitalized Veterans

During the month of December Christmas gift shops were held in 21 hospitals in the state of Illinois. Nearly 6,000 hospitalized veterans in these establishments with little or no income, were able to shop at no cost to themselves. They chose gifts for the members of their immediate families which were supplied through generous contributions of American Legion Auxiliaries.

Many of us cannot imagine "there for the grace of God go I" sick and injured men who participated in this program. But you think of a small child who on Christmas Day, separated from her father, opens a gift and says, "Oh, a beautiful doll. It's from daddy!"

Representatives of the Morton Grove Unit #134 of the American Legion Auxiliary recently spent a day at the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium where they wrapped packages for the 175 veterans confined there, added a gift enclosure card and mailed the items to the families who reside out of town.

Mrs. Ed Lange, Unit Rehabilitation Chairman, who is hospital chairman at MTS reports Auxiliary President Mrs. Albert Nehart, past president Mrs. George Howe and members Mrs. Herman Hack and Mrs. William Rembacz joined her for the day's wrapping session. When some men had as many as 11 children, you can see how many gifts the ladies wrapped of toys, jewelry, games, etc.

Complete returns as to money expended are not in yet due to the complex problem of tabulating monies spent, but a year ago a total of \$31,139.04 was spent to deliver 12,000 gifts to 10,000 men and women patients in VA and other Illinois hospitals who were former service personnel.

Since the inception of this program in 1944, the state of Illinois Legion Auxiliary Units have spent in excess of one million dollars providing holiday cheer to these hospitalized veterans.

The project was begun by International entertainer Eddie Cantor, and ladies of the Morton Grove American Legion Auxiliary as well as those throughout the state spent many valuable hours away from their own personal shopping and holiday endeavors purchasing and assembling the gifts for this annual holiday veteran's program.

Mrs. Lange said, "The hospitalized veterans are always so grateful for the opportunity to 'shop' without leaving the hospital; many who cannot even leave their beds. Carts are wheeled to the bedside of those who cannot walk down to the Gift Shop room and they, too, see suitable items which will be gift wrapped for them, hundred-fold which they are able to choose after viewing. Our women work very hard for many weeks prior to this Christmas gift shop time picking out suitable items to make this project a success."

Dr. Richard Short, superintendent of High School Dist. 207, said that he believed, on the basis of his schools' experience with the United Motor Coach co., that local bus systems would establish effective public transportation when the college opens.

The proposed district has a population of about 250,000 people, which is expected to provide an initial student body of at least 1,800 full-time junior college students and 2,200 by 1973-74.

The assessed valuation of property in this area is \$1,112,000,000, and the proposed initial tax rate for the junior college would be 17-1/2¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation for an educational fund plus 5¢ for a building fund.

The proposal calls for a curriculum of which 40% would be for technical and vocational training. Witnesses cited more than 230 different occupations for which two-year certificate programs are presently being offered in various junior colleges around the state. Virgil Marsh from Lutheran General Hospital and Jack Mau, a Niles township industrialist, cited specific vocational education needs of business, industry and institutions within the proposed district.

Robert Runde, admissions director of Wright Junior college, noted junior college districts are required by law to give preference to their own residents when a school gets crowded. His school already bars outsiders from a full-time enrollment in the Fall term and he predicted Maine and Niles township residents would face increasing difficulties with all neighboring junior colleges in the near future.

Dr. Short explained the state law that requires a high school district not in a junior college district to pay much of the cost for its residents to attend junior colleges.

He cited the experience history of Maine township's high school district over the past four years, in which the drain on high school funds has mushroomed from \$34,952 in 1966-67 to an estimated \$500,000 this year.

The state law permits the high school district to assess a 3¢ levy for three years to offset these costs. However, in Maine township the junior college tuition costs have already exceeded the full three years' revenue by nearly \$760,000. That money reduces the funds available for the high schools. Continuation of the 3¢ levy by the legislature would not solve Dist. 207's problem, Dr. Short said. Current expenses are equivalent to a 9¢ levy.

In answer to a question from the audience, Dr. Short refused to estimate whether a levy of 15¢ would be inadequate in the future to send area junior college students to other districts. He noted the huge increases in junior college attendance, which jumped from about 150 in 1966-67 to more than 800 in 1968-69. There is no way to tell, he said, when this will level off.

The Building Commissioner's report showed total fees of \$1,468.75 for the month of December.

According to Nilesites who recall the "Romey Years", the main factor making the former chief so controversial was his consistent flair for making newspaper headlines and his continuous running battles with the then village trustees, regarding irregularities in his department. After Romey's resignation Mayor Blase set up a committee to seek a new police chief for the village. About 10 candidates were interviewed for the post before Sgt. Clarence Emrikson, who had been on the Niles force for 3 years, was appointed by Blase to handle the job.

A testimonial dinner dance, attended by 400 persons, was held in May of 1961 at the Tam O'Shanter Country club in tribute to Romey. The dinner was hosted jointly by the Niles Chamber of Commerce, Niles Lions and Niles Police and Fire departments. Eleven police chiefs from neighboring areas were on hand to join in the tribute. At that time Romey received gifts from several groups, among them a diamond-encased police star from "the men" on the Niles Police Force.

In many respects this is a repeat performance of previous petitions presented by Stein asking the same things of the school board in Dist. 63.

It has already been determined that the school district does, in fact, comply with all safety rules and bona fide bids on school buses are obtained by a citizen's committee on bus transportation and then a recommendation is made to the school board. Hugh McGulgan, Dist. 63, who had not had the opportunity of studying the latest plea from Stein when contacted by The Bugle, "Dist. 63 has been properly checked by state officials and found to be operating all phases of this bus and safety problem correctly. We have been over all this ground before with Mr. Stein."

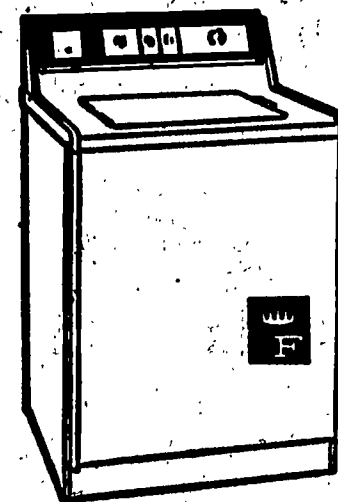
