



munity college explained the need to interested residents.

The idea of a junior college in our area for our two townships seems most noteworthy and deserves the serious consideration of all residents. Presently, every resident in our area can go to a junior college in our state, since the junior colleges were placed under state jurisdiction in 1965. Since we don't have a junior college district here your high school district foots the major burden of the tuition paid at the schools you attend. All residents, including those with college de-grees, are entitled to two more years of public school at the junior colleges in the state. And the major tuition cost (approximately \$15 per class hour) is paid from the educational fund of the high school.

It is expected in the coming ears all areas of Illinois will be a part of some junior college district. Proponents of creating a district contend it is better we form and control our. own district, rather than become annexed to a neighboring district. Thus, local control results in local residents sitting on the college school board, creating the policy needed in our own area. Thus, if the demand and need for greater manual arts training, nurses training, or other skilled areas is ingreat demand, the local board can institute a curriculum to meet these needs. It was cited at Wednesday's meeting that local hospitals are in great need for more nursing and hospital help and voiced this need at a county hearing explaining the need for a local college district.

business activities in Niles implied his ethics were less than what should be expected of a Mayor.

In addition to the Marcheschi charge of using the Mayor's office for "private gain" the second topic most emphasized was Blase's "machine politics" which points to his dual role as Democratic Maine Township Committeeman as well as his role as Niles' Mayor. Trustee Keith Peck said he was wearing-2 hats which conflict with one another, and cited the role Blase took in the unincorporated area which he believes is a direct conflict with his village Mayor's role. He said Blase favored annexation and will likely bring it up again when he seeks support for committeeman in the 1970 election. Peck does not believe annexing the 5,000-person high rise and multiple dwelling areas is in Niles' best interests. Marcheschi later mentioned Blase's "fooling 'around" in that area may have lost Niles chances for annexing just the shopping center area on the north side of Dempster Street.

Marcheschi said he thought the public offices ... should not be used as a

stepping stone for further political positions and pri-

vately admitted to THE BUGLE he thought Blase would not fill out his full term in office moving on to bigger political ambitions during the next 4 years. Marcheschi emphasized the need to win this election was paramount to Blase's future plans.

Keith Peck, who ran with Blase 4 years ago, said the only reason he ran with Blase then, was he was assured Ken Scheel was running for office. Peck said he questions whether the board meetings are "open'l since questions from the public were squelched by a Blase edict which had temporarily banned free discussion from the public. He said Blase's high-tempered attitude has "brow-beaten" the trustees and Blase's "one-man whims" amounts to a dictatorship. Marcheschi backed up Peck's accusations noting the smaller turnouts at village board meetings.

It was stated by Marcheschi his party had a diffi-

cult time renting store space for their meetings, implying Blase placed pressure on store owners not to rent space to the Marcheschi party.

Marcheschi also said he felt the Mayor's post was a "part-time" position but Blase was making politics a "life-long career."

In answer to BUGLE questions about Marcheschi's business activities in the community he said he has never solicited insurance business in the years he has served on the board. He noted he sold insurance to the Police and Fire Benevolent Associations, but on+ ly after they contacted him and his prices were the lowest bids they received. Blase's activities in the insurance business were discussed. He has been reported linked with a David Silk, who solicited business in Niles using the Mayor's name when attempting to sell here.

Park Board Commis-

sioner Jack Leske, who is running for trustee, said Blase's philosophy of gove

ernment is "different than mine. There is no need for national politics" in Niles village government.

Village clerk Marge Lieske, who shares equal animosity with Blase over each other's political posi-tion, stated: "In clear conscience I had to make a decision. There are things that go on which disturb me." She then said people were urging her to run. for Mayor but she was intending to run for clerk as an independent until this ticket was formed. Mrs. Lieske said "religious people" asked "can you take it?" when she told them she was not going to run with Blase, mentioning the pressure which would be used against her for this decision. She said she "can't and won't put up with" what's going on in the village. While vague in this implication she said the Brown Bottle Restaurant on Caldwell Avenue is illegally zoned. THE BU GLE previously mentioned a good friend of Blase and a political benefactor of Blase, is involved in the Brown Bottle.

In other comments Trustee Keith Peck said he believes future action should be taken to give Niles better post office facilities and thought the need for street lights in residential areas might be considered.

While much of the criticism was wrapped in vagaries one of the candidates made a statement which they believed was convincing, despite many of the vague innuendoes spoken during the evening. He said we should note the candidates decided not to run with Blase. It was they who turned away from him rather than Blase not want-

ing to run with them.




