



From The Left Hand

The sound and fury of April's village election is slowly fading away and a sense of normalcy is returning to the village hall. Many of the wounds encountered in the "battle of '68" are still raw but the wounded will survive to battle another day.

In past years we publish a few New Year's resolutions at the end of December which we would like to see considered by the guys who are elected by the village's bill payers. Actually, the fiscal year of the village begins in May and this is the best time for such resolutions to be considered. If we were doing the quarterbacking at the village hall we'd call some of the following signals:

1. Actively pursue the CTA extension plan which Mayor Daley mentioned last week. A metropolitan public transportation system which would create a one-service system in conjunction with Chicago is of paramount importance in our area. Morton Grove has already lost one industry and is expected to lose a second one. The inability to bring people into the area for employment is a problem which will see additional industry move from the area if the problem is not solved. With the additional CTA service down the median strip of the expressway, buses feeding this system seem to be essential for its success for suburban travelers. But initiating some action on behalf of suburbia, rather than only coming from the city, is essential for its activation.
2. From a selfish standpoint the need to retain industry requires personnel to "man" and "woman" the many jobs. Since residents enjoy a lower tax base because of industry being here, (particularly in Niles township) it is essential public officials begin working with industry to create low-cost housing in suburbia. The federal government will finance at low interest rates such housing and it's imperative, if suburbia is to meet the challenges of the seventies, that they initiate such action. At the LWV Luncheon 2 weeks ago the guest speaker, a sociologist from the University of Chicago, thought industry should take the lead in such an endeavor. With low cost federal financing available, with the crying need for employment in the suburbs, and with the crisis in the cities, it is our responsibility to create such action. It requires action from the community but most important it requires responsibility and sheer "guts" from public officials to stand forthright and show the leadership they contend they have. If their election promises of leadership can be taken seriously, then such an issue cries for their being in the forefront of such an effort.
3. The creation of a citizen "think-tank" committee. The village board should seek out residents who would periodically recommend means for improving their community. Such members should be selected on a non-partisan basis and should study and review other communities' actions and suggest to local officials means for bettering our area.
4. In the review of the village manager issue public officials should study and consider creating a referendum to enhance the position of a manager.

In the village of Niles it is an ideal time to consider such action since the manager has received overwhelming votes of confidence in the past when he ran for office. Since the village staunchly backs the present manager he should be given the opportunity to fully exploit his position, without having to look over his shoulder at the village officials.

In Morton Grove the manager system is likely to be given a more fair and open consideration in the coming months, with the advent of the new men in office. If and when the plan is approved submitting it to residents for a vote will insure a manager who is free of politics. In Niles the initial attempt at its first manager was little more than a messenger boy for the public officials. Such a watered-down version of the position can obstruct the future of a meaningful manager-system.

New Officials Sworn Into Village Offices

It had humor...it had pathos...there were serious moments and a few of hilarity.

It was the May 13 meeting of the Niles Village Board of Trustees and the time to swear in the newly elected officials of the village.

While a good-sized crowd of friends and well-wishers watched, new trustees Peter Pesole and Richard Gruenwald as well as incumbent trustee Keith Peck were sworn in by Judge Anton Smigel. Then it was the turn of newly elected Village Clerk Frank Wagner; after him it was the turn of reelected Mayor Nicholas Blase, who was sworn in to serve his third term. While it took the Mayor a few extra minutes to get through the oath (he nervously had a few of the words mixed up), the ceremonies were finally concluded and the new board called to order.

Blase told those present one of the wonderful things about our government is "it always continues. At no time is there a lapse in government, there is no failing of the continuance of government."

Speaking to those officials leaving office Blase told them "good men and good women come and go in government

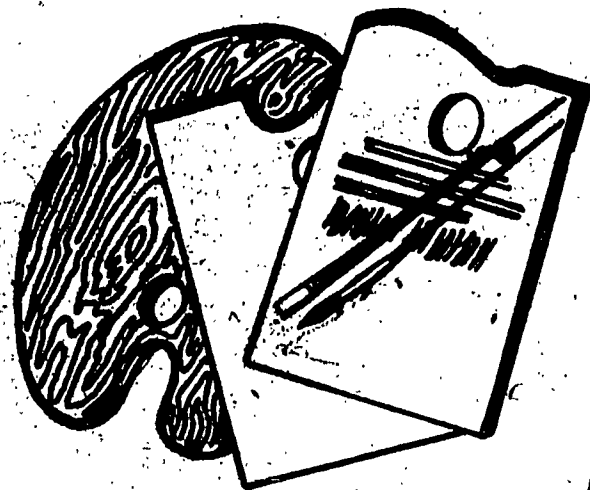
Auxiliary in making this year's effort the best ever.

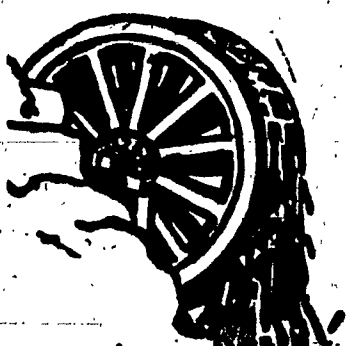

I used to think parents who went to Little League and Peanut League games and yelled their heads off at all and sundry, were really losing their marbles, if indeed they had not already done so and were using this as a means of getting back at the world for all its levied miseries.

You know what? I've changed my mind. Not only that, I, too, have developed into a first-rate yell-outer but even more, I have a membership card in another club, this one a fan club. Objects of the admiration are those men who give their time, effort and ulcers to the children's baseball leagues as coaches.

No doubt in the Niles Baseball League ranks every coach is good and deserving of a big pat and bear-hug but the only one I've seen in action and watched up close is the gentleman coaching our 9-year-old's team—the JETS (an expansion team, my son proudly and unhesitatingly points out).

In this instance the coach, who has been active in boy's baseball for several years, is Don Maycan. Beginning sometime in April he took 13 boys (9 and 10 years old) who looked as though they each had 4 arms and 4 legs, all uncoordinated and all limbs moving in different directions at the same time and in 6 weeks has actually made them look like a baseball team, all playing in the same game at the same time.

It is a curious thing and for the most part defies description... this ability Don has to get through to the boys. He doesn't yell or scream or bellow or stamp his feet and jump up and down when he gives instructions or tells his players what to do nor not to do. He just tells them and they do it. Why doesn't it work that way in our house after the uniform has been tossed into the washer and civvies donned once again?

I don't know. It just doesn't.

And another thing...he isn't asked for a reason for every command he issues. His words are accepted as gospel as they are uttered. Why doesn't it work that way in our house? I keep threatening to cut a record explaining the necessity for eating 3 well-balanced meals every day (instead of pizza for breakfast, hamburgers for lunch and french fries drenched in ketchup for dinner) so when our sons next ask why they have to drink O.J. instead of root beer and eat spinach instead of sweet tarts, all I have to do is don my disc jockey cap and spin the platter.

Coach Maycan has that quiet authority in his voice that gets through to players and parents alike. But it's more than that. It's speaking softly but carrying the big suck T.R. always referred to, it's intuitively knowing when to speak and when to gesture without words, it's giving the boys a chance to do something they obviously like to do without saying something like "be careful, watch out, watch what you're doing" or "you can't do it that way, do it this way."

Whether it's all that and more or something else, I'm not too certain. Whatever it is, it works like a charm and has made the team one large cult of "coach worshippers."

I must mention, too, in the Maine-Northfield Little League, the parents and coaches, managers, etc. have purchased their own field and have also done an outstanding job in bringing authorized Little League baseball into this area.

Even though, every once in a while, one of the catchers gets bubble gum caught in his mask or a left-fielder watches a navy jet fly overhead while 2 runs are scoring against his team, the effort expended by all the adults involved more than matches the enthusiasm shown by the youngsters.

It might all be mini-baseball but it's maxi-effort.

Bids for videotape recorders, television cameras, and accessories were approved May 5 by the board of education during an adjourned meeting from a week ago. Purchase of the equipment, at a cost of more than \$8,000, will provide five television systems in the high schools, with three at Niles West and one each at the other two schools.

The school board also approved purchase of an Electronic Printing Tape Calculator.

to be used in the Business Education department at Niles East and 28 overhead projectors for use in the three schools. Carpeting for the aisles of the auditoriums in the three high schools was approved also, pending approval from Skokie's fire marshal that the carpet fabric is not a fire hazard.

On the basis of low bid, the school board authorized the schools to purchase gasoline, oil and other automobile ser-

vices, used primarily by driver education cars, from a local Sinclair service station. According to Superintendent Charles Szuberla, automobiles used by the school district use from 1,500 to 2,000 gallons of gas and about 20 quarts of oil every month.

In a series of motions concerning special education in Niles Township, the board of education approved naming the Township's new center for

Trainable Mentally Handicapped children as the Julia Molloy Center, and transferring the township's special education services from the Orchard school to Dist. 74. Orchard school has served the TMI children in Niles Township for 18 years. State legislation now requires that the service be assumed by the public schools. Mrs. Molloy has been principal of the Orchard school since its beginning.

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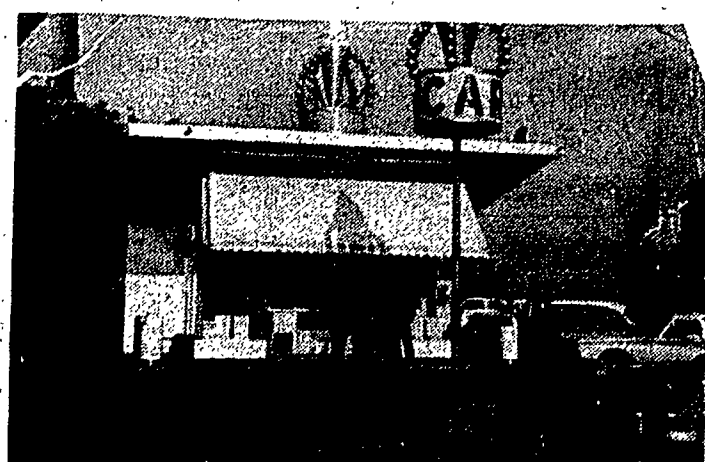
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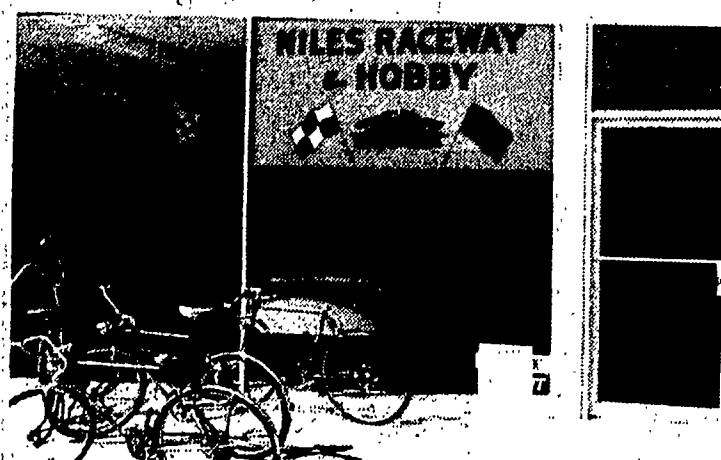
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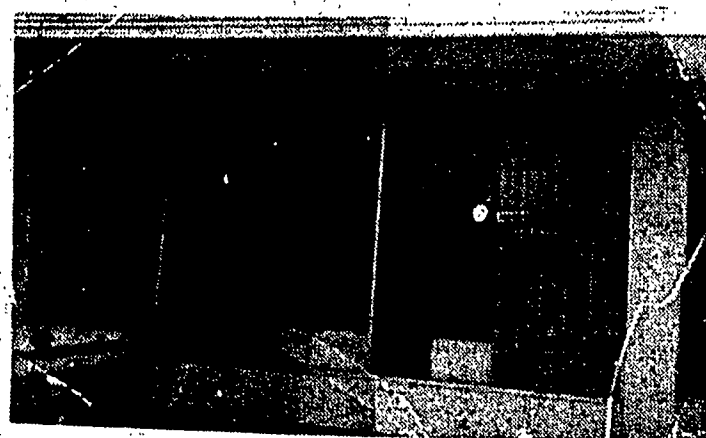
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Maine High Placement Test May 17

The test battery is designed to assist the student and the counseling staff in making decisions regarding course selection and placement which will meet the needs and interests of the student. It is used as only one of the criteria, along with the student's past performance and judgments of former teachers, in deciding on a program of studies to be taken in high school.

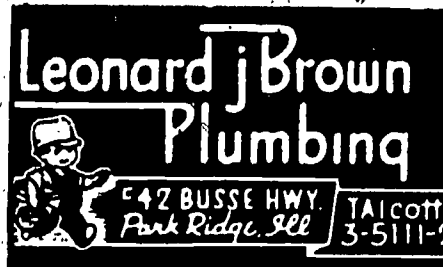

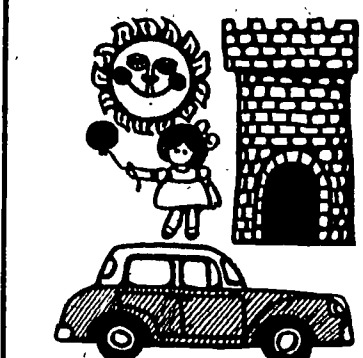

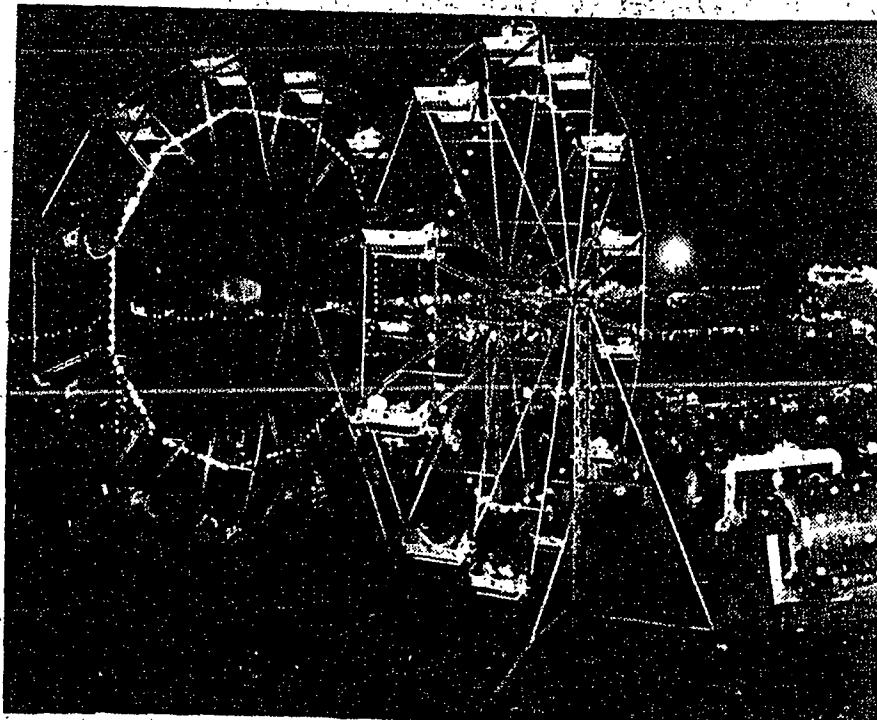
MELODONS PARTICIPATE IN DEDICATION

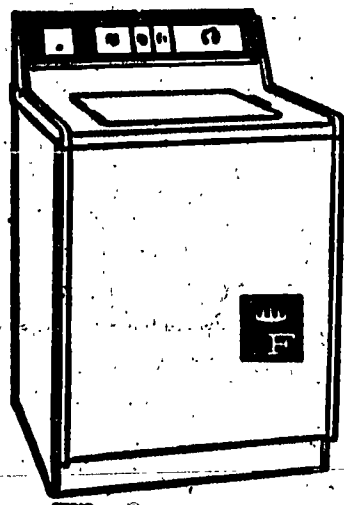

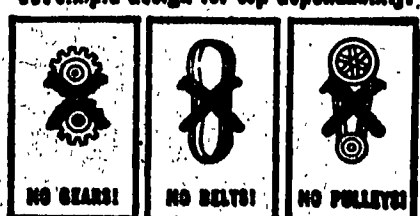
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Innovations For Maine Summer School

Students of the three Maine Township High schools - Maine East, Maine South and Maine West - can presently sign up for a seven week course related to the Cooperative Work Training program, which is a part of the Cooperative Education program of the high schools.

Cooperative Work Training is a cooperative effort by the school and the community to provide on-the-job training for high school young people in semi-skilled or service occupations.

The 1969 summer school program, which will be conducted at Maine East high school, will serve as a "pilot study" for all three high schools and will continue through the fall of 1969.

during the regular school year.

Structured in conformity with the plan of cooperative job training established by the Illinois State Board of Vocational Education, the new curricular plan enables high school students, who must be at least 16 years of age, to earn school credit while providing a school supervised vocational work experience.

The Cooperative Work Training Program has been established to assist students in making a successful and happy initial and continuing vocational adjustment.

Periodically each employer is requested to complete an evaluation of the student

learner's progress and performance. During the summer, participating students may work on a full-time basis while attending a related class each Monday morning. Students are paid a wage comparable to that of other beginners in any state and Federal regulations applying thereto.

The students receive one-half credit for the related class hours and one-half credit for their work experience.

Tours of many and diversified business and industrial plants have been planned so that students can gain a closer look at the world of work. Mr. Raymond A. Scharf and Mr. Allen J. Kaluzna of the Maine East staff will serve as coordinators of this summer school program

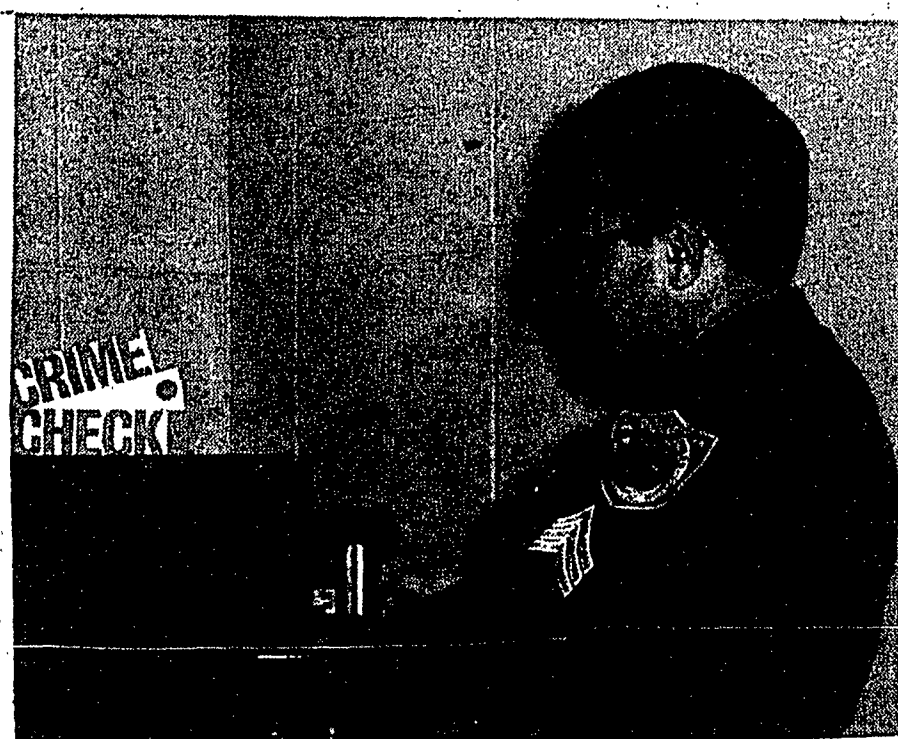

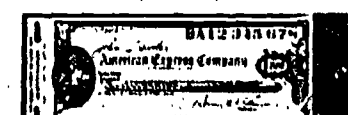
