During that period a high school boy had been electrocuted at a New Trier High school pool and Sullivan concerned himself with the lavishment of the huge L-shaped pool and it became the key issue in the hotly-contested battle for the commissioner's post. Schreiner won the election and two years later Sullivan joined Schreiner by winning the election in 1965. While local savants questioned whether the men could work together the political wounds of 1963 quickly healed and the men worked together admirably.

April 11 Sullivan presented Schreiner with the golden bathtub at a farewell party for Schreiner, reminding all of us how yesterday's bitter battles can be smiled upon in retrospect.

BD. DENIES PRE-SCHOOL ZONE PLEA

The "voice of the people" was heard, discussed and heeded Tuesday night at a meeting of the Niles Village Board of Trustees.

About 25 residents of the Maryland-Ballard area attended the meeting to protest against the proposed rezoning, from R1 to R3 Special Use, of a parcel of land 100 feet by 200 feet next to Ballard elementary school at Maryland and Ballard. The rezoning would have allowed utilization of the land for construction of a Kinder College Pre-School establishment, according to the petitioner Dan Millington.

It all boiled down to the fact residents in that area just didn't want any commercial establishment in the midst of their residential area.

Petitioner Millington had made his presentation to the board prior to the voiced objections, outlining plans for a \$170,000 structure completely carpeted, air-conditioned, with a 2,500 square foot play area and a 5,900 square foot building area. He told board members that site had been chosen because of its proximity to the center of Niles, Ballard school and the Ballard playground as

The neighbors' main objections to the pre-school included spot zoning which would have allowed a commercial enterprise in an otherwise com-

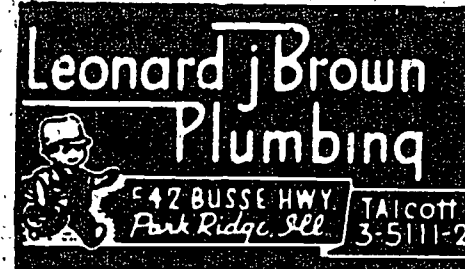

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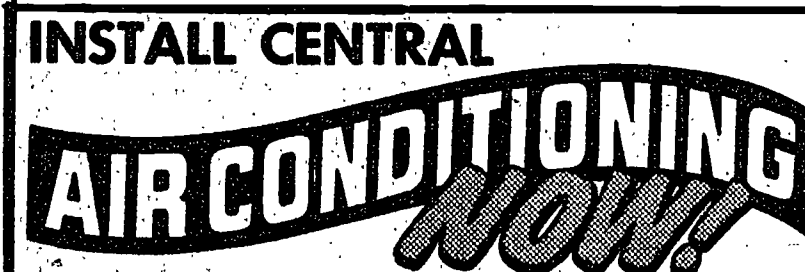
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AWARDS FOR ROBINSON, WALDER

Let's consider a different kind of LSD—Loyalty, Sincerity, Devotion. To most young people today, the "enemy" is anyone over 30. Everyone is out to prove themselves, to do their thing, to get into the act. They might get hurt in the process but then its hurts that puts them in the drivers seat. Or so they think.

The qualities of loyalty, sincerity and devotion to any job these days on the part of employees are becoming harder to recognize, especially when it's both mental AND physical varieties of that kind of LSD being required.

In no jobs are the requirements of mental and physical devotion more rigid than in the police and/or fire department. You gotta have it — plus a goodly portion of that loyalty and sincerity, too. A short pause for reflection on all these deep thoughts will also possibly lead you to the conclusion—"I wouldn't want their job for anything...."

Outside of the astronauts, who successfully returned Monday from their casual excursion around the lunar surface, very few jobs are more demanding than those of policeman or fireman. I don't know if it's beneficial or not to them or the community if these people join unions. If their salaries are kept up to cost of living levels and their hours and benefits are reasonable, they don't have too much need for a union.

Conversely, if they do not receive adequate pay and benefits, the union hammer is the only feasible weapon to pound their message home.

No matter how you slice it, it takes a certain breed of man to seek out a job that will constantly test his LSD quotient.

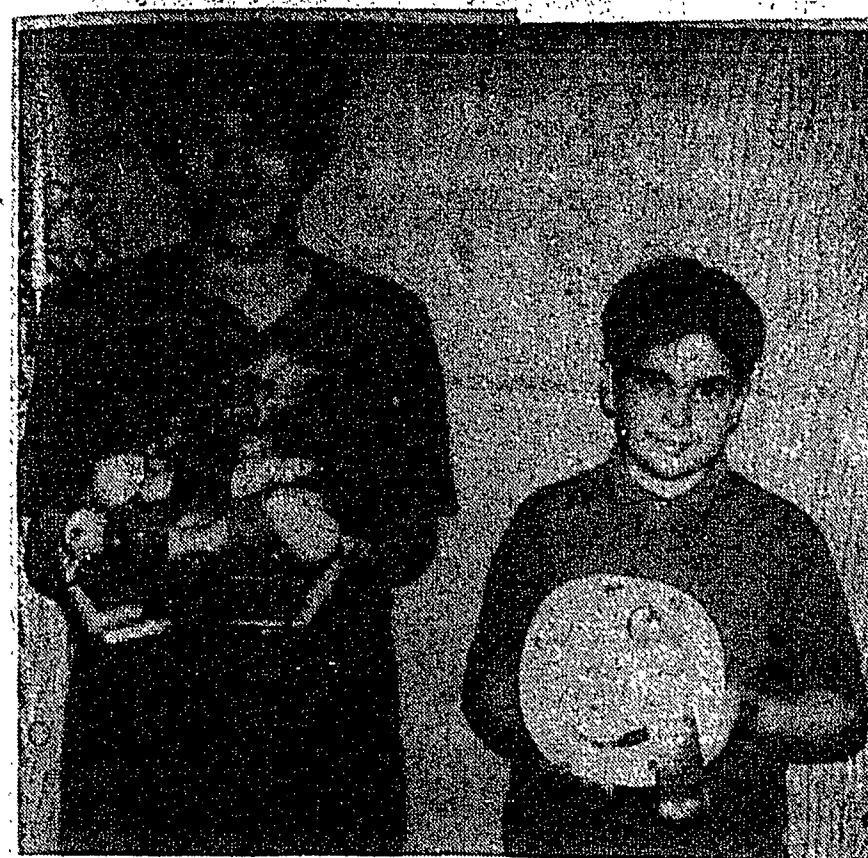

In other games, Edison Lumber Red Sox defeated the N.B.L. Pirates 7 to 2. Slowly, (Continued on Page 11)

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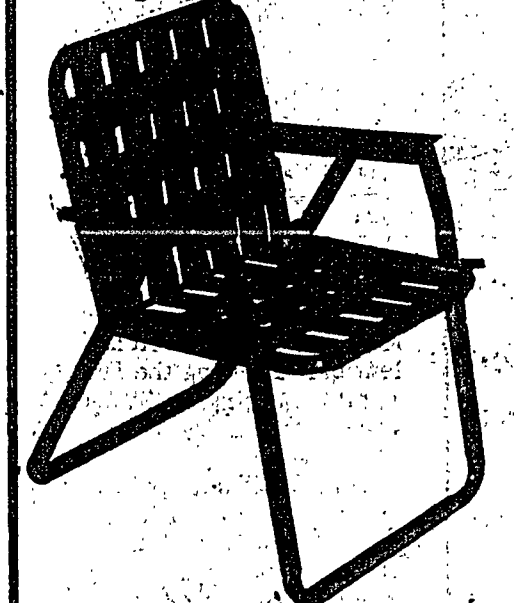

Dist. 63 Acts To Halt WJJD Site Construction

The board of education of East Maine School Dist. 63 has authorized its attorney Allen Schwartz to take whatever legal action he deems "advisable" to prevent construction by the Intercontinental Development Co., Inc. which the board contends will create a tax loss, a decrease of bonding power and, at the same time, an increase in the number of students in the district.

The construction site involved is located at Ballard and Greenwood rd., on what is known as the WJJD site.

When that property was rezoned in October, 1966, officials of Dist. 63 appeared at the hearing and publicly supported the proposed amendment with the understanding that developer Morris Suson, now a head of the Intercontinental Development Co., Inc., intended to develop the land in a way that would be beneficial to the dis-

trict. Suson's plans at that time, according to the authorizing resolution passed unanimously by board members of Dist. 63 at their May 13 meeting, called for construction of a commercial shopping center (now completed), eight 16-story apartment buildings with no more than 920 efficiency, one and two-bedroom luxury apartments. The area was to be extensively landscaped, and the buildings covering a small portion of the land were to be set back on the site.

The Intercontinental Development Co., Inc., however, has taken out permits to erect 14 four-story apartment buildings on the WJJD site containing over 1,100 efficiency, one, two and three-bedroom apartments. The buildings would cover 30 per cent of the site.

The Dist. 63 board charges in its resolution that "the project will cause a tax loss,

a decrease of bonding power, an increase in school operation costs and an increase in the number of children to be educated over the original plans and agreement of Morris Suson, all to the damage of the school district."

The resolution further authorizes Attorney Schwartz to "institute legal action in such form as he deems advisable to correct this wrong and injury, and to prevent future injury and detriment to the school district."

Dist. 63 is a district which has had to contend with the acute problems of a rapidly expanding suburban area. In 1960-61, its student enrollment was 2,723 pupils with an assessed valuation of \$22,350. per pupil and an operating cost of \$358.85 per pupil. By 1967-68, enrollment had jumped to 7,029 with an assessed valuation of \$19,787. per pupil and an operating cost of \$734.04 per pupil.

May 23—

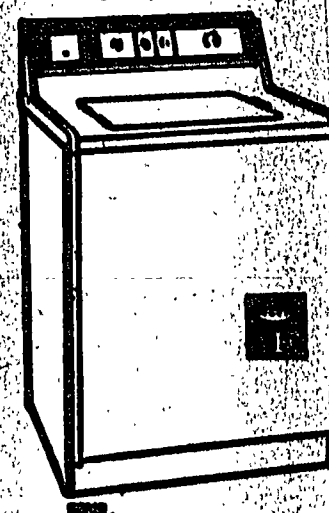

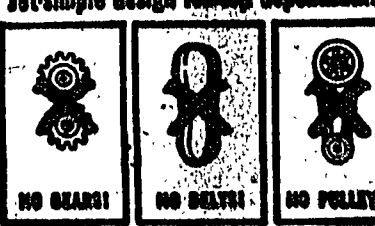
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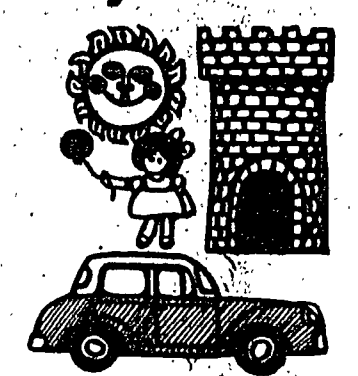
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
