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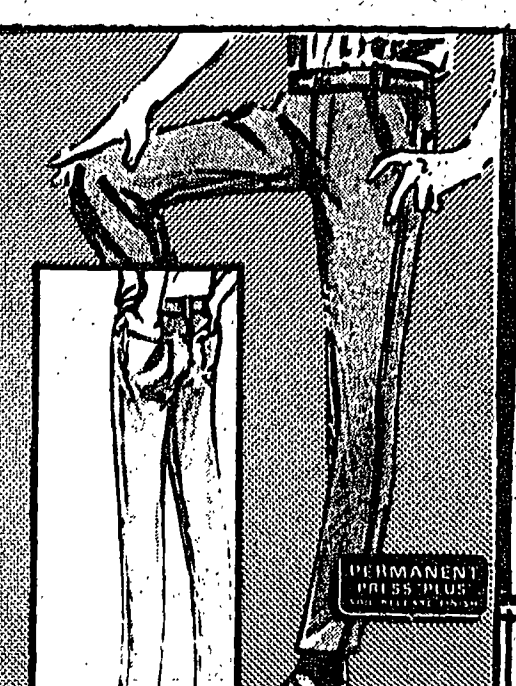

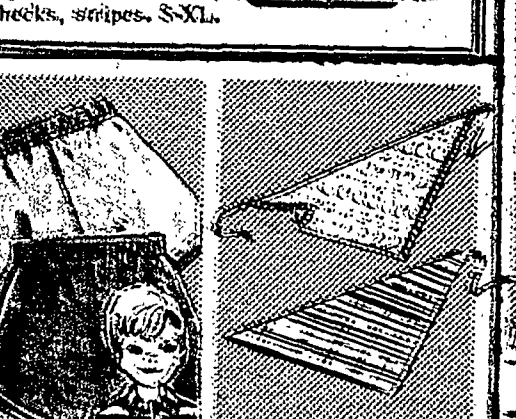

**From The Left Hand Niles Days Plans
Announced,
Disney Theme**

The BUGLE has become one of the more stalwart publications in this area. In former years Nilesites used to affectionately (?) refer to it as "the gossip sheet", or the "scandal rag" and eagerly look forward to the little intimacies which exist in the community. But now, lo and behold, an old BUGLE alumnus, Freda Aron, is writing a series for a Skokie paper on "wife-swapping in the suburbs". The articles make The BUGLE's past rumblings strictly minor league...sort of out of the Sally and Dick primers by comparison. We guess we're just not as sophisticated as our big brothers to the east.

Former Niles Park Commissioner Walter Zalud died 2 weeks ago. Walt, a very gentle man, was on the Board during the halcyon days when we were at odds with the Board over many of its policies. One time a closed meeting was held at Walt's home. We arrived before the meeting began and Walt welcomed us there. But when the meeting began the park board members asked us to leave. Rather cantankerously, we refused to budge. But after several minutes of bickering, we told the members to vote on whether or not they wanted "the press" at the meeting. We thought by placing them on record we had boxed them into a corner. But the equally cantankerous Board voted us out of the house, and with much chagrin, we left the private home which had a public meeting. Knowing Walter, who always was most mild-mannered and equally gracious, we're sure the incident was distasteful to him.

In Niles the village board has been tape recording its village board minutes for several years. The Board's minutes are also recorded by a secretary at every meeting. The tapes are a record for Niles archives, in the event there is a disparity of opinion over what has previously transpired. On occasion, we have used the tapes to make sure what we've reported has been accurate.

In Morton Grove, a 45-minute harangue took place the week before the new officials gained office regarding what was said at a previous meeting. And last week 20 minutes were spent on matters concerning what was or was not said at the previous meeting. Then trustee David Cohen corrected an error in the written minutes which erroneously reported what he had said. When we suggested MGC consider tape recording their minutes as Niles does, we received immediate opposition from manager Huber, mild resistance from Mayor Bode and silence from the rest of the Board.

The campaign for above board open government which the new men vowed during the pre-election time is already beginning to look hollow. To be fearful of ACCURATELY recording public meetings certainly lends suspicion the new officials are less than interested in moving away from the party days of the past Board. If this new Board refuses to open up the government but retains much of the provincialism of the past, then April's election will have gone for naught. Already, the hiring of a professional political payroller to serve on the Police and Fire Commission indicates

Board Adopts Campaign Pledge**Reduces Village Clerk Salary \$4,200**By Naomi Krone

In one fell swoop Niles Village Board of Trustees at a meeting Tuesday night voted to reduce the salary of the Village Clerk (Frank Wagner, Jr.) from \$6,600 to \$2,400; approved a series of one-man committee recommendations by Mayor Nicholas Blase ("work is accomplished quicker that way") passed an amendment raising the salaries of Plan Commission members from \$7.50 per meeting to \$15 per meeting and announced there will be a public forum June 23 at 8 p.m. in the council chambers to hear the pro and con concerning the parking of trailers and boats on private property.

Reduction of the village clerk's salary was one of the campaign promises made by Blase and Wagner during the recent village election. Wagner also is director of police department records (as a civilian employee).

The one-man committee ap-

pointments were recommended by Blase in the interests of efficiency. They include: Harrison, coordinator of governmental bodies, Tr. Peter Pesele; coordinator of tax activities, Tr. Richard Grunwald; family relations and transportation, Tr. Ed Berkowsky; public property, roads and buildings, Tr. Keith Peck; use of property related to zoning ordinances, Tr. Ang Marcheschi; business licenses, Tr. Richard Hartzak.

With the resignation of John Burnier as head of the Niles Air Pollution Commission, Blase announced the unit would become a part of the Niles Health Commission. George Anderson was reappointed Niles Village Engineer; Ken Galkinsky was named plumbing inspector; Len Berkowsky was named to the Fire and Police commission.

In other business the board Tuesday night approved an ordinance.

Director Robert Holley has put together a beautiful production. When you attend a performance, pay special attention to the costumes and sets — they're fit for royalty.

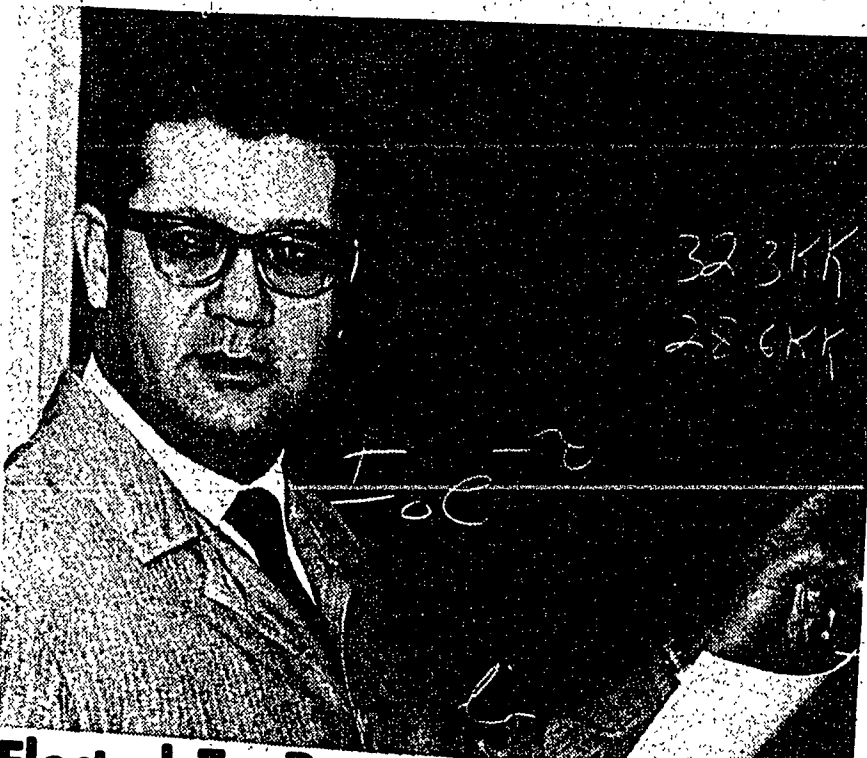
