

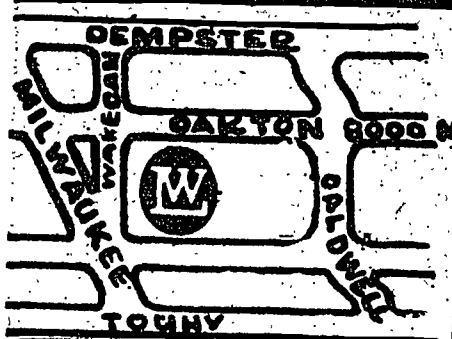

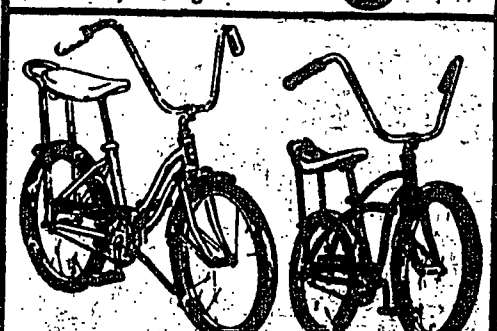

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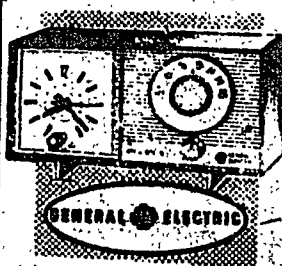

## From The Left Hand

We urge everyone within eyesight of this column to view and hear the junior college trustee candidates tonight at 8 p.m., at Niles Elementary School North in the Lawrencewood Center area.

If you are not actively involved in the community these days, particularly in school affairs, it is likely you know little about the candidates. Considering the officials elected will be spending millions of dollars thru the immediate years ahead, it behooves all of us to make an intelligent choice at Saturday's election.

Two caucus-like groups have been formed in the Niles-Maine Township district, and after screening candidates have made endorsements. The first endorsements came from the District 535 Committee, which selected people which they contend were chosen for their abilities and background, rather than the location of where they live. The second group, the Maine-Niles Committee, then made their choices, basing them on their representing all ends of the new district, as well as choosing the candidates for their background.

Candidates include 6 from Des Plaines, 4 from Lincolnwood, 3 from Morton Grove, 7 from Niles, 8 from Park Ridge and 15 from Skokie.

We have had resident candidates seek our support in Saturday's election but have turned them down. Unlike village elections, we don't feel qualified to render endorsements and have only scant knowledge of only a very few of the candidates. Furthermore, we are in agreement with the 535 Committee's position that the residence of the candidates is unimportant and the abilities of those running should be the sole consideration in electing the trustees.

In our brief discussions with residents in the various areas we've heard much hearsay about the motivations behind many of the candidates. We've been told the ultra-conservatives are attempting to take over the proposed college board and the ultra-liberals have a group of candidates who are also moving into the picture. Other rumors contend the Republicans from Maine Township are out to dominate the Board while others contend the Niles Township Democrats are moving to take over the Board.

Since we've observed much of this maneuvering thru the years we're sure some kernel of truth can be eschewed for each rumor. Let it only be written the organized groups in the communities can get behind a candidate and likely assure his (or her) election if the campaign, however quiet, has support. Thus, if the local Republicans or Democrats, with their wealth of workers, decide to turn-on a 12th hour telephone campaign, it is likely they can elicit much support for their favorites.

It can be concluded those candidates receiving the endorsements of one of the caucus-like groups, or candidates looked favorably upon by the local political groups, will be elected Saturday.

With 40 candidates you can be sure you have all the shades of the political spectrum, which will be represented. We know of one ultra-conservative, a member of Maine East's teaching staff, who will be one of the candidates. We've been told a partner of one of our state representatives will also be on the ballot. There's one candidate who emphasizes law and order in his screening committee speeches. There's candidates seeking the endorsement of liberal groups in Skokie, all which indicates the many shades of opinion and involvement in Saturday's election.

Cornball as it may read we urge all residents "to think for themselves" and the best way to do that is by being informed. Tonight at 8 p.m., you can make your own determination.

## Niles Pk. Dist. Breaks Ground Sunday

Groundbreaking ceremonies will be held at the Niles Park District Recreation Center, 7877 Milwaukee ave., Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m., June 22, when the Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District will take the first step towards attaining its goal in the improvement and development of the existing Park District facilities. These improvements and developments have long been only some outlines on blueprint.

This first step will be the construction of adequate administrative offices for the Park District, which will rise immediately adjacent to the present Recreation Center building and which will house facilities to provide for better management of the Park District's affairs.

The second step toward the fulfillment of promises made, will occur at the Oakton Manor Park site at 3 p.m., also on Sunday, June 22, when groundbreaking rites will be held for the construction of a small Recreation Center building to be used by the residents for recreational programs and the like.

Board of Commissioners has also announced bids have been requested for the construction of a gymnasium at Grennan Heights Park, with anticipated completion in mid-winter of 1969-70.

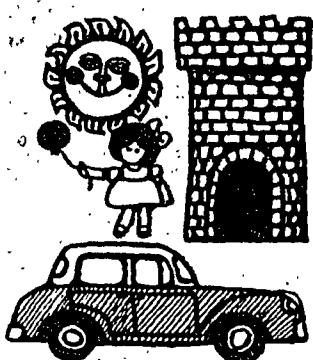

64 and visitors referred by the Chicago Board of Education attended a three-day workshop on individualized reading sponsored by East Maine School Dist. 63 June 2, 3, and 4 at East Maine Junior High School.

The workshop was conducted by Dr. Jeannette Veatch, professor of education at Arizona State University and primary developer of a system of individualized reading which makes use of experience charts and well-illustrated library books rather than basal reading texts to develop a child's early "key" vocabulary, plus individual conferences and continuous evaluation once the child has moved beyond the primary reading level.

Purpose of the workshop was to introduce reading coordinators and teachers to the methodology, philosophy and implementation of the Veatch individualized reading approach.

A short and long-term study also is currently being planned in East Maine School Dist. 63 for the 1969-70 school year which will compare the performance of students instructed in reading under the individualized program with those learning by the traditional basal text approach.

The study, under the direction of Mrs. Lorraine Bach, director of the gifted child program and coordinator of instructional materials; and Dr. Henry Alexander, language arts consultant and district testing director, could involve as many

as 44 teachers and 660 students next year.

The study, according to Dr. Alexander, would help determine the feasibility of using the individualized reading materials and methods recommended by Dr. Veatch in the District 63 reading program. The decision about which reading approach to use, Dr. Alexander pointed out, remains with the classroom teacher.

"There is great compatibility, however, between the nongraded, individualized educational philosophy of District 63 and the Veatch method of teaching reading," Dr. Alexander noted. Commercial texts tend to lock a child into a structure which has been determined by the publisher, he said.

The District 63 reading program is currently individualized in the sense of attempting to meet the reading needs of individual students, however, basal texts are used.

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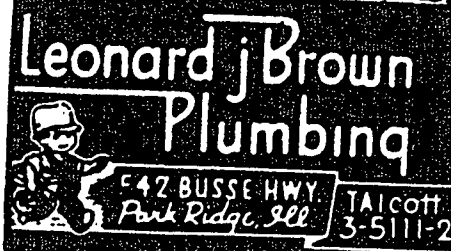


## Pack 84

A spokesman in the Cook County superintendents office, said this week that the polling places for the most part will be the same as the April 8 junior college election, with the exception of a change from the Croation Children's Home to Maine East High school.

As a former school teacher and now a substitute in the Skokie schools, Mrs. Doris Sopkin, said, "I have always favored higher education for everyone desiring it. Now that the referendum has passed with an overwhelming vote showing great community interest, I feel that our junior college must be of the highest calibre, geared to meet the needs of all."

contested by Tr. Dick Flickinger (who narrowly lost the mayoral race) several weeks ago, told members of the board when he made the Goldberg appointment he had not been aware it was customary for the police and fire departments to choose their own secretary.

The Mayor then announced Carl Eckhardt would continue to serve as secretary of the Police and Fire Commission.

Bode then announced the appointment of Joseph Smolinsky and Lee Tamaraz to the Zoning Board and the Plan Commission. Both appointments were approved by the board. Bode then recommended the reappointment of Jim Corcoran as Plumbing dept. head and the reappointments of John O'Brien, Donald Struck, Lester Butso and Fred Husher as members of the Electrical Commission. The board approved these recommendations.

Roy Johnson, head of the volunteer Fiscal Analysis committee, read a progress report. He said as far as they can see the Utility Tax can be abolished at this time, although he added, this recommendation is subject to the financial review of the audit. Other members of this committee are Harry L. Fliset, Edward W. Springer, Jr. and I. Bernard Greenfield.

Trustee David Cohen said he received letters from Rep. Edward Warman and Sen. Russell Arrington thanking the Morton Grove board for its advice and interest in recent bills pending in the Illinois Congress. Trustee Cohen then told the board he also received a letter from the Council of Governments of Cook County urging M.G. to join them and the board agreed to do so.

John Hilkin said at a meeting with the Glen-Golf Disposal Co. the use of a container besides metal for garbage was discussed. The Glen-Golf Co. will probably run a trial program this fall. Hilkin then read a letter in which Officers Pearson and McCarthy were praised for their fine work when a 5-year-old boy was bitten by two dogs in Oketo Park. Officer Pearson tracked down the owner and did a fine job.

Herbert Houndt said in regard to the repair on Narragansett it was decided to defer action to a later date since the Forest Preserves were not in favor of granting the necessary easement and would use the funds for the improvement of

the following streets: Callie ave., Fernald, Georgiana, School, Capulina, Menard, Davis and Greenwood. However, the village will take some steps in the improvement of Narragansett.

Houndt reported 175 loads of rubbish have been collected in the last 10 days by the Public Works Dept. Supt. Fragassi of the Dept. of Public Works has asked the board to consider the purchase of a new tractor to replace the old one that is in bad condition. The Public Works Dept. also needs a new street sweeper and it must have diesel power. The board agreed to advertise for bids and the specifications will be on hand in the administration bldg.

A letter was received from Grove school requesting permission to close off South Park ave., between Morton ave. and School st., during recess. The board approved this request.

Atty. Nordberg said the Overmiller attorney informed him his client was coming to town and Mr. Nordberg hopes to resolve this case soon. Nordberg received a request from Phillips Petroleum to rebuild its station at Dempster and Georgiana. The decision was deferred to a later date.

David Cohen said in regard to Bugle Publisher David Besser's question as to why tape recordings were not made of the minutes he checked with other municipalities. He said after talking to them he felt it was an unnecessary expense and not needed here. Mayor Bode agreed.

Fred Huber said Topps Dept. Store requested permission to conduct a tent sale from June 26 to July 6. The request will be granted if traffic problems can be worked out. Voter registration will be held at the Village Hall June 19 to Aug. 22. Municipal tax collected for March was \$39,590.24.

Bugle Publisher David Besser asked the board "How do we make up for the money lost on the Utility Tax?" They explained "we have gotten along without this tax before and by collecting it we have gained an additional \$200,000 and we don't really need it any more."

The Board of Local Improvements agreed to pay the sum of \$41,684.80 to the Monarch Asphalt Co. for work on street improvement.
