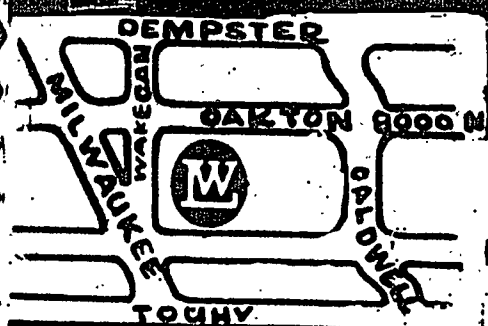

Our brunch included eggs and Irish bacon with black pudding, a wonderful sausage-type dish. Other foods include cornish pasties, a vegetable, ground beef and onion dish, scotch meat pie, baked haddock and fish and chips, with the codfish imported from Britain.

I've always thought a personal column, a sort of a between the guy who runs the newspaper and the people who read it, column, might be in order. In the years we've written the Left Hand we've used the column for the business of what this newspaper is all about, alerting residents to their communities' happenings and problems. But now it's summertime...and the living is supposed to be easy...and I thought you might be interested in a between you and me column.

Being an unabashed Chicagoophile, a lover of the city with the big shoulders, I thought you might like to extricate yourselves from ticky tacky suburbanland, and go where the action is.

Sunday night I quite unexpectedly came across a theatre in the city which you haven't read about before, because as the guy at the door said, "we don't want the press around here." In an alleyway in back of the Oxford Pub, at 2263 Lincoln, there's an upstairs converted bowling alley which is being used for an avant garde-type of theatre. Upstairs a fellow named Bill Russo is producing a rock-musical that's as exciting and wild and, in parts, as moving as any theatre we've ever seen. It might better be described as a rock-opera, since the music and lyrics and dancing comprise the entire dialogue.

While dancers and singers are doing their thing on stage a slide machine projects scenes on a wall behind the performers. Strobe lights are flashing all over the stage, while projected images of Che Guevara, death in Viet Nam and other protest actions are pictured on the wall. A big rock band, about 12 or 14 pieces blasts its way thru the projection, lending an imperceptible sound which fills the room with highly-charged emotion. When Che Guevara's death scene reaches its climax, the portrayal of a martyred leader has great impact on the audience.

Showtime is 7 and 9 p.m. Sunday, Wednesday and Thursday nights, and 7:30 and 9 p.m. Monday night, the 4 nights it is open. Admission is free, though donations are accepted at the end of the performance. It is best to arrive at least 30 minutes before showtime, since the audience is very limited, and they turn away hundreds of people after about 300 file in. It's an exciting evening, and if the producer knew we were writing this column, I'm sure he'd ask me not to publish it. The show is very limited, and he's really not interested in exposing it to a larger audience. But if you want to throw off your cloistered suburban existence, go down the gangway behind the Oxford Pub.

Potatoes May Be Cheaper But--

VILLAGE
COSTS RISE-
BOARD OKs

It will cost the Village of Niles \$619,317 more to operate during the coming fiscal year than it did during the last one.

The Niles Village Board of Trustees at a meeting Tuesday night passed an ordinance providing an appropriation for the Village for general corporate purposes. The approved appropriation gives the village the green light to spend money already planned for in the cash budget for fiscal year May 1, 1969 and ending April 30, 1970.

Total appropriation approved Tuesday night is \$3,853,563.

Categorized, the breakdown is:

General Corporate Fund	\$2,328,155
Water Fund	821,808
Garbage Fund	150,000
Social Security Fund	70,000
Police Pension Fund	80,000
Fire-Pension Fund	80,000
General Obligation Bond Fund	60,600
Vehicle Tax Fund	180,000
Road and Bridge Fund	83,000

Total All Appropriations \$3,853,563

Higher appropriations are needed for remodeling and renovation of new village administration building, traffic survey programs, photo lab equipment, fire prevention bureau, mobile radio unit, police firing range, landscaping of the courthouse and police building, alarm system, fencing of all public works properties, 50-50 sidewalk and curb program, tree trimming, family service department, mailing of vehicle and dog tag applications, among other items.

Without the recently passed Illinois state income tax, Niles continued on page 13

Charges GOP Intrusion In J. C. Election

As the Maine Township Regular Democratic Organization Committee it has been my understanding and have always maintained the position that politics in our schools should not be tolerated or imposed. Now that the election of the Jr. College #535 is over it is rather

interesting to note that the Republican Party, embarrassed once again by State Rep. Robert Juckett, tried unsuccessfully to state their own candidates and influence our new Jr. College with national party lines within the ranks. We, as Democrats and concerned citizens and parents of the township, while supporting the Jr. College because of its long ranging effect on our youth, did not and would not support a slate of candidates. While Juckett denies any claims of his supporting and financing such a slate the fact reveals his law partner to be a last minute candidate along with 3 other Park Ridge residents, Juckett's home town.

Approximately one year ago Juckett, prior to his re-election, used the cast of the Maine East High school play for his Republican Fund Raising Dinner. The Democratic Party of Maine Township has stayed out of our schools; we suggest the Republican Party and Mr. Juckett do the same.

The Legion and its Auxiliary especially have furnished food, serving personnel and monetary aid as well as other facets of support to the U.S.O. for a long time.

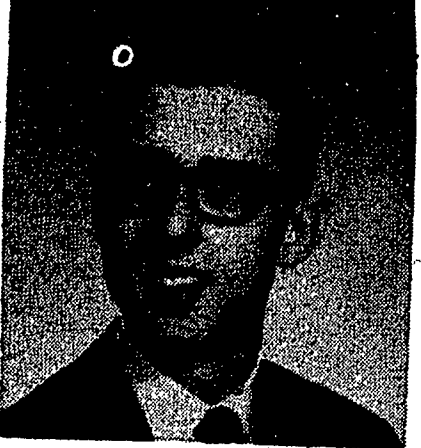
On Dean's List

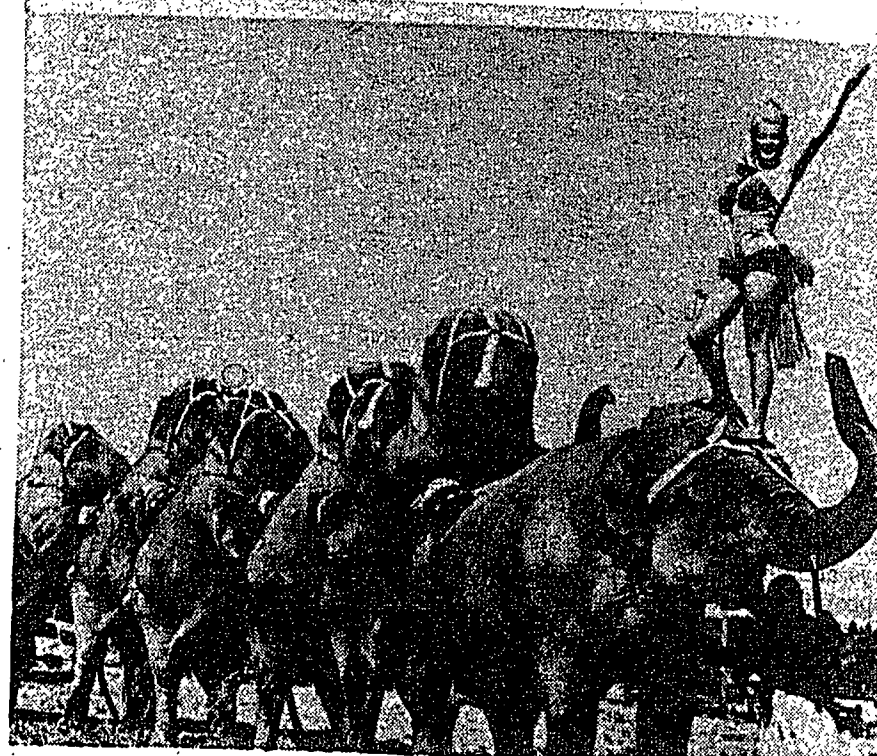

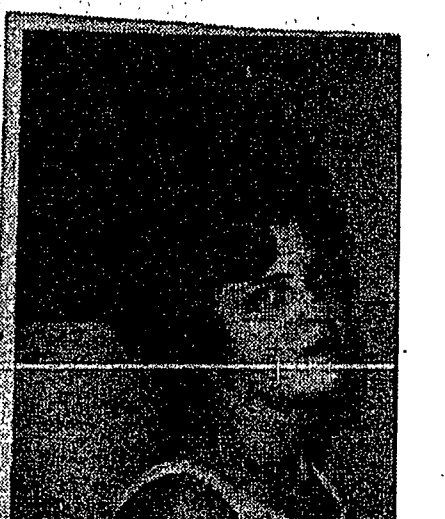

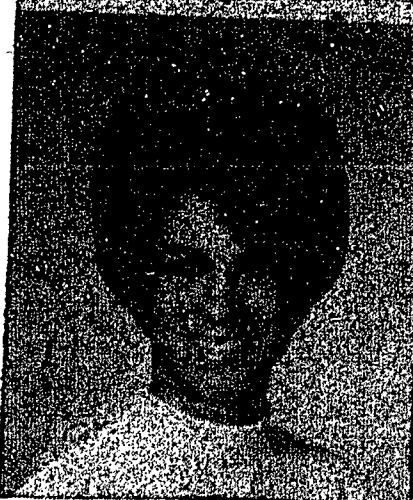

Lakowski pitched all 6 innings but couldn't seem to outpitch Mina, who also pitched 6, to lose the game to the White Sox 8-4.

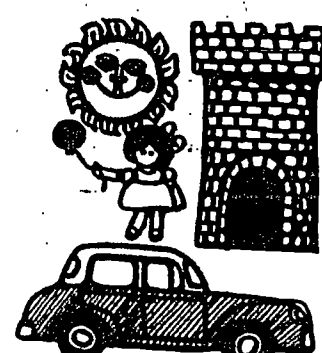
The Yankees won a close game against the Tigers, 14-12. Spino, Mueller and Grouzard divided the pitching to make the win.

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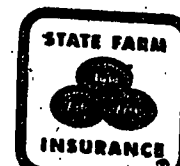

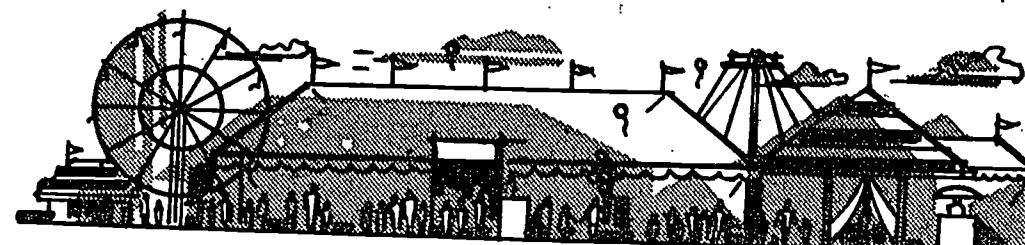

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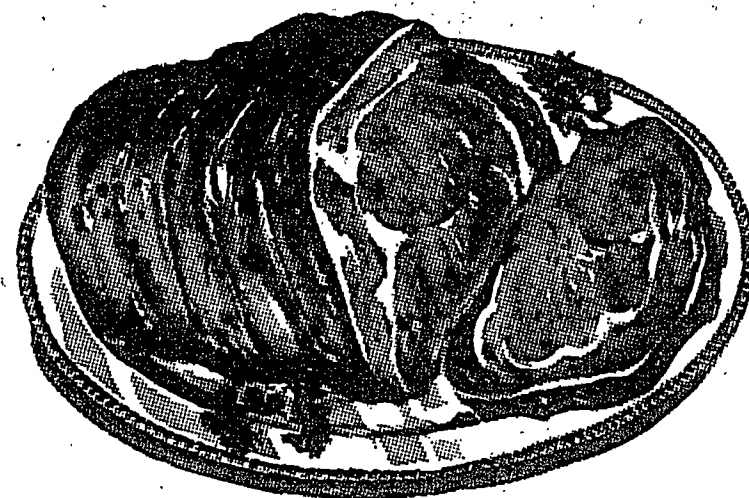

This event was followed up by a car painting project on Thursday, June 26. The victim, a car, belonging to Sue Bulmer, leader at the park. The youngsters seemed to get more tempera paint on themselves than on the car, but all had a good time.

From M.G. Public Works

Because of the number of calls received by the Department of Public Works regarding various types of infestation of trees in Morton Grove, Supt. Fraggasi deems it advisable to repeat the information furnished.

A number of the hardwoods, especially the maples, are subject to bleeding canker caused by the fungus (phytophthora cactorum). Reddish-brown cankers develop in the inner bark of the trunk and main branches, the bark becomes furrowed and sunken, the leaves wilt, and the branches die back. In maple the margins of these lesions are usually olive green. Sap oozing from these cankers through openings in the outer bark resembles small spots of blood — hence the name "bleeding canker."

The removal of infected bark and the sterilization of diseased areas with chlorox, and then covering this area with pitch has given satisfactory results.

It has been brought to the attention of the Public Works Department of an infestation of the

maple trees in Morton Grove. The Morton Arboretum gave the following description of the disease as cottony maple scale (pulvinaria innumerable), a common, conspicuous, and injurious pest of the soft maple.

The infestations may kill twigs, branches, limbs and occasionally entire trees. Heavily infected branches appear as if decorated with popcorn. Asotry mold sometimes grows in this infestation causing branches and foliage to appear black for a current generation. Scale may overwinter in one of two forms — either as eggs or as immature females which in the Spring lay eggs or give birth to living young.

This scale (insect) has many natural enemies which help control it; however, at times spraying may be needed. The spray mixture — malathion 50% emulsion, 2 tablespoons in 3 gallons of water.

Inasmuch as only the males have wings, other winged insects, birds or people are necessary to spread an infestation from one plant to another.

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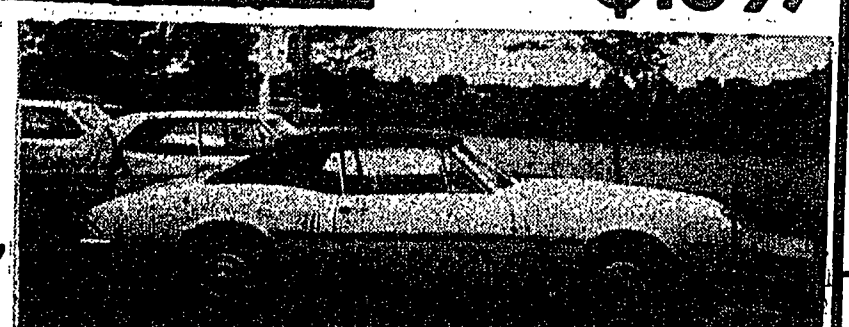
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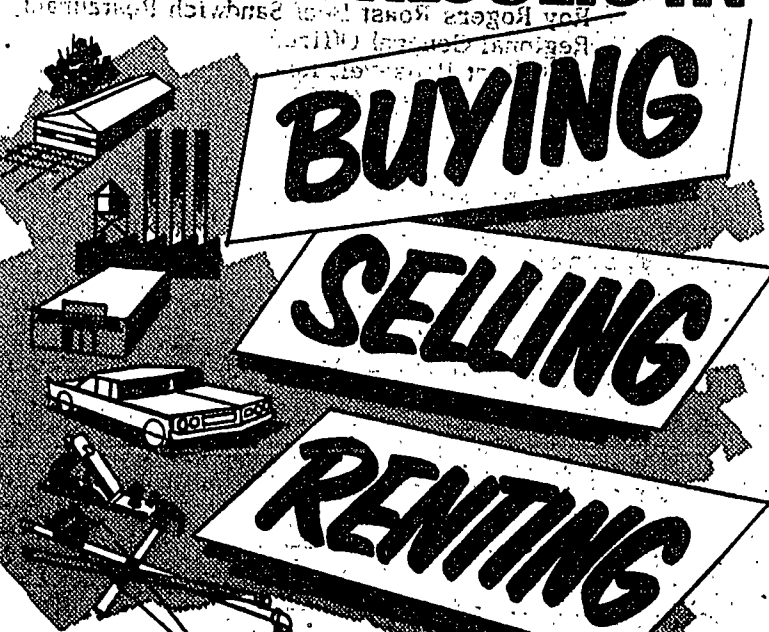

Educators Visit Center

Six prominent Louisiana educators paid a visit recently to the Maine Township Diagnostic and Remedial Learning Center, 33 S. Prospect Ave., Park Ridge, to learn first hand of the functions of the Title III Center and the progress and success which this federally funded project has had in the community. The Maine Diagnostic and Remedial Learning Center, under the direction of Dr. Thomas V. Telder, had been recommended to the group as one of the outstanding Title III projects in the country.

Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of High School District No. 207 which administers the Title III project (under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act)

was on hand to greet the visitors and speak to them concerning the organization of the school districts in the township, cooperation and planning for this and other township programs in education, and current plans for the continuation of the project through an inservice training program for teachers during the 1969-70 school year.

The visitors, representatives of the Louisiana State Advisory Board for Title III, included B. M. Woodward, M.D., member of the Louisiana State Board of Education; Samuel J. Medina, Louisiana State Coordinator of Title III; Wade H. Davis, Superintendent of Schools in Alexandria, La.; G. J. LeDet, Special

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Advisor for federally funded programs in Louisiana; Mildred J. McCormick, Principal of Alexander Elementary school in Shreveport, La.; and Curtis Bradshaw, Superintendent of Vernon Parish schools in Leesville, La.

Dr. Telder introduced his staff to the visitors and gave a brief history of the Center since it was established in 1967 to meet the needs of youngsters in the area having learning problems. The Center is designed to diagnose the causes of learning problems and provide programs to overcome reading and communication disabilities. Services ranging from classroom help to a complete multidisciplinary diagnosis is offered to all public and parochial school students of Maine Township.

A slide-tape presentation of the Center was shown to the visitors, and members of the staff assisted Dr. Telder in explaining its functions, its teacher-training and inservice programs, and answering visitors' questions.

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The Louisiana educators were especially interested in the Center's program for the coming school year. As this will be the final year for federal funds for this Title III program, measures are being taken to insure greater service for a greater number of youngsters through the establishment of a teacher inservice training program to be conducted at the Center at 33 S. Prospect, Park Ridge. Here, teachers will be trained to help them better understand the learning process, the learning problems of children, remedial approaches, and the latest innovations in teaching techniques, curriculum and curriculum materials.

Dr. Kenneth Beasley, Director of Research Grants at Northern Illinois University and Evaluation Consultant at the Center, spoke to the Louisiana visitors on the development and function of the Diagnostic Center's program in relation to the purposes of Title III projects.
