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#63 Files Appeal With Zoning Bd. On WJJD Construction Site

East Maine School Dist. 63, continuing its fight to prevent construction of 14 four-story apartment buildings on the WJJD site at Ballard and Greenwood in unincorporated Des Plaines by the Intercontinental Development Co., Inc., filed an administrative appeal with the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals, at a hearing July 30.

In its appeal, the Board of Education of Dist. 63 asserts that in granting building permits to the Intercontinental Development Co., Inc., the county building department acted against and contrary to the amended ordinance approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners on the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals following a rezoning hearing in October, 1966.

The construction plans presented to the Zoning Board of Appeals by Morris Suson, developer and owner of the property at that time, called for construction of a commercial shopping center (now completed), eight 16-story apartment buildings with no more than 920 efficiency, one and two-bedroom luxury apartments. The area was to be extensively landscaped, and the buildings, covering a small portion of the land, were to be set back on the site.

Officials of District 63 appeared at that hearing and publicly supported the proposed amendment of the zoning ordinance with the understanding that Morris Suson intended to develop the land as proposed—that is, in a way which would be beneficial to the district.

Column #3 on "Summer time and the livin' is easy"

If you'd like a "close-in" day-away-from-home and you like to wander a bit, take the kids downtown via the Northwestern train.

Since I'm an inveterate north-south walker in Chicago's loop I thought walking from the west end to the east would give us an interesting view of the city.

Taking my number one son along, we wandered in and out of stores which had radio equipment displayed in its windows. Doing the wandering with leisure and with utter abandon made the browsing all the better, especially since we had no schedule to follow. This was the key to our day. . . wandering freely with loads of time to spend doing nothing.

Walking east on Madison Street we inspected the new First National Bank building. We took the long view from across the street and then huddled against the tall building columns and followed the veering contours as they climbed the building. The columns bend inward toward the center of the structure and then appear overhead as they flow away from the center.

Feeling like an overaged Huck Finn in the big city we next saw the beautiful Inland Steel all-steel and glass building just east of the 1st National building, on the north side of Madison.

We turned south at Dearborn and moved 2 blocks south to Adams St. and wandered into a stock brokerage office. The action had already ended for the day but the number one son was shown the teletype reports of the day's activities, which are flashed across the center screen in the brokers' room. He was given a 1-minute digest by looking at the Standard and Poors' books but because of the lateness of the day, turned down a brief tour of the offices with an accompanying resume of what takes place in a brokerage house.

Boarding a bus we moved south to the Adler Planetarium where a half-hour film, "The Mysterious Sky," should precede a walking tour there.

While a short walk can take you across to the Field Museum or the Shedd Aquarium, our afternoon was fading away and we bussed ourselves back to Michigan Avenue at the river. Crossing to the Wrigley Building north side of the river, we ventured down to the lower level and boarded a cruising boat, which ended our loop wandering with a 7-minute trip up the Chicago River to the Northwestern Station. The 35¢ ride is Chicago's answer to New York's 5¢ Staten Island Ferry ride. It's a pleasant topper to a wandering thru the city, as you move thru the shadows of the tall buildings which border the river, a great way to end a leisurely warm afternoon.

If you're feeling nautical and would like to view Chicago's beautiful lakefront there's a 1- and 2-hour lake boat tours leaving from the lower level at State and Wacker. The 2-hour tours cost \$2.50 while the 1-hour rides cost \$1.75 with children under 10 being charged \$1.25 for either tour.

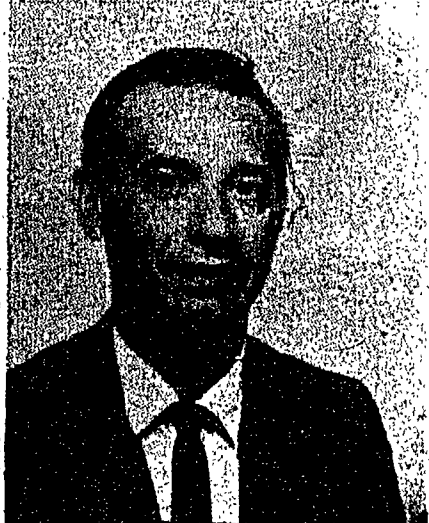

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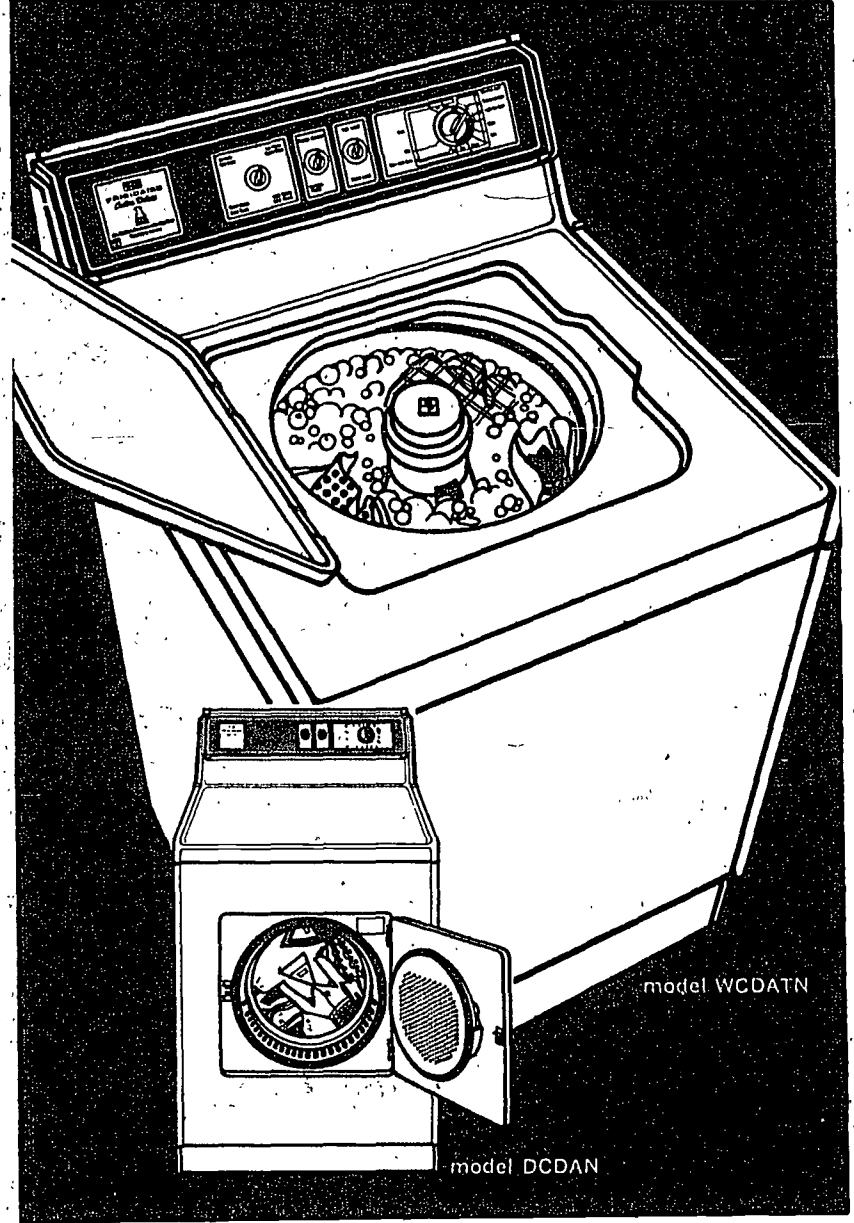
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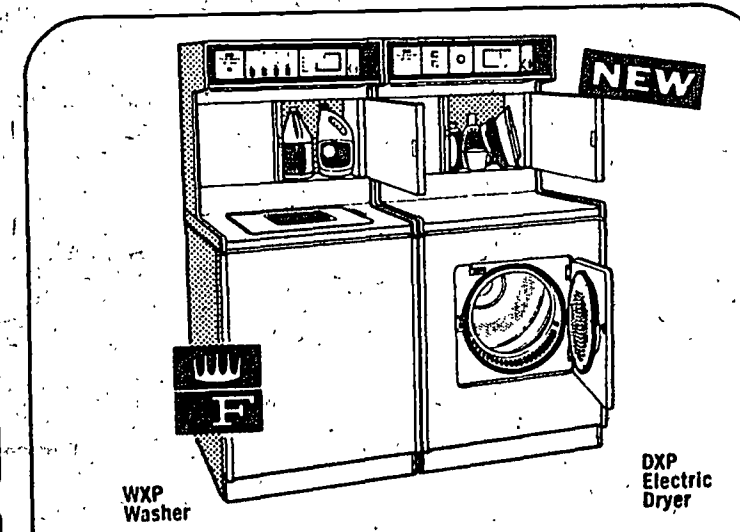


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Dist. 67 News

...On Parents, Baseball And Such

To those readers who have been paying attention and reading The BUGLE diligently these past few months, you may remember a column I wrote on the effort, time and patience put in by most Baseball League managers (and one in particular — Don Maycan) in molding a team and teaching the boys the fundamentals of baseball and good sportsmanship.

Now the season of regular league play has ended and I'm certain most parents are, in a way, relieved the dinners on the run are over but sad, for the games were a lot of fun. To those parents who just taxed their boys to the games and never stayed to watch, you missed a wonderful experience. You didn't see a boy named Crutchfield make an unassisted double play, the first "big" league action in his young life. You missed hearing him tell the way it happened — "there I was, playing my position and paying attention like the coach told me to, when all of a sudden, . . ."

You missed the cheering for "Fussy," "Jonesy," "Wisy" and Petrillo; for Russ, Tommy and Ken, for Scott, Robbie and Greenberg, too. And don't forget those hits by Doyle and Hoffman. It was a united effort plugged with determination and, most of the time, alertness. But, most important of all, it was sparked by a rule — everyone got a chance to play.

I am now wondering why this same rule is not applied to all boys' baseball league games. . . why, as one reader wrote in, didn't all the boys get an equal chance to play in the minor all-star game? They do in Peanut League. Since, in most cases, it is the ability of the boy to play baseball that propels him to all-star status, why isn't this ability utilized by some of the managers and all players given an equal chance to participate?

As long as I've been standing on my soap-box this long, how about those parents that abuse the spirit of the game by making life utterly miserable for the umpires? These are guys who play in Pony League and ump the Peanut League games. Most of them know the rules a darned sight better than the decidedly partisan parents. Why do some parents and managers (we've seen 'em both do it) make up their own rules as they go along and then wonder why the umpires don't see things their way?

When the boys sign up next year to play in the Niles Baseball League, how about handing each parent a set of rules followed in their particular league? Why not let the parents and players, as well as managers and coaches, in on all the fine points and rules adhered to in the league?

I'm well aware of the fact managers and coaches donate their time and energy to the cause. . . but is there any way the theory of sportsmanship and fair play could be explained to a few of the managers as well as some of the parents? That, too, would sure help the cause.

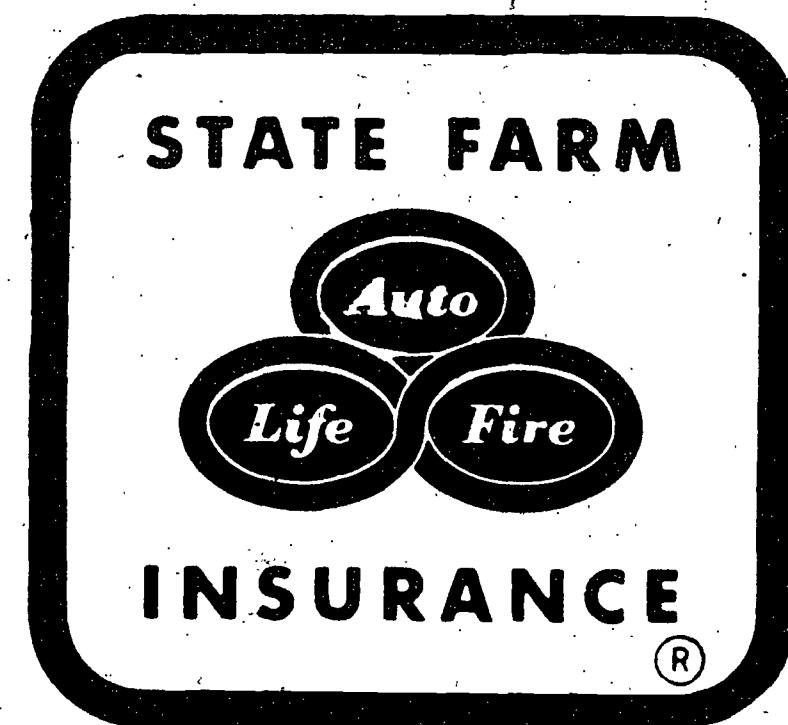

MTHS Students Get High Scores On Exams

Advanced Placement Examinations were given to 271 Maine Township High School students at the end of the school year, with a total of 411 different tests taken. Students taking the tests have been participants in the schools' Advanced Placement Program, which prepares stronger students for advanced work in college.

Students doing well on these tests are able to receive college credit for work taken in high school, or are given advanced placement upon entering college. Such students may be excused from taking basic courses in college thereby giving them an opportunity to concentrate on courses in line with their ability and interests.

An exceptionally outstanding performance in the testing was made by Scott Ferratolo, 311 N. Wolf rd., Des Plaines, a student from Maine West. Scott received grades of 5 (the highest score) in all three tests taken by him - Spanish, English, and European History.

Seven other students received two 5s each on their test scores: Karen Koerner, 8104 Wisner ave., Niles, and William Newman, 233 Washington rd., Glenview, both of Maine East; Maine South students Erik Graf, 220 Belle Plaine, Park Ridge; Carl R. Johnson, 1200 S. Western, Park Ridge; Gary M. McClelland, 1601 S. Cherry, Park Ridge; and Guy G. Riddle, 1500 S. Crescent, Park Ridge; Peter Baenziger, 1052 Alfini dr., Des Plaines, of Maine West.

Thirty-four other students received one 5, making a total of 42 outstanding performances in these difficult Advanced Placement Tests.

Students in the Advanced Placement Program must take the three-hour examination, which consists primarily of essay questions. These examinations are based on a five-point college-level scale with 5 indicating high honors, 4 indicating honors, and 3 indicating good. Normally, colleges grant advanced credit or advanced placement to candidates with grades of 5, 4, and 3, and individually review candidates obtaining a grade of 2 in the tests.

The results of these tests indicate not only that a student has learned more of some subject while in high school, but also shows that the school has been able to prepare an able, ambitious student for advanced work in colleges and universities.

would not be able to enjoy."

The board can now proceed on negotiations to purchase the DiMaria property at Sherman and Waukegan as well as the Schwinge property adjacent to Lawrencewood shopping center.

Mayor Nicholas Blase told the board "it is most appropriate that Niles is the recipient of the highest federal grant to date in the State of Illinois. I wish you Godspeed in spending the money."

The grant comes from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation. The park district board will put up matching funds so a total in excess of \$700,000 will be spent. While the Schwinge and DiMaria properties are near the point of purchase, park board attorney Gabriel Berrafato, in answer to a question by Charles Morris, 8021F Washington, concerning the Deer Park trailer property, told the board negotiations would soon be started in an effort to purchase park site land there and provide sorely needed recreational facilities for the area.

"Am I to understand we're no further ahead with that than we were 6 months ago," Morris queried. "I wouldn't say that," the attorney answered. "Six months ago we didn't have approval of the federal grant application."

In other business Tuesday night the board opened bids for general contractor, plumbing and electrical work for the proposed Louis Schreiner gym in the Grennan Heights park plan. Apparent low bidder is Slezak Construction Co., at \$148,981. Other bids were C. W. Gaasrud, \$151,823 and Fred W. Skirrow, \$184,800. Bidding on plumbing work were Stompanato Sons Plumbing Inc., \$15,555; Frank Saville, \$18,424 and Frank's Plumbing Co., \$17,950. Electrical bids included Crown Engineering \$21,997; G&M Electric, \$24,950 and Northbrook Electric, \$26,925.

He said later that the school district has been forced to act into such areas as zoning because of the lack of local governmental regulations in the unincorporated area, which makes up a significant portion of District 63.

All it takes to enter an event is to pick up an entry blank at the Niles pool office and pay 25¢ entry fee. Entries must be in by Aug. 14.



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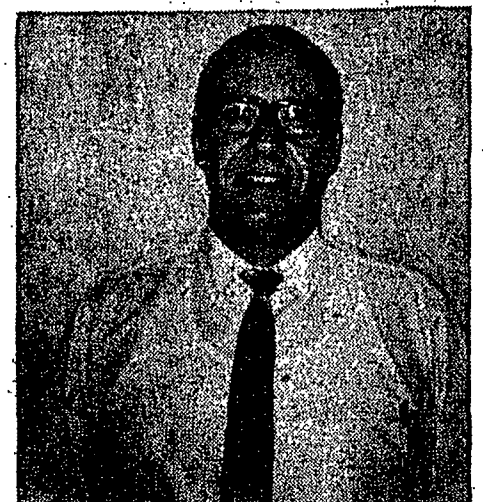

Practice Makes Conversion At Telephone Co. Perfect

Precisely as planned, Central Telephone Company of Illinois inaugurated its first Western Electric #5 Crossbar dial switching system in Park Ridge at 2 a.m. last Sunday, Aug. 3.

Engineered and designed to handle an ultimate of 20,000 telephone lines, this second step in the massive five phase service improvement plan announced in 1967 will use only 9,000 lines initially. The remaining 11,000 lines are for future growth in and around Park Ridge.

Exactly at 2 a.m., more than 100 craftsmen and supervisors began working. By 2:10 a.m., 9,000 telephone lines had been

disconnected from the equipment in service and reconnected to the new Crossbar dial facilities. No telephone subscriber among the 9,000 had been without service for more than 10 minutes.

According to Thomas King, Central Telephone Equipment Engineering Supervisor and Crossbar project coordinator, a maximum of only 10 minutes of service outage is exceptionally good, King said. "This is the best cutover we've ever had. One year of detailed planning," continued King, "results in as near perfect a conversion as possible."

Telephone subscribers in the

693, 694 and 825 telephone exchanges were effected by the Sunday morning conversion. Other subscribers served by the Park Ridge dial switching center will be converted to Crossbar equipment at a later date. This includes residents and businesses in Rosemont, Chicago, Niles and Park Ridge.

The first phase of the service improvement program took place at the Des Plaines dial switching center in September, 1968. At that time, Crossbar service was made available to approximately 13,000 subscribers in the Des Plaines area having telephone numbers with the prefixes of 297, 298 and 824.

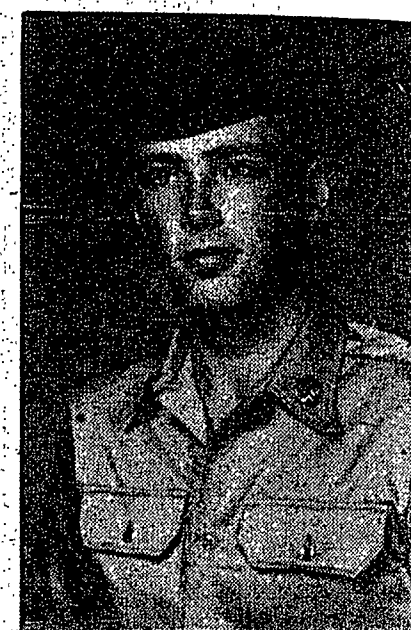

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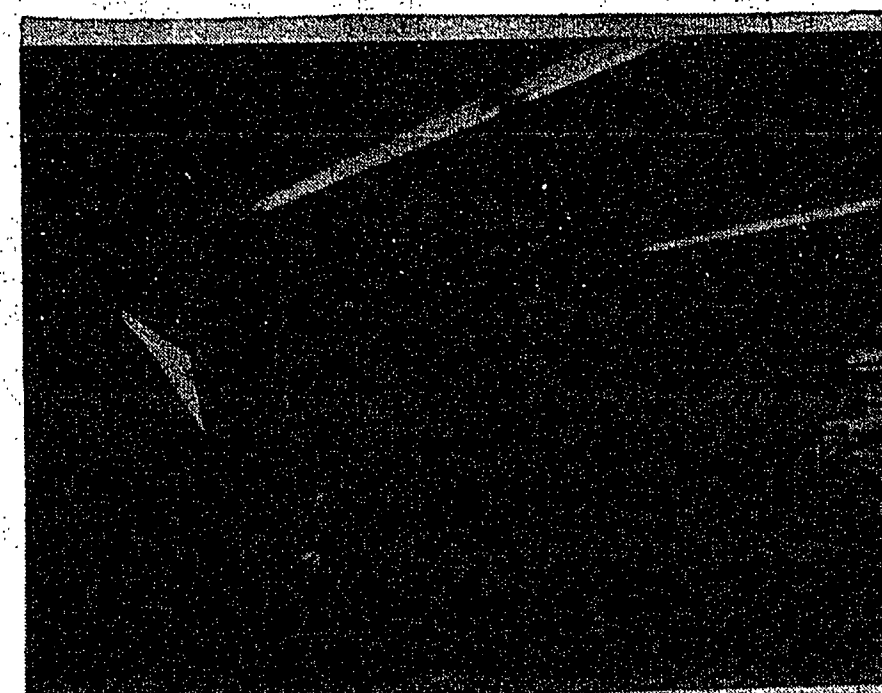

The Cubs attained the lead in the National League by winning both ends of a double-header at Austin Park on Saturday.

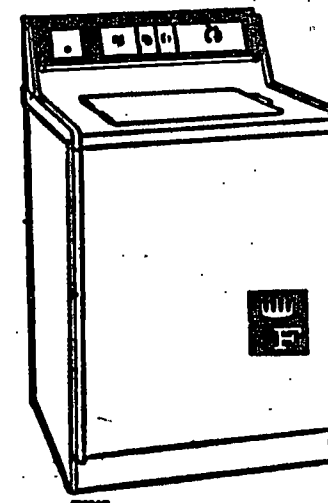

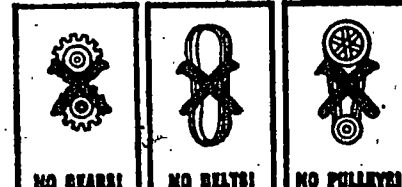

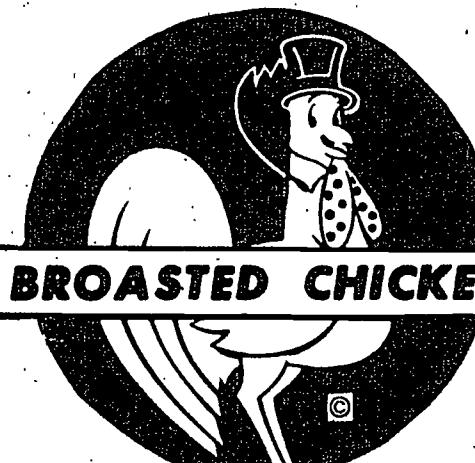
