## #207 Students Rate Above Average In Achievements

Current research studies show that the scholastic aptitudes and academic achievements of Maine high school students continue at a level significantly higher than the national average, according to Merlin W. Schultz, coordinator of pupil personnel services for Dist. 207.

In a recent report to the district's Board of Education, Mr. Schultz discussed some of the tangible research facts on student performances as shown by testing results throughout the district.

Studies of the results of three large external test administrations - the American College Tests, College Entrance Examination Board, and National

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Merit Scholarship Examinations - show that Maine student performance is at the 65 percentile in relation to the 50 percentile for all college-bound students, When comparing the Maine results for these tests with all high school students, the percentile rises to the low 80's.

In a study of the results of the California Test of Mental Maturity, given to all students at Maine since 1963, the overall results over the past six years indicate that the scholastic aptitude of the Maine student body remains constant at a level considerably higher than the national average.

In discussing the evaluation of academic achievement, Mr. Schultz pointed out that his of-

fice has assembled much factual information concerning Maine student performance through the use of many different types of studies. These include studies of the four tests already listed and also studies of the Advanced Placement Examination and Differential Aptitude Tests, A Dropout Study, Follow-up Study of Graduates, and Mark Distribution and Aspiration Study also give much information about District No. 207 students.

"When studying student per-formance," Mr. Schultz ex-plained, "it is far better to have several indices than to put all your faith in the results of one instrument." He continued, "There are many pitfalls in placing undue emphasis on test results. When all the indices

point in one direction, you have a much safer feeling that you are getting sounder support in year period. making judgments."

Mr. Schultz's report to the Board was largely directed to the results of the Iowa Tests of Educational Development given to the junior class in May, 1969. The tests measure performance in basic social concepts, natural science, correctness of expression, quantitative thinking, and general vocabulary.

The lowa tests are given to incoming freshmen, and the same tests are given again during the junior year. Therefore, it is possible to have a measuring device indicating how much educational growth takes

St. John Brebeuf enrollment stands at 1,400, up 200 from 1968. Our Lady of Ransom projected enrollment this year is859 compared to 862 of last year.

There's a total of 860 students this year in the 1Dist. 71 Niles public schools; 530 at South and 330 at North, up 20-30 students over last year according to Supt. Clarence Culver.

Another test battery, the Differential Aptitude Tests, measures performance in abstract reasoning, clerical accuracy, mechanical reasoning, space relations, and language usage. The latter tests also tended to confirm above average performance abilities of Maine stu-

Mr. Schultz states that the best use of test results comes when test information is given each student for the purpose of more effective decision-making regarding future plans. He said that assembling test data for research purposes is secondary to student decision making.

In concluding his report to the Board of Education, Mr. Schultz remarked, "I am pleased to present this type of information to the Board and to the public. Here we have evidence that student achievement at Maine is being maintained and that our student performance is not deteriorating as we frequently are led to believe by reports from some individuals who are critical of public education."
