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


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

#### From The Left Hand

It was late Thursday evening and we were finishing dinner when our very friendly waitress, a lady named Kelly, sat down at our table and interspersed her conversation with "You'd better believe it." The little mother, who had been thru the recent trauma of seeing her first child off to college, was with the little editor in Toledo, a first night stop on an autumn vacation which is honoring a 20th wedding anniversary.

Saturday midnight we had a drink in a very famous resort-inn, the Foodergong, atop a hill overlooking Ephrata, Pa., when the waitress repeated the Toledo phrase "you'd better believe it." Tonight, Sunday, in a gift shop in Lancaster, the shopkeeper used the same phrase and then added another Maxwell Smartism, "sorry about that," which we also heard echoed and re-echoed up and down these hills the past 3 days. When America, the beautiful, gets hooked on a phrase or a word they beat it to death and you'd better believe it.

This is now our third night in Amish country in the Lancaster area and we're leaving in the morning for the Pocono Mountain area near Philadelphia, if we were to stay with these Pennsylvania Dutch one more day our overeating might prevent us from ever reaching that 20th anniversary which is still 3 weeks away.

The name of the game is 'eating' and even the most avid weightwatcher would find it difficult to contain herself. At every meal you eat sweet and sours. A spreading cottage cheese and apple butter are served at every lunch and dinner. A wonderful sweet and sour vegetable mixture of pickles, celery, beets and string beans called Chow Chow is also a part of each meal. Homemade breads and butters prepare you for the sauerbratens and other main course meats which are surrounded with corn side dishes. We've had corn fritters and a wonderful fried corn and corn and chicken soup ... every imaginable corn recipe but corn liquor. When you gain your second wind you top off the meal with wet or dry shoe fly pie, a first night, and we combined pretzels with a chocolate sundae, a rather unusual combination, which tasted great.

As many of you know, the Amish people here are among about 22,000 people, who have retained their followays for 200 years. They're farmers whose lives have centered around their religion. Their homes have no electricity, they drive horses and buggles, the men dress in black coats and hats, and the women dress soberly in dark colors in ankle-length dresses, and their heads are covered at all times. Driving thru these hills, their horses and buggles may be behind or front of your car while you drive, a remarkable contrast of 18th and 20th century America.

Saturday morning we attended the Farmer's Market in Lancaster, and the vegetables were polished and huge, the eggs unbelievably large, and the snitzels and home-made bakery goods, the beautiful Fall flowers, the cider and home-baked foods everywhere, made it a most interesting morning. The previous night we attended a Farmers Harvest Fair on the streets of New Holland and every one everywhere was eating. There must have been 300 exhibitions of rides and games and animal and food competition displays and 200 of the booths were selling food and everyone was eating. This was at 9 p.m. By midnight the streets, still bustling with people, and they were still eating, standing, sitting and eating.

Saturday afternoon we toured an Amish Farm, took time out for a family-style dinner, and the corn and the beets and the tomatoes dishes, the apple butter and the cottage cheese and the macaroni and cheese and the corn soup and the chow chow, all preceded the main courses, which included chicken and fish for everyone. If a way to a man's heart is by preparing such food then a Pennsylvania Dutchman must be the most devoted man on this corn-filled earth. They have 2 truisms they live by: "Kissing wears out, cooking doesn't" and "Better to die eating than die fighting."

Sunday we wandered thru the back roads and toured the electricity-free farm areas. Every other Sunday about 20 Amish families gather at each other's homes for 4 hour Sunday services. They spend the day together, enjoying dinner with these, many people (families include an average of 6 children), and leisurely enjoy families include an average of 6 children), and leisurely enjoy

#### Peck: "2 Demo Appointments Politically Motivated"

Policital overtones could be seen at Tuesday night's village board meeting when trustee Keith Peck twice was the lone dissenter in voting against 2 new members appointed to Niles Health Board, Peck voted against the appointment of Ken Galinski and Nick Constantino, stating he thought both were motivated by political considerations by Mayor Blase. According to Peck both men are active Democrats in the

but then had it returned to the lower court for further study, on a ruling by an Appeal Court. The case is presently in the lower court. It is assumed the Anderson people will fulfill their obligation to the park district after a clear-cut decision is made. However, because of the 7 year option period, trustees are fearful the period may end at which time the Anderson people would retain the

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

Whatever the motivation, the gesture is indeed appreciated. Faculty sponsor, Richard Turner, explains, "Cook County hospital is in the heart of the ghetto. The children's ward has two nurses to care for 100 kids between the ages of six months and 18 years. Great Lakes Naval hospital treats soldiers wounded

At Cook County hospital, the volunteers help feed and diaper the younger kids. They play games and act as tutors for the older patients.

Because the hospital is 97% black, students from West are confronted with a totally different environment. Many of the older patients are hostile and bitter toward the white suburban volunteers. Students from West are often forced to defend themselves and the entire white community.

"We go up to Great Lakes every month to visit the veterans," explained Mr. Turner. "Here, the girls are especially appreciated. They


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#### What About The Library System?





Pesole also said he was

"bugged" by the inaction of the park board, who last year received approval for a \$1,000,000 plus referendum for parks and buildings and a swimming pool. He said "our money is involved and they haven't even sent a letter of intent to the trailer park owners regarding the intended acquisition of land there.\* He noted they're now building an office addition on the present Milwaukee Avenue recreation center and he thought this should be the last priority to be considered after they pursued the much-needed recreation areas and buildings Nilesites approved. He said the swimming pool would not be built for another year and a half and they now have an additional \$370,000 in federal money in addition to the original sum for more than a million dollars.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase told THE BUGLE after the meeting, while the money is languishing in the bank, it is being eaten up by inflation, implying land values continue to increase while the money loses value.

In an addendum to the resolution Pesole also wanted to include the urging of the park district to pursue these park lands, but the village will send a letter to the park district asking what progress its making in this area.

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
