## From The Left Hand

It was late Thursday evening and we were finishing dinner when our very friendly waitress, a lady named Kelly, sat down at our table and interspersed her conversation with "You'd better believe it." The little mother, who had been thru the recent trauma of seeing her first child off to college, was with the little editor in Toledo, a first night stop on an autumn vacation which is honoring a 20th wedding anniversary.

Saturday midnight we had a drink in a very famous resort-inn, the Foodergon, atop a hill overlooking Ephrata, Pa., when the waitress repeated the Toledo phrase "you'd better believe it." Tonight, Sunday, in a gift shop in Lancaster, the shopkeeper used the same phrase and then added another Maxwell Smartism, "sorry about that," which we also heard echoed and re-echoed up and down these hills the past 3 days. When America, the beautiful, gets hooked on a phrase or a word they beat it to death and "you'd better believe it."

This is now our third night in Amish country in the Lancaster area and we're leaving in the morning for the Pocono Mountain area near Philadelphia. If we were to stay with these Pennsylvania Dutch one more day our overeating might prevent us from ever reaching that 20th anniversary which is still 3 weeks away.

The name of the game is "eating" and even the most avid weight-watcher would find it difficult to contain herself. At every meal you eat sweet and sour. A spreading cottage cheese and apple butter are served at every lunch and dinner. A wonderful sweet and sour vegetable mixture of pickles, celery, beets and string beans called Chow Chow is also a part of each meal. Homemade breads and butters prepare you for the sauerbratens and other main course meats which are surrounded with corn side dishes. We've had corn fritters and a wonderful fried corn and chicken soup... every imaginable corn recipe but corn liquor. When you gain your second wind you top off the meal with wet or dry shoe fly pie, a marvelous molasses pie. A second dessert was also served the first night, and we combined pretzels with a chocolate sundae, a rather unusual combination, which tasted great.

As many of you know, the Amish people here are among about 22,000 people, who have retained their folkways for 200 years. They're farmers whose lives have centered around their religion. Their homes have no electricity, they drive horses and buggies, the men dress in black coats and hats, and the women dress soberly in dark colors in ankle-length dresses, and their heads are covered at all times. Driving thru these hills, their horses and buggies may be behind or front of your car while you drive, a remarkable contrast of 18th and 20th century America.

Saturday morning we attended the Farmer's Market in Lancaster, and the vegetables were polished and huge, the eggs unbelievably large, and the snitzels and home-made bakery goods, the beautiful Fall flowers, the cider and home-baked foods everywhere, made it a most interesting morning. The previous night we attended a Farmers Harvest Fair on the streets of New Holland and everyone everywhere was eating. There must have been 300 exhibitions of rides and games and animal and food competition displays and 200 of the booths were selling food and everyone was eating. This was at 9 p.m. By midnight the streets, still bustling with people, and they were still eating, standing, sitting and eating.

Saturday afternoon we toured an Amish Farm, took time out for a family-style dinner, and the corn and the beets and the tomatoes, the apple butter and the cottage cheese and the macaroni and cheese and the corn soup and the chow chow, all preceded the main courses, which included chicken and fish for everyone. If a way to a man's heart is by preparing such food then a Pennsylvania Dutchman must be the most devoted man on this corn-filled earth. They have 2 truisms they live by: "Kissing wears out, cooking doesn't" and "Better to die eating than die fighting."

Sunday we wandered thru the back roads and toured the electricity-free farm areas. Every other Sunday about 20 Amish families gather at each other's homes for 4 hour Sunday services. They spend the day together, enjoying dinner with these many people (families include an average of 6 children), and leisurely enjoy a Sunday afternoon, without radio or TV. The frolicking of throngs of children, and the easy walking and laughter of the many young

Resolution Passed To Finalize Action

## TRUSTEES ASK PARK BOARD TO RESOLVE TAM ISSUE

At the behest of Niles trustee Pete Pesole Tuesday night Niles trustees passed a unanimous resolution urging Niles Park District attempt to reach a conclusion on the 3 year old Tam O'Shanter issue. Trustee Keith Peck said the long-delayed conclusion may be an excuse by the present owners, Emil Anderson interests, to run out the option on the property, which has about 37 months to go.

The park district has a written contract with the owners that the park district has the option of purchasing the land during this 7 year period if the Anderson interest receive the industrial zoning approval for the property. They initially received it but a private group of citizens, the Save Tam group,

contested the zoning in a circuit court and were defeated, but then had it returned to the lower court for further study, on a ruling by an Appeal Court. The case is presently in the lower court. It is assumed the Anderson people will fulfill their obligation to the park district after a clear-cut decision is made. However, because of the 7 year option period, trustees are fearful the period may end at which time the Anderson people would retain the property.

Peck also noted after this 7 year period the village has a 6 month period to pick up this same option after the park district's option expires.

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### Maine East Homecoming

### Nilehi Teens Visit Hospitals

Is it tokenism, a sense of guilt, or the desire to help the underprivileged that inspires 25 Nilehi West high school students to regularly visit the Cook County and Great Lakes Naval hospitals?

Whatever the motivation, the gesture is indeed appreciated. Faculty sponsor, Richard Turner, explains, "Cook County hospital is in the heart of the ghetto. The children's ward has two nurses to care for 100 kids between the ages of six months and 18 years. Great Lakes Naval hospital treats soldiers wounded in Viet Nam."

At Cook County hospital, the volunteers help feed and diaper the younger kids. They play games and act as tutors for the older patients.

Because the hospital is 97% black, students from West are confronted with a totally different environment. Many of the older patients are hostile and bitter toward the white suburban volunteers. Students from West are often forced to defend themselves and the entire white community.

"We go up to Great Lakes every month to visit the veterans," explained Mr. Turner. "Here, the girls are especially appreciated. They

write letters for the men, or just sit and talk."

Boys and girls are eligible to join the Hospital Troupe. Petitions will be made available in the Spring for students interested in joining next year's volunteers, according to Turner.

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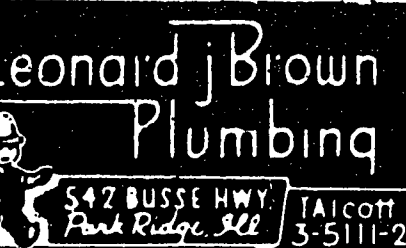

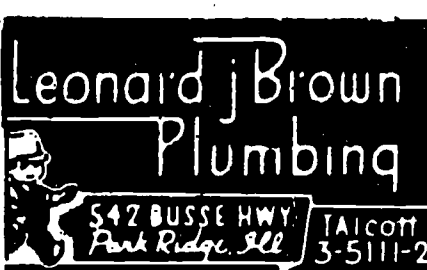

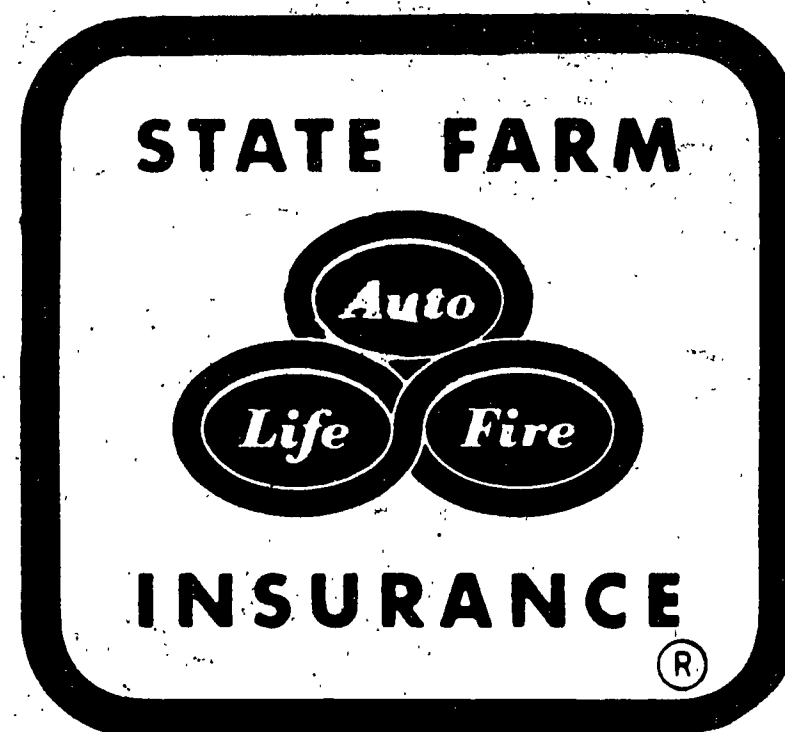

## COACHES' Corner

It is hard to believe that a team can out-gain its opponent by 179 yards and still lose the ball game, but that's what happened when Niles West won their Homecoming Game by defeating Deerfield 7-6.

Deerfield's bigger but slower Warriors controlled the ball almost entirely during the first half. Halfback Kevin Koopman along with fullback Bill Bell led Deerfield's rushing attack for the first 24 minutes for a total of 107 yards compared to the Indians' 35 yards. At one point in the first quarter, Bill Bell galloped 54 yards to the Niles West 24 yard line, but the Niles West defense stiffened and Deerfield lost the ball on downs. Twice during the first half Niles West intercepted two of Mark Nelson's passes, one by linebacker Chuck Jackson and another by defensive back Kenn Dohm.

Niles West showed general sluggishness offensively trying to dent the big defensive line of Deerfield. Punter Ken Dohm on numerous occasions kept Deerfield in poor field position. As the first half ended, the game was scoreless.

Bill Guenther took the second half kickoff to the Deerfield 47 yard line and it looked like Niles West would be off and running. Tim Erickson and Fred Chapekis moved the ball to the 40 yard line, but again Deerfield's defense held and Niles West had to punt. Finally with 4 minutes left in the third quarter, Deerfield's fullback Bill Bell fumbled and the Indians' Jeff Lapins recovered on Deerfield's 28 yard line. Quarterback Bill Guenther and Tim Erickson alternated running the ball down the 11 yard line mostly penetrating the right side of Deerfield's defense. On a fourth down and one situation with the ball on the 2 yard line, Guenther managed to follow his right offense line to the 1 yard line to keep the drive alive. On the next play Tim Erickson scored from the one yard line with 54 seconds remaining in the third quarter. 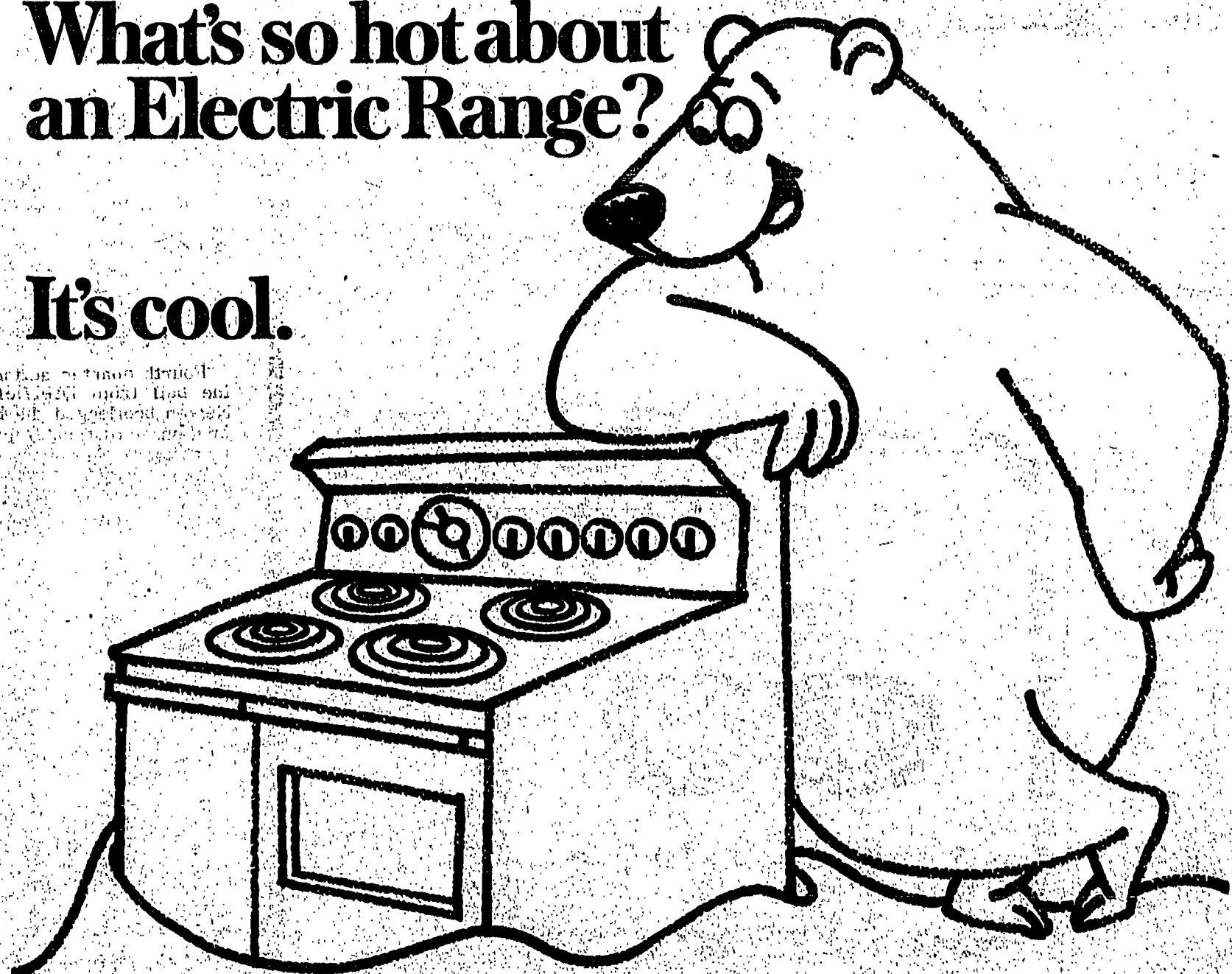

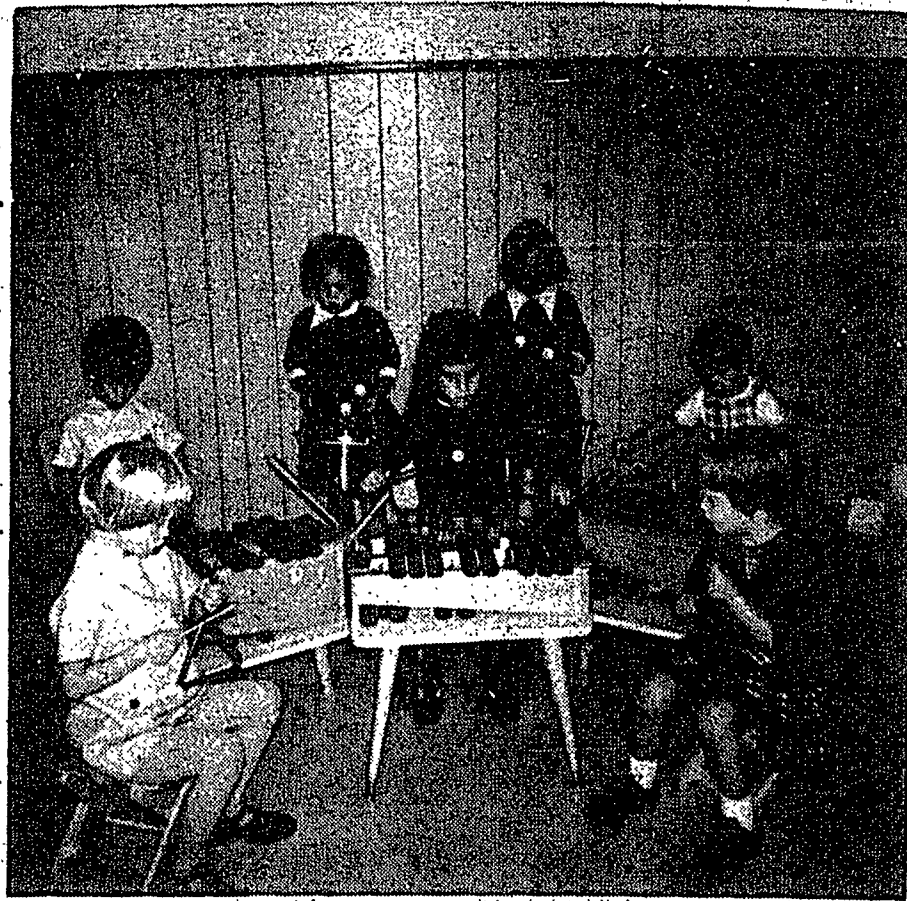

6. Expanded the guidance services through appointment of Guidance Dept. heads in each division and the addition of social workers in each school; also the extension of Counselor Services to certain periods during summer.

7. Successfully initiated Project Wingspread in cooperation with Chicago public schools.

8. Introduced courses in Aeronautics, Sex and Drug Education, Computer Programming, and a Child Care Practicum.

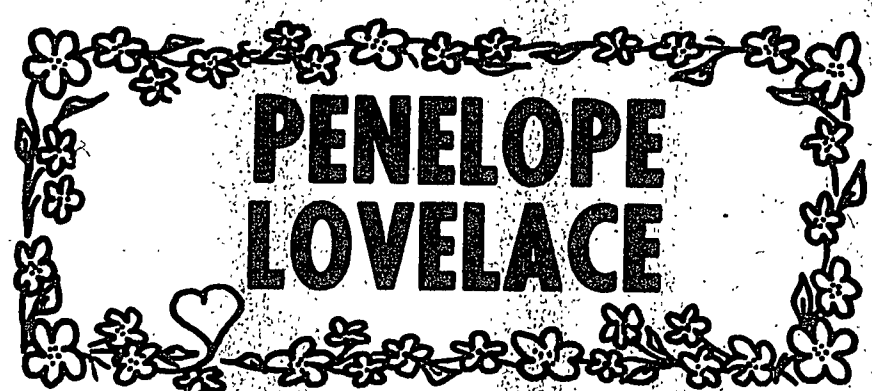

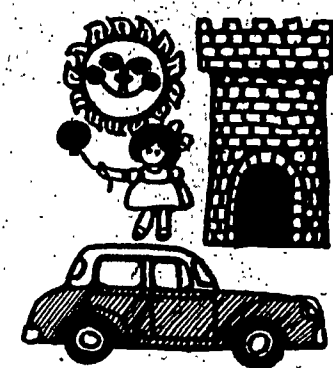

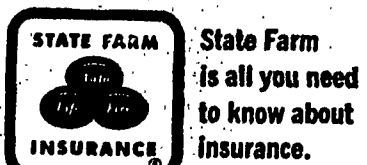
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## What About The Library System?

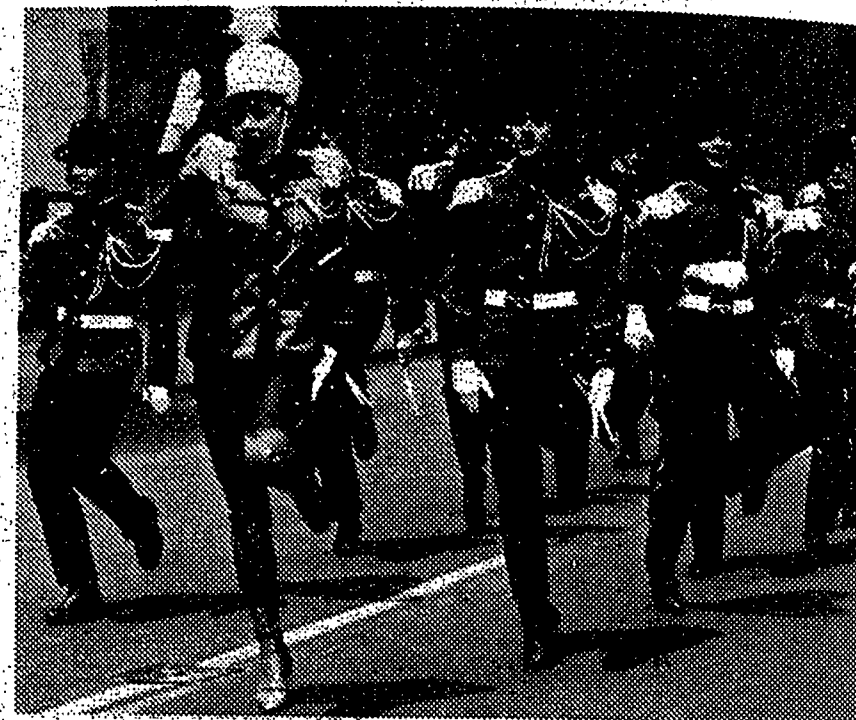
Pesole also said he was "bugged" by the inaction of the park board, who last year received approval for a \$1,000,000 plus referendum for parks and buildings and a swimming pool. He said "our money is involved and they haven't even sent a letter of intent to the trailer park owners regarding the intended acquisition of land there." He noted they're now building an office addition on the present Milwaukee Avenue recreation center and he thought this should be the last priority to be considered after they pursued the much-needed recreation areas and buildings Nilesites approved. He said the swimming pool would not be built for another year and a half and they now have an additional \$370,000 in federal money in addition to the original sum for more than a million dollars.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase told THE BUGLE after the meeting, while the money is languishing in the bank, it is being eaten up by inflation, implying land values continue to increase while the money loses value.

In an addendum to the resolution Pesole also wanted to include the urging of the park district to pursue these park lands, but the village will send a letter to the park district asking what progress its making in this area.

John Hilkin reported that a broken water main had been replaced on Marmora and Monroe and that a fire hydrant had been replaced on School St. Mr. Hilkin also stated that between the hours of 7 p.m. and 11 p.m. on Friday about 3 1/2 inches of rain fell here. Attorney John Nordberg read an ordinance granting a Special Use permit to Arthur Goebelt for the construction of an apartment building on the old Dilg property on Lincoln Ave. Mr. Nordberg then read a letter from an attorney concerning an unpaid bill for a condenser placed in the air conditioning unit at the Police Station. It was then explained by Fred Huber that the company was never given an order to install a new condenser but was just called in to give an estimate on the job. The matter will be suitably dealt with.

Mayor Bode read a proclamation making Oct. 19-25 Cleaner Air Week. Mayor Bode then said that he met last week with Chief Hildebrand, Ed Wilander and several fire commissioners and that at that time the Fire Chief indicated that there was a need for additional personnel in his department. Mr. Wilander is currently conferring with Treasurer Kennedy to see if there are sufficient funds in the budget to hire new men.

Fred Huber said that he and Supt. Fragassi met with Niles to discuss the upkeep of the Washington Rd. boundary and also that he received approval from the Forest Preserves to annex the section of land on Oakton and Caldwell near the river. Clerk Fred McClory said that the Con-Con election on Nov. 18 should not be forgotten. He also reported the Municipal Tax for July was \$46,259.82. A request by the Ben Levine Memorial for Retarded Children was granted which will allow this group to solicit in the village on Nov. 23. Mr. McClory reported that the village hall was opened last Friday night and that several people showed up in spite of the rain.

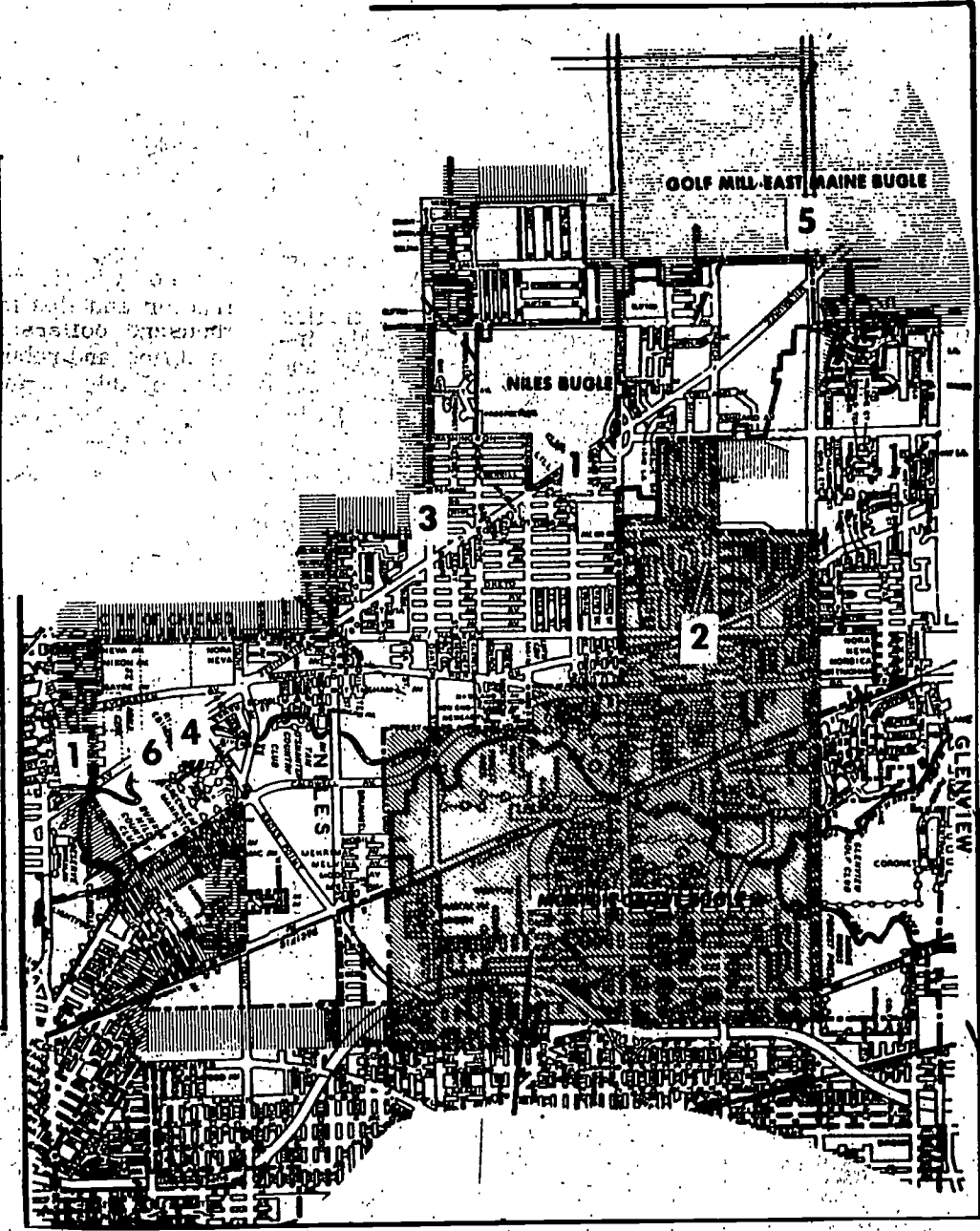
