Our number one son had his talking pumpkin by the front door again this year. Borrowing a wonderful idea from the Hartzells on Merrill Avenue in Niles, the talking pumpkin welcomes the trick or treaters to our house every year.

During their younger years in Oakton Manor in Niles our four kids looked forward to the talking pumpkin and the ghost who came down from the 2nd floor at the Hartzells. The memory has been such a pleasant one it's been perpetuated at our house in recent years.

It's great fun watching the younger children stand and talk to Mr. Pumpkin. When he explains he can't get out and do his own trick or treating and begs for a piece of candy, it leaves smiles all around when the 3 and 4 year olds reach into their bags and place a piece of candy in front of Mr. P.

The man behind the pumpkin is producing this show from behind a living room drape. With microphone in hand he's often able to identify many of the youngsters who are amazed when Mr. Pumpkin identifies them by name.

Being part of the over 30 group (and over 40, also) I've noticed many of us are beginning to show our age as we reminisce about the thirties and forties when we were growing up. But Halloween then seems quite different than today's trick or treat days.

On Chicago's south side in our neighborhood we always had a mainmth bonfire in the school playground. Days before the big fire we used to carry wood to school and drop it on a mounting hill of timber. It was all quite innocent among the younger kids but some neighbors around the school began complaining fence boards were missing out by the alley, which eventually resulted in the end of the bonfires.

Living in an apartment area we used to daringly go inside the hallways and ring the doorbells, sometimes placing pins in them and then running for our lives by dashing down the street.

When we saw an auto moving on the street two boys would stand on opposite sides of the street and pretend they were holding a tight string or rope, hoping the driver would stop, for fear of driving into the invisible line.

Waxing windows with harmless soap was also the order of the day, often being the order of the week preceding halloween as well. Any store-keepers foolish enough to clean their windows during the week of the goblin were merely asking for more wax and soap before the darkness came.

Most of the action was what we considered daring rather than destructive. The name of the game was to cause some misery to the older generation. While we may not have been obstructive, we certainly aimed to be obstreperous.

While most of us played the game within very strict rules, in which no harm was done, there were a few of the more daring who appointed themselves as self-styled heroes this one night of the year. Jumping on the back of streetcars and pulling the trolley lines was expected among the heroes. And on 71st street the one-night heroes used to pack garbage cans with paper, light them, and block the IC trains from passing. The night wasn't a success until 3 or 4 trains were backed-up while the track was cleared. This was the prelude to the egg-throwing contest which separated the few from the many. Gangs of kids would roam down one side of the street, and when viewing the kids from the other side of the tracks, would bombard them with eggs borrowed from the outside egg cartons of local grocers. After the initial attack the chase began in which the greater number chased the lesser number. The end result was the big fight on halloween but it seldom ever passed the one-punch stage, then only by one or two of the guys who were friends the rest of the year.

Perhaps the kids on our street were more reserved but old Jack Warner put a damper on our halloweens for many years to come. Old Jack grabbed a hold of the back of a milk truck, where the empties were stacked. While swinging under the moving vehicle suddenly all the bottles overturned on Jack. The glass and the blood and the fear of all of us in the 10 year old bracket put a damper on that halloween and many future ones after that. Old Jack Warner recovered but many of us always approached future halloweens with much caution.

ACCEPT NILES DAYS AMBULANCE

At the October 28 Village Board meeting Niles officially accepted a new \$16,000 ambulance from the Niles Days Committee. In accepting the vehicle on behalf of the village, Mayor Nicholas Blase thanked the Committee for its "magnificence and munificence" in its efforts which resulted in the presentation. The new ambulance gives Niles two emergency ambulances which will be stationed at each of the fire stations.

.....A second area requesting multiple dwelling zoning is on one and a third acres west of Chester and 230 feet south of Greenwood. Blase noted Niles is interested in this area for future annexation saying the property "would round off" the village at that point.

.....Approved 2 resolutions requesting the park board take action to resolve Tam O'Shanter problems and to increase the Health Board from 5 to 7 members.

.....Ordinance was approved banning anyone from boarding up buildings without getting an okay from the village. Officials noted the unsightliness of buildings boarded up on Milwaukee avenue (such as gas stations) to prevent window breakage, etc. The village attorney said non-compliance with the ordinance would allow the village to go into the courts for direct action. The ordinance applies to dangerous, uncompleted and abandoned property. Blase ordered Village Manager Scheel to contact gas stations which are boarded up and inform them of the law.

.....Bids were received for review for cleaning a 250,000 gallon storage tank.

.....The village will file objections November 7 at 3 p.m. in the Des Plaines village hall regarding multiple dwelling zoning requests in the unincorporated area. One area, near Golden Acres, 350 feet west of Glendale near Maynard Street, will be objected to as Blase contends it may set a precedent alongside single family dwelling zoning. Blase suggested local residents voice

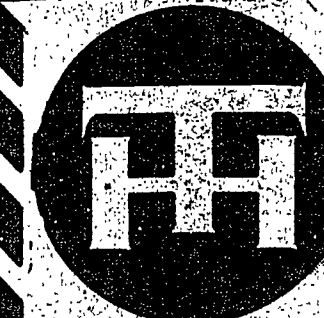
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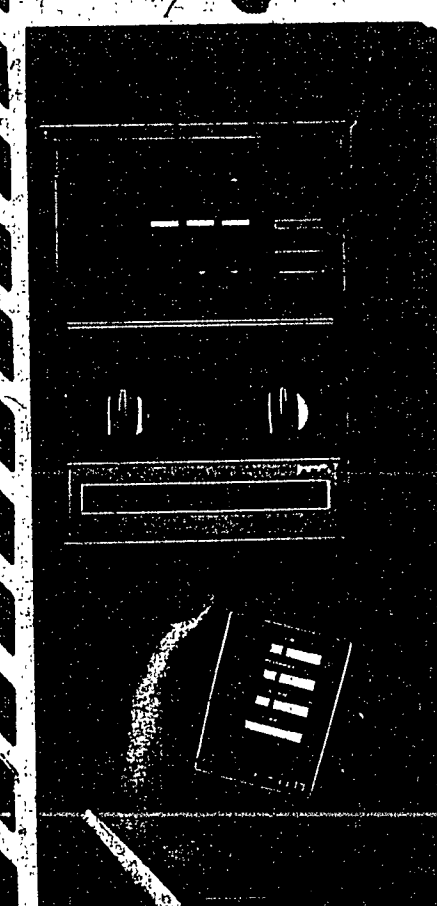


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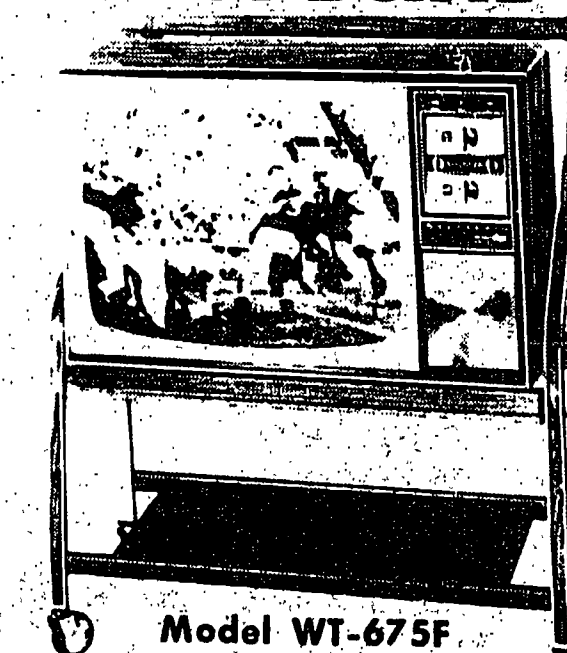
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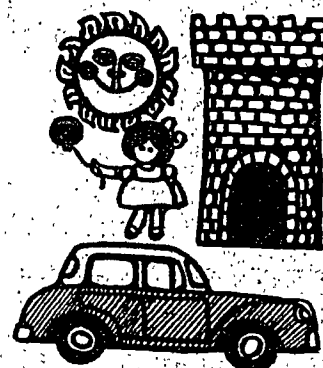
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Community College

Coordination Plans

Niles-Maine Community college board announced this week it is setting up formal procedures for coordination with area high schools. In announcing the new program, board chairman Ray Hartstein stated that the same students and same payers are served by various school boards, and administrative boards and administrative divisions.

This makes it important for us to plan educational programs and training requirements to link the high schools and the community college in an unbroken chain of learning experiences," he said.

The community college board meeting of Nov. 4 heard a presentation by Niles Township High School Superintendent John J. O'Connor. O'Connor said that the high school board was "convinced" that the community college was the best way to provide for the needs of the community.

Blase Seeks Re-election

the city oriented political leaders look to suburbs for their future election victories. This too, will become a reality, and with it, the important changes necessary to insure the Democratic Party's security.

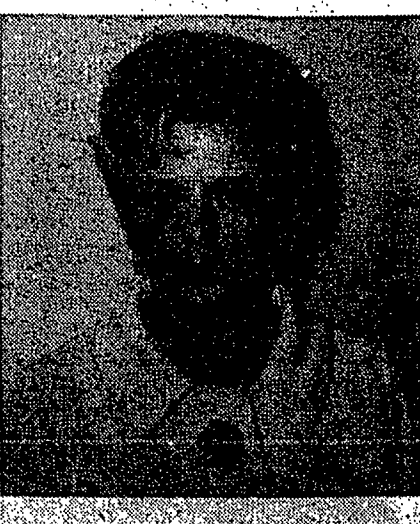

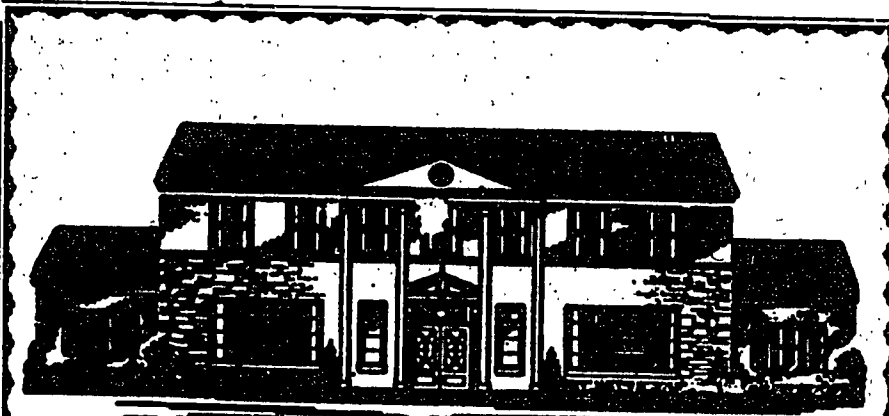

Other programs operating to articulate with the high schools include regular information sent to editors of the various high school newspapers, and a questionnaire sent to a sampling of high school students worked out by the students themselves with the help of Robert Goldberg and William J. Sterling who were appointed by the college board to supervise the project.

College board members, Meyer Kamin and Griffith McDonald of the community involvement committee have urged that high school students and faculty members attend the two community meetings to be held in November. The first is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 13 at Niles North High School, room 100 C. The second will be at Maine West High School on Thursday, Nov. 20 in room L101.

The meetings are being organized by volunteer citizen committees under the leadership of Stephen Loska of Des Plaines and Al Serota of Skokie.

Overseas Postal Regulations

Postmaster Henry W. McGee reminds Chicagoans to take full advantage of the special services offered by the Post Office on parcels addressed to our Armed Forces overseas.

When a parcel weighing five pounds or less and measuring less than 60 inches in length and girth combined is mailed, it will be given air lift service on a space available basis. Parcels meeting the qualifications should be endorsed by the sender, on the address side "SAM" (SPACE AVAILABLE MAIL).

SAM mail is given air lift service between points of embarkation and military post offices overseas.

Parcels weighing less than 30 pounds and measuring less than 60 inches in length and girth combined will be given air lift service on a space available basis from Chicago to the military post office overseas when the sender pays a fee of \$1.00 in addition to the regular parcel post rate.

When a parcel that meets these requirements is mailed at a postal station, and the sender pays the \$1.00 fee, the accepting postal employee will endorse the parcel "PAL" (PARCEL AIR LIFT).

In making the announcement, McGee also urged all Chicagoans to make certain that parcels addressed to members of our Armed Forces overseas are mailed before Nov. 8.

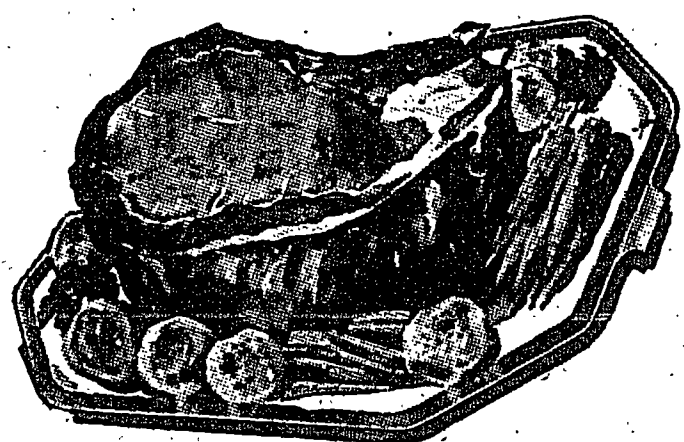

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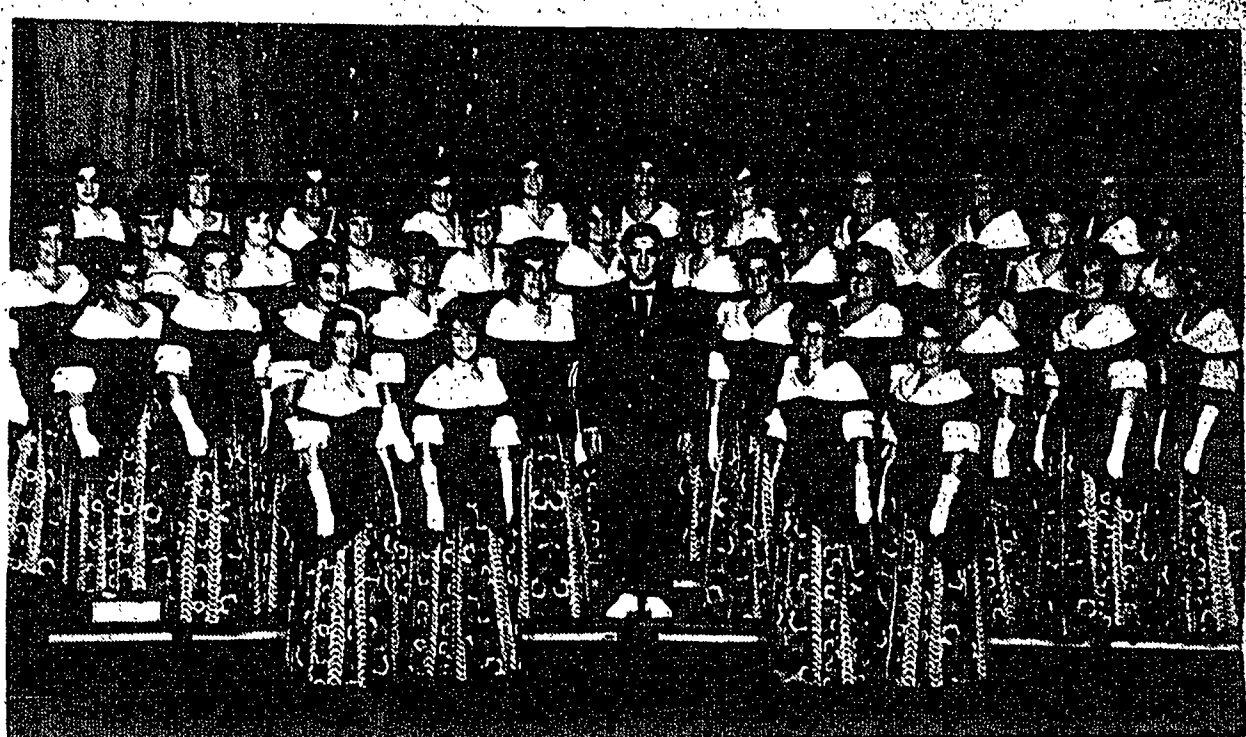

Niles West Nips Maine West 21-16

Niles West ground out an exciting 21-16 victory over arch rival Maine West last Saturday in a contest which featured crucial fourth-down situations. The Indians were led by a sturdy defense who recovered two fumbles and Mehmet Demirel's 34-yard touchdown run of a blocked punt. Both teams concentrated strictly on moving the ball on the ground. Maine West attempted 7 passes and failed to complete 1 while Niles West completed 2 of 3 passes which netted a minus 5 yards.

Mid-way through the first quarter Maine West's fullback Keith Moranz quick-kicked on a third down and long yardage situation and Bill Guenther returned the kick into Warrior territory. With the help of a personal foul and the hard-running of Tim Erickson, Mitch Nelson, and the scrambling of Bill Guenther, Niles West advanced to Maine West's 17 yard line. On three running plays the Indians managed 8 yards to the 9 as Coach Basrak elected to gamble on a fourth and 2 instead of trying for the field goal. Halfback Mitch Nelson on a simple hand-off from Bill Guenther hit the center of the Maine West line for the necessary 2 yards and the first down. Bill Guenther on the next play from scrimmage, swept around his right end for 7 yards for the touchdown and Gregg Jakubik conversion made the score 7-0.

Maine West had constant trouble moving the ball against the quickness of the Niles West defense throughout the first half. In the second quarter Larry Portman recovered a Bill Guenther fumble on the Niles West 9 yard line. Nick Fininis moved the ball to the 1 before tumbling and defensive back Scott Shore recovered in the end zone for a touchdown. With the Warriors deep in their territory Keith Moranz fumbled and Scott Shore recovered his second fumble on the Maine West's 10. Quarterback Bill Guenther again swept around his right end for 10 yards and his second touchdown of the afternoon. Maine West added a safety shortly before half time to make the score 14-2 at intermission.

Niles West opened the second half by trying an on-side kick but the Warriors recovered the loose ball at their 48. Reserve quarterback Bill Priester replaced Dave Arnswald and the change seemed to spark the Warriors on. Flashy halfback Nick Fininis dashed 35 yards through the left side of the Niles West defense to the 15 yard line. Maine West utilized short chunks of yardage before Fininis went over from the 3.

With 4 minutes and 50 seconds left in the third quarter, the turning point of the game occurred when defensive end Randy Hillstrand crashed through and blocked Keith Moranz' punt and Mehmet Demirel picked up the loose ball and easily ran 34 yards for the touchdown to make the score 21-9. Trailing now by 12 points, Maine West would not quit. Bill Priester utilized the running of Nick Fininis and Keith Moranz to bring Maine West within 5 points as Fininis took a Priester handoff and dashed through a gaping hole for a 19 yard touchdown run.

The Indians controlled the ball and the clock for the final 6 minutes as Guenther and Erickson marched to Maine West's 15 yard line as the final gun sounded and the 1969 football season came to an end. The victory by Niles West brought their overall season record to 5-3 and a Central Suburban Conference record of 4-3 which tied them for third place with Deerfield. Maine West finished in last place with a 1-4-2 record.

Last Friday night Downers Grove North won its first West Suburban championship since 1949 by smashing Maine East 37-16. The Trojans were led by halfback Berry Cernoch who scored 3 times on runs of 2 and 12 yards and a 49 yard pass from Steve Wilson. Maine East's Pete Gross scored all 16 points on runs of 3 yards and 1 yard and also tallied 4 points on 2 conversions. The loss by Maine East tied them for last place in the West Suburban Conference along with Proviso West at 1-6 and the Blue Demons seasonal record of 1-7.

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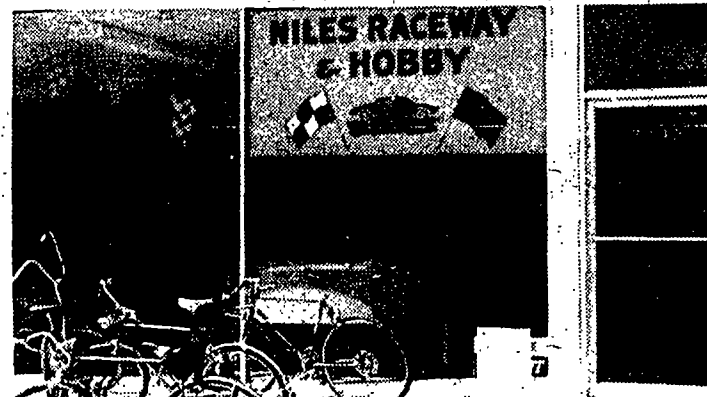
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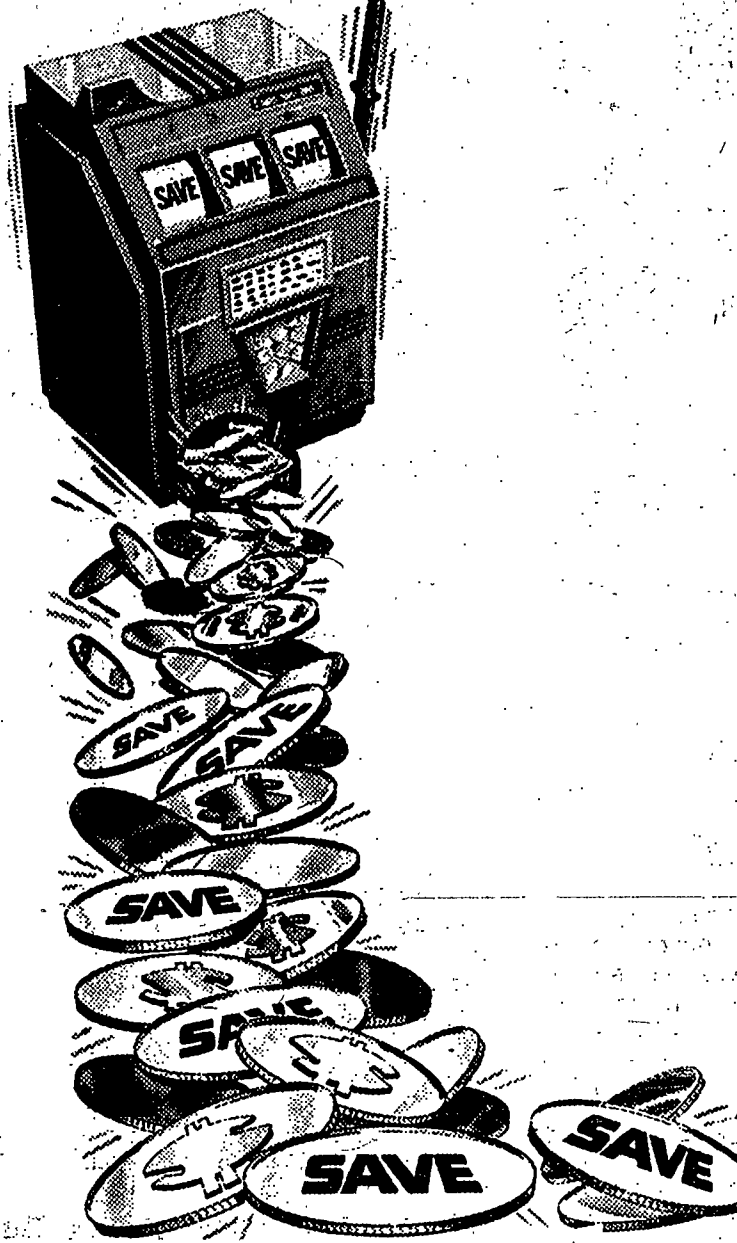
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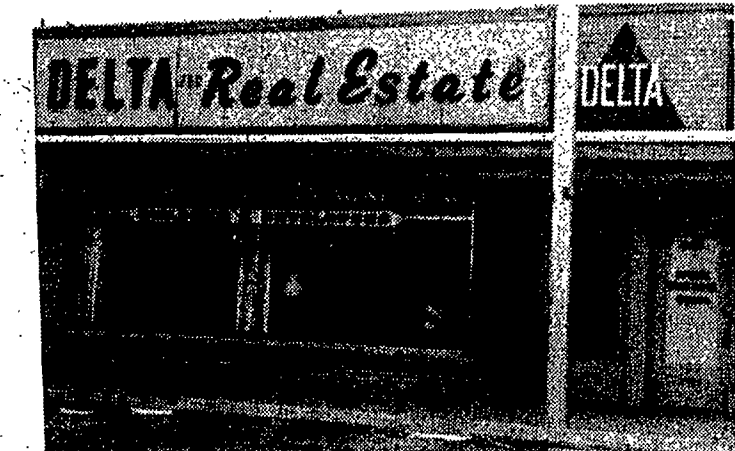
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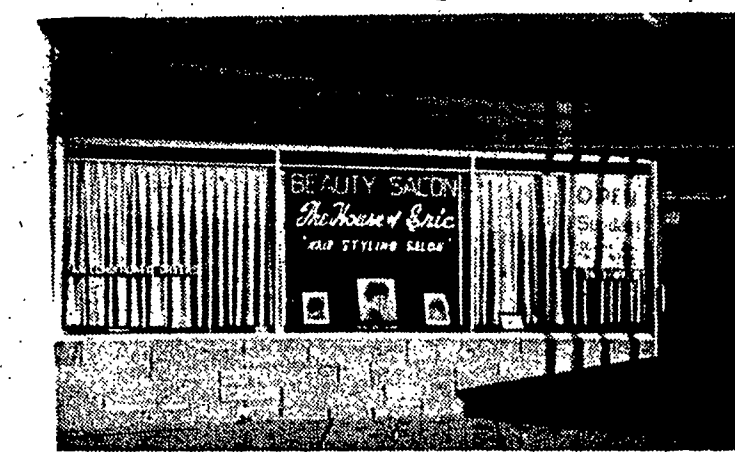
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Senior Citizens Traffic Signal

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 16-1 OF THE NILES HEALTH AND SANITATION CODE

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That Sec. 16-1 of the Niles Health and Sanitation Code for the Village of Niles which reads as follows:

A board of health of the village is hereby created and shall consist of five (5) members. All of said members shall be appointed by the president of the village subject to the approval of the board of trustees. They shall hold office for one year or until their successors are appointed. (Code 1934, Ch. 35, Sec. 1; Ord. of 9-18-57, Sec. 1)

is hereby amended to read as follows:

A board of health of the village is hereby created and shall consist of seven (7) members. All of said members shall be appointed by the president of the village subject to the approval of the board of trustees. They shall hold office for one year or until their successors are appointed. (Code 1934, Ch. 35, Sec. 1; Ord. of 9-18-57, Sec. 1)

SECTION 2: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, be, and the same are, hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

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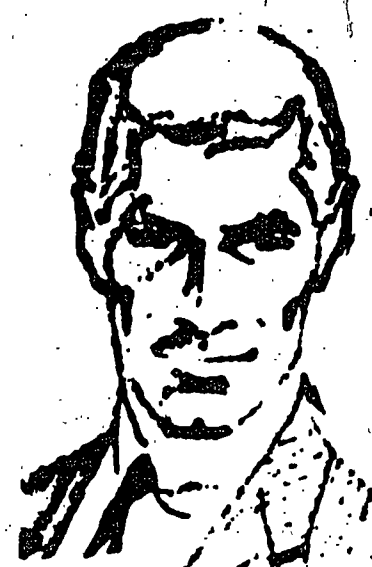

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Nathanson School Program

Some unique features of the educational program of the Shelley Nathanson school in East Maine School District No. 63 were described by Frank McGowan, principal; and Mrs. Elsie McAvoy, reading specialist, at the Oct. 14 meeting of the Board of Education.

The report is the first in a series of educational reports covering all schools which will be made at upcoming board meetings by District 63 principals.

The Shelley Nathanson school, located in unincorporated Des Plaines, was the first school in the district to be constructed specifically to accommodate a team teaching, non-graded educational plan. Up to 1,000 visitors tour the school each year.

The program of the Nathanson school is designed to provide for the "continuous progress of students at rates and in directions commensurate with their own abilities and interest." Children remain with the same team of teachers for two years.

Diagnosis and Prescription

The "diagnosis" of the educational needs of each child and a "prescription" for meeting those needs, McGowan said, are keys to the functioning of the Nathanson program.

In the diagnostic procedure, the children are exposed to both group and individual screenings conducted by the teachers to determine the subject area weaknesses and strengths of each child. Once the child's learning needs are known, a prescription is made and he is placed with those teachers from whose style of teaching he will most benefit.

Retrieval System
To better record and track each student's academic progress, the staff at Nathanson school, assisted by other district personnel, has developed a "retrieval system."

A card is kept for each child in all subject areas. The card lists specific skills and behavioral objectives. When the child has satisfactorily mastered a skill, his teacher will notch his card. When all cards are placed in a box, it is mechanically possible for a teacher using a key sort to lift out all the cards of children needing additional work in a particular skill.

The system, developed last year, is being field tested this year at Nathanson, Nelson, Ballard and Mark Twain schools in District 63.

In addition to offering a more efficient means of recording a child's academic progress, McGowan noted, the retrieval system equips teachers with the information needed to talk intelligently with parents about the individual needs of children.

Critiquing
The teachers of Nathanson

school have also "developed and devised" an unusual system of critiquing themselves, according to McGowan. Each teacher fills out a questionnaire (devised by the teachers themselves) focusing on (1) flexibility (2) communication (3) continuous planning and (4) accurate evaluation of the teaching process.

Questions such as "How flexible are your student groupings?" "Rate your own acceptance of other team members' ideas." "What is the atmosphere of your planning time?" and "Is there a child on your team who has no teacher to whom he can relate?" are answered.

The teachers of a team then compare answers and draw up a final summary critique which is reviewed by the principal, team and team-principal (teachers and principal) discussions of the critiques, intended to bring out information and ideas to make the team a more effective teaching unit, are held.

Contract of Study

Another interesting and unique learning activity being used at Nathanson school is the "contract of study." Students, in essence, make an agreement with their teacher to pursue a specific unit of study. This unit of study, in math, science, reading or social studies, specifies the materials

to be used, the activities to be carried out and the goals to be reached.

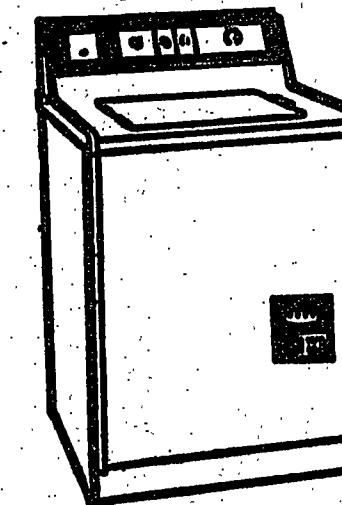
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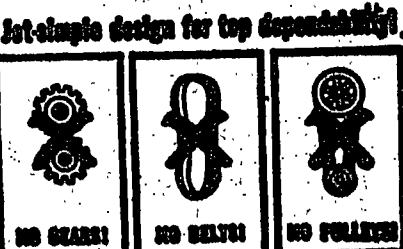
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
