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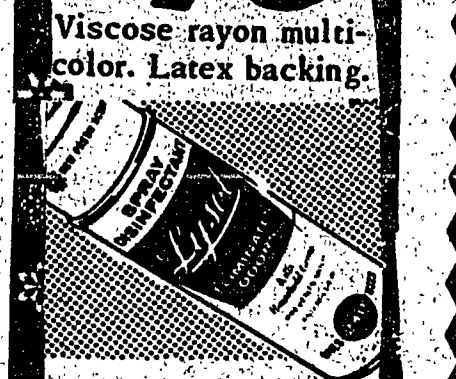
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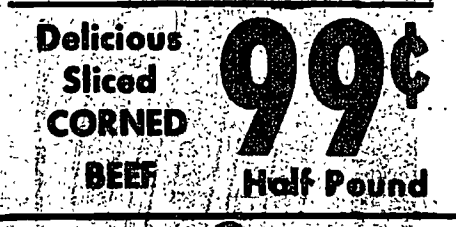

## From The Left Hand Essay Winners Conduct Board Meeting

Perhaps the singularly most important vote you can make this year is in next Tuesday's Con Con election. Your vote will be expressed through the winning delegates who hopefully will rewrite a state constitution which may affect everyone's life in this state.

At Tuesday night's meeting of the Village Board winners of the Children's Essay contest in Niles conducted their own meeting before a huge crowd of family and friends. In a contest sponsored by the Family Relations Service of Niles, theme of the essays was, "If people are found in outer space what would you tell them about our country and the Village of Niles?" Of the 400 entries submitted, writers of the best ones were chosen to become acting village officials for a day and were honored at a luncheon. Among the winners chosen were William Kemp, acting Mayor, Ann Becker, Village Atty., Karen Quinn, Village Clerk and Arthur Aufman, John Breen, Vanessa Lubowich, Karen Merkel and Susan Moritz, trustees.

While we're not intending to unfurl the BUGLE flag, nevertheless old Bugle readers know the supporting of candidates who are most responsive to the electorate, and have a primary interest in better government, has always been a cause we've championed.

In 1959 the first endorsement The BUGLE made was for an independent Niles village trustee candidate, Ken Scheel. While he lost the election, his surprising high vote moved Ken into Niles political circles, and in 1961 his Bugle-supported Party, led by Scheel, turned over the old forces here, and led the way to Niles' eventual All America rating. The past 8 years progress in Niles has been astonishing, and it all began back in 1959 when Nilesites began to pay attention to their community.

A similar parallel exists today where the need to re-vamp our state constitution is of primary importance. And placing equally non-partisan independent candidates at the convention is essential.

In reviewing the problems which have to be tackled in rewriting the constitution, it's obvious the most qualified people must be chosen. Ask yourselves what should be the disposition of the state sales tax? Should it be decreased or at least should buying essentials be excluded from this tax? And what about the state income tax? Should it be a flat tax, a gradual increasing tax or should we eliminate it?

Consider our judicial system. How do we eliminate the political domination of the system? And how do we choose better qualified men to serve in an area which is pocked with dishonor and sleaziness?

What do we do about aid to schools? Should parochial schools receive state aid? And should the burden of supporting the public school system be increasingly handed to the state? Is it fair elementary school systems east of Harlem avenue have more money to spend for their children than school systems west of Harlem avenue? And should Chicago's schools be burdened by inferiority because of their location, while the blue blood suburban children receive the very best educational process?

What about our legislature? Should we retain 2 separate bodies or has the system become archaic? And should legislators only sit for 5 months every 2 years to legislate for a state of 10,000,000 people? And what about the functions of the governor? Should he have the power to appoint the secretary of state and the superintendent of education or should they remain independent? Should the lieutenant governor be elected as we now elect our president and vice-president or should they remain independent, where men from separate parties can serve at the same time as presently exists?

Obviously, in review of just these few questions it seems many have political implications. Thus, to elect candidates who are serving political parties is a disservice to the community and defeats the very essence of the reason for the calling of the convention. We believe it essential an independent non-partisan candidate be chosen, and Mrs. Evans is the lone candidate who has not received endorsement from one of the political parties.

More important than the lady's independence are her qualifications. Her efforts on behalf of the Des Plaines League of Women Voters, in which she has spent years studying government problems gives her the insight necessary for a superior delegate. It has been reported she spent 1 year attending every County

Voters in the 4th Senatorial Dist. go to the polls Tuesday to elect two candidates to the state constitution convention (Con Con). Tuesday's Nov. 18 election is a run-off of the primary from Sept. 23 when Tuesday's finalists were elected from 10 candidates which sought the posts.

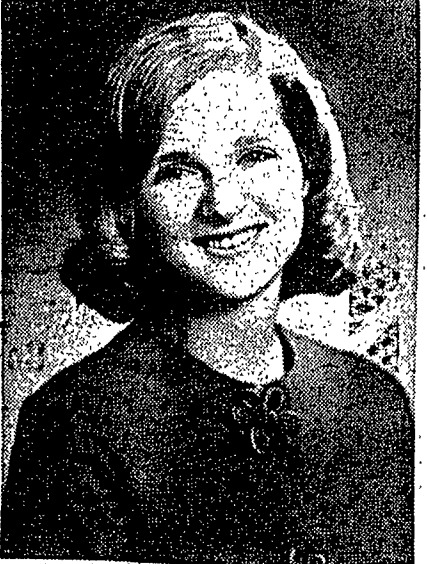

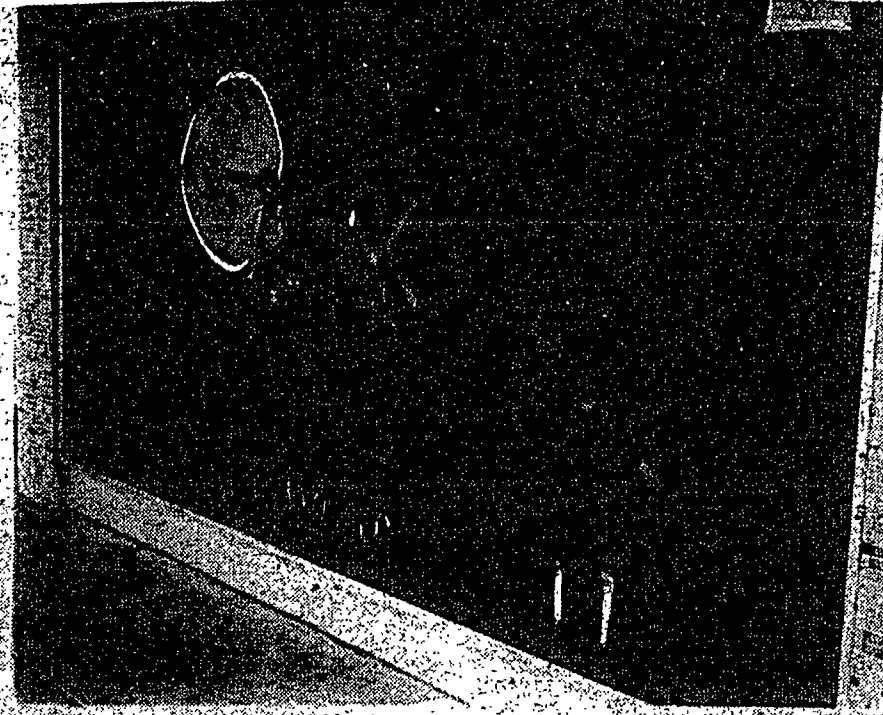

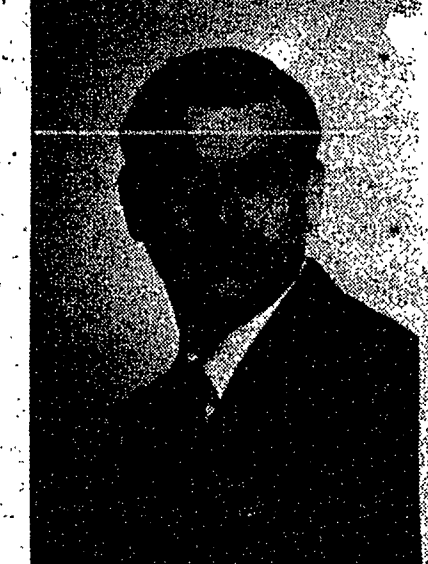

### Asserts 207 Action Unconstitutional

Harry Kliner, attorney for David Johnstone, 1743 Prospect ave., Des Plaines and his daughter, Melanie, in their controversy with the Dist. 207 administration over Melanie's alleged "offense" of wearing Vietnam moratorium materials, political buttons and the like, at school, has sent the following letter to Dist. 207 Supt. Dr. Richard Short and the Board of Education.

Dear Sirs:

I am writing you in regard to certain incidents that took place at Maine Township High School West on October 15 and 16, 1969, regarding the wearing by certain students of buttons or insignia indicating sympathy with the peace movement or other non-violent causes. I am specifically concerned with the case of Melanie Johnstone of Des Plaines, a Junior at Maine West West, who, on October 15 and 16, wore certain buttons of a non-inflammatory nature that can best be characterized as peace insignia but which did not in any manner suggest violence or disruption.

Melanie was subjected to various indignities and harassment by teachers and other administrative officials at Maine West and was ordered in and out of various administrative and Deans' offices, all of which were aimed at having her remove the buttons. At one point, she was told by a teacher that if she continued to wear the buttons she would be expelled from school, and that this would result in a reduction in the percentage of her high school grades for the particular period when she was absent from class due to detentions arising from the wearing of the buttons. In other instances I am advised students wore arm bands or other insignia, again expressing the cause of peace, and some of these were also advised, were expelled or otherwise disciplined by school officials, although in some instances nothing was said to certain students.

It appears clear to me that the action of the administrative personnel and the teachers at Maine West on the occasions in question were in direct violation of the Constitutional right of free speech encompassed in the opinion of the Supreme Court of the United States rendered in February, 1969, in the case of Tinker vs. Des Moines Independent Community School District, et al. This decision, as I am sure you are aware, established the Constitutional right of students to express free speech rights guaranteed in the First and Fourteenth Amendments by the exhibition of non-inflammatory arm bands or insignia expressing sympathy with peaceful or other non-violent causes. The Court made it clear that Constitutional expression do not cease at the school house door.

It is my understanding, upon investigation of this matter, that a policy was adopted by school officials prior to the opening of school this Fall that no buttons would be permitted to be worn other than those that had something to do with urging support of the school. This policy and its implementation is, in my judgment, clearly in violation of the Tinker decision and raises an important question of policy which is a responsibility of the Board of Education and should not be left in the hands of the Superintendent or Principals or of other administrative or teaching personnel. I think it is important that you, as a Board, take a position on this matter and make it clear that Constitutional rights apply to students at Maine High Schools as clearly as they apply to all students throughout the country.

There are further reasons why this is a matter of concern to Mr. David Johnstone, Melanie's father, and to myself and to others interested parents. It is my thought that the primary purpose of education is to have a student achieve understanding, not only of himself, but of the world around him in order that as he enters life as an adult he can contribute constructively to our American way of life. This cannot be achieved, in my judgment, by repressive measures which have the effect of preventing a student from seeking his own identity, so long as his search is conducted in a peaceful, non-violent, non-disruptive manner.

Further, my feelings are to this country, as I am sure did many of yours, to escape the strictures of an Old World society that required conformity, whether it be to religious beliefs, to status, or to a caste system, which arbitrarily gave rights to certain persons and denied them to others. I do not think our children should be intimidated from expressing peaceful dissent nor should we aim at a return to a time and to circumstances which caused our ancestors to seek America as a haven of freedom.

I do not think that this is a matter that should have to be resolved in a legal confrontation between the Board and concerned

Both men will go to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot at San Diego, California for recruit training. The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and the 45-caliber pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects, hygiene, first aid and sanitation, and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare

citizens since I believe it is very clear that the present policy as expressed by the administration violates well-established rights and principles and it should not be necessary to seek legal redress.

The response so far received by Mr. Johnstone to his protest to the Superintendent, in his letter dated October 16, has been completely unsatisfactory and, in fact, unresponsive. The suggestion has been made to him that he have some sort of conference with the Principal of Maine West, but I see no point in a parent having a conference to explain some elementary principles of Constitutional law that are well established.

Mr. Johnstone was further advised by the Superintendent that Melanie would not "be docked 4%" in her high school grades for a Dean's detention, but there was no disclaimer that she would not be docked at all and of particular importance the Superintendent made no commitment that similar type threats would not be expressed in the future.

I believe that this is a matter where an expression of policy by the Board is essential and I therefore specifically request the following:

1. That the Board advise whether they recognize the implications of the Tinker decision and further agree that school administrative officials will be instructed to comply with the intentions of that decision and to cease discouraging students or intimidating them in any manner in the peaceful expression by symbols or insignia of rights which are Constitutionally protected.

2. That in the case of Melanie Johnstone, it be made crystal clear that the Board does not approve of a teacher or any other school official threatening a student in a matter of this kind and that she and her father be further assured that no such action will be taken in the future.

I had originally intended to ask for a public hearing before the Board, but I now believe, upon reflection, that a hearing is not necessary since I am certain that this letter makes plain that the Board should announce the policy decisions in this area without engendering a public debate on the question of whether Constitutional rights deserve respect and recognition.

I trust I will hear from you in regard to this matter at your earliest convenience.

## Nilehi's Position On Moratorium

Clarification of the school's position relative to a proposed Washington, D.C. bus trip Nov. 14 and 15 was given today by Nilehi Superintendent Charles Szuberla. The proposed trip is presumably in connection with Vietnam war moratorium activities planned on Nov. 14.

"I wish to make it clear that the Nilehi Township High School system is neither sponsoring, nor does it sanction any bus trip to Washington, D.C. on Nov. 14 or 15," Szuberla said.

"Parents perhaps should be reminded too that because the school system is not sponsoring or sanctioning the proposed bus trip, it will provide no supervision," he added. "In short, despite what some apparently have been told, the school is not responsible for the health, safety, or welfare of students on the bus to the nation's capital."

Szuberla added that the school's absence policy on Nov. 14 will be the same as that on any other day during the school year.

## HEAR At Lutheran

Lutheran General hospital, Park Ridge, is one of 35 regional hospitals that will form the backbone of the Illinois Hospital Association (IHA) Hospital Emergency Administrative Radio (HEAR) system. It is scheduled to be in partial operation by 1970.

The system is designed to meet the need for inter-hospital communication in time of emergencies such as tornadoes, floods and civil disorders," said William Stiller, associate director of Lutheran General hospital and chairman of the IHA Hospital Frequency Clearance Committee.

"It will enable hospitals to tell each other how many beds they have available, for example, and the status of their staffs and blood supplies. Radio is an excellent means of communication during a disaster because it isn't subject to damage that often disrupts normal communication channels such as telephones."

LGH was picked as a regional hospital for its location with reference to other anticipated regional hospitals, the highway and tollway systems, and O'Hare International Airport. Another factor was that Lutheran General is already an established unit in the Red Cross emergency radio system.

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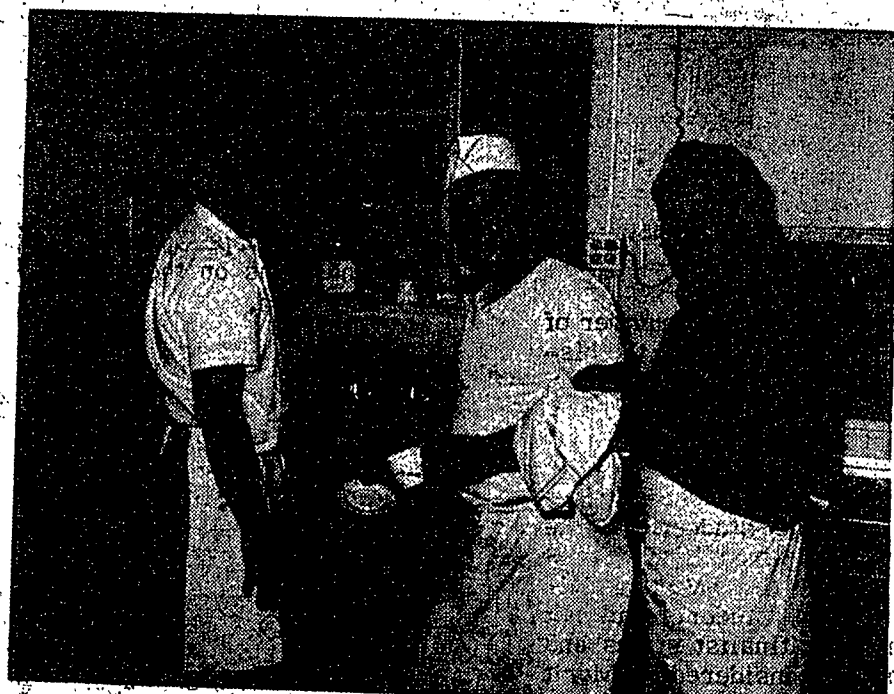

observation assignments are part of the training.

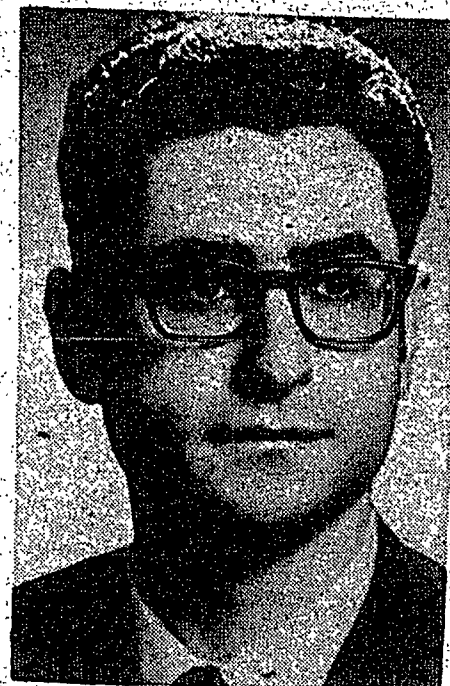

Board hearing, indeed significant of her interest, long before selection to this post was even discussed.

Lastly, in supporting Mrs. Evans we were impressed with her opinion that the new constitution should be presented to the electorate in sections rather than as a whole. Both in New York and Maryland new constitutions were defeated by the electorate because they presented the entire constitution for one vote. Thus, though New Yorkers were alleged to approve of up to 90% of the entire new bill, still their resistance to 10% of it caused the entire law to fail.

## Stevenson School Program

"In my personal opinion," Jack Cantor, principal of the Adlai E. Stevenson school, told members of the board of education of East Maine School District 65 and audience at the Oct. 28 meeting, "the schools of this country have not fulfilled their promise."

"When are we going to stop alienating our children?" he asked. "When are we going to give the child what is really appropriate for him?"

Although the Adlai E. Stevenson school can't claim to be the perfect educational institution, he said, "at least we're trying. And we do have one important thing to offer—our children want to come to school."

The basic task of a school, he said, is to give each child the tools he will need to operate in a complex world.

In attempting to get "inside" the operation of the Stevenson school, Mr. Cantor devoted a major portion of his report to a color and black and white slide presentation showing a variety of learning activities.

Emphasis in the slide presentation, as in the Adlai E. Stevenson school itself, was upon people. For it is the interaction of people, teachers and students, students and students, and teachers and teachers, which makes for learning situations. And it is people, Mr. Cantor says, not one, but many, giving of themselves who have worked to ensure the success of the Adlai E. Stevenson school.

## Driving Tips

Frosty fall mornings can be just as dangerous as the hazards of the snow and ice of winter, cautions the Chicago Motor Club. AAA.

Even if it rains when temperatures are in the low 30s or upper 20s, warmth from the ground prevents freezing on highways. However, cold air circulating above and below bridges, expressway ramps or overpasses can coat the surface with ice.

If your car skids, the motor club advises: Don't hit the brakes. Instead, let up on the accelerator slowly—at the same time turning the front wheels in the direction of the skid. For example, if your rear wheels skid to the right, turn the front wheels to the right. But don't over-correct the skid—and be sure to keep your car in gear. Gentle pumping of the brakes will slow you to a safe speed with far less danger than tromping on the brake pedal.

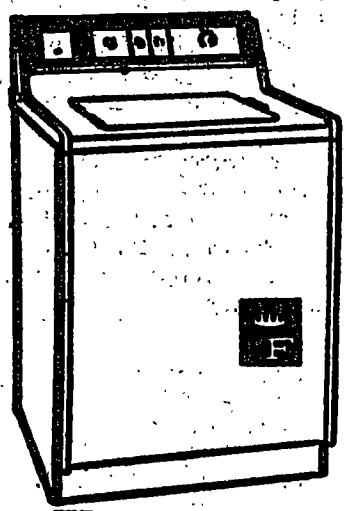

by the Park District regarding that land. After a nod of approval from Gabe Barrafato, Park District attorney, the board agreed to delay a decision on the matter for two weeks. Mr. Barrafato appearing for the Niles Park District said they presented their original petition on the Gail Ann subdivision on Nov. 5, having acquired certain portions of the Jonquil Terrace property for a site through a referendum. In 1968, after the referendum there was litigation between School Board 64 and the property owner, however at that time the Park Board was assured they could acquire the property they wanted at a later date. When they learned of a court decision on this property they submitted another petition. Mr. Yalowitz then told the board there has been a proposed plat of subdivision submitted to the village and he suggested this be studied by village officials to see if it is satisfactory to them and then tabled until such time as a decision is reached by the appellate court regarding ownership. "My clients up to now have been declared owners and are awaiting further decision", said Atty. Yalowitz.

In other business trustees moved to advertise for bids for calcium chloride and rock salt for snow removal. The bids which must be sealed are to be received no later than 5 p.m. on Nov. 23 at the new Administration Bldg. Trustees also approved a request by the Pleasantview Nursing Home for a Special Use Permit in order to build an addition to their property.

Trustee Angelo Marcheschi brought up the traffic problems at the intersections of Dempster and Milwaukee, and Oakton and Milwaukee where he said there is not enough space for cars wishing to make left turns. Milwaukee and Waukegan are also

troublesome. Mr. Marcheschi would like to see "No Left Turn" signs placed at these corners, and suggested sending letters stating this to the state of Illinois. Ken Scheel said letters were sent several years ago with no results but at this time studies of the situation are under way and something will probably be done soon.

Village Manager Ken Scheel said in regard to the bids opened at the last meeting for painting on "2 overhead" storage tanks the bid of \$11,000 from Newman and Co. in Park Ridge was an excellent one (since it includes lettering) and should be approved. The board concurred. Mr. Scheel also advised in 1961 our zoning code called for any manufacturer building on at least 5 acres to come before the zoning board for a Special Use. "It is now an unnecessary ruling and should be removed from our code", said Scheel. The board agreed to study this suggestion. Continuing, Scheel gave the following reports for the month of October. Family Service - 114 cases carried over from last month, 136 cases now pending and 13 cases closed. Fire Dept. - 55 people transported by ambulance, 207 alarms received. Health Dept. - 17 complaints from home owners, 8 restaurant and food inspections made. Police Dept. - 868 citizen complaints, arrests made, 100 motor vehicle accidents, 2 deaths. Public Works - 9 meter leaks, 916 feet of sewer pipes installed, 60 trees removed. Engineering Dept. - Final plans have been prepared for sidewalks on Washington to Golf.

## Dist. 63 Faces Lack Of Revenue

The most serious problem facing East Maine School District No. 63 is a "lack of adequate revenue" according to the 1969-70 school district annual report filed by District 63 with the State Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The report notes that the inadequate revenue intake occurs even though residents of the school district have never defeated a bond issue and are taxed to the maximum permitted by state statute.

The financial problems are made more difficult, the report continues, for the following reasons:

- (1) "Much of our area is unincorporated and yet we have schools located in four separate villages, Niles, Des Plaines, Morton Grove and Glenview.
- (2) "The rapidity with which multiple-type dwellings, townhouses, duplexes and apartments have been erected has required rapid expansion of physical facilities.
- (3) "Schools in four separate municipalities demonstrate the lack of a local governmental body with responsibility for all of its citizens."

In answer to the question, "What recent improvements have been made in the district?" the report states: "Our most recent improvements include the implementation of the concepts of nongradedness and team teaching throughout the entire school system. Although we have only two elementary buildings designed for flexibility, the traditionally designed buildings have not interfered with providing each pupil an unbroken sequential program specifically tailored for his needs.

"Our comprehensive inservice training program for teachers has been funded under Title III of the ESEA Act of 1965. On a pilot basis, we are inaugurating an individualized approach to reading utilizing trade books, in lieu of basal texts. We have instituted a comprehensive developmental reading program throughout the system. Other recent innovations include a gifted program, learning centers, and a special edu-

cation cooperative program." The report, which also included information about school board policies and procedures, enrollment, curriculum, personnel, teaching loads, school calendar, number of schools, school-community relations, etc., was approved by the District 63 board of education at its Oct. 28 meeting.

Auditor E. Allan Epstein, who appeared at the meeting to report on the audit of the district which he conducted for the fiscal year, July 1, 1968 to June 30, 1969, also pointed up some of the financial difficulties of District 63.

The audit report shows an \$855,272.19 deficit in the educational fund and a \$120,550.51 deficit in the general building fund as of June 30, 1969. Mr. Epstein noted that he had made an examination of the statements of Cash Receipts and Disbursements of the various funds of District 63 in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards.

The basic accounting records have been maintained as required by the Illinois Financial Accounting Manual for Local School Systems" dated July 1, 1965, he reported.

In other action, the Board authorized School Attorney Allen Schwartz to appear at two rezoning hearings scheduled for Nov. 7 to object to the rezoning of two property sites, one located on the north side of Ballard rd., about 206 feet east of the intersection of Ballard rd. and Potter rd.; the other located on the south side of Maynard rd., about 300 feet west of Glendale rd.

The request for rezoning of the Ballard rd. property is for a change from B3 general Business District to R6 General Residence District; the Maynard rd. property would be changed from R4 Single Family Residence District to R6 General Residence District.

The District 63 Board opposes such zoning changes which usually result in an increase in the number of students attending schools in the district without a corresponding increase in tax income.
