End Of The Month Meanderings . . . . .

Niles old village hall building would make a great recreation center for Niles youth and senior citizens. As former trustee John Poeschl told us, the downstairs former fire department area would be a great game room for Nilesites. And the upstairs former courtroom would be a fine meeting hall. We would hope Niles village fathers consider such an effort.

If Niles trustees believe getting involved in recreation matters might conflict with park district activities they might show a long-overdue benevolence by leasing the building for \$1 a year to the park district. While the park district could always use additional facilities, it would be a great re-approachment of the 2 districts joining together in the best interests of the same community they both serve.

The park district is always struggling to maintain a good recreation program with a limited amount of money. In contrast the village always has ever-continuing sources for increased moneys which has resulted in the multiple improvements in Niles in recent years. With the ever-soaring sales tax revenue, and the new bonanza income tax refund to Niles, the village must be considered among the more wealthy communities in the area. Unfortunately, the park district doesn't share in this wealth, and thus could use some benevolence from the village fathers. Turning over the old building for park needs might improve relations between the 2 boards, and would benefit the park district, without causing any liabilities to the village.

Hosannas should go to Bob Wordel and his fellow-Chamber members for the fine village directory which has been distributed thruout the community. Bob told us the Chamber is getting back on its feet which is certainly manifested by the directory effort. Past Chambers became bogged down several times in similar efforts. But under Wordel and friends the Chamber is showing new signs of health.

Maine East's variety show once again was a great success. On Saturday night it played to a packed house, which rose as a body to cheer the kids at the finale. The music was great and the dancing and the comedy was the best ever. One girl we missed this year was a young lady named Coorlas, who we've heard yearly since her junior high days at East Maine. She's a very talented singer and we're sorry she missed this year's show.

The need for a re-approachment between the Niles park and village boards was never more evident than in recent weeks. Park representatives, who've never looked with affection at Mayor Blase, think he is out to embarrass the park board every chance he gets. They point to the announcement at a recent village board meeting that builder Ben Mattion had settled his court case with school district 64, and presented his subdivision plans in Jonquil Terrace, which the park board was unaware of. Being the announcement was made at the village board meeting, it looked at first glance that the park board, which is seeking 5 acres there for a park, was caught offguard.

It would seem a telephone call from the village to the park district before the meeting would have been a more co-operative way of handling the problem. But the announcement at the village board meeting was felt to be another way of embarrassing the park board.

Park Board officials also thought Trustee Pete Pesole's sounding off about the progress of park plans was out of order. Since they believe Pesole is "Blase's man" on the village board, it is implied Pesole is being used by Blase, as vice-president Agnew is being used by President Nixon. These suspicious and expressions of distrust have been a part of the Niles scene since the park board was activated 15 years ago. The bickering and the

# CRANE VICTOR IN 13TH DIST.

Republican Philip Crane easily won Tuesday's congressional election in the 13th district beating Democrat Edward Warman by an unofficial total of 68,819 to 48,670.

In a vote which saw less than 40% of the electorate vote Crane was victorious in every township except Warman's home

In the northwest suburban townships in the district Crane won by a 3 to 1 margin. In Elk Grove Township Warman was defeated 7,061 to 2,403. In Palatine Crane won by 5,150 to 1,911 margin. In the western township area of Schaumburg Crane won 2,679 to 1,195. In northern Wheeling Township Crane held the approximate 3 to 1 advantage winning 11,161 to 3,906 while in Northfield Township he won 8,692 to 3,602. Along the North Shore the margin was closer though Crane won there as well. In Evanston Township Crane won 10,428 to 8,359 while in New Trier Township he was victorious by a 12,962 to 9,599 vote.

In school district 71 Superintendent Culver said their district only receives the minimum \$48 but emphasized at the end of the meeting teachers' salaries will be an ever-increasing burden in the coming years.

Maine's Superintendent Short said the district is now operating \$1,500,000 in the red requiring a \$10,000 to \$12,000 interest charge for a loan which Continued on Page 16

### Dist. 207 President Issues Statement

A statement prepared by Mr. John L. Means, president of the Board of Education of District 207 was read by him at the regular monthly meeting of the board held on Monday evening, Nov. 17.

Mr. Means' statement was prompted by a letter sent to board members by a Des Plaines attorney, Mr. Harry L. Kinser, in behalf of Melante Johnstone, a student at Maine Township High School West. The statement by Mr. Means points out the circumstances which prompted Mr. Kinser's letter and outlines the board's position in this matter.

Recently the Board of Education received a letter from an attorney representing a parent who had complained about the treatment he said his daughter

received over the wearing of buttons giving expression to certain views.

The letter alleges that school officials acted in a way contrary to a recent decision of the United States Supreme Court. This decision held that under certain circumstances students had the right to wear a black arm band as an expression of free speech.

As president I referred the letter to our superintendent and requested that it be reviewed by our board attorney, Mr. Allyn Franke, who has advised us concerning that matter.

It is to be regretted that the parents of this young woman saw fit not to take the matter up directly with the school officials involved. If they had, I am sure, they would have quickly received assurances that their daughter would not be penalized for wearing the buttons. Many other parents, with real or fancied grievances, have been able to resolve their problems in this manner.

This is not to say that parents do not have a right to bring a complaint to the board. Indeed, this route has been followed when parents felt their rights had not been satisfied by the school administration. Students have also exercised their rights and brought grievances before the Board of Education.

The board and the administration have always worked within the framework of the Con-

stitution of the United States and the laws of the land. They also wish students to have as much freedom of expression as possible commensurate with the maintenance of a good educational climate. Without order, little is accomplished in the learning process.

In recent years students have been given much freedom to express themselves. This freedom manifests itself in various ways.

Students in their school newspapers are expressing opinions quite freely on a variety of matters of deep concern to them. All of us can be proud of these expressions. Most of these students exhibit a maturity beyond their years. More importantly, these publications give the students a forum where their opinions can be effectively presented, in preparing these articles for publications students receive valuable learning experiences. In addition the papers offer a vehicle for the presentation of student views without the kind of nose to nose confrontation which on occasion has led to unfortunate instances of name calling, near violence and in some cases violence.

Student forums have provided and will continue to provide opportunity for expression and examination of many viewpoints related to political and social problems.

For this reason I, for one, feel that student publications and other forums provide the best opportunity for students to present their views. I suggest that the board acknowledge receipt of Mr. Kinser's letter and advise him that the board has always abided and will continue to abide by the Constitution and the laws of the land. I further suggest that the parents in this specific instance work with the school administration. The board expects that actions by teachers be handled through the administrative staff in accordance with approved policy.

### Blase Calls For Open Primary

Democratic Committeemen from the 10th Congressional District met Wednesday, Nov. 19, in River Grove, Ill., to slate a Congressional candidate from the 10th district, and fill a vacancy for Democratic state Central Committeeman, created by the death of Leon L. Mazor, who died Monday, Nov. 10.

Meeting with Nicholas Blase, Maine Township committeeman were Jim Kirie, Leyden township; Ray Welsh, Oak Park township; Robert Martwick, Norwood township and Jack Morgan of Proviso township.

With the exception of Blase, the slatemakers selected Jack Morgan of Proviso township as their preferred candidate for state central committeeman. In keeping with the position he has taken regarding the Democratic Party's policies and relationship of the city and suburbs, Blase, who is often referred to as the 'Independent Thinking Democrat' within the Regular Organization, questioned Mr. Morgan with regard to his policy and position.

When it became evident to Mr. Blase that Mr. Morgan's attitudes were geared along the same unresponsive policies now dominating the entire Cook County Organization, Blase chose not to vote stating, "I do not feel Morgan is the best qualified candidate to serve the interest of the Democratic Party within the 10th Congressional District. Nor do I feel it is necessary to slate a candidate on the basis of many years of faithful service to the Party as a reward. The position of State Central Committeeman has never been one of importance or meaning. It's time we changed that philosophy by making the State's 24 State Central Committeemen the voice, the slatemaking, and po-

licy making arm of the State Democratic Party. The candidate chosen must be vocal, responsive, and able to make a decision and abide by it, regardless of pressures placed upon him. For suburban Cook County, this is our opportunity to finally have a voice within the party. We must not blow this chance." Blase continued, "For this reason, if the slatemakers do not choose a viable candidate for this position, I will become a candidate for the office of State Central Committeeman from the 10th Congressional District."

Again, Blase passed on voting when the slatemakers agreed on slating Patrick Logan of Oak Park, as the 10th Cong. District's candidate for Congress, in addition to Logan, Gary Maples of Maywood is known to have expressed a desire to be slated as the Congressional candidate. It was at this point that Blase insisted on an open primary race.

"The time to open up the Democratic Party is now. Let the voters determine their choice of candidate by virtue of an open primary. It would not only provide the candidates with additional publicity, but it would also furnish the voter with a unique opportunity to select the candidate by his participation and choice. It is the choice they deserve in electing the men and women they desire to represent them in government policy and decision," said Blase emphatically.

Any candidate who wishes to run for Congress from the 10th District, on the Democratic Party label, must file his petition between Dec. 8 and 15, 1969, in order to appear on the Primary ballot March 17, 1970. If interested, call 692-3388 for further information.

Patient billing, accounts receivable and the employees payroll are currently programmed for the computer. All accounting procedures are expected to be programmed in 1970.

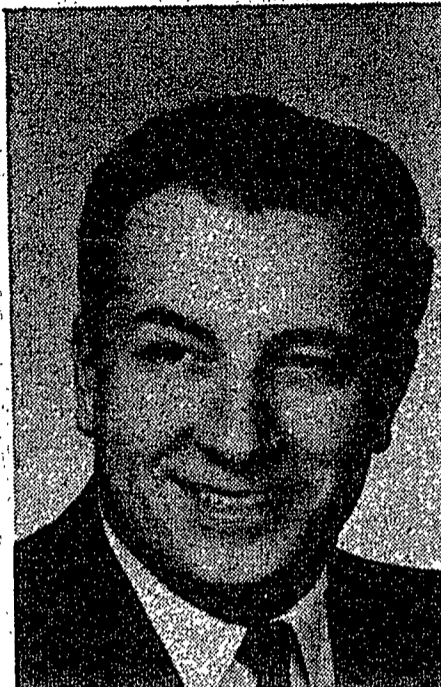

Rep. Robert S. Juckett (R-4th) received the unanimous endorsement Friday night of the Regular Republican Organization of Maine Township in his bid for a third term in the state legislature.

Full support of the organization's leadership and 122 pro-

clinet captains came despite the bid of an unbacked candidate for one of the two representative posts held by Juckett and Rep. Arthur E. Simmons (R-4th) of Skokie, who also received the organization's endorsement Friday.

Juckett has distinguished himself in his first two terms for his forthright determination, in floor debate and in the hallways and committee rooms of the Capitol. Juckett stood firm in his vote against imposition of the state income tax, backed in his stand by an overwhelming percentage of his constituents, as recorded in repeated local surveys.

During the Spring session and the October session, Juckett served as vice chairman of the House Public Welfare committee, where he reportedly was virtually alone in fighting for the taxpayers' interests. Juckett has served through both his terms as secretary of the Legislative Commission to Visit and Examine State Charitable Institutions.

Through his work on this commission, Juckett last Spring led an investigation into illegal practices at Chicago State Men-

tal hospital and is credited with prompting much of the action which has been taken to correct the chaotic situation and illegal procedures which existed there and in all Illinois state mental health facilities under the previous administration.

Juckett was appointed by then Speaker Ralph T. Smith of Alton, recently appointed to the U.S. Senate to fill the vacancy created by the death of Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, to chair a special committee, the Illinois Select Committee on Hunger.

Juckett also serves on the House Judiciary committee, the Multistate Tax Compact Advisory committee, the Governor's Advisory Commission on Appointments to the Fair Employment Practices Commission (FEPC) and the Mental Health Fund Advisory committee.

During his first term Juckett served on the Highways and Traffic Safety, County and Township Affairs, and Executive committees.

Before entering the legislature, Juckett served on the Park Ridge City Council as fourth ward alderman, where he was noted for his determination and his concern for his constituents. His performance as alderman and his dedicated service and leadership in the Maine GOP led the Regular Republican organization to endorse Juckett for nomination as state representative in the June 1966 primary, where he was successful despite opposing candidates. In 1968 Juckett faced no primary opposition.

Juckett is an attorney with offices in Park Ridge, where he and his wife Jan and family of four children reside.

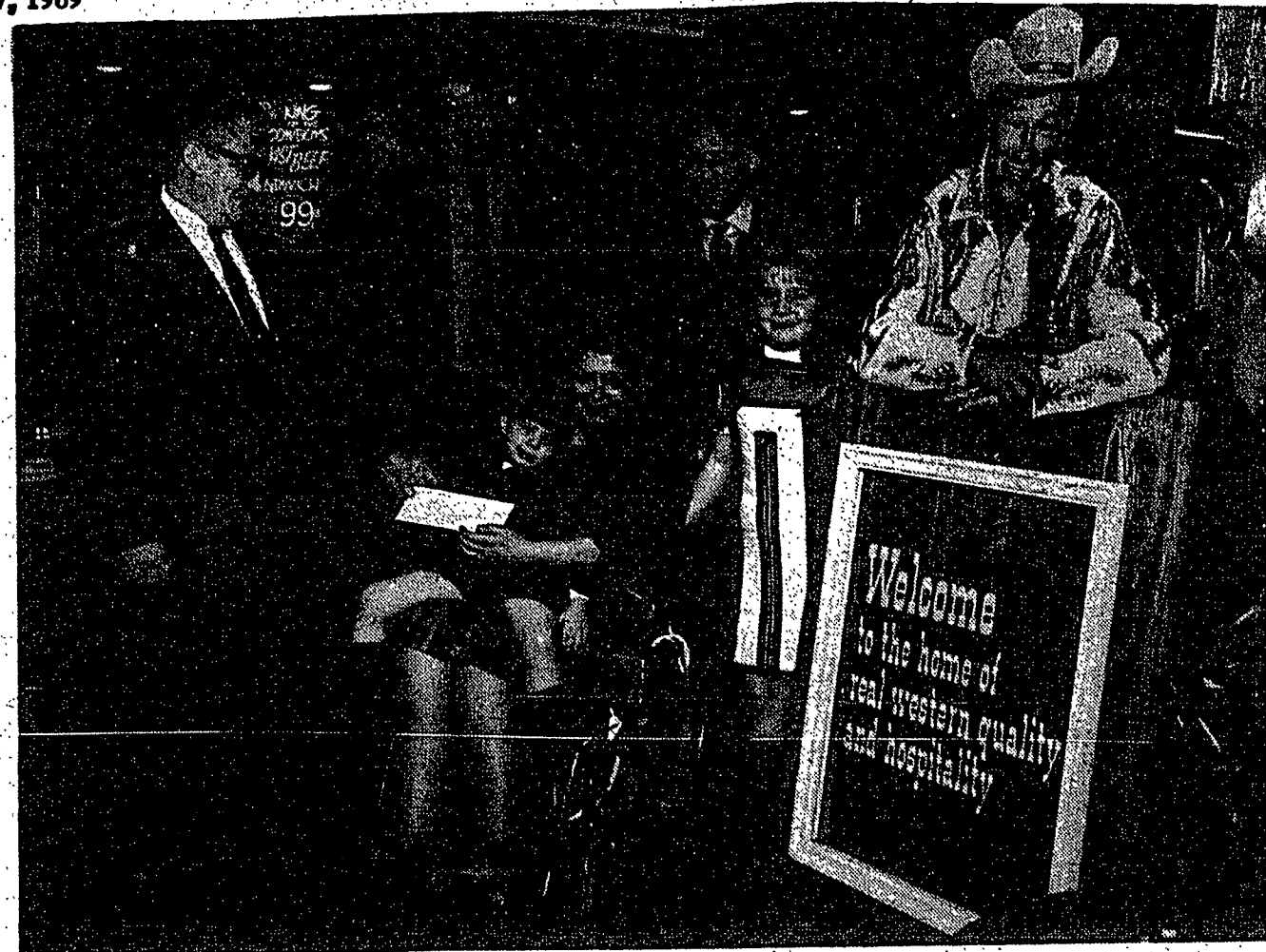

The three-man team and special decontamination swimmer will be the first of the recovery forces to reach Apollo 12. They will attach a flotation collar to the capsule and assist the astronauts aboard the rescue helicopter.

# Fulle Urges Ban of Syndicate Businesses

County Commissioner Floyd T. Fulle urged all Chicago and suburban businessmen this week to join Cook county government in refusing to do business with companies owned or controlled by the Crime Syndicate.

Commissioner Fulle's appeal was made after he introduced a resolution banning all branches of county government from doing business with any of the 31 firms identified as mob-connected in a report issued last week by the Chicago Crime commission. Fulle's resolution was adopted unanimously by the County Board at its November meeting and became effective immediately.

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The anti-syndicate resolution updates a similar measure Fulle introduced in 1967 when the crime commission published its first list of Chicago area firms said to be dominated by mobsters.

"The best way to hurt the syndicate is to cut off its sources of income," Fulle said. "I for one don't want to see public funds used to profit companies that are nothing more than syndicate fronts."

"If all legitimate companies in Chicago and in the suburbs joined county government in this endeavor, we could drive such questionable enterprises out of business fast," Commissioner Fulle emphasized.

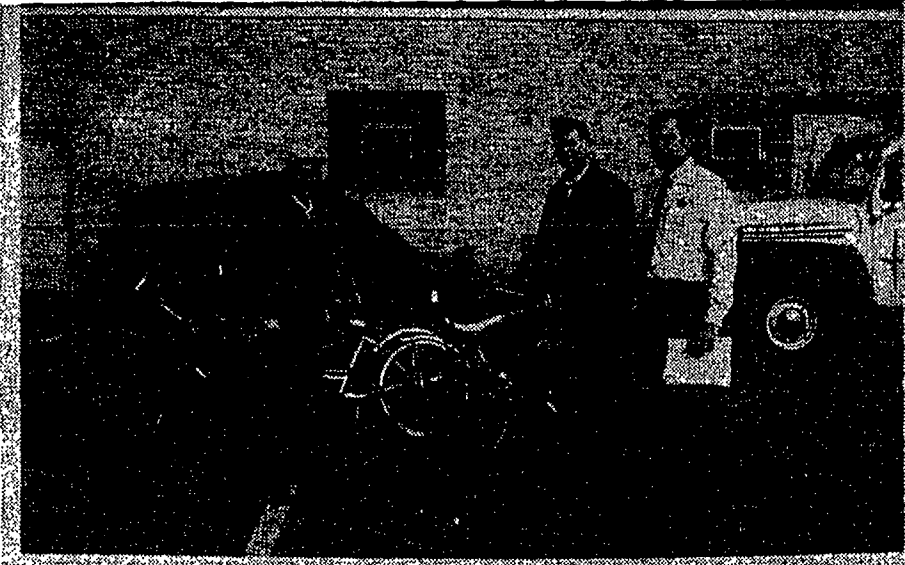
With a little fancy work by quarterback Blipp, Austin scored their first touchdown after the conversion the score was 7-0.

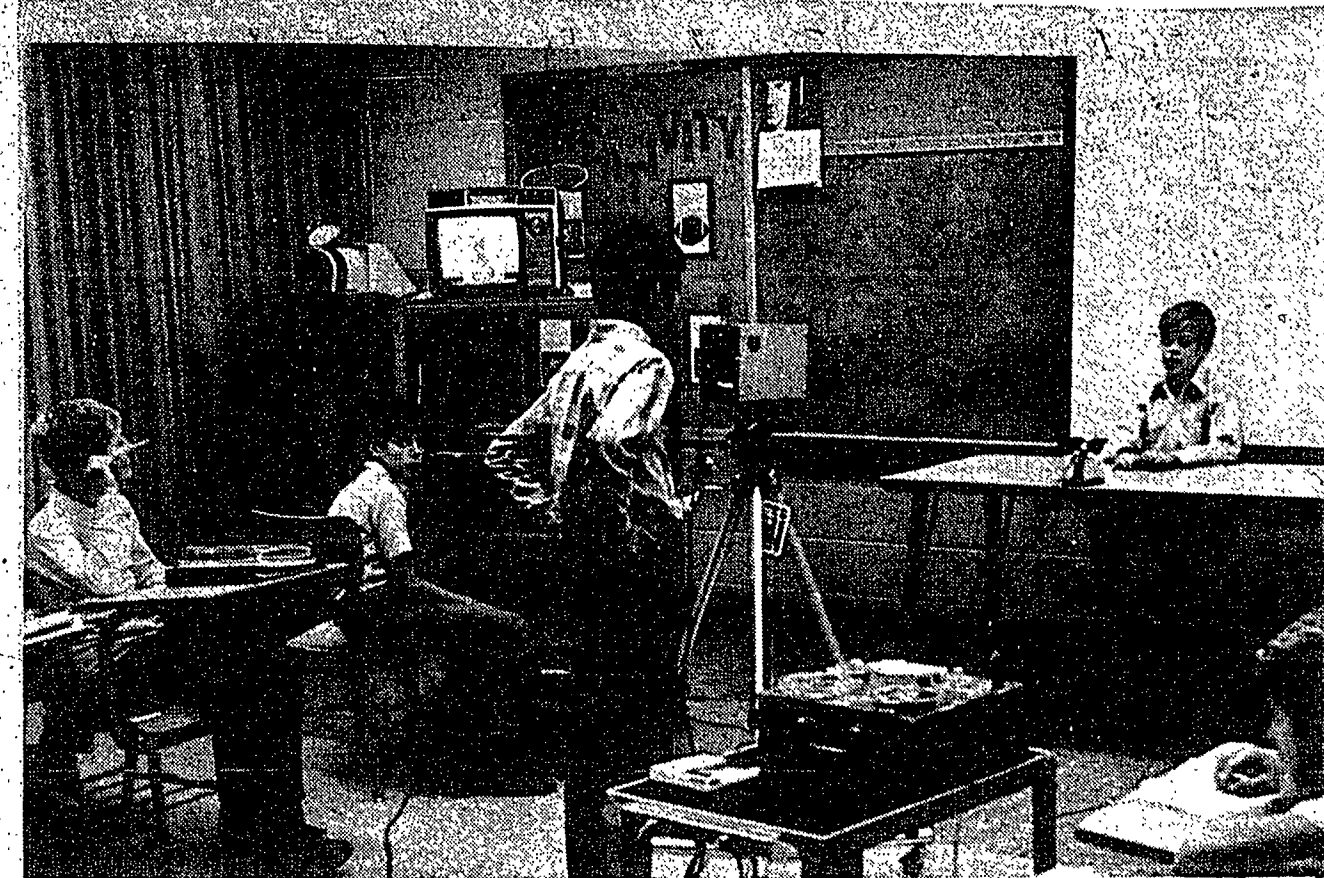


## Collecting Toys For Children

## TV Teaches At Golf

The newest teaching machine in District 67 - at Golf Junior High School in Morton Grove - is instant-playback TV.

The setup includes a TV camera, a monitor set and a videotape recorder. The value of the equipment is about \$1,500, according to Joseph Sullivan, Golf principal and chief architect of the V.T.R. (Video Tape Recorder) plan as a teaching aid in his school's classrooms.

With the device, as used first in the classes of Mary Jane Ziagos, language arts & social studies instructor, students in a communications study unit prepare commercials, (eighth grade) or short talks (seventh) or short talks (seventh) on a subject of their choice. But before the TV camera, the student's creation is videotaped, then played back for him or her to view along with the rest of the class. The critique or analysis that follows is thus much more personal, keener, more introspective, more immediate - and usually more candid.

The videotaped pupils own analysis of his own work and appearance on tape is perhaps the best thing to emerge from the plan.

Mrs. Ziagos, of Niles, feels that the use of V.T.R. not only is a fine motivational technique but that it also relates well to the pupil's environment - it's something they know and life.

However, she and school officials indicated that the TV setup, though a great deal of fun for the youngsters to operate and in which they can participate, is not a plaything but a serious educational tool subject to many aberrations and ills and mishaps in operation, the same ones that plague our many electronic devices in the modern world.

It's easy, too, for the instructor to lose the point of the whole thing and get lost in trying to improve techniques of the TV medium (make-up camera angles, etc.) incidental to her use of the V.T.R. device. Mrs. Ziagos indicated that teachers have to learn how to operate many devices, these days. They need to be tuned in electronically, or they'll be turned off academically. V.T.R., she feels, is the latest word in

a complex teaching world that includes mastery of overhead projectors, recorders, movie projectors, film-strip machines amplifiers, etc.

District Supt. William Strout, of Morton Grove, said about V.T.R., "Pupils learn quickly to recognize (and correct) poor speech habits, lack of poise, poor posture, etc. Our V.T.R. provides an instrument for immediate self-evaluation. It has many applications. The teaching staff is enthusiastic about putting it to use."

Principal Sullivan, of Northbrook, said: "We hope instant-playback TV will help the students improve their speech by allowing them to see themselves as others see them. Teachers will also use the playback for presenting lessons themselves and preparing lessons for all classes of a grade."

Use of V.T.R. will spread into other classrooms of the junior high as time and the equipment allow.

Frank Hren, physical education coordinator in District 67, looks ahead to V.T.R., use especially in tumbling and basketball, in fact, anything in which individual skills are to be bettered. Don Mitchell, instrumental music instructor, ventured that it might be valuable in such things as teaching correct embouchure for blowing an instrument, as well as the right posture for the instrumentalist. Elaine Uchiyama, French teacher, feels that there will be "immediate feedback" when her pupils are dramatizing dialogues via TV.

Terrance Murphy, art instructor, felt that taping demonstrations, for example, the silk-screening process, would eliminate the need for the second-and-third-time demonstration "live", thus making the procedure and clean-up less messy and not so time consuming. Adelaide Hess, vocal music teacher, has not yet decided where the TV setup will apply best to her instruction but "perhaps in chorus rehearsal".

Louise Ton, science teacher, felt that the TV could be used in connection with some experiments normally done only by the instructor. Television, par-

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# M.G. Firemen

Robert Kruger are studying for the same degree at DuPage County junior college.

These men attend school two nights a week on their own time. To obtain their degrees they must successfully complete a required number of credit hours in such varied subjects as fire extinguishment, the theory of combustion, fire inspections, hydraulics, mathematics, fire department administration and village administration. A full time student can obtain this degree in two years, but only being able to attend a couple of nights a week so as not to interfere with their normal fire department duties means that these men will not receive their degrees for approximately four years. Firemen Albert Pitts and Matt Stoklosa attended the pump and pumper operators school conducted by the University of Illinois Firemanship Training Division and held at St. Charles, Ill.

This school is intended to teach the finer points of pump and pumper operation to fire department personnel currently assigned to their operation and to men training to become department engineers. Firemen Pitts and Stoklosa are assigned as operators at the department's west side station at Harlem and Sherman. Firemen Bernard Brady and Norman Ruth attended the ninth advanced practical course for ambulance attendants, firemen and police on emergency aid and transportation, of the critically injured sponsored by the Chicago committee on trauma of the American College of Surgeons and held at the Chicago Fire Academy, 558 Dekoven St., Chicago, Ill.

Some of the many subjects covered are: mechanism of breathing, the airway, circulation, resuscitation, head injuries, shock, emergency childbirth, care of wounds, eye injuries, broken bones, dislocations, treatment and recognition of heart attacks, strokes,

diabetic disorders and other cardio-vascular disorders, poisoning, burns and the extraction of injured persons from wrecked vehicles, buildings and cellars or wells. All technical subjects are taught by professors and associate professors from such schools as Loyola School of Medicine, University of Illinois Medical School, Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago Medical School and the teaching unit at Cook County hospital.

Personnel who attend this course are required to have completed the American Red Cross advanced first aid course which Chief Hildebrandt stated all of his men have done with the exception of the two new members of the department who just reported for their first day of duty on Nov. 17, 1969. They will complete the Red Cross advanced course as part of their candidate training. Firemen Raymond Grah and James Roxburgh attended the school conducted at Oshkosh, Wisconsin by the Wisconsin Association of Mechanics for the Fire Service.

**Dist. 207 Seeks New Source Of Revenue**

A new source of revenue to reduce the Maine Township High School is being sought by the Board of Education of Dist. 207. At its monthly meeting Nov. 17, the board passed a resolution requesting municipalities that the majority or in part within the district's boundaries of share part of their state income tax monies with the school district.

IN PASSING THIS resolution, the board acted within the provisions of the new state income tax legislation which states that the funds derived from the income tax and returned to the municipalities and counties shall be used "solely for the general welfare of the people of the State of Illinois, including financial assistance to school districts." Copies of the board's resolution are being sent to all municipalities within the Maine High school district.

Present at the Board of Education meeting Monday night were four American Field Service exchange students now attending Maine High schools. The students, their foster parents and their sponsors, were presented to board members. Construction of the new learning resource center at Maine East is progressing satisfactorily and hopefully both projects will be completed and in use before the end of the school year.
