



## Left Hand VFW Offers

When you hear the state contributes \$525 to each student in Illinois public schools somebody is not telling it like it is.

Peter Struck, attorney for school districts 70 and 71, explained at last week's Niles Board meeting, the state merely guarantees each school district will have this \$525 minimum per student, and that the state makes up the difference between the amount of money residents in each district pay, and this \$525 base figure.

In school district 71 in Niles, enriched by industry tax monies, the district only receives a minimum \$45 from the state. Because assessed valuation of property in this district is high, and there are only about 800 students there, they have about \$100,000 assessed valuation behind each child. In addition to the low tax bills to residents they receive the most amount of money in the area primarily due to the ratio of low student enrollment to high valuation. The high valuation is due to the tremendous industrial complex in Niles' eastern area.

In school district 63, where the 6,000 students do not have a comparable assessed valuation, due to the lack of industry plus the greater number of people within the relatively small area, it must receive help from the state. It has been estimated District 63 children have about \$23,000 assessed valuation behind each child which necessitates an outlay from the state to meet the \$525 minimum. And even though the tax bills in District 63 are \$200 and up per home more than in District 71, the residents taxes go for more school buildings as well as for the educational costs for the children. Since there is no comparable industry, the state money plus increased taxes pay for the students' education.

School problems and issues may not make exciting reading but school matters probably affect more families and more concerns in our areas than any other community factors.

School districts are attempting to receive additional money from local villages which will be receiving state income tax money. It was estimated by Niles' Mayor Blase the village would receive about \$5 to \$6 per head in this new revenue and the legislature said some of this money could be passed on to local school districts. Blase mentioned the legislators were merely unburdening their responsibilities by passing the school problem to the cities and villages. He said Niles will consider the problem by sitting down with neighboring towns and finding their answer to a solution. In our areas we have several elementary school districts, as well as 2 high school districts, which desire the much-needed money. Considering Niles may only receive around \$175,000 rebate the splitting up the pie would seem a negligble amount. Still, if the school districts can receive moneys from each one of the towns they're affiliated with it could mean another \$100,000 per district if the villages chose to be magnanimous. As an example local districts can go to Morton Grove, Niles, Skokie, Lincolnwood, Golf, Des Plaines and Park Ridge for moneys. Elementary districts would likely share only in the villages they're involved with but the high school districts would be able to go to each one of these

division plans for a 5 acre tract in Jonquil Terrace by developer Ben Mattion is of much interest to residents in Niles Park Dis-trict, school District 64, as well as neighbors in Jonquil Terrace, the homeowners who live west of Milwaukee ave. between Howard st. and the area south of the Steinberg-Baum store at Oakton

Niles Park District is seeking

to purchase approximately 1.7 acres for a park; school district 64 which bought the property in the middle or late fifties for \$50,000 now desires to sell it for estimates of \$150,000 to \$250,000; former owner Ben Mattion sold the property to the listrict after it threatened to use condemnation proceedings but when it decided not to build a school there Mattion sought to re-buy the property at about the same original price he sold it for; the court had ruled in favor of Mattion but the school district has now appealed the verdict and all concerned are waiting the

The strange and complex case caused additional confusion at Niles Village Board meeting some weeks ago when builder Mattion came in with subdivision plans, in which the very mininum requirements for land usage, were used to create more than 20 lots for future buildings.

Appeals decision.

According to one park official the purpose of the plans was to record a specific number of home building there. It would enable the landowner to show the value of the property hased

at a village board meeting, after the park board had stated at the previous week's meeting no court decision had been reached on the matter, further caused confusion in the village. Actually, the plat was submitted, even though the decision was under appeal, which meant Niles Park District still could not act until the decision is determined as to who owns the property.

It is believed Niles Park District may indicate to the court its interest in part of the land, though such action is not likely to affect the decision's outcome.

The case likely centers around the school district's threat of condemnation which it is alleged resulted in its originally purchasing the land from the builder, Mattion. While the threat never went into a court case for condemnation, nevertheless the very act of using the threat, is the core of the entire

The right of a public body to use the act of condemnation to acquire private land is an ac-cepted right often used by public bodies. In the event the public body does not use the land for its intended purpose, in this case the building of a school, does it have a right to sell the land at an increased amount, and to profit by the sale? Since the public body has a right of mnation, not available to private persons, should the pro-



## Dist. 63 Request Tax Rate Increase

Residents of East Maine School District No. 63 will be asked to approve a 30 cent increase in the educational fund tax rate (from \$1.81 to \$2.11 per \$100 of assessed valuation) and a 17-1/2 cent increase in the building fund tax rate (from 37-1/2 cents to 55 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation) in lanuary, William Gurolnick, president of the Board of Edication, announced at the Nov.25 meeting of the Board.

## Bergquist Urges Tax Changes

Roy H. Bergquist, Republican candidate for State Representative in the 4th District today urged delegates to the Illinois Constitutional Convention to scuttle Mayor Richard J. Daley's plan for a payroll tax on suburbanites working in

"A new tax article for the state must be considered by the Con-Con delegates," Bergquist said, "but it should not include discriminatory taxation against the residents of surburban Cook County. We pay sales taxes which benefit the city of Chicago every time we make a purchase in the city.

"Most of us already pay higher real estate taxes than Chicago homeowners do. And a good part of our tax money goes to help pay for county welfare programs and County hospital patient care while the vast majority of the persons dents of Chicago."

The payroll tax proposal was introduced recently by Chicago's 10th ward Alderman John Buchanan who said he hoped the bill would be introduced in the state legislature. However, Daley said the tax plan would be placed before the Constitutional Convention which begins meeting in Springfield on Dec. 8.

"I hope the convention delegates quickly sidetrack this attempt to penalize people for working in the City of Chicago," Bergquist said, "If it ever goes before the General Assembly, I will certainly do all I can to defeat it."

Bergquist said Mayor Daley is pulling "a snow job" on the residents of Chicago by stressing that such a payroll would be paid by suburbanites working in the city. "Actually," Bergquist said, "a payroll tax such as this would have to be paid by everyone working in Chi-cago, even those living in the city. Daley is trying to lull Chicagoans into thinking that this is a tax only on those of us who live in the suburbs and work in the city. Even the mayor's budget director says this just isn't true."

Recently, on Oct. 21, the members of the Board of Directors of the Skokie Vallev Family Counseling Service and their husbands and wives met with the staff of the agency to hear informative talks on the counseling services the agency offers to individuals and famlies in need. Miss Clair Hahn, Executive Director of the agency presided at the meeting.

Miss Francis Philbrik. staff social worker described that people make their first comput with the agency by phone with many people make their own calls to the agency, a great number have interested friends or relatives, ministers, police youth officers, school counselors, etc. who make the first contact for them. She explained that the agency has two offices, one in Skokie and one in Evanston, but that all phone calls are received at the Evanston office, DA 8-2404.

She also happily reported that the all too familiar waiting list of the past has sharply declined due to an increase in the staff of the agency. Family Therapy worker, Mrs. Grace Halperin, told of striving for communimeeting with the entire family or sometimes just with certain members according to the situation. Communication was also stressed by Mrs. Virginia Foo. marital counselor. Whether she sees couples together or separately is determined by the circumstances. And sometimes when the marriage is beyond hope, counseling can help to adjust the couple to new, separate lives and seeks to lesson the adjustment for any children that might be involved. She said many children who are referred for individual problems by the schools, etc. often eventually involve their parents or their whole family because a troubled child generally is a symptom of a troubled home.

Mrs. Jacqueline Wolf descri-

bed her recent teenage groups that include both boys and girl from the Niles Township High Schools. In a basement room at the Evanston office — complete with beads, pillows, and posters - they have the opportunity of discussing their concerns about school, parents, dating, etc. with a young male social worker and Mrs. Wolf. A puppet was introduced by Mrs. Francis Arbetter, child counselor. The puppet is a familiar friend and conversation mate to many children that Mrs. Arbetter sees in therapy. Through this puppet and through play, she feels she has been able to reach many children who might never have been able to communicate. Finally, Miss Deane kraetsch spoke on individual therapy with adults.





The Diamond Jubilee of the village of Morton Grove will officially begin Dec. 24, 1969, on which date 75 years ago the suburb was chartered.


