



Commonwealth Edison Company announced today that it will spend almost \$3 million on its 1970 substation construction program in the north and northwest suburbs.

Les Milligan, vice-president of Edison's northern division, said the program will be carried out to boost the power capacity available to local residential and industrial custo-

"Transformers with a combined capacity of over 300,000 kilowatts will be installed this winter and spring at various substations throughout the division." Milligan said. "This means that by the summer of 1970 we will have added enough capacity at our substations to

serve the equivalent of nearly 225,000 more residential cusresidential customers.

Milligan said the utility will install 13 huge transformers at existing substations in Arlington Heights, Des Plaines, Niles, Northbrook, Palatine, Schaumburg and Skokie. Two new substations will be

placed in service in 1970 in Deerfield and Libertyville. Deerfield substation, located at Lake-Cook rd. near the Milwaukee Road right of way, will cost the utility over \$500,000 to complete. Two 33,000 kilowatt transformers and related switching equipment will serve Deerfield as well as parts of Northbrook. The power center will be able to handle the po-

wer requirements of over 50,000

The Libertyville substation will cost about \$200,000 to build. It will consist of a 20,000 kilowatt transformer and associated switching equipment. Located near Route 21 and Route 45, the substation will be capable of serving over 15,000 residential customers.

"Our division is serving one of the fastest growing areas in Commonwealth Edison Company's service area," Milligan said. "Expansion of these substations will help to meet the increasing electric demand in the north and northwest suburbs. Electric demand for the first 9 months of 1969 increased more than 11 per cent over the similar period a year ago.

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

His progressively greater responsibilities during the last decade have given him broad experience in virtually all facets of college. administration. He has served in nearly every academic capacity in three of the nation's outstanding community colleges - Cuyahoga Community college, Cleveland, Ohio: Flint Community college, Flint, Michigan, and

Harrisburg Area Community college, Harrisburg, Pennsyl-

Since Sept. 1966, Dr. Koehnline has been Dean of Instruction at Harrisburg Area Community college. During this period, the Community college has moved from its first temporary campus to a new campus, adequate to serve 5.000 students in the area of the state capitol. 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

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

A unique service for patrons f the Niles Public Library has been initiated by the North Suburban Library system, the library cooperative located in Morton Grove and serving 28 member libraries in the northern suburbs.

Articles which occur in back issues of magazines may be requested at the library. These requests are forwarded to a centralized pool of microfilm that is housed in the Morton Grove Public library. A copying machine prints an enlarged image on standard paper and the requested article is then mailed directly to the patron.

Central Serials service as the operation is called has concentrated on obtaining the back files of magazines indexed in Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature and Poole's Index which most libraries use extensively in locating magazine articles used for reference and research
