## New Dress Guidelines For Maine Hi

The New Year will bring new dress guidelines for Maine Township High School students. This was the statement made by Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of Schools, at the regular monthly meeting of the District 207 Board of Education held Monday, Dec. 15, in the Faculty Study at Maine East.

The superintendent told a crowd of over 150 teenagers and adults attending the meeting that officers of the Student Councils of the three Maine high schools, and their advisors, have been working with him since October of this year in developing recommendations for a revision of the current dress guidelines. Dr. Short said

that he expects administrative action regarding this matter soon after the first of the year.

Dr. Short told the Board and the visitors that changing styles, recent court decisions and the advice of the Board's attorney indicate that the parental role long played by schools in such matters can no longer be maintained. "However, we trust that our students will dress and groom themselves in an appropriate manner and that, at all times, their dress and grooming will reflect good taste," Dr. Short stated.

In other action the Board of Education was advised that construction work at Maine East, Maine North, and the new administration building continues on schedule. Roy O. Makela, chairman of the Board's Building and Grounds Committee, said that the target date for completion of Maine North is still September, 1970; for Maine East construction, April, 1970; and for completion of the administration building, Jan. 15, 1970.

In a report concerning Maine North, Mr. Makela informed the Board that discussions continue regarding annexation and water for the new high school. He said that a meeting will be held on Jan. 6 at which he, Dr. Short, and Robert Wells, principal of Maine North, as well as representatives from District No. 63, will discuss with Mayor Behrel of Des Plaines

and Mayor Blase of Niles problems related to annexation.

The Board approved a resolution authorizing the extension of an agreement for an exchange of property with Ridgewood Cemetery until March 31, 1970. The exchange involves roads leading to and from Maine North.

In other action the Board of Education accepted a report from its special insurance committee, chaired by William Wuehrmann, Park Ridge board member. The report recommended increased coverage for property, increased limits for automobile liability, boiler, and fidelity bond on employees. The increased annual premium for the extended coverage is \$1,943.00.

Acting on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the Board approved the processing of a three year lease-purchase agreement with the Friden Division of the Singer Corporation for an automatic purchase order writing system.

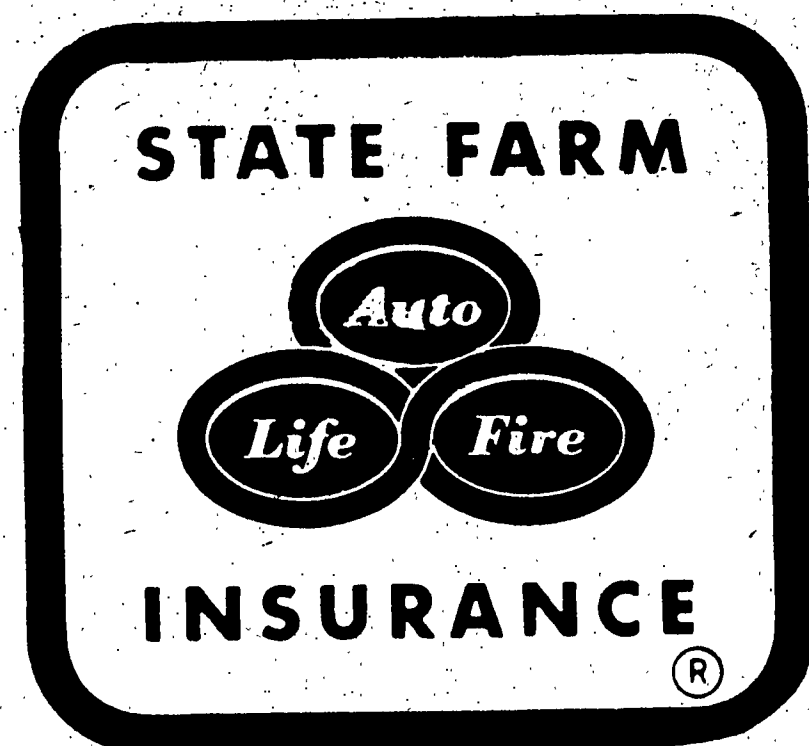

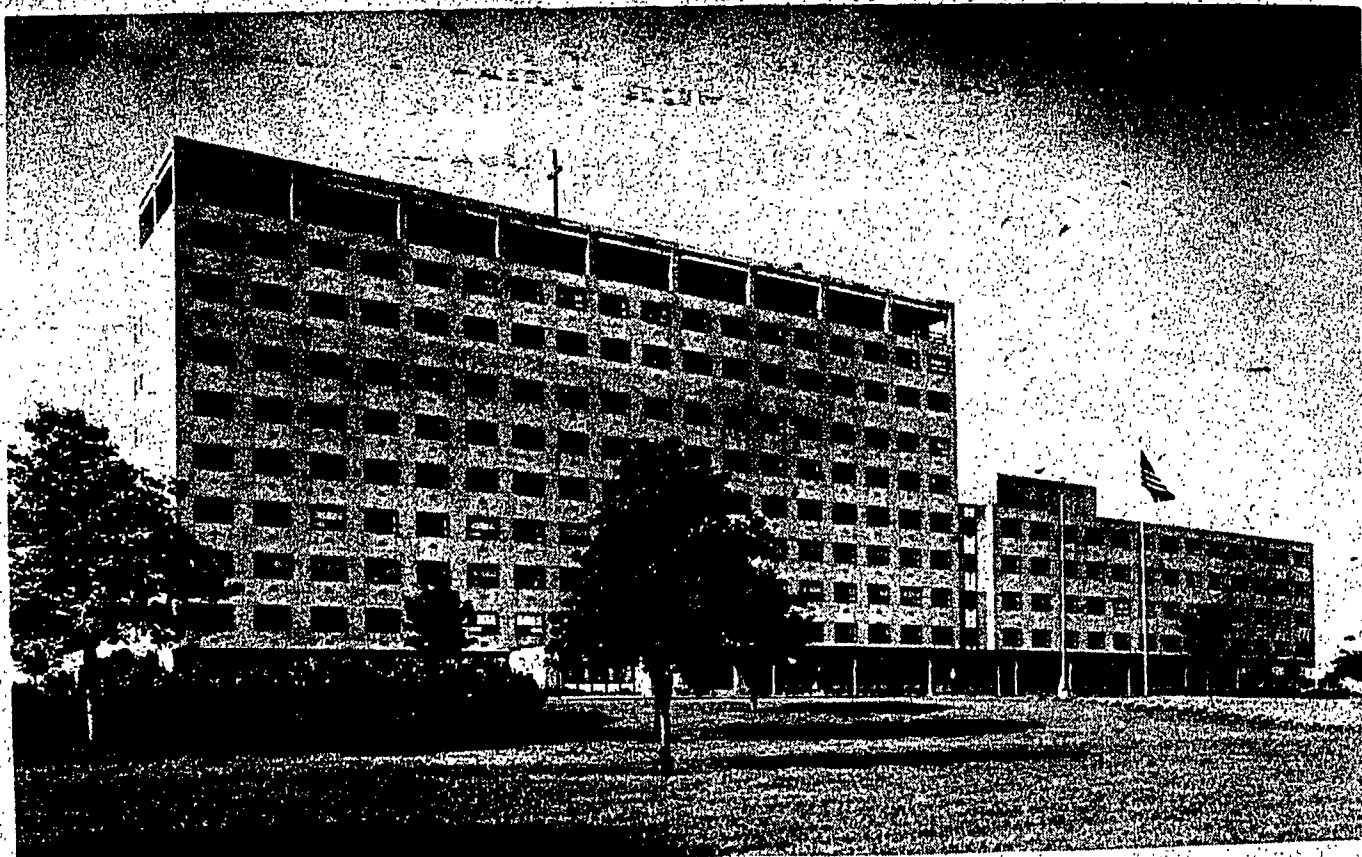

## 10th Anniversary Open House

Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, will note its tenth anniversary with an open house for the public on Sunday, Jan. 4, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The hospital was dedicated Christmas Eve, 1959, and the first patients came to Lutheran General Jan. 4, 1960.

Facilities normally closed to the public will be toured, such as the hospital's famous hyperbaric oxygen center, one of the largest of its kind in the world. Hospital personnel will be on hand to explain the facilities and equipment. A slide presentation "This Is Lutheran General Hospital" will be shown.

Twelve years ago, the hospital's location at 1775 Dempster Street was nothing but prairie, grass. Today it is the site of one of the largest and most modern hospitals in the United States.

The public can get an inside view of how a large, modern hospital operates during the 10th anniversary open house at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, Sunday, Jan. 4. The hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The hospital was dedicated Christmas Eve, 1959, and the first patients were admitted Jan. 4, 1960.

Facilities normally closed to the public will be toured, such as the hospital's famous hyperbaric oxygen center, one of the largest of its kind in the world.

Other facilities open to the public will be the cardiopulmonary laboratory, medical laboratories, medical records department and the physical and occupational therapy departments.

Hospital personnel will be on hand to explain the facilities and equipment and to answer questions from visitors. The slide show "This Is Lutheran General Hospital" will be shown. The public will leave the open house with a better understanding of the complex world of modern medicine.

Lutheran General hospital was dedicated Dec. 24, 1959, during the hour-long television program, "Inn of Many Rooms." The program told the Christmas Gospel in the setting of the new hospital. An estimated million television viewers made the program part of their Christmas celebration.

With 316 beds and 32 basins, Lutheran General was one of the largest voluntary, non-profit hospitals ever built at one time in the United States. Today it has 665 beds.

Since the hospital opened its doors Jan. 4, 1970, it has served

over 400,000 people and has continuously expanded its facilities to provide medical care for the citizens of the wide area which the hospital serves. In 10 years the hospital cared for 130,000 adult and children inpatients, 170,000 emergency patients and 90,000 outpatients and has delivered 23,000 babies. The hospital has provided over 1,300,000 patient-days of service.

Lutheran General developed and has continuously practiced its program of Human Ecology, which is the understanding and treatment of the human being as a whole person and in light of his relationship to God, to his family and to the society in which he lives.

The hospital's tradition goes back to the nineteenth century when Lutheran Deaconesses from the old world came to America to establish hospitals, homes and social agencies. Among those who came were a small group of Norwegian Deaconesses who founded Lutheran Deaconess hospital in Chicago. Lutheran Deaconess hospital, which closed its doors in May, 1968, after over 60 years of service, was the mother hospital and sponsor of Lutheran General hospital.

## Commonwealth Edison's 1970 Construction Program

Commonwealth Edison Company announced today that it will spend almost \$3 million on its 1970 substation construction program in the north and northwest suburbs.

Les Milligan, vice-president of Edison's northern division, said the program will be carried out to boost the power capacity available to local residential and industrial customers.

"Transformers with a combined capacity of over 300,000 kilowatts will be installed this winter and spring at various substations throughout the division," Milligan said. "This means that by the summer of 1970 we will have added enough capacity at our substations to

serve the equivalent of nearly 225,000 more residential customers."

Milligan said the utility will install 13 huge transformers at existing substations in Arlington Heights, Des Plaines, Niles, Northbrook, Palatine, Schaumburg and Skokie.

Two new substations will be placed in service in 1970 in Deerfield and Libertyville. Deerfield substation, located at Lake-Cook rd. near the Milwaukee Road right of way, will cost the utility over \$500,000 to complete. Two 33,000 kilowatt transformers and related switching equipment will serve Deerfield as well as parts of Northbrook. The power center will be able to handle the po-

wer requirements of over 50,000 residential customers.

The Libertyville substation will cost about \$200,000 to build. It will consist of a 20,000 kilowatt transformer and associated switching equipment. Located near Route 21 and Route 45, the substation will be capable of serving over 15,000 residential customers.

"Our division is serving one of the fastest growing areas in Commonwealth Edison Company's service area," Milligan said. "Expansion of these substations will help to meet the increasing electric demand in the north and northwest suburbs. Electric demand for the first 9 months of 1969 increased more than 11 per cent over the similar period a year ago.

Also endorsed at the same meeting, was the entire State ticket, headed by Adlai E. Stevenson, III and the County ticket, headed by George Dunne,

President of the County Board, put forth by the Democratic Party. The organization further endorsed the following persons and their respective offices: for U. S. Congressman of the 13th Congressional District - Edward A. Warman; for the 13th District State Central Committeeman - Raymond V. Krier; for State Senator of the 4th Senatorial District - Alan Scheffres; for State Representatives from the 4th Senatorial District - Aaron Jaffe and Kenneth Lindquist.

## First Niles-Maine Community College President

The appointment of Dr. William A. Koehnline as the first president of the new Niles-Maine Township Community College was announced by the new college's Board of Trustees at their regular meeting held Dec. 16, 1969, at Maine South High School.

The Board anticipates that Dr. Koehnline will be available to assume his duties in mid-January. Many problems will face the new president, including interim and permanent college facilities, staff and faculty appointments, and development of a curriculum for the short and long range needs of the community of 300,000 persons.

The presidential search was climaxed by Dr. Koehnline's appointment. During the search the Board screened 150 letters of application, resumes and other pertinent material, including papers submitted on the "Philosophy of a Community College." A large number of these applicants were personally interviewed, their references checked and campuses visited for a first-hand review of their operations. The applicants considered came from 26 different states and submitted credentials from 49 major universities.

Dr. Koehnline is a seasoned administrator and educator, and is well qualified for the presidency of the Niles-Maine Township Community College. His progressively greater responsibilities during the last decade have given him broad experience in virtually all facets of college administration. He has served in nearly every academic capacity in three of the nation's outstanding community colleges - Cuyahoga Community College, Cleveland, Ohio; Flint Community College, Flint, Michigan, and

Harrisburg Area Community College, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Since Sept. 1966, Dr. Koehnline has been Dean of Instruction at Harrisburg Area Community College. During this period, the Community College has moved from its first temporary campus to a new campus, adequate to serve 5,000 students in the area of the state capital. Dr. Koehnline has served as assistant president to Dr. Clyde Blocker, President of Harrisburg and one of the most renowned and innovative educators in the Community College movement.

He received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, and his Doctorate from Ohio State University. Mrs. Koehnline holds an M. Art, as a means of education and as related to technology, is among Dr. Koehnline's professional and avocational interests. He is a collector of graphic art, with special emphasis on the work of William Blake and Max Ernst. Mrs. Koehnline shares in her husband's interests.

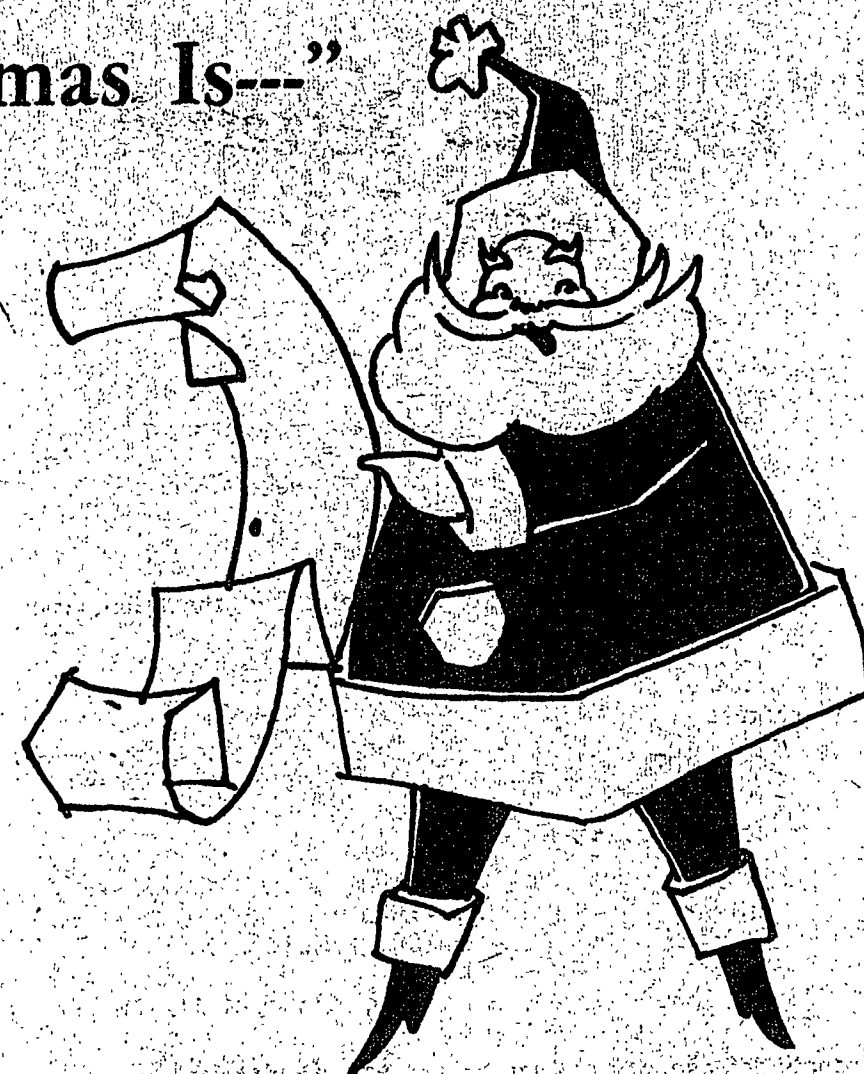

## Notre Dame Basketball Record 7-0

Notre Dame's streaking hard-court five dashed past two more opponents last weekend to run this season's record to 7 and 0.

Friday evening, the Dons made the long trip to Wheaton in a game with St. Francis, a team previously unbeaten in the SCC. The Spartans indicated that they were emotionally up for the contest in their pre-game drills, but the Green and White took command of the action in its early stages and never relented. Coach Hinger's talented squad exploded for 9 points before the surprised Spartans were able to put the ball through the hoop once.

## A Unique New Service

A unique service for patrons of the Niles Public Library has been initiated by the North Suburban Library system, the library cooperative located in Morton Grove and serving 28 member libraries in the northern suburbs.

Articles which occur in back issues of magazines may be requested at the library. These requests are forwarded to a centralized pool of microfilm that is housed in the Morton Grove Public Library. A copying machine prints an enlarged image on standard paper and the requested article is then mailed directly to the patron.

Central Serials service as the operation is called has concentrated on obtaining the back files of magazines indexed in Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature and Poole's Index which most libraries use extensively in locating magazine articles used for reference and research

purposes. Among current holdings are: Aerospace Technology; Atlantic Monthly back to 1857; Business Week; Education Digest 1949 to the present; Harvard Law Review, 1887 to the present; Scientific American; Time Magazine; as well as about 100 other titles of the most used periodicals in the public library.

If the Central Serials service does not own a title that is requested, it refers the request to a network of reference and research centers throughout the state. These centers, the Chicago Public Library, the University of Illinois library, the Illinois State Library and the University of Southern Illinois library have a wide range of resources and are able to supply articles of a more technical and specialized nature.

The service should prove to be a great boon to anyone working on a research project.

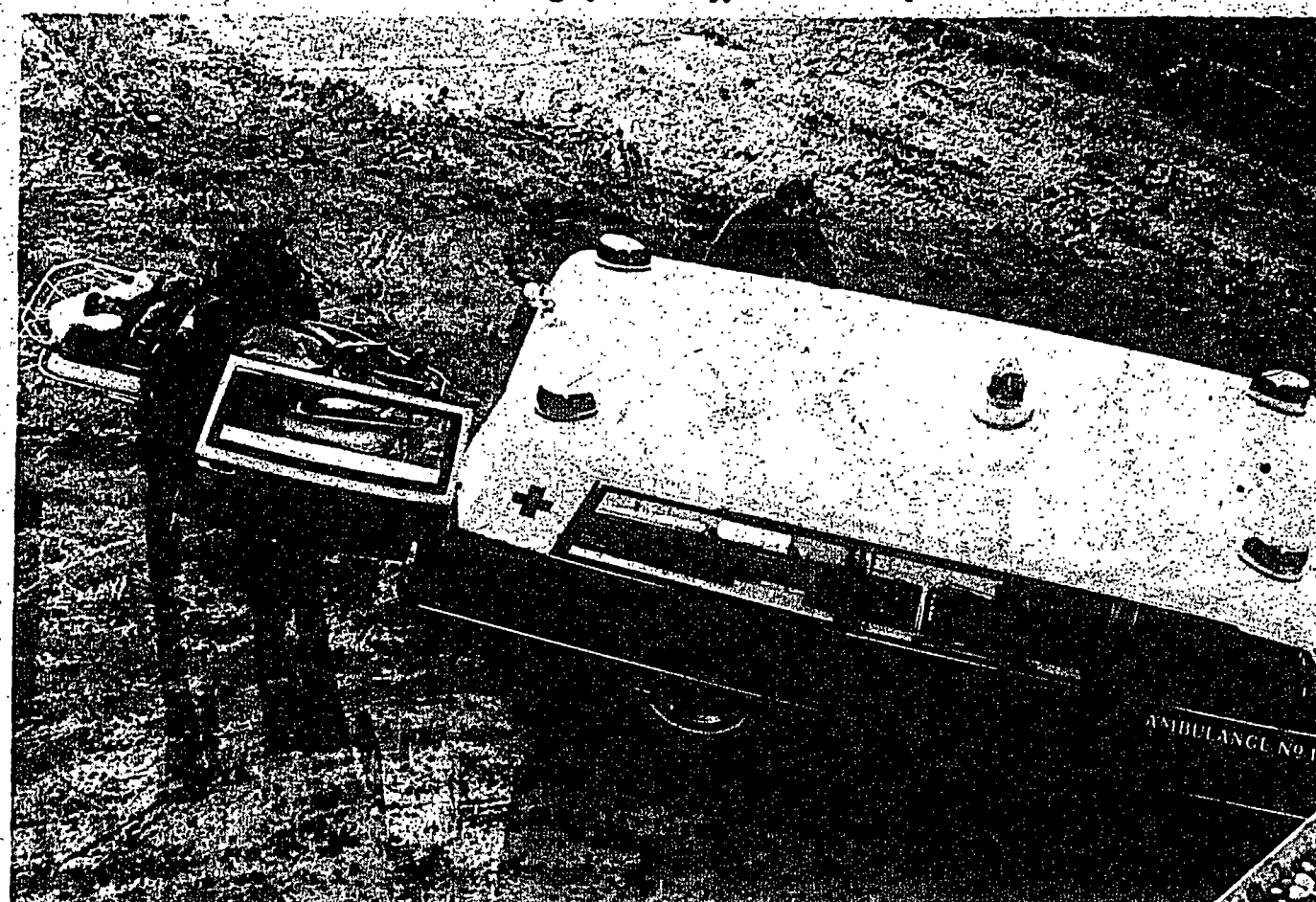

### Niles Snorkel "On The Job"

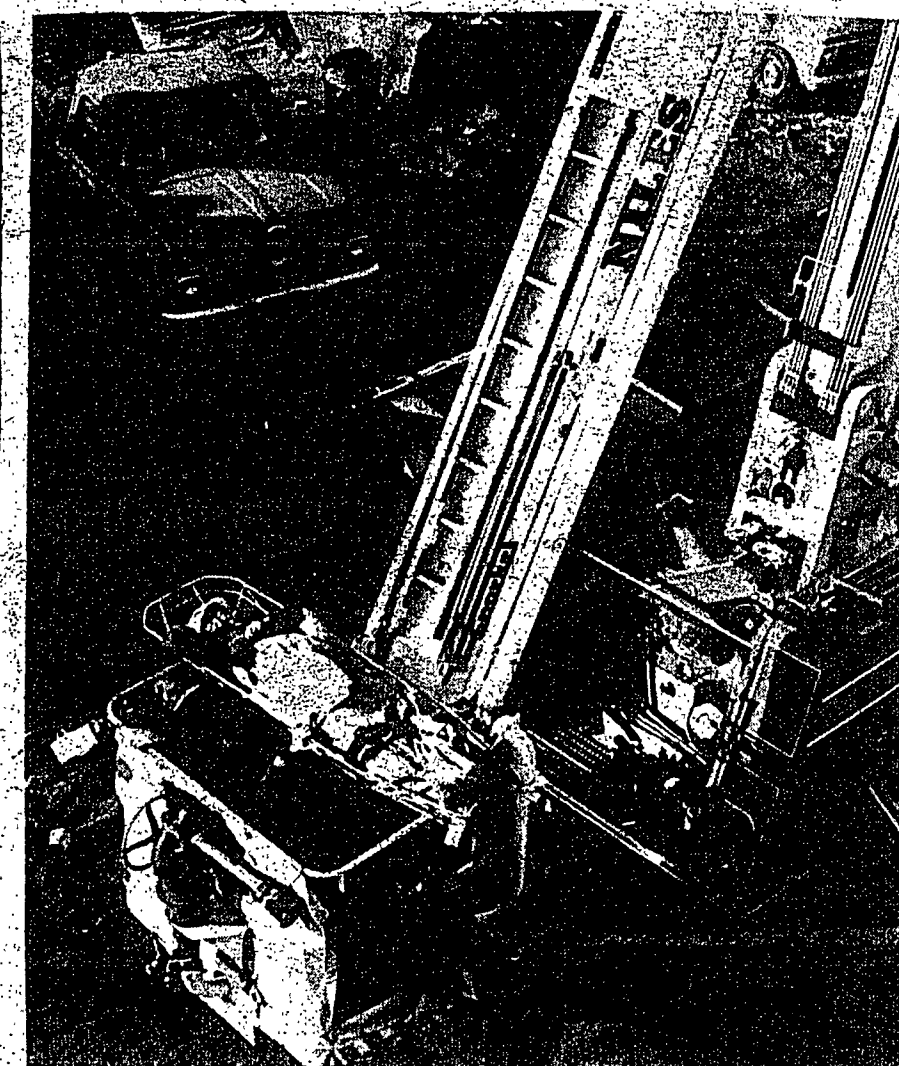
The versatility of the Snorkel as a rescue vehicle was demonstrated last Thursday when the Niles Fire Department was

called upon to remove an injured construction worker from the roof of a factory building to a waiting ambulance.

The injured worker was Robert Penney, 33, of 1940 Newcastle ave., Chicago, an iron worker. He suffered an apparent broken right leg when he was struck by a falling metal beam while working on the 35-foot high roof of the American Printers and Lithographers building, 6701 Oakton st. Workers are constructing an addition to the building.

When Niles firefighters Vito Lesloski and Tom Marcotte,



of Ambulance 1, arrived, they realized that removing the victim in a conventional stretcher down a ladder would be a hazardous task. They called for Snorkel Truck 1, which is equipped with a Stokes basket, a metal mesh stretcher, contour shaped so that an injured person may be securely strapped into it with a minimum of jostling during transportation.

Snorkel 1, which is equipped with an 85 foot boom, arrived commanded by Lt. James Foerster and manned by firefighters Norbert Ludkowski, Cal Radway and Robert Altstadt. While they raised the Stokes basket to the roof in the snorkel basket, the ambulance crew comforted Pen-

ney whose leg had been splinted. Penney was then secured in the stretcher and removed to the ambulance below. He was treated for his injury at Lutheran General hospital.

Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, in praising his men for their efficiency, said that firefighters and their equipment must be capable of performing many duties besides firefighting.

# Pre-School Vision And Hearing Tests



The Suburban Low Incidence Development of Exemplary Services (SLIDES) and Niles Elementary Schools, District Number 71, announce that they will conduct preschool vision and hearing screening program on Jan. 21, 22 and rescreening Jan. 23, 1970 for all children in the community age 3 through 5 years.

The program will be conducted at Niles Elementary School South, 6935 W. Touhy ave., Niles, (Phone NI 7-9752) from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in co-operation with the Illinois State Department of Public Health, the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness, and Niles Elementary School District. The purpose of the screening is to locate the preschool age children with possible visual or hearing problems and to identify children needing special educational services because of any limitations.

If the difficulty persists, the parents will be requested to take the child for complete diagnostic examination.

It is necessary to register children for the screening programs. At that time the parents will be given a vision readiness game to play with the children so that they will be prepared for the screening. Registration will be held on Jan. 14, 1970 at Niles Elementary School, 6935 Touhy ave., Niles, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The Office of SLIDES and Niles Public Schools invite all parents of preschoolers to take advantage of this preschool vision and hearing screening program which is offered as a free public service to the children.

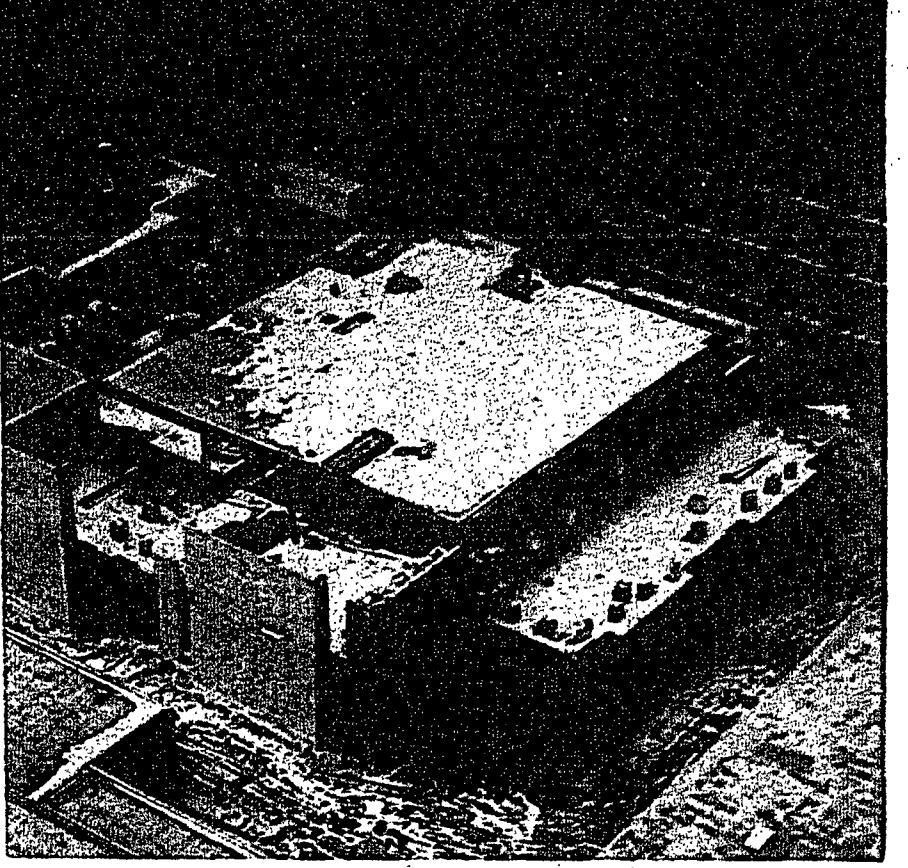

# Senior Citizens Foster Grandparents Program

Chicago's Foster Grandparents Program is proving what love can do, according to Dr. Maria Piers, a nationally known expert in early childhood development.

Children who are ignored, cut off from adult contact and love, can face a "total deterioration of the intellect" with lifelong crippling effects, Dr. Piers said.

"In Foster Grandparents we have a preventive program that can salvage children from the pernicious influence of neglect, can save dropouts," continued Dr. Piers, who is dean of the Erickson Institute for Early Childhood Education and a member of the Foster Grandparents Program's technical advisory committee.

"We have seen the positive results of the daily, loving contact between children and adults in the Foster Grandparents Program and know that this can make a terrific difference," she said, "but the program should be carried out on a much larger scale."

"Every institution or agency caring for children could benefit from the program."

The Foster Grandparents Program, administered by the Division for Senior Citizens of the City's Department of Human Resources, is conducted under a grant from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, U.S. Administration on Aging, through the Chicago Committee on Urban Opportunity.

With the assignment of four Grandparents to start work this month at the DePaul Settlement and Day Nursery, 2145 N. Halsted st., 54 Senior Citizens now are working daily at six institutions and agencies where they visit, play with and love children who need special adult attention.

Everyone concerned with the program has praise for it.

"We have seen in the two years that Foster Grandparents have been working that children are benefitting immensely from the program," said Robert J. Ahrens, director of the Division for Senior Citizens. "The Foster Grandparents themselves benefit not only from added in-

come but from the worthwhile, rewarding activity in which they are involved."

At the Illinois State Pediatric Institute, 1640 W. Roosevelt rd., 19 Grandparents work with severely retarded children aged 2 through 12. They frequently accompany the children for vigorous outdoor play or engage them in quieter exercise and activity.

"The results obtained here have been very rewarding," said Thomas Herzog, R.N., director of nursing service at the institute.

"While the activity is very important, perhaps an even larger benefit is the undivided attention and personal contact with one consistent adult."

Foster Grandparents also are working at the Chicago Child Care Society, 5467 S. University ave., Cook County Children's hospital, 700 S. Wood st., Mary Crane Nursery school, 2905 N. Leavitt st., and Chicago State hospital, 6500 Irving Park blvd.

In a nursery school setting, Foster Grandparents comfort small children who are fearful and lonely on being away from home for long periods every day; they dry tears and help make lunchtime happy; they sometimes take children on short outings, as to a nearby library.

A Grandparent can give undivided attention to the child who is overwhelmed by group activity.

Most of the Foster Grandparents have raised families of their own and many have backgrounds that include work with children, although this is not a requirement for employment.

They must be 60 years old and have other income limited to \$1,600 for an individual or \$2,100 for a couple. They work four hours each day and are paid \$1.60 an hour.

Each Grandparent attends a 10 day orientation course before assignment and in-service training sessions held monthly.
