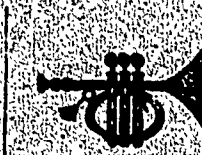

Dist. 63 Dismisses Law Suit

The board of education of East Maine School District No. 63 passed a resolution at their Dec. 16 meeting to dismiss a damage suit against Morris Suson, owner of Suson Associates, Inc., and Walter Kassuba, president of the Kassuba Development Co., after approving the terms of the out-of-court settlement.

The suit, which charged violation of agreements, involved the construction of apartment buildings on a site at Ballard and Greenwood, known as the WJJD site, in unincorporated east Maine.

Major points of the settlement were listed by Allen Schwartz, attorney for the board of education of District 63.

Walter Kassuba has agreed:

1) That neither he nor future owners of the Ballard-Greenwood site will construct 3 bedroom apartments on the site. However, the buildings presently under construction will be completed as begun.

2) A \$7,500 donation will be made to District 63.

3) To construct a 4 ft. wide sidewalk on the south side of Ballard Road from Greenwood ave. to the western edge of the WJJD site.

4) To make available to the residents of District 63 a walking area through North Shore Trace and other of his properties to school sites.

5) To make every effort to seek incorporation for properties owned by him.

Morris Suson has agreed:

1) On or before Dec. 31, 1976 to execute a deed transferring to District 63 a 4 acre site of land which the district finds suitable for a school site.

2) To donate \$7,500 to District 63.

3) To construct sidewalks on the Key East Apartment site to give access to children walking to the Mark Twain school from Golf Road.

4) To erect a fence within 15 days around a pond lying north of the Mark Twain school.

5) To make every effort to seek incorporation for his properties.

William Gurolick, president of the District 63 Board, called the settlement a "Satisfactory outcome" and of great benefit to the people of District 63.

We have gained \$15,000 in cash, which far exceeds the legal expenses incurred by the suit; a 4 acre site which can be used in the future for school construction, and a guarantee for safety improvements, Mr. Gurolick said.

He also complimented the work of Attorney Allen Schwartz and the Law Firm of Hertz, Coven, Robbins and Schwartz.

Groundbreaking For Niles Nursing Home

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the Niles Nursing Home, 8333 Golf rd., Niles was held on Tuesday, Dec. 30 at 10 a.m. The 5 story building, situated on over one acre of land, will contain 284 beds on completion and is the first of a chain of nursing homes and shelter care facilities to be managed by Community Nursing Homes of America, Inc., a group of physicians, nursing home administrators and community business leaders. The officers of Community Nursing Homes of America, Inc. are Dr. Seymour Herschman, president, Jacob Nayman, treasurer and Sidney Weinschneider, secretary.

Theodore E. Buenger, president of Dovenmuehle, Inc., obtained the permanent financing for the nursing home from the Federal National Mortgage Association and the mortgage of over 2 million dollars is being guaranteed by the Federal Housing Authority. Architect for the nursing home is Shayman and Salk and the builder is Missner Construction company.

The Niles Nursing home will

give all forms of care; nursing, geriatric, convalescent, post-operative and rehabilitative. These services will be integrated with the surrounding communities to benefit the elderly in the area and give additional care facilities to the patients.

Taking part in the groundbreaking ceremonies was Nick Blase, Mayor of Niles, Kenneth Scheel, Village manager, Ben Mankowsky, Niles Building commissioner, Dr. Jerome Podgers, Niles Health commissioner and representatives of Dovenmuehle, FHA and Community Nursing Homes.

Chick Evans college scholarships for the 1970-71 school year have been awarded by the Western Golf Association to 32 outstanding Chicago-area boys.

The new Evans Scholars bring to 2,729 the number of former caddies who have received scholarships since this program was initiated by famed amateur golfer, Chick Evans, in 1930. Each scholarship covers full tuition and housing and is renewable for four years. Its value ranges from \$3,500 to \$7,500.

Blase Reviews The '60s

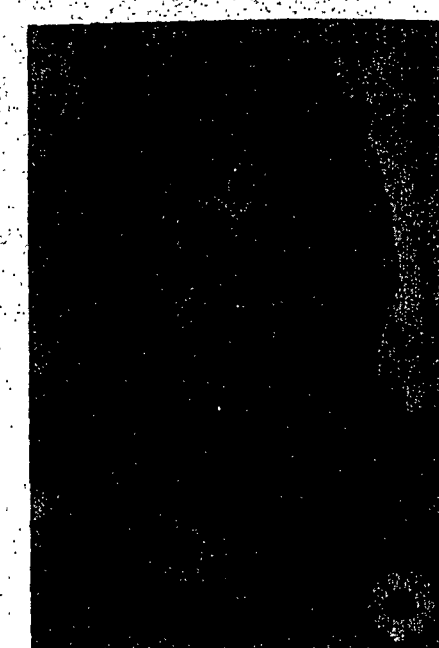

Dist. 63 Referenda Resolution Passed

A formal resolution calling for a special election Jan. 27 to vote on an increase in the educational fund and building (operation and maintenance) fund tax rates was approved at the Dec. 16 meeting of the board of education of East Maine School District 63.

The voters are being asked to approve a 30¢ increase in the educational fund tax rate from the current \$1.81 to \$2.11 per \$100 of assessed valuation and a 17-1/2¢ increase in the building (operation and maintenance) fund tax rate from 37-1/2¢ to 55¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation. No more than 5¢, however, will be levied for the building (operation and maintenance) fund the first year or a total of 35¢ per \$100 assessed valuation.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voting precincts will correspond to the nine elementary school attendance areas.

The tax rate increases being requested will provide the minimum amount of funds needed to meet the expenses of maintaining the current educational program for another two years, according to William Gurolnick, president of the Dist. 63 Board of Education.

East Maine School Dist. 63 is currently operating with a deficit of \$855,272.19 in the educational fund and a \$120,550.51 deficit in the building (operation and maintenance) fund. These two funds make up 88% of the district's budget. Total cash deficit for these two funds comes to nearly a million dollars. Each year the deficit has grown.

The school district has reached the point, however, when additional funds must be forthcoming in order to continue the current educational program, according to Superintendent Frank Dagne.

Last year the district borrowed a million and a half dollars, in the form of tax anticipation warrants, to cover its near one million dollar deficit and tax collections which had been earned but not received.

The district will reach a point sometime in 1971, unless the proposed increases in tax rates are approved, when it will be impossible to sell a sufficient amount of tax anticipation warrants to cover the deficit.

The tax rate increases will not eliminate the entire deficit, James Bowen, Dist. 63 Business Manager, has said, but they will enable the district to maintain a survival position.

Specifically, the increase in the educational fund tax rate will finance such items as salaries (all except custodians) instructional supplies and equipment, lunch supervision,

health, music, and library programs and others.

The building (operation and maintenance) fund rate increase will pay for custodians' salaries, the maintenance and operation of school buildings, utilities, etc. The building (operation and maintenance) fund has no connection with school construction.

Residents of Dist. 63 gave their approval in the last referendum held on March 11, 1967, for sale of \$4,945,000 in bonds for school construction to carry out a five-year construction program.

Since then, the Adlai E. Stevenson school and an addition to Washington school have been constructed and the land has been acquired and construction begun on the first phase of a junior high school, the Apollo school, which is scheduled for completion by next September.

Some \$2,295,000 of the construction bond authorization remains. However, it will take three or four years to receive these funds (as bonds already sold are retired and the assessed valuation increases), and taxpayers are assured that they will not be asked for additional funds for construction until these bonds can be sold, according to Mr. Gurolnick.

Funds received from the increase in both the educational and building (operation and maintenance) funds will be used to meet educational expenses, he pointed out.

Since some expenses listed within these two funds can be transferred from one fund to the other, the board of education intends to assign non-instructional items, currently in the educational fund because of lack of funds in the building (operation and maintenance) fund, to the building (operation and maintenance) fund thereby freeing additional monies in the educational fund for educational expenses.

The board of education reduced this year's budget in most categories where cuts could be made without damaging the educational program, Mr. Gurolnick said, and further cuts are contemplated for the next year whether or not the tax increases being proposed are approved.

All costs of education, however, are climbing upward parallel with and sometimes ahead of other costs, according to Supt. Dagne. With the current revenue, he says, Dist. 63 could not next year pay its teachers the salary increases already built into the salary schedule for experience and additional educational credit, much less meet even the cost of living increases.

Park District Reports On Ice Rinks

In order to properly prepare a base for an Ice Skating rink, we must have had at least 36 continuous hours of near zero temperature which will freeze the ground sufficiently so that it will not absorb the water when applied. After the ground has been frozen enough, a crew of at least 3 men must, during the late evening and early morning hours, spray (not flood) water on the area at intervals. This must be halted if there is a snow fall. Snow, mixed with water causes a slush which freezes and makes a rough surface.

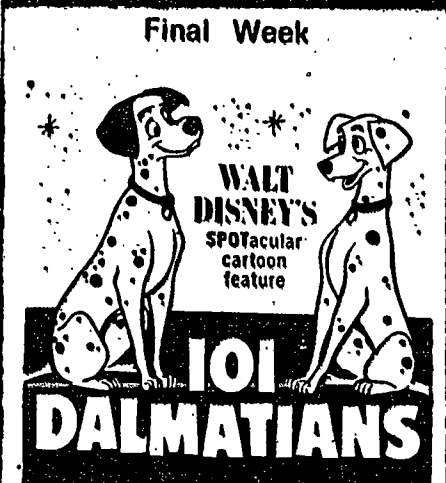
In order for all rinks, including the Hockey rink, to be established and maintained for good skating, at the same time, it would require the services of 4 crews of 3 men each, 4 vehicles with 4 hoses, etc. Inasmuch as manpower is difficult to obtain for this type of work during the hours mentioned, we must take one Park site at a time to build a rink.

(Some crews have worked 22 hours straight through to establish a Rink because the men would not be available the next day.)

All this preparation can be lost overnight if the temperature rises above freezing and the whole routing must be started over from the beginning. This has happened many times during past seasons. Cooperation from the weatherman is the most important part of building a rink.

You have to see dangers to avoid them, says the Chicago Motor Club-AAA. That's why all-around visibility is essential to safe driving. Make sure that your windshield wipers and defroster are in top condition. And always clear all snow and ice from the front, rear and side windows of your car before you get underway.

The election of new officers of the medical staff of Forest hospital has been announced by Morris B. Squire, administrator.

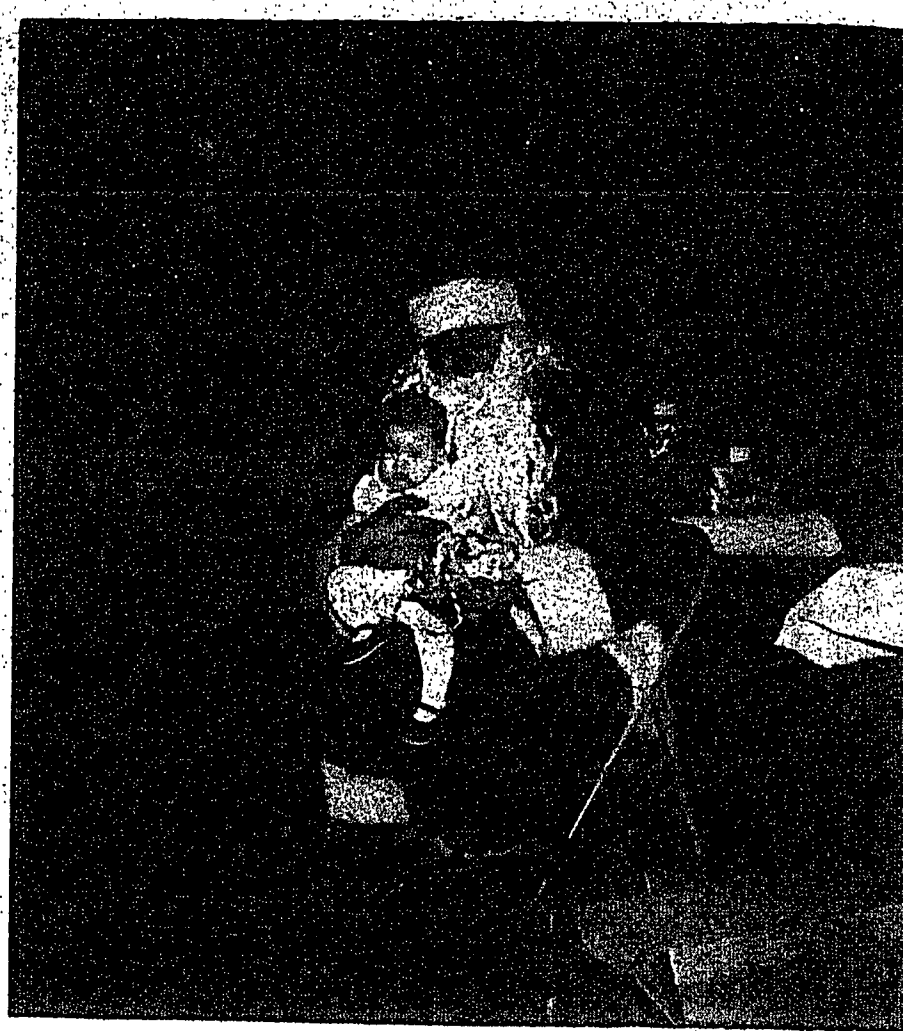

Bergquist For Township Tax Collection

Roy H. Bergquist, Republican candidate for State Representative in the 4th District, today termed a recent Circuit Court decision prohibiting township collectors from collecting taxes, "another tactic of the City of Chicago to dominate the suburbs."

"Fortunately," Bergquist said, "The Illinois Supreme Court has wisely delayed carrying out the Circuit Court order until the justices have time to consider the matter fully."

The decision signed by Circuit Judge Daniel J. O'Brien last week, declared that only the Cook County collector may collect taxes for the county's various taxing agencies.

"This would have deprived the 30 suburban townships of between 6 and 7 million dollars a year to which they are entitled under the 2% fee set up

by State law as payment for collecting taxes from county residents outside Chicago," Bergquist explained.

"This order would have taken from the townships a major source of revenue," he said "and forced some townships to levy their own taxes."

Bergquist said that many suburban school districts would be hurt by the ruling because some townships share the tax fee revenue with the school systems.

Although Judge O'Brien found the fee allowed the suburban township collectors unconstitutional, Bergquist said, he failed to bar the fee collected for taxes for the City of Chicago.

"The State Legislature approved this township collection fee," Bergquist said, "and the courts permitted it for all these years. This matter should be a legislative function and the courts should not be allowed to upset it."

"I hope the Supreme Court upholds the appeal and overrules the O'Brien decision. If the Supreme Court approves Judge O'Brien's ruling, then the Constitutional Convention should re-establish the suburban townships' rights to that tiny 2% rebate on their own tax money when the State constitution is revised."

The Military Chairman announced that he was sending two pound boxes of candy as Christmas gifts from the men's club to the 16 men and women parishioners who are in service.

Dist. 63 Request State Tax Rebate

In an effort to locate additional funds to ease its ever-increasing financial shortage, East Maine school District 63, along with other local school districts, is seeking to persuade the villages within its boundaries to allot a portion of the money they will receive from the new state income tax to the schools.

The board of education of Dist. 63 passed a resolution at the Nov. 25 meeting requesting that the villages of Niles, Morton Grove, Glenview and Park Ridge and County of Cook allocate funds in the form of block grants to Dist. 63.

Donald Stetina, assistant superintendent in Dist. 63, was dispatched to the Niles board meeting on Nov. 25 to represent Dist. 63 in discussion of allocation of the new state income tax funds.

The legislation which authorizes a state income tax contains a provision that funds derived from the income tax shall be used "solely for the general welfare of the people of the State of Illinois, including financial assistance to school districts, any part of which lie within the municipality or county, through unrestricted block grants for school purposes carried out within the municipality or county making the grant."

Questioned about the possibility of actually receiving a portion of the funds, however, Dist. 63 administrators expressed pessimism. The language of the new income tax bills, Mr. Stetina noted, make them permissive, so that the villages may or may not choose to contribute funds to the school districts.

In other action, the board approved a resolution to be filed with the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals objecting to the rezoning of a piece of property located on Glendale rd., 300 feet west of Glendale rd., in unincorporated Maine Township, from R-4 single family

residence to R-6 general residence.

The petition lists a number of reasons for Dist. 63's objection. The first reason: "The rezoning change would influence a zoning change to multiple development into adjacent vacant land. The petitioners expert witness, George Kranenberg, testified at the Zoning Hearing that if this map amendment is granted, it could be a precedent for multiple apartment zoning in the 35 acres of vacant land adjacent to the subject property."

Another point made in the petition is that: "The intensification of the population will cause additional hardships upon the School's resources and facilities which now are at the breaking point."

Allen Schwartz, attorney for Dist. 63, noted that the school district has been appearing at rezoning hearings to object to rezoning which might be detrimental to the district for many years. But, he pointed out, while the school district now has the right to appear and be heard at a rezoning hearing, it does not have the statutory authority to take its objections into court.

With the filing of an objection, William Grolnick, president of the Board noted, Dist. 63 has gone about as far as it is permitted to go in objecting to the rezoning of a piece of property.

The Board also authorized James Bowen, secretary of the Board, to write letters to the appropriate governmental bodies to seek a stop light at the intersection of Dempster and Cumberland.

In an educational report, Dr. Henry Alexander, assistant superintendent for curriculum, reported that last year's evaluation of the district's inservice program showed that the attitudes of teachers in Dist. 63 toward educational change has been significantly effected by the inservice program in a positive manner.

Bergquist said, "shows that this was a planned attack on the governor."

"We are fortunate," he added, "that we have Con-Con delegates who saw through this obvious partisan move by young Mr. Daley." The delegates defeated Daley's motion by an overwhelming vote of 71 to 42. Bergquist singled out Des Plaines delegate Anne Evans for special praise.

"Anne ran as an independent in the Con-Con race in Des Plaines," he said, "just as I am running as an independent Republican for State Representative in the March 17 primary."

"She was elected without organized party support and I am sure her work in helping draw up a new State constitution will make those who supported her proud they did so."

Bergquist also hailed the election of Samuel W. Witwer of Kenilworth as Con-Con president. "Witwer is an excellent choice," Bergquist said.

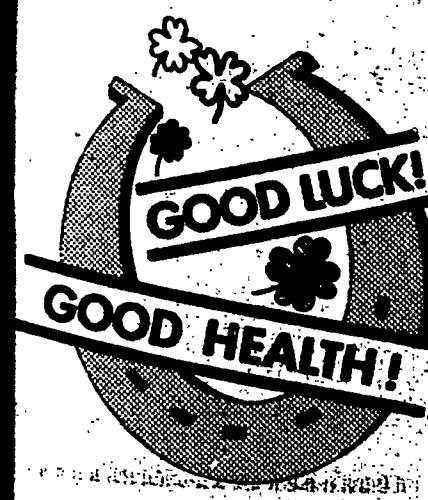

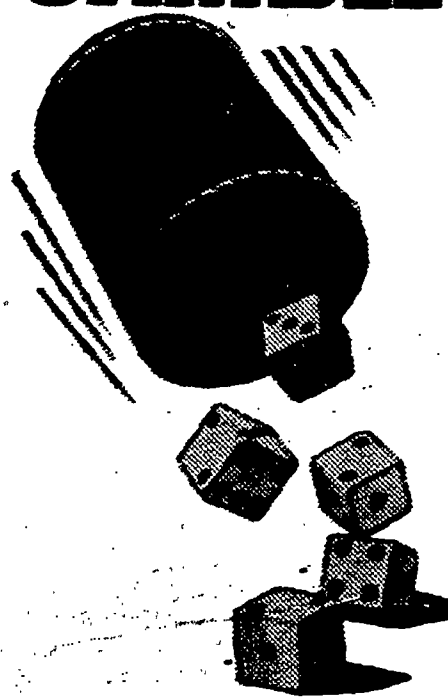
