#### \$350,000 Too High From The Left Hand By David Besser Bids Rejected Editor & Publisher

District 63 residents trudge to the polls Tuesday to vote on an increase in the educational tax fund and in the building (operating and maintenance) fund. It is estimated the increase will cost residents with \$25,000 homes an additional \$35 yearly while residents with \$50,000 homes will receive a tax increase of \$70 annually.

As a 17 year resident of the district I must say its painful, pathetic and frustating to keep pushing taxes up. And as a resident who has 4 children going thru the school system I know it's necessary, important and must be supported,

The supporting of these referendums is really a vote of confidence given to the school administration and the school board. There are few residents who keep abreast of Board meetings and administrative problems in the district. Thus, the sole criteria for voting must be based on the worth of the program presently in the district. Since most of us feel the education in the district is excellent it must follow that this excellence must be supported with more dollars.

There is little doubt older residents should have been more active 10 years ago when the encroachment of multiple dwellings first were talked about here. Then it was important to annex the unincorporated areas into the surrounding incorporated villages. The zoning laws of these towns would have prevented the hodge podge of multiple dwellings in the district, which would have lessened the burden of the school district. Many people proposed this, Mayors rather impotently spoke of the issue, feeble editorials suggested such a plan, and I former school board member, Earl Epstein, spoke of this need continuously. But there was no leadership in the community and today's residents are now paying for this burden.

Taxpayers everywhere, and particularly in District 63, are now locked into a situation which they cannot escape. Mounting opercosts and increasing salaries must be met if the educational level here is to keep pace. There is no alternative. We must pay the bills.

A lady at the Oak PTA meeting last week posed the question, 'Where are all these spiraling increases going to leave people on fixed incomes? Only last week local residents were told about a 30% water rate increase and an increase in refuse disposal rates here.

While we don't know of an answer to the lady's question we must wonder out loud why Niles can't either decrease the \$35-\$50 real estate tax residents pay to the village, or eliminate the utility tax, Morton Grove has taken off the latter tax in a community which receives much less revenue from sales tax than Niles.

Niles trustee Keith Peck told us last week Niles may be able to clear up all its indebtedness around 1980, which indeed is significant. It indicates a very prosperous town is able to meet all future bills with today's revenue. But what is also suggested by the remark is today's residents will be paying off ALL of the bills for tomorrow's residents. Somehow, we believe a middle ground might be reached which would give tax relief to today's residents, and let tomorrow's Nilesites share in the cost of the many new facilities of recent years.

The ever-increasing tax squeeze here will eventually see an exodus which would be forced on people, who helped build these communities, but won't be able to enjoy the fruits of their efforts.

While village officials are reluctant to lower village and utility taxes, because industry contributes to them, it must follow that industry, just the same as residents, deserves these same tax reliefs.

It might behoove village officials to have financial experts, such as Ed Benjamin, make a study of ways to relieve the tax burden, or at least try to plan for spreading the burden over the future years. School officials and all taxing bodies are on this same tax crisis precipice, and should attempt to seek some answer for tax making precipice, and should attempt to seek some answer for tax making and soning for tax problems. If we can hire experts for planning and zoning and engineering and education certainly we might consider similar studies for easing the burden on today's residents who are being looked to

Leske and park president Jerry Sullivan said the project will have to be "re-vamped." Commissioners said the unsuccessful bidding will cause a delay of a few months. Gerber told the Board there will be a March 1 increase of \$7 per ton for steel and wages will also go up resulting in higher bids the next time around.

Resident John Ellin, 8028 Merrill, said he was present at recent meetings and friends who bid on the project told him there were at least 2 changes in the specs every week after the specifications were made known which he said may have contributed to the higher bids.

While the park commissioners did not choose to be quoted the architect, Zelman Alper, received implied criticism for the problem. Leske said there had been foot dragging on presenting the specs for bids since last summer when the plans were expected to be fin-
