District 63 residents trudge to the polls Tuesday to vote on an increase in the educational tax fund and in the building (operating and maintenance) fund. It is estimated the increase will cost residents with \$25,000 homes an additional \$35 yearly while residents with \$50,000 homes will receive a tax increase of \$70 annually.

As a 17 year resident of the district I must say its painful, pathetic and frustrating to keep pushing taxes up. And as a resident who has 4 children going thru the school system I know it's necessary, important and must be supported.

The supporting of these referendums is really a vote of confidence given to the school administration and the school board. There are few residents who keep abreast of Board meetings and administrative problems in the district. Thus, the sole criteria for voting must be based on the worth of the program presently in the district. Since most of us feel the education in the district is excellent it must follow that this excellence must be supported with more dollars.

There is little doubt older residents should have been more active 10 years ago when the encroachment of multiple dwellings first were talked about here. Then it was important to annex the unincorporated areas into the surrounding incorporated villages. The zoning laws of these towns would have prevented the hodge podge of multiple dwellings in the district, which would have lessened the burden of the school district. Many people proposed this, Mayors rather impotently spoke of the issue, feeble editorials suggested such a plan, and I former school board member, Earl Epstein, spoke of this need continuously. But there was no leadership in the community and today's residents are now paying for this burden.

Taxpayers everywhere, and particularly in District 63, are now locked into a situation which they cannot escape. Mounting operating and building costs and increasing salaries must be met if the educational level here is to keep pace. There is no alternative. We must pay the bills.

A lady at the Oak PTA meeting last week posed the question, "Where are all these spiraling increases going to leave people on fixed incomes?" Only last week local residents were told about a 30% water rate increase and an increase in refuse disposal rates here.

Niles trustee Keith Peck told us last week Niles may be able to clear up all its indebtedness around 1980, which indeed is significant. It indicates a very prosperous town is able to meet all future bills with today's revenue. But what is also suggested by the remark is today's residents will be paying off ALL of the bills for tomorrow's residents. Somehow, we believe a middle ground might be reached which would give tax relief to today's residents, and let tomorrow's Nilesites share in the cost of the many new facilities of recent years.

The ever-increasing tax squeeze here will eventually see an exodus which would be forced on people, who helped build these communities, but won't be able to enjoy the fruits of their efforts.

While village officials are reluctant to lower village and utility taxes, because industry contributes to them, it must follow that industry, just the same as residents, deserves these same tax reliefs.

It might behoove village officials to have financial experts, such as: Ed Benjamin, make a study of ways to relieve the tax burden, or at least try to plan for spreading the burden over the future years. School officials and all taxing bodies are on this same tax crisis precipice, and should attempt to seek some answer for tax problems. If we can hire experts for planning and zoning and engineering and education certainly we might consider similar studies for easing the burden on today's residents who are being locked into a tax squeeze.

Educational - Operating Increase

DIST. 63 VOTES ON TUESDAY

On Tuesday, Jan. 27, the residents of East Maine School District No. 63 will go to the polls to vote on proposed increases in the educational and building (operation and maintenance) fund tax rates.

Approval is being requested at a special school tax election set for Jan. 27 for a 30 1/2% increase in the educational fund tax rate from the current \$1.81 to \$2.11 per \$100 assessed valuation and a 17-1/2% increase in the building (operation and maintenance) fund tax rate from 37-1/2¢ to 55¢ per \$100 assessed valuation. No more than 5¢, however, would be levied for the building (operation and maintenance) fund for the first year. The total cost for the first year (tax bills mailed April, 1971) will be 35¢ per \$100 assessed valuation.

The funds being sought will provide the minimum amount needed to meet the expenses of continuing the current educational program for another 2 years. William Gurolick, president of the District 63 Board, has stressed.

East Maine School District No. 63 is currently operating with a total cash deficit of nearly a million dollars; a \$855,272.19 deficit in the educational fund and a \$120,550.51 deficit in the building (operation and maintenance) fund. These two funds make up 88% of the district's budget.

Funds derived from both the educational and building fund tax hikes will be used to meet educational expenses, according to Mr. Gurolick.

The Board of Education reduced this year's budget in categories where cuts could be made without damaging the educational program, he says, and further cuts are contemplated for next year even if the tax increases are approved.

While the full 30 1/2% increase in the educational fund would be levied the first year, the 17-1/2% increase in the building (operation and maintenance) fund would be levied at 5¢ the first year, 10¢ the second year, 15¢ the third year and the full 17-1/2% the fourth year. The increase would be included in the tax bills mailed April, 1971.

A resident of East Maine a home with a market value of \$30,000 will pay an additional \$3.50 a month in taxes with passage of the tax increases being sought to maintain the educational program and to meet rising costs of education in the district.

Polling places will be open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. for the special school tax referenda scheduled Tuesday, Jan. 27 in East Maine School District No. 63.

The voting precincts this year coincide with the attendance areas of the 9 elementary schools in District 63. Parents will vote at the elementary school attended by their children. Residents of the small Washington school attendance area will vote at Washington school.

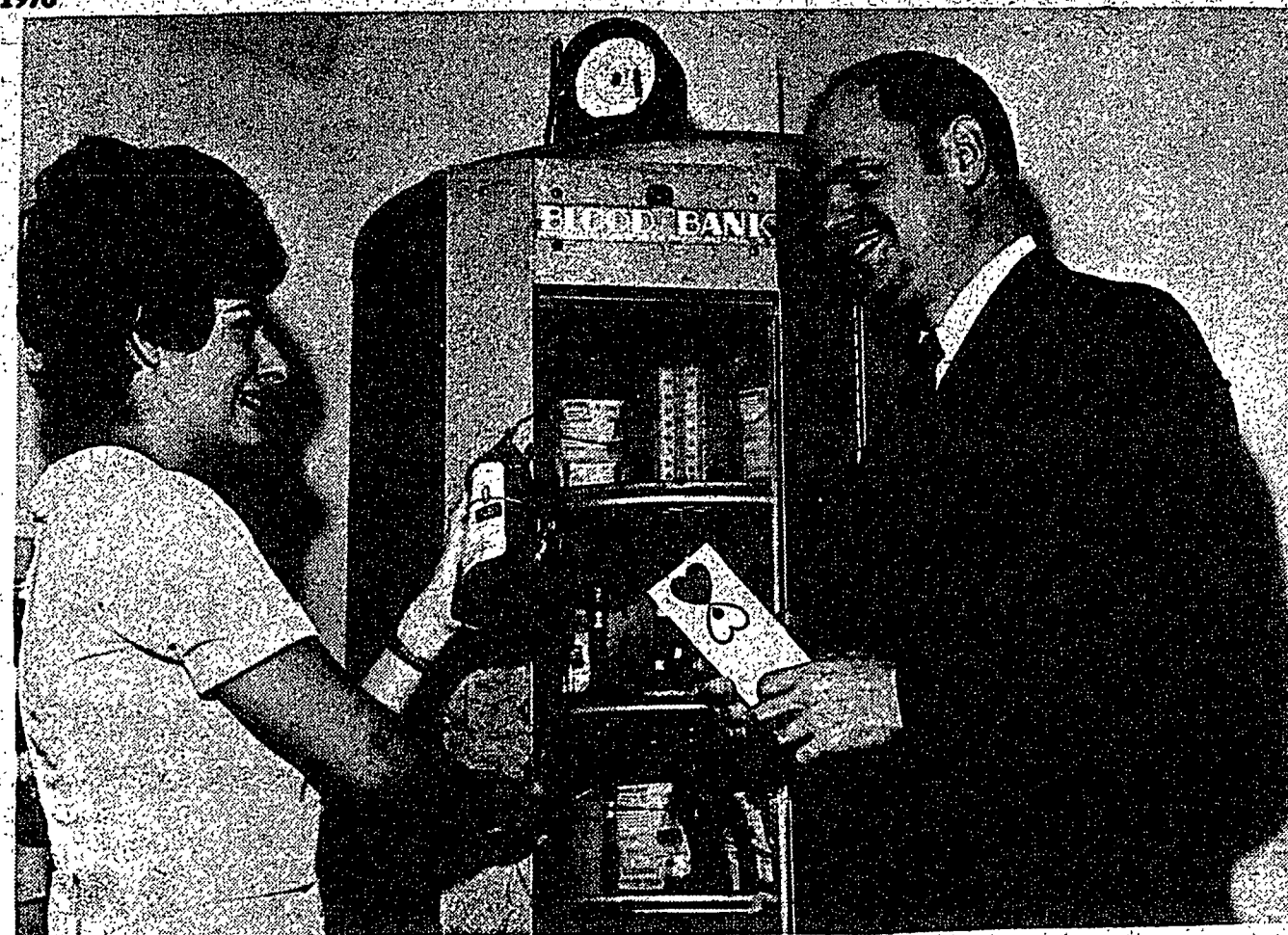

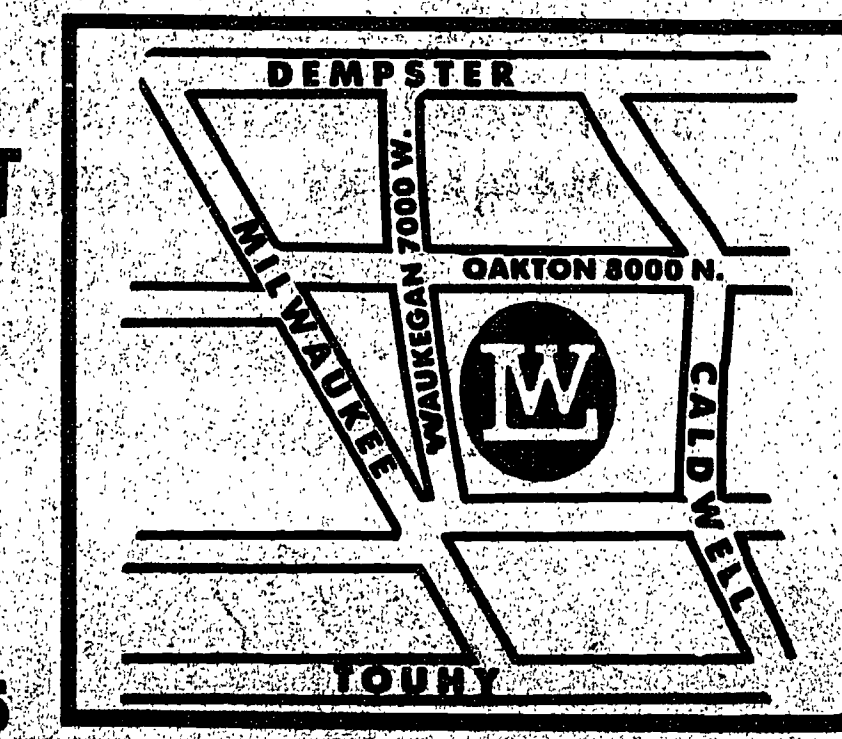

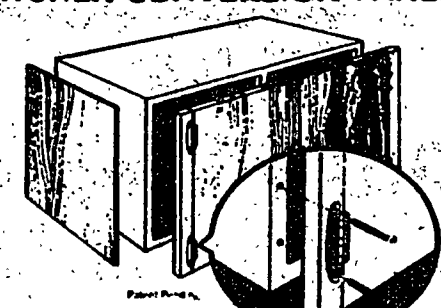

Let's Check Our Own Backyards?

Dear Sir:

Though their primary concern was school population, the mothers of District 63 could receive a beautification award for deterring the rezoning of land for multi-family dwellings if one considers the following experience.

During an all day tour of Chicagoland to view the use of land for multi-family dwellings I saw many attractive developments. When told that we would next see some unfortunate mistakes, I found myself in my own neighborhood touring the Suson-Cassaba developments between Golf and Dempster. We were made aware of these flaws; no architectural amenities - tight ugly; streets of poor quality and planning - simple grid plan which gave no thought to safety despite obvious high population of young children; over-head wiring; cramped, cluttered backyards indicating critical lack of storage; no thought given to en-

vironment - space around buildings within zoning ordinances but not of much use to tenants; no thought given to privacy - tenants have to walk past the fronts of other units (motel style) to get to their own, no parking provisions.

It sort of warms the cockles of your ticky-tacky heart to know that people from most of our states (including Hawaii), England, the Philippines, and South and Central America have been bussed here to study a bad example of land use.

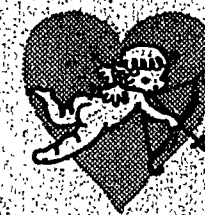
Blase also seeks the position of State Central Committeeman out of the 10th Congressional District.

ished. Alper also travels overseas monthly and the park board implied they were not getting the attention for the project as they expected. The park board believed a member of the architectural firm would be present at the meeting but Alper called in sick and no other member of his firm was present.

A meeting next Tuesday night with the firm will discuss what can be done to adjust to the new problem.

Obviously, the plans will have to be re-done, causing an additional delay. The increased costs caused by the long delay will be an additional cost factor, though the money for the project is now in certificates earning around 5 1/2% and expected purchase of treasury bills will increase the rate by another 2%.

The original referendum was for \$750,000 for construction of buildings as well as furnishings. A federal grant increased this figure to \$1,120,000. The Grennan Heights gym, the addition to the administration building, and the Oakton Manor building plus architectural fees reduces the remaining money to about \$650,000, to be used for the sports complex in the Ballard-Dempster Park.

In other Tuesday park actions the park board reported it will tell the zoning board it will not OK the special use zoning to extend the Pleasant View Nursing Home next to Jozwiak Park unless it is made definite that no curtailment of park programs will result from the addition.

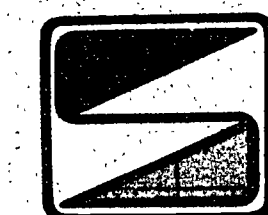

Jaffe Concerned By Demo Screening

(Political News Release)

"I am deeply disappointed and concerned with the undemocratic, Tammany Hall type screening process chosen by some of the leadership of the Niles Township Democratic Coalition," charged Aaron Jaffe, Democratic Committeeman and candidate for election this year.

"I am further convinced that the rank and file membership of the NDC, when they are informed of the facts, will not condone these methods."

"In December," stated Jaffe, "I was contacted by telephone by Mrs. Ruth Jacobsen, who asked if I wished to appear, along with other candidates for elective office, at an NDC screening meeting at the home of Sidney Solomon. I indicated my willingness to present myself at such a meeting."

"After this conversation, I heard nothing until Jan. 7, when I received a telephone call from Mr. Solomon, who informed me of the following: (1) the screening would be held at a different place, (2) only four people would be invited to appear;

Curtis MacDougall, Kenneth Lindquist, Aaron Jaffe, and my opponent for Democratic Committeeman, (3) that a letter of invitation to this screening would shortly be sent to the total NDC membership and that under the same cover there would be included a letter from my opponent appealing for support."

"I asked why Edward Warman was not going to be screened, Mr. Solomon stated that the NDC didn't feel it necessary. That the organization would, in all probability, endorse Warman's opponent without hearing from Warman."

"I then requested and was refused the same privilege as my opponent of sending my ap-

peal for support in the NDC screening invitation.

"When I voiced my belief that the screening was stacked against Warman and Jaffe, Mr. Solomon was not at all reticent about admitting that the executive committee had already indicated its preference of candidates."

"In view of this conversation with Mr. Solomon, it plainly appears that the leadership of the NDC has no intention of conducting a bona fide screening for the benefit of its membership. Sadly, the NDC, which presents itself to our community as a watchdog of democratic processes and proponent of Democratic Party reform, has in fact resorted to river ward politics of the worst order."

"In just the few months since I have been committeeman, I have tried sincerely to broaden the base of the Democratic party in Niles Township. I have conducted my organization on have made significant strides in developing an organization that is representative of the Democratic community. These are facts which are acknowledged by the very people in the Democratic Party to whom the NDC itself looks for leadership and reform."

"If the NDC method of conducting their screening is any indication of the manner in which they hope to conduct the Democratic Party in Niles Township it will be a throw-back to an era of 50 years ago, when Henry Dink Kenna and Bathhouse John McLaughlin high handedly manipulated politics.
