This is particularly true of the longrange responsibilities which determine the course of the Distant trict for years to come. The members of the Board have already recognized the problems facing it and know that a number of them will loom larger and be more difficult to solve in the decade ahead. Among them are the changing teacher-board relationships, the requests by the public for more effective teaching and broader educational services and the administration of an increasingly complex enterprise such as this one. Enlightened solutions will all require more money, and adequate financing for the district is already a severe problem.


"Knowing that these problems will require both immediate action and continuous attention over a period of years, I have decided that now is the appropriate time for me to retire from active educational administration. . .







for the re-drawing of the plans. He said he was legally authorized to present plans for a \$672,000 project, but now the remaining money, after other park buildings are built is only \$600,000. 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




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
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














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Parochiaid Unconstitutional Dear Editor:

How ironic that the open meeting on Monday, Jan. 19, at Our Lady of Ransom church in support of the most divisive proposal in religious circles today, parochiaid, should have been held during Religious Unity Week! (Parochiaid is the term given to any scheme for affording public funds to private, usually parochial, schools.)

The meeting included a showing of the Illinois Catholic Conference's movie, "A Time for Action," and a question-and-answer period. The movie is a well-done if somewhat slanted survey of Roman Catholic schools in action. It begins with dramatic views of abandoned St. George High school, Evanston. It tells par-ishioners how much it would cost for students to be transfered from private to public schools, how to save their schools from closing through parochiaid, and how to pressure legislators into voting for it.

What the movie does not mention, however, is the absolute constitutional ban in Illinois on public aid, the ban which faces such a grave threat in Con Con. I would ask those who immediately jump into the financial pros and cons of parochiaid, or, as a lawyer at the meeting did, into methods of "bending" the law to obtain it would ask them why they are so eager to support the many denominational and political schools which parochiaid would certainly foster? I don't want to support them, and it surprises me that to get aid for their schools some Roman Catholics. are so willing to give their tax money even to the Protestant schools which are already established,

Nonetheless, if we must, let's skip over the advisability and constitutionality to the financial. This past year there was a drop of 24,500 (to 299,000) in the Chicago city parochial school enrollment. "A Time for Ac-tion" warns that a shift of 50,000 students into public schools statewide in September would cost taxpayers \$36 million. (This figure is based on an average annual per-pupil cost of \$743.) How accurate is this figure?

Although many potential closed schools may not have student bodies as disperse as St, George in Evanston, let us take it as a concrete example. From its enrollment of about 800, only 23 transfered to Evanston Township high schooll It is highly doubtful that those 23 cost \$17,089 (23x\$743) to educate in their new school.

Now it is obvious that many large, urban parochial schools would, if closed, cause school boards to purchase or rent additional facilities and hire more teachers. But it is just as obvious that (1) many parochial schools (Notre Dame, Hales Franciscan, etc.) would never even consider closing, and (2) in hundreds of medium-sized communities pupils from closed schools will be absorbed at far less than \$743 each. Even if all schools closed, would the cost of buying them back as public schools or replacing them reach the astronomical figure of \$1 billion which parochial leaders have been bandying about?
