In the many discussions about tax rates I'm always confused concerning village tax rates. What are the rates in our villages? Also, what is the sales tax return in our towns?

The Bugle

In Morton Grove Fred Huber told BUGLELINE the village rate is .582 per \$100 assessed valuation or \$5.82 per \$1,000. However, he emphasized, unlike neighboring communities, the rate also includes the library district which is part of the village district. Huber said the sales tax return to the village from the state was \$495,000 for the past fiscal year but with the increase of 1/4% it is expected to pass the \$500,000 mark this year. He said for the first 8 months of the year the amount of tax return is about \$380,000. Projecting this figure the return would be about \$570,000 ending May 1.

In Niles Ken Scheel told BUGLELINE Niles village tax rate is .352 per \$100 assessed valuation. The separate library district rate is .144 per \$100.

Sales tax refund to Niles will be about \$1,200,000 for this fiscal year.

Unlike Morton Grove, which discontinued the utility tax, Niles also receives \$300,000 from this self-imposed tax on gas, electricity and telephone for residents, industry and commerce.

Comparing the 2 communities Morton Grovites pay \$58.20 per \$10,000 assessed valuation for taxes to their village and library. Niles pays \$49.60 for the same services. Morton Grove receives \$560,000 in sales tax refunds while Niles receives \$1,200,000. Morton Grove discontinued its utility tax while Nilesites pay \$300,000 annually for this tax. Thus, while Nilesites pay about \$9 less for real estate tax they pay about \$10 more for the utility tax and receive about \$38 per person from sales tax while Morton Grove receives about \$20 per person for sales tax.

School teachers in our school district have been telling students their parents should support the upcoming school referendum. While their interest is understood I wonder if there isn't a code of ethics or perhaps a law which forbids teachers from involvement in such action?

A section of the Illinois State statutes which is called the school code does not make reference to the matter. District #63 attorney Allen Schwartz told BUGLELINE in the school code under teachers there was no reference to teacher participation in elections, political activity or referendums.

While the school code is silent on this matter, according to Schwartz, he cited a case under general common law in which a teacher does have the right of free speech outside the classroom. He said he thought within the classroom a teacher is limited to passing out information but does not have a right to advocate.

Mr. Bowen also informed the Board that the district will be able to sell a million and a half in tax anticipation warrants to local banks at the 6% maximum interest rate set by law.

Dist. 63 Begins Cutbacks Feb. 27

Supt. Frank Dagne is in the process of meeting with principals to draw up guidelines for termination of the school-supported lunchroom supervisory program, it was announced at the Feb. 10 meeting of the board of education of East Maine School Dist. 63.

The guidelines will be consistent throughout the district, but consideration will be given to the difficulties peculiar to each school.

All paid lunchroom supervision in the district's nine elementary schools will be terminated Feb. 27 except for students who are bussed.

The elimination of paid lunchroom supervision is one of the several cutbacks being made this year in an effort to begin to conserve funds following the Jan. 27 tax referendum defeat. It is one of several programs which the district is able to terminate this year and which least affects the educational program.

In other action, the Board awarded contracts to Carroll Seating Co., Claridge Products & Equipment, Inc., Karnes Music and Brodhead Garrett Co. for fixed and movable equipment for the Apollo school scheduled to open next Sept.

The equipment will be paid by bonds authorized by voters in 1967 for construction of the new junior high school. The contracts total \$203,907.13. Lunchroom and foreign language equipment have not yet been let out for bid.

The Board passed a resolution to sell \$300,000 of the authorized Apollo bonds on a 6 year schedule.

Eagan and park president Jerry Sullivan reported the park board, The Save Tam Committee, the TAM owners and village trustees Pete Pesole have been meeting weekly in an attempt to iron out their problems.

Sullivan said the park board had several generous offers for the 37-1/2 acres of land north of Howard Street, but the Park Board felt it had a responsibility to its constituents for future open space for an area which could never be re-claimed once it was developed privately.

Sullivan said the Board had "3 options" for the property but the problem "is now in the hands of the lawyers."

In 1966 the Anderson owners agreed to develop an approximate 9 hole 33 par golf course and any public body would have an option on the property before 1973 ended. The Park Board has first option and if it does not exercise it then other Niles public bodies may do so.

PHOTOSENSITIVITY

The skin is sensitized to sunlight by more than ninety chemicals. These chemicals cause hives, localized pigmented areas or itchy rash. Although photosensitivity is not common, the things causing it are growing. The main reasons for this are additives used in foods, drugs, soaps and household products.

This is usually noticed when an eruption develops in areas exposed to light, such as the back of the neck, the chest "V," face, fronts of the legs and outside of arms. The eruptions do not usually appear in shaded or covered parts of the body. Now and then the rash is found only where the chemical has been applied.

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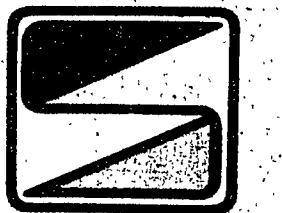
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Stevenson To Speak To Maine Demos

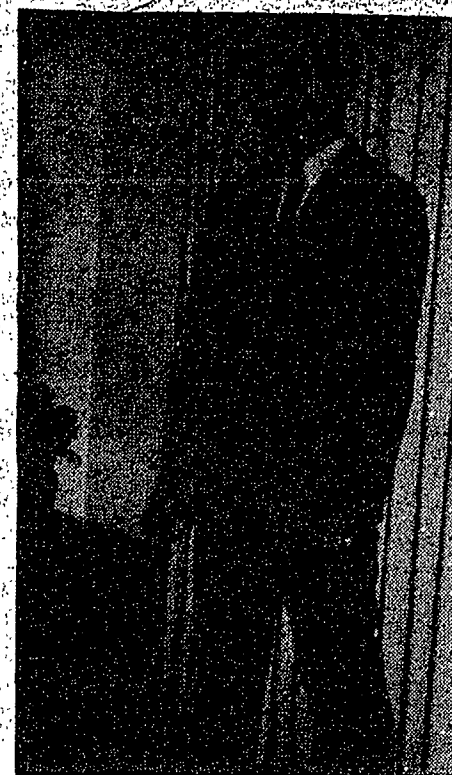
"While these goals may seem contradictory at first," Bergquist told a Park Ridge meeting, "they can be achieved through proper action by the State, County and Federal governments."

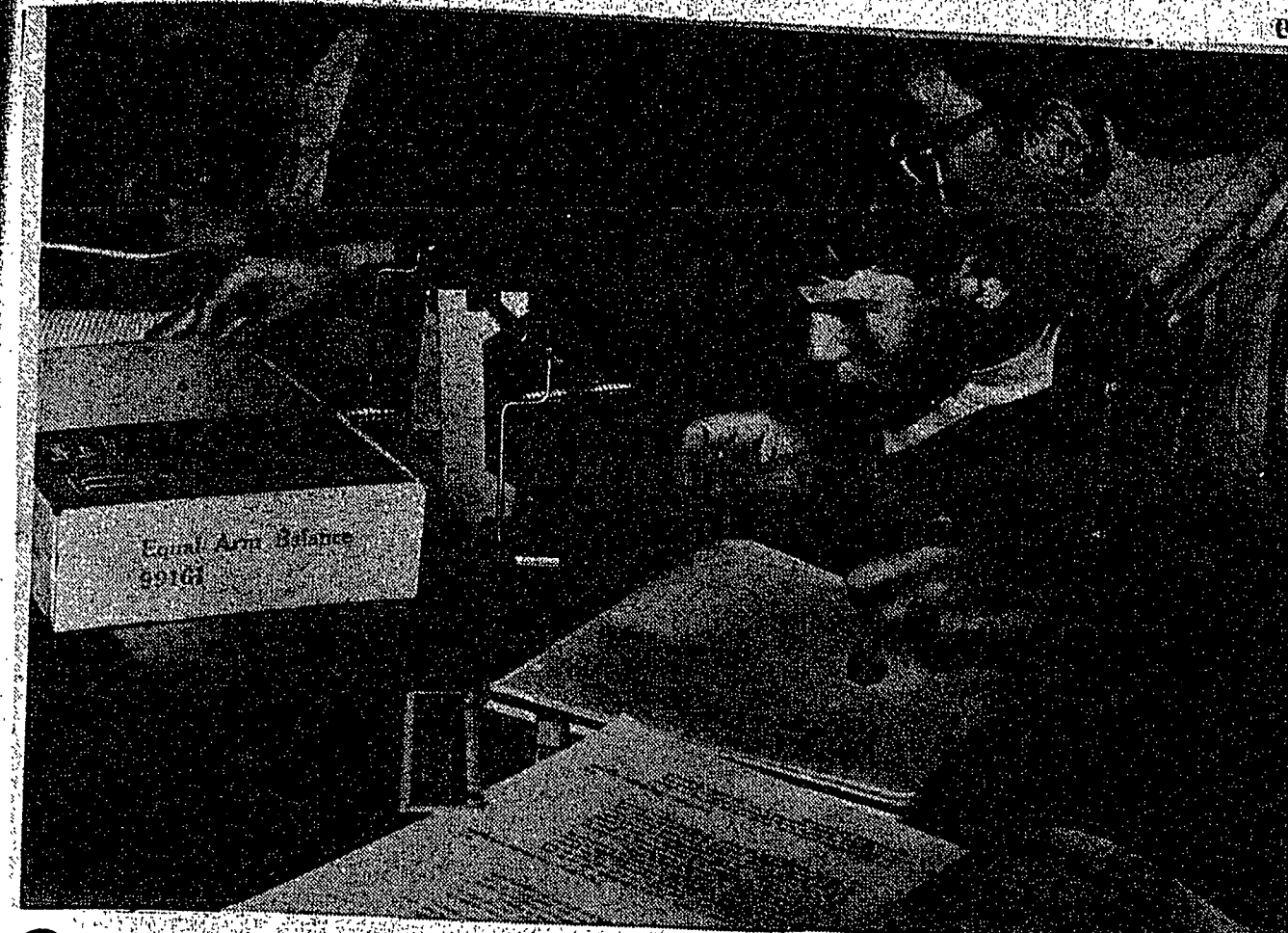

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Open House Sunday, March 1

For students at St. John Brebeuf Elementary school, Niles, science took on new meaning this past September with the introduction of a new science program in the 8th grade and in grades 1 through 4. The program will be extended to the remaining grades next year.

St. John Brebeuf is among more than 200 parish schools in the Chicago Archdiocese using one or more of the grade-level science programs. Science will be just one of the subjects visitors can view during "Open House Sunday" on March 1st.

Local nonpublic schools will hold classes on Sunday, March 1, to enlist support for the state aid bills expected to be introduced in the Illinois General Assembly in April.

State legislators, city and school officials, and the general public are invited to afternoon classes at Our Lady of Ransom and St. John Brebeuf Schools.

Local and non public school students will join with their counterparts throughout the state in the classes on Sunday program to illustrate that the educational services rendered by the private school system are worthy of the tax dollars being requested in the Illinois General Assembly this spring.

Classes in conventional subjects will be in session during the Open House Day in support of a project begun by the Illinois Catholic Conference to acquaint the general public with the community service performed by the private schools.

More than 450,000, or one out of six elementary and secondary school pupils in Illinois attends a nonpublic school. Increasing costs have led to the closing of some private schools and will lead to the demise of more, according to the administrators involved. If additional financial aid is not found,

When the General Assembly reconvenes in April, two bills are scheduled to be introduced. A "purchase of services" bill will be reintroduced by Rep. Edward J. Copeland (R. Chicago) in which the state will be asked to allocate \$60 per grade school student and \$90 per high school student to schools in return for their secular education services.

Many proponents of state aid favor this method of giving funds directly to those schools meeting state standards in return for teaching services and materials necessary for subjects common to public and nonpublic schools.

An allowance of \$226 per grade school student and \$438 per high school student in the form of state income tax deductions for parents of nonpublic school pupils is the plan to be proposed by Rep. David J. Regner (R. Mount Prospect).

Gov. Richard Ogilvie and Lt. Gov. Paul Simon have indicated approval of the purchase of services bill. In a speech given last October, Ogilvie commented that the cost of educating a sudden influx of all nonpublic school students in the public school system would "probably exceed \$400 million a year."

Open House For Radiologists

An open house for students interested in a career in radiologic technology will be conducted by the School of Radiologic Technology of Lutheran General hospital, Park Ridge, Sunday, Feb. 22. The hours are 1 to 5 p.m.

The open house will begin at the School of Health Sciences (formerly the School of Nursing building). Visitors will see 2 movies, "More than a Job" and "Light in Shadows" and will receive personal consultation by the staff and students.

Students will conduct a tour of the hospital's radiology department and the school's classroom facilities. Parents of interested students are also invited to attend.

Ogilvie praised the "significant contributions" made by private schools, stating that they have stimulated competition which has improved educational opportunities for every child in Illinois.

Approximately two-thirds of the states now provide aid in some form to nonpublic schools. Pennsylvania and Ohio have recently passed legislation similar to the proposed purchase of services bill.

March 1 classes will be in session at Our Lady of Ransom School from 2 to 4 p.m. and at St. John Brebeuf from 1 to 4 p.m. St. Isaac Jogues school, 8101 Golf rd., Niles will hold their Open House from 1:30 - 4 p.m. to show the quality of its services to the community.

Open House For Radiologists

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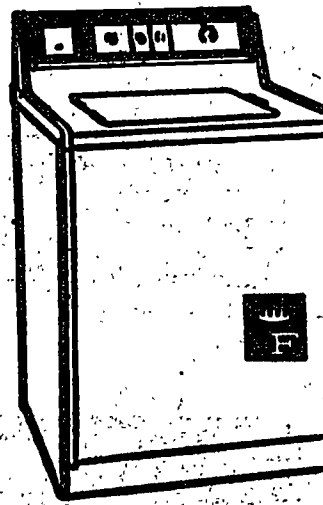
