Dist. 63 Announces Cancellation of March Referendum

At a press conference called on Monday, March 9 at Noon, President William C. Grolnick, School District 63, announced the cancellation of the March 28 referendum and issued the following statement:

For the last several months the Board of Education, the Administration and Staff and hundreds of citizens of District 63 have been working diligently

explaining the financial needs of the schools. A tremendous effort has been made. This is a sad commentary on the conditions schools find themselves today - begging for additional funds to meet increasing operational costs, these costs increasing due to inflationary pressures, competition for qualified personnel, increases in utility and building costs, and a rapid growth in student

enrollment. No other governmental operation or business enterprise must follow this procedure. Most other taxes are extracted from the taxpayer without the consent of referendum and all businesses raise prices to maintain profits or even stay in operation. It is time that the State of Illinois do something constructive about school finances.

The analogy characteristics of schools would be that of a business man calling on his customer to raise prices due to increasing costs of doing business. If the customer says "no", the business man or school does not stop producing the product but must continue to produce, searching within to cut costs, avoid salary increases, buy poorer quality raw materials. It isn't long before

the quality of the product is affected. And so it is with the schools. Programs are planned with such unknowns as will the voters approve a tax increase? Will the students stop coming to the doors? Will the state give more aid?

District 63 has had an unprecedented increase in enrollment since 1954, from 883 Continued on page 20

From the Left Hand

It's hard to tell the players without a scorecard. And even with a scorecard it's hard to tell who's giving the right score. Tuesday morning Nick Blase held a press conference replete with TV cameras, newsmen et al, to suggest Cook County residents refrain from turning in their taxbills for 15 days to protest their ever-increasing taxes. Since Blase is running for election for committeeman it brought a cry of "politics" from his opponent, Jim Hilliard of Morton Grove. Newcomer Hilliard reminded us Blase blasted away at the telephone company in Des Plaines and Park Ridge before his last candidacy, leaving the intimation Blase's motives are keenly attuned to political motivation.

To balance the scales Blasesmen decry the phone calls newspapers received allegedly changing the time of the press conferences (when Blase was supposed to speak). Hurriedly, Blase people called all papers to make sure they were informed of the scheduled time, leaving little doubt they believed there was some skulduggery on foot, coming from the enemy camp.

Over in the Republican camp Nilesite Roy Bergquist is battling hard to unseat either Robert Juckett or Arthur Simmons for the state representative's post. While we don't endorse candidates in elections outside our villages we may be showing a bit of prejudice in stating Bergquist received the endorsement from the Chicago Sun Times along with Simmons. It considered Juckett too far to the right for their endorsement. We've heard Juckett speak once and heard him refer to former President Johnson in such crude and irresponsible terms that his own Republican colleagues said such remarks were unwarranted. In the Sun Times endorsement it refers to Juckett as an "obstructionist" a term we heard from people who said his conduct downstate has reflected poorly on our district.

Turn Down School Referendum 2 To 1

Niles Township residents overwhelmingly turned down Saturday's High School educational tax increase by more than a 2 to 1 vote. 5,913 voters opposed the increase while 2,778 resident okayed the increase. The school board sought to up the rate from 1.2991 to 1.7791 per \$100 assessed valuation.

A breakdown of the vote showed Niles and Morton Grove voters were more strongly opposed than voters throughout the district, Niles voters said "No" 668 to 103, while Morton Grove voters voted 909 "No's" to 366 "Yes's."

Niles Honor Student Found Dead

A 15-year-old Niles honor student was found shot to death early Tuesday after leaving a note saying he was despondent over the death of his girl friend according to the Chicago Sun Times.

The body of David D. Mrozek, of 9029 Joey Dr., Niles was found beside a .38 caliber revolver in an alley near his home according to Niles Police chief of detectives Edward Dennis.

The youth, who was shot in the head, had been dead several hours, Dennis said.

Police later recovered the note at the Mrozek home. Dennis said the letter told of how sad the youth was after the death of his girl friend following an illness several months ago.

Blase Calls For 15 Day Tax Moratorium

At a news conference held on Tuesday, March 10, Mayor Nicholas Blase said, "Being acutely aware of ever growing financial dilemmas within our school systems, I have, for the past several years, been actively involved with the serious problems confronting suburban taxpayers. The plight of the suburban taxpayer is presently critical; while he has, out of desire, overburdened himself

financially in order to provide his children with quality education, this same burden has now placed him in jeopardy. He can no longer meet the rising demands of his ever increasing Property Tax bill with Education slicing 80 percent out of each tax dollar. We must face the realism of State Aid to Education not being commensurate with the rising cost of quality education.

Illinois, the 3rd most affluent state in the Union, ranks 47th in terms of Aid to Education, rather distressing acknowledgement considering an excess of 100 million dollars lies idle in the State Treasury.

We must now react in the only way possible. In order to emphasize and dramatize the urgency of our situation, I am requesting, as Mayor of the Village of Niles, that all residents of Suburban Cook County declare a 15 Day Moratorium to withhold payment of their Real Estate Taxes. I am requesting that Taxpayers contact their individual Mortgage Companies; Savings and Loan Associations; or, if they pay their Real Estate Taxes directly, to withhold all payment for 15 days, in order to emphasize the burden placed upon us.

During this 15 Day Moratorium period, no Taxpayer will be penalized as much as 1 cent for withholding. We remain comfortable within the limits as specified by law.

We are asking the Governor of Illinois, as head of the Republican Party, and Richard J. Daley as head of the Democratic Party, and all Taxing Legislative Bodies to take immediate steps to relieve the tax load of the Property Owner so that he isn't forced out of his home, while allowing our educational level to sustain its present quality standard."

Bergquist Urges Large Voter Turnout

(Political News Release)

Roy H. Bergquist, independent Republican candidate for State Representative from the 4th district, charged this week the district's representation in the State House is "shameful."

Urging voters to turn out in large numbers for the March 17 primary, Bergquist said: "If residents of Maine and Niles townships want their complaints about record high property taxes, the half billion dollar

welfare bill, and the sad financial plight of our schools to be heard in Springfield, they had better elect a new Republican representative to the General Assembly."

Bergquist charged his opponent has failed in his responsibility to the voters of the district. In welfare alone, he merely follows the pattern set by Democrats years ago. We now have 2 and 3 generations on welfare and the cost of aid will increase to 810 million

dollars in 1971 according to recent estimates by the Governor.

Dear Editor:

In the March 5 issue of the Park Ridge Herald, a statement was issued by Mr. Floyd Fulle and Mr. Robert Juckett, claiming that the Village of Niles Regular Republican Organization has been inactive for four years, and that Mr. Fulle himself, now holds the charger for the Organization.

Blase Charges Opponent "Puppet Controlled"

Nicholas Blase, incumbent Maine Township Regular Democratic Organization Committeeman seeking re-election on March 17, 1970 in the Primary Election charged his opponent as "a puppet who is in every sense a city controlled by City oriented leadership."

Blase who also seeks election as the 10th Congressional District's State Committeeman further charged, "My opponent claims a good candidate 'follows the leader' even if it does not serve in the best interest of Maine Township and the 10th Congressional District. His responsiveness is not towards the residents from whom he seeks election and continued support, but only to the policies set forth by downtown Chicago. This complete lack of comprehension and responsiveness to the needs of suburbia on the part of candidates with

mediocre qualifications is in direct keeping with the attitudes of the Cook County Central Committee, that is an indifference, an unresponsiveness to suburban problems.

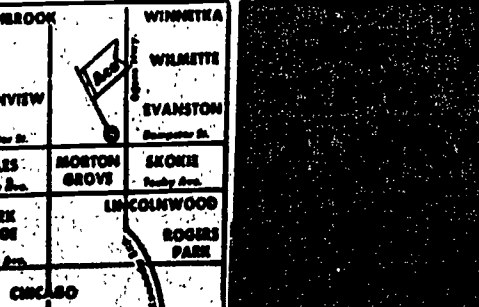

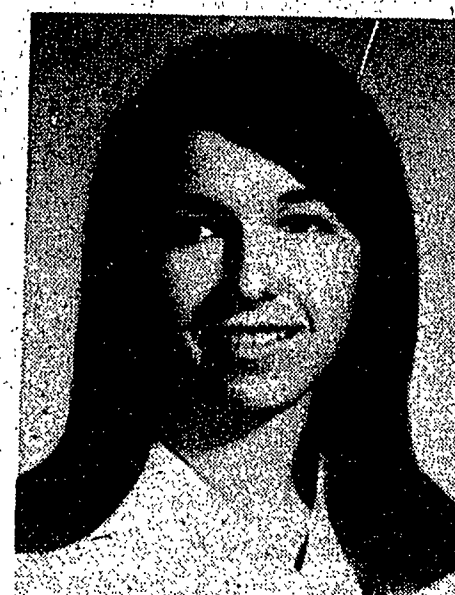

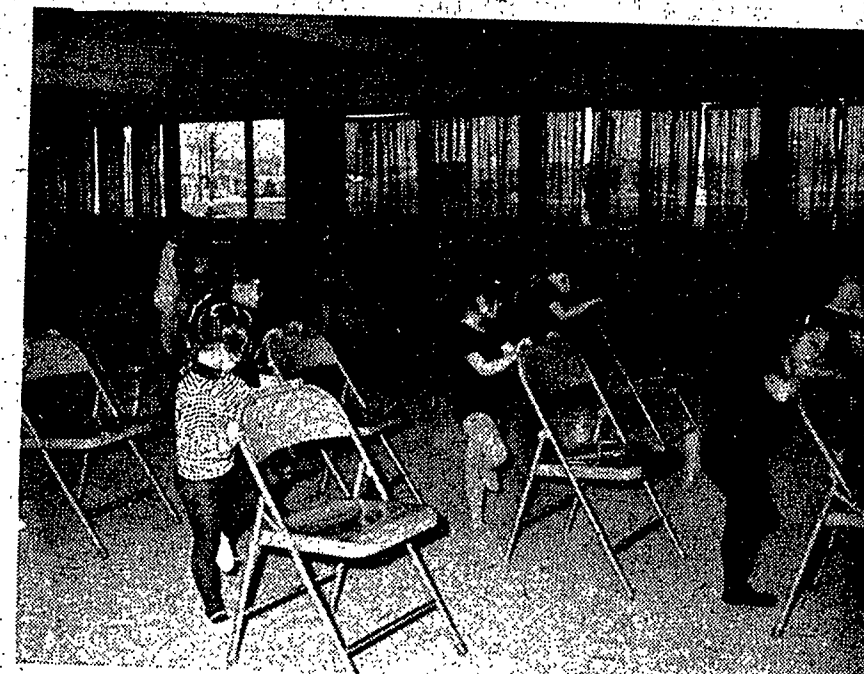

Golf-Maine Park District Authorizes Construction

The Golf-Maine Park District has formally authorized invitations for bids for construction of recreational facilities on the park site at Dee rd. and Emerson st. The District took the action at its regular meeting, Sunday, March 1.

Beginning Monday, March 9, a copy of the plans and specifications will be available for inspection by potential bidders at the District's Office, 9390 Dee rd., Des Plaines. Duplicate sets of plans and specifications may be obtained, beginning March 9, from the District's Architect, Ralph H. Burke, Inc., 506 Higgins rd., Park Ridge.

Illustrations of some of the equipment to be installed are on public display at the District's Office.

The plans and specifications call for grading and grassing of the site; baseball fields; playground areas; tennis courts; basketball and shuffleboard area; and an outdoor artificial ice rink. Board President Donald Ross said, "We have omitted more than \$90,000.00 worth of construction that was part of the site plan approved last year, against the possibility of receiving a federal grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for \$45,000.00. I have been in touch with Senator Charles Percy, trying to have our application expedited. The Senator has been in contact with the local HUD Office, to make them aware of his interest. However, the local office has advised me that their next funding analysis will not take place until sometime in April. Following the analysis, which we hope will be favorable, the application is submitted to Washington. The local office advises that it may be a few months before we have a reply."

mitted to Washington. The local office advises that it may be a few months before we have a reply."

Ross also stated, "Current estimates of total costs for the construction covered by the plans and specifications, including architect's fees and other expenses, range up to \$300,000.00. Our construction fund has approximately \$230,000.00 in it. If the total of the bids and these other costs exceed the amount of money now on hand we will have to award contracts for only as much work as we are able to pay for now, and seek additional funds through bonds or other means. Although we have received no encouragement whatsoever in our attempts to find private development fund sources, we will continue to explore every possible means of financing additional development and land acquisition."

Construction will begin as soon as the weather permits. The ball fields are expected to be completed in time for the Park District's first baseball league game, June 15. Total construction time is estimated at 120 days. By summer, the playground areas and tennis courts are expected to be useable.

In other business, the Board authorized its architect to begin work on a site plan for development of the park site at Kathy ln. and Western ave., and adopted a resolution authorizing the filing of an application for a grant equal to 50% of the cost of developing this site. The application is being made under the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation's Land and Water Conservation fund program. Information about the fund and the method of filing was provided to the district by State Representative Robert Juckett. The Park District's share of the cost of this development, estimated at \$100,000.00, will come from the sale of bonds, or other means.

The Board also heard a report from Recreation Director Turk Glazebrook which advised that although the district's brochure has not yet been distributed registrations are coming in for summer day camp and for the district's baseball league. Information describing these programs is available by visiting or telephoning the District's Office.

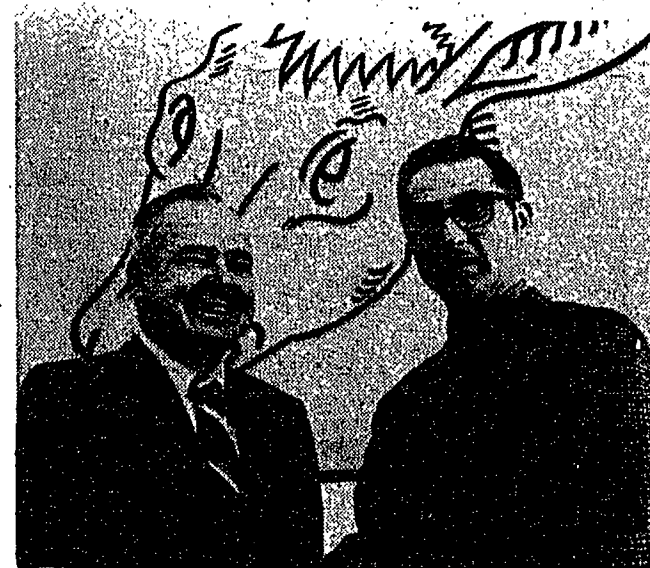

Saturday Niles Township turned down a request for an increase in the high school educational tax rate by more than a 2 to 1 vote. Next door in neighboring Evanston, which was named the top high school district in the country in McCall's magazine last year, a similar tax increase won by less than a 5% margin. And back home in Maine Township school district 63, which had passed 10 referendums in a row before losing 2 months ago, at a meeting Monday announced the abandoning of its scheduled March 28 referendum.

Tuesday morning, before klieg lights, whirling movie and TV cameras, Nick Blase announced his recommendation that all Cook County residents should withhold their tax bills for 15 days, before submitting them for payment, as a protest against the ever-mounting tax bills which are putting the crunch on Joe Taxpayer.

There's little doubt what is happening is the guys playing the game are blowing the whistle. The tightening up of the economy across the U.S. plus ever-increasing taxes has placed Joe Salary in an intolerable situation. No longer is he able to say "Yes" every time another cost factor confronts him. And the "situation" is graphically being shown at the polls.

This is the week when one of two Maine Township high school basketball teams is likely to move into the "Sweet 16" finals of the state basketball tourney. Notre Dame and Maine South High schools are favored candidates to meet Friday night in Palatine for one of the 16 finalist posts.

We saw Friday night's Notre Dame-Evanston game, and to paraphrase that old sage of Wrigley Field, "Notre Dame is some team." The undefeated Dons have 2 outstanding players in Center Eaton and guard Yachan. They've got good height, are well-coached and have that most important quality "poise" which often spells the difference between winning and losing in this tourney.

Being an old hardwood fan, Friday night's game brought back ominous memories of a Marshall-New Trier game we saw a couple of years ago, when the emotion and electricity was at such a high-pitch, a small riot broke out at the game. At the ND game we heard some scuffling resulted which seemed inevitable, after experiencing the tenseness of the crowd.

In our high school games 25 years ago there was always talk about the big fight after the game, but it was mostly talk. Today times seem to have changed. Whether in the center city, or in suburbia, the genuine anger of the crowd seems quite different from the spirits of our day. Maybe we're perched above the crowd today, and watching from the sidelines gives us a second-hand view which is distorted. But if our instincts aren't playing tricks on us, there's a feeling of hostility and abandon from these crowds, which we never noticed a few years ago.

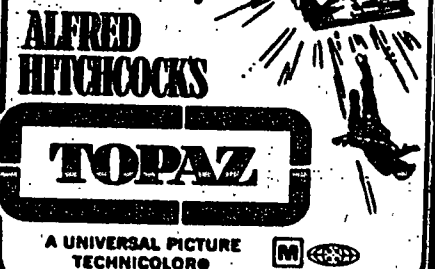

to a peak of 7345 in 1968, an increase of over 800% in this period we have built 9 new schools and are currently completing the second Jr. High School. We have added 17 additions to these schools and have purchased 14 relocatable classrooms! During this period the quality of the educational program has grown to state, national and even international prominence. A program which costs less per pupil to operate than 80% of the districts that surround us. A program where the teacher's average salary is only \$100 above the lowest average in the state for districts of comparable size.

In planning for future operations, schools are faced with more questions than a business or other agency faces. As said previously, will our assessed valuation increase? What will next years enrollment be? Will there be an increase in state aid? A year ago, in developing our budget, we planned for an increase of 200-250 in enrollment - our actual enrollment dropped slightly below the 1968 high. Assessed valuation? - we needed a crystal ball. Last year it only went up \$1.7 million - we took a conservative view in planning.

Last Thursday, our business manager, Jim Bowen, obtained manager, Jim Bowen, obtained our next years assessed valuation figure from the County office. As you noticed, tax rates were published this weekend and it was noted that the County equalization multiplier went up an extraordinary 4.8%. The Board of Education, meeting as a committee of the whole, with Supt. Dagne and Jim Bowen carefully reviewed the significance of this information.

Our assessed valuation went up \$14.8 million dollars! It is unfortunate that this could not be known earlier this year, but repeated attempts to determine the figure by many means was to no avail. As a result of our deliberation, we have decided to cancel the referendum for March 28. Our preliminary figures indicate that our financial needs will be met for at least one year, possibly two. This action will be ratified at the Tuesday night meeting. The Board has pledged at its many meetings to look very closely at expenditures and to reduce wherever possible, consistent with maintaining a quality program. This pledge will be kept and the results will be evident when our budget for next year is presented.

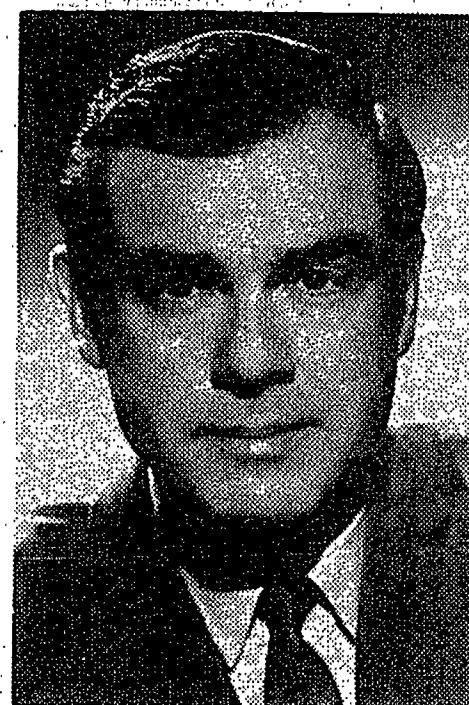
