

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

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

> Mr. Gurolnick now wishes to learn something about experimental team teaching. Team teaching alone as practiced in District #63 is experimental and wasteful. Leading authorities in educational supervision and administration have invariably stated that a self-contained classroom with flexible grouping can provide all elements necessary for a totally childcentered program. When some free time is also provided to teachers through duty free lunch periods, gym and library programs, etc., the self-contained classroom has also been identified as the most satisfactory and satisfying to both teachers and pupils. In school buildings which were built for self-contained classrooms, costly rehabilitation costs could be saved by leaving the walls standing.

That lesson being over, Mr. Gurolnick wishes to learn something about the non-graded primary as he calls the Primary Continuous Development Program in Chicago. As it happens, pioneered with this program in 1960, and it is hardly an unproved, costly program, It is based on the sound educational concept that we allow the child to develop at his own readiness level. I'm sick of all the untruths, innuendos, name-calling, and downright sarcasm.


