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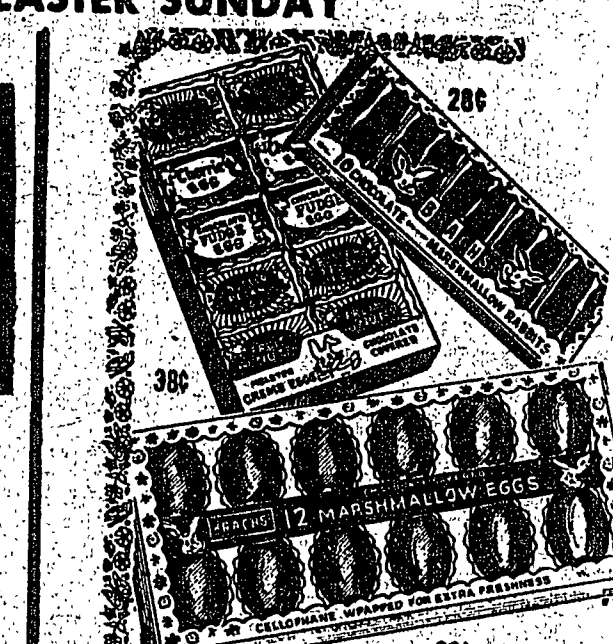

The first signs of spring hit our neighborhood this week and joy reigned up and down the block. The much-maligned postal worker brought that first vestige of spring to all the neighbors, the real estate tax bill, and the voice of the gurgling could be heard in the land. The guy next door rushed out of his house, let out a warlike 'whoop' and gave a Ron Santo heel-kick in mid-air, while expressing his joy to the world. And the lady across the street, grasping her bill tightly in her super-greased hand, pirouetted in the snow on her front lawn, and told the world she actually was saving \$40 over last year. While all of us raised our voices in praise, she said she only received a \$60 increase in this year's tax bill, while last year it increased by \$100, which indeed is a \$40 savings. She became the heroine of the week on our street. We raised her on our shoulders and paraded her the length of the street, while fellow-neighbors showered her with shredded remnants of old tax bills.

On other streets less joy could be heard. A Church Street resident approached us with a hang-dog expression, and vowed he'd oppose every bond referendum placed before him. Still in that taxpayer's euphoric, he said he figured about 40% of his bill goes for the elementary school district, and 30% for the high school district. While walking in the shadows he gave ominous predictions for any votes which asked for more money. Amidst this annual self-inflicted pain, he said he was now paying 2-1/2% for the junior college district and knew this figure would soon have to be increased. We didn't think this was the time to tell him about upcoming high school referendums which he'll be confronted with in the near future, in addition to a junior college hike, and eventually the elementary schools are going to have to be asking for more money, at least in Maine Township.

TAX BILLS UP FROM 5.13% TO 8.5%

Increased valuation of property pushed tax bills up from about 5.13% to 8.5% in the many taxing districts in Niles, Morton Grove and East Maine's unincorporated areas.

Township collectors in Niles and Maine Townships told THE BUGLE Tuesday, 1969 was the quadrennial year when land was re-assessed in the area. It was also the year when the state's equalization factor moved up from 1.45 to 1.52 for all Cook County residents, which together with the new assessed valuation rates, caused the jump in taxes.

Tax rates are determined by multiplying the assessed valuation by the equalization rate. Each county in the state receives a rate which is aimed at equalizing valuations in all counties in the state. It is determined by the true market value of real estate in the counties and its aim is to lessen the discrepancies which vary between counties.

The year 1969 was the quadrennial year in which property in the area was re-evaluated. Thus, it was possible for the assessed valuation to decrease from last year (as was reported by an unincorporated resident) but the total tax rate increased.

The Illinois PTA recognizes the importance of having the best qualified persons possible as members of school boards. Hence it approves the participation by representatives of

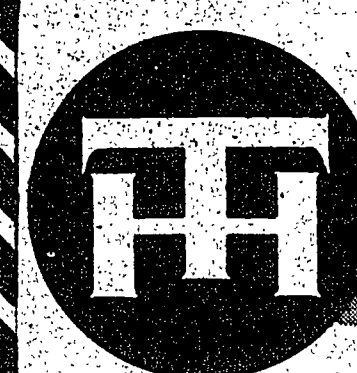
local PTA units in nonpartisan organizations for the selection of school board candidates.

For effective participation in a caucus or nominating committee, PTA units should send their delegates uncommitted. Therefore, delegates, when voting for the selection of candidates, make personal choice which does not in any way obligate the PTA to active support of any candidate. Delegates to caucus, when reporting to the local PTA unit, should include the following: names of all nominees and their qualifications, and the candidates selected by the caucus. Any group activity in support of a specific candidate, or group of candidates, on the part of the local unit, council district or state branch is a violation of the nonpartisan policy of the National PTA.

There is no contradiction between the nonpartisan policy of the NCPTA and the privileges and responsibilities of its members as citizens in a democracy.

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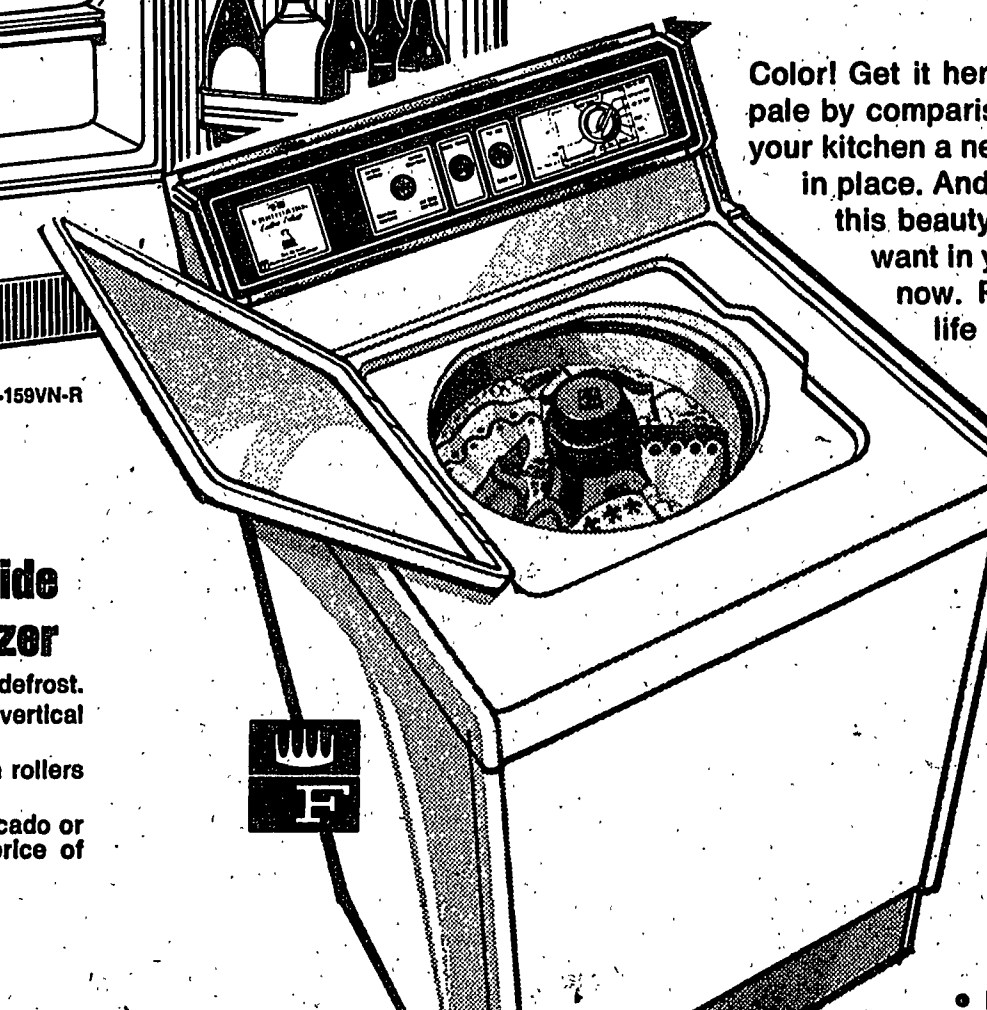
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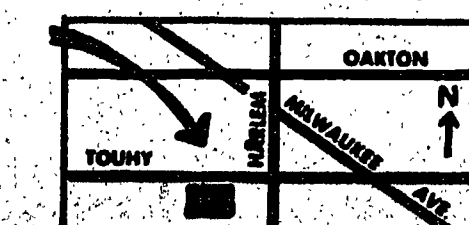
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Poppy Day Co-Chairman Named

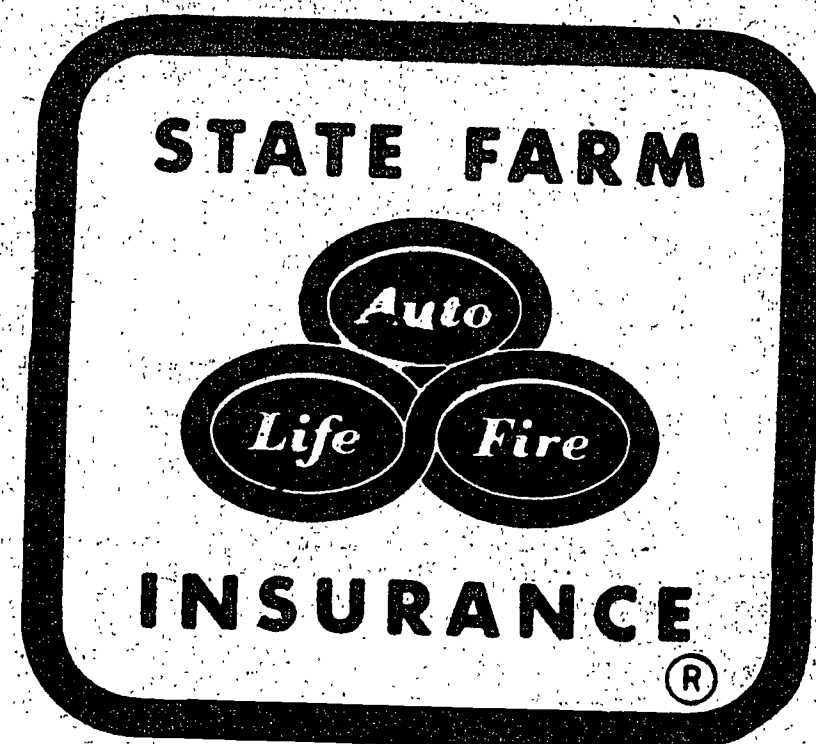

Niles Elementary Summer School Classes

The Board of Education of Niles Elementary Schools, District No. 71 will sponsor a Summer School for a period of 6 weeks beginning June 22 and ending July 31, 1970. The program will be designed to:

- Provide an opportunity for additional help in basic subject areas to pupils who need individualized attention or who want to improve their basic skills.
- Provide enrichment and exploratory experiences to children interested in special content areas.

Summer school attendance will not influence the grade placement of students for the following year. Instruction is on a highly individualized basis and each child will progress at his own rate.

Clarence Culver, superintendent of the Niles Elementary Schools, will be in charge of instruction. All instructors will be members of the Niles Elementary School Faculty. The fee which includes books and teaching materials, will be \$25 per class and is payable at the time of registration.

Summer school enrollment will be opened to all students enrolled in School District No. 71. Non-resident students may enroll to complete individual classes to 15. School District No. 71 will not provide transportation or crossing guards. The parents are responsible for the transportation of their children.

Registration will be held during the day of April 9, 1970 between 9 a.m. and 12 noon for students enrolled in Niles Elementary Schools. Registration will not be accepted after April 16. This deadline must be observed so that the staff can be secured and instructional material ordered. Registration for non-resident students will be held April 16, between 9 a.m. and 12 noon. Registration will take place at 6935 E. Touhy ave., or 6921 W. Oakton st.

Classes will be held at Niles Elementary School North, 6921 Oakton st. Children enrolling in classes will enroll in the grade they were in during the 1969-70 school year. For example, if you were in grade 5 during the 1969-70 school year you would enroll in grade 5 classes.

East Maine General Caucus Report

This organization was formed several years ago for the sole purpose of seeking, screening, nominating and supporting candidates "of outstanding ability and character" for election to the elementary and high school boards of education. All the district's non-political organizations with 25 or more member-families are asked to participate.

All candidates for school board election are invited to appear before the caucus to present their qualifications.

This year, 24 organizations were represented in the caucus. With each of these groups authorized to send two delegates and two alternate delegates to the caucus, a total of 96 citizens were eligible to participate.

Three general meetings were held, as well as several committee meetings. Candidates presented their credentials, submitted written answers to questions, and were interviewed by the caucus nominating committee.

The nominating committee selected five candidates who sought endorsement for the elementary school board, and three who sought endorsement for the high school board. These candidates were presented to the entire caucus at a meeting held at the East Maine Junior High school on Feb. 26, 1970.

At this meeting, each candidate was allotted a five-minute oral presentation, and each answered questions from caucus delegates.

After this thorough procedure, caucus delegates made their endorsements by secret ballot. We feel, therefore, that District 63 voters would do well to give serious consideration to these caucus-endorsed candidates in the school board elections to be held April 11.

The Elementary District 63 Board:

William Allen - Seeking his second three-year term on the

board. Allen is a staunch advocate of the district's philosophy of progressive education. He is a graduate of Iowa State university with graduate work at Berkeley and Yale, and is Manpower Division Manager of a major insurance company.

William Guroinick - Now president of the elementary school board, Guroinick has played an important role in revitalizing District 63 from a traditional educational system to one which has won well-deserved national renown - at a lower cost per student than most suburban Chicago elementary systems. A graduate of the University of Illinois in chemical engineering, he holds a M.S. degree from the Newark College of Engineering, and is manager of a chemical plant. He is seeking his third term on the board.

Arlene Nidetz - An active FTA officer, Mrs. Nidetz has served on school committees for 5-1/2 years. She is well-versed in school affairs, and has lobbied in Springfield - at her own expense - for better school legislation and for tax relief for the district's property owners. She is president of the River Ridge FTA Council, and is a journalism graduate from the University of Illinois.

For High School Board 207:

Ray Makela - Seeking his second term on the high school board, Makela has drawn on his background as an architect to help coordinate the school's huge building program. He also has worked to modernize the board's educational philosophy. He is a graduate of Chicago Technical college, with graduate work at University of Chicago and other institutions.

Sylvia McNair - A highly effective member of the District 63 board for six years, Mrs. McNair also has served on regional and state school improvement groups. Her interest in education has led to studies of educational institutions throughout the United States, Canada and Europe. She is a writer and editor for a large publisher, a graduate of Oberlin college, and has done graduate work at Northwestern university.

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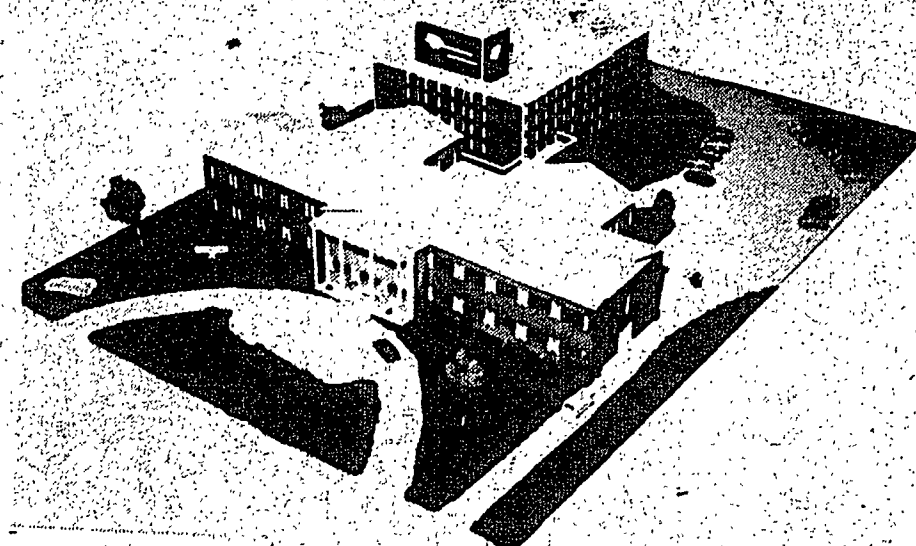
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Expanded Nursing Home

Grazian Outlines Aims For District 207

At an informal meeting in his home last week, Leonard R. Grazian, independent candidate for the Maine Township High School Dist. 207 Board of Education, expressed his views on some of the issues he considers most important in the School Board election and outlined his plans to bring these views to the district's voters before they cast their ballots April 11.

"I'm not an obstructionist," the candidate said. "My two eldest children have received excellent educations at Maine Township High schools and were graduated with honors. There are areas, however, where I believe improvements can be made, and I believe my qualifications will permit me to make a positive contribution toward making these improvements as a member of the board."

A practicing attorney who also holds a BS degree in chemical engineering from the Illinois Institute of Technology, Grazian expressed his concern over the growing drug and narcotic use among the district's youth. "Although the problem is not as great here as it is in some areas," he said, "I believe this is the time when we must establish in our high schools the type of anti-drug programs that have been successful in other parts of the country; programs such as those employed in some California high schools, for example."

Grazian said he is deeply concerned, too, about the growing problem of extraneous forces

and pressures on the students and the school system.

"We have our students being pressured by elements from the extreme right and the extreme left," he said, "and I believe this is a matter which certainly calls for an examination by the board."

Another area receiving the attention of the 45 year old father of eight is discipline in the schools. "I believe it would be beneficial to all to take another look at our present system of suspensions and expulsions," he stated. "In my opinion, it seems there are ways in which other forms of effective discipline could be used more advantageously."

Grazian strongly believes that school administration should be left to the administrators and policy should be left to the board. He suggested that at times there is a tendency for one body or the other to become too involved in an area in which it has no proper place.

Also a lecturer, the Morton Grove resident who lives at 9504 Oliphant was one of the last to file his petitions as a candidate after being urged to do so by his friends. This is his first attempt to seek and elective office and he says his late entry into the campaign is taking practically all of his time in trying to catch up.

According to one of his supporters, Grazian's interest in youth plus his professional at-

All this will not prevent tears when a child is hurt, but it may help him to develop a more mature attitude toward hospitals, doctors and nurses.

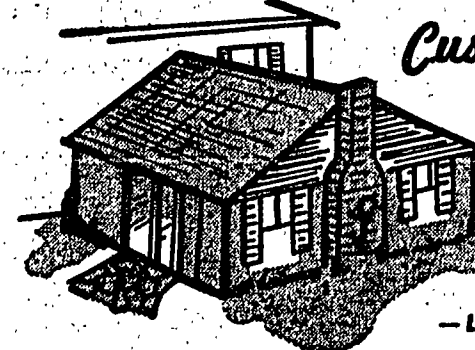

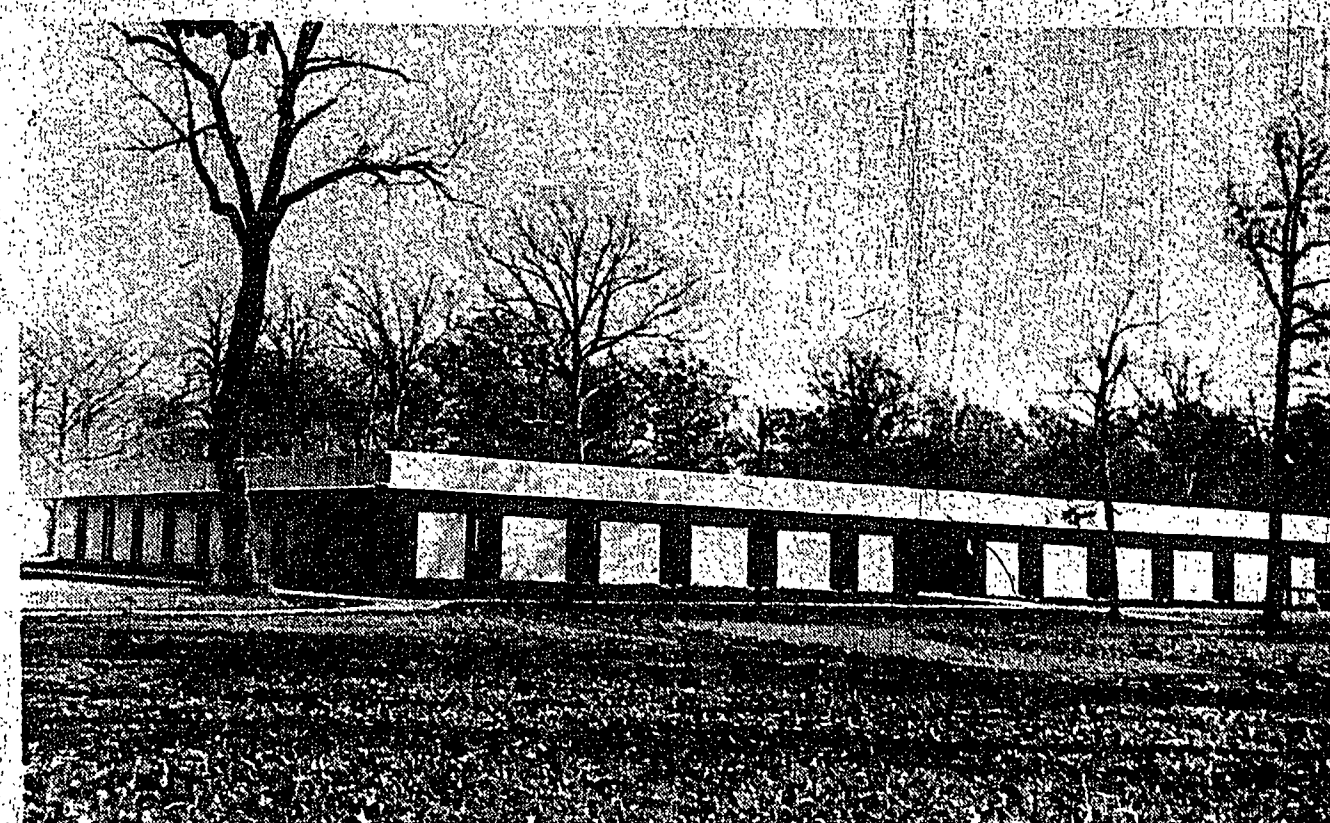

Tuesday, March 3, was a long-anticipated moving day for over 40 members of Maine Township High School District 207's administrative staff. On that date the staff vacated its offices at Maine East and temporary quarters in scattered locations in the area and moved to new offices in the recently completed Ralph J. Frost Administrative Center located at 1131 S. Deer Rd. in Park Ridge, at the south end of the Maine South campus.

The new center has been named in honor of the district's assistant superintendent and the district's other administrative officials. In addition, the building will house the district's business office, purchasing office, data processing department, payroll department, public information office and teacher personnel department.

In speaking of the move to the new facility, Dr. Short stated, "We have long needed additional space to efficiently handle the increased volume of administrative work connected with our three large high schools plus a fourth high school, Maine North, opening in the Fall. We also have felt the need to bring our administrative offices together instead of operating from several locations in the area. Our new administrative center admirably fills both needs. Nilehi Caucus Issues Policy Statement

We believe that the public schools should give equally to all students the opportunity to reach the highest educational development of which they are capable, within the limits of their native endowment and level of maturity. We believe that the public schools should cultivate leaders and foster leadership, should provide opportunities for leadership experience, should train for leadership both students and adults, and, as institutions, should exercise dynamic educational leadership in the community.

We believe that the curriculum of the public schools should be both progressive and traditional; flexible enough to meet students' needs in an ever-changing world and conservative enough to preserve the basic values of our American culture. We believe that the public schools should be guardians of human dignity, at all times teaching and practicing respect for the integrity and the fundamental rights of all individuals. Mr. Fred Minkus, Chairman of the 219 Caucus, comments that the above policy statement has not just been created to answer critics. Rather, the policy statement has existed for over five years

and all delegates to the 219 Caucus are requested to support the caucus 100% in the pursuit of this policy.

The District 219 Caucus, operating continuously since 1951, has again this year canvassed the community for candidates willing to serve on the school board, screened these candidates, and selected the two most qualified as District 219 Caucus endorsed candidates for the election coming April 11, 1970. The Caucus does not object to other candidates seeking office, and the Caucus does not prevent any individual citizens from becoming independent candidates. In fact, the Caucus welcomes a contested election as it stimulates additional interest on the part of the citizens in the community.

However, Mr. Minkus is emphatic in wanting the citizens of the community to know the following:

1. The 41 organizations sending delegates to the district 219 Caucus are purely voluntary.
2. The civic organizations participating in Caucus are without question the most Democratic, "grass roots" type assembly that the community can offer.

3. That Caucus by-laws specifically prevent board members with Caucus endorsement from holding office for more than six consecutive years, with the express intention of bringing new leadership to the high school board from time to time, and to keep board members from being in office in perpetuity.

The broad based cross section of the District 219 Caucus specifically guards against extroverted spokesmen for a disgruntled group or persons with an "axe to grind" from becoming Caucus endorsed candidates. The Caucus has the utmost confidence in Mr. John Carlson and Mr. Angelo Poulakides because these men have not only passed the test of Caucus screening and election, but have proven their ability to serve the community in a rational, progressive manner.

When the State of Illinois increased its allotment of school aid to \$520 per pupil a misconception arises in many people's minds who believe the full \$520 is given to school districts for each pupil.

In school district 63, \$324 is allotted for each pupil while in school district 64 in Niles and Park Ridge approximately \$250 is distributed for each child. In Niles Township in our communities the amount is substantially less.

In District 64 we were told about 87% of the 6,800 students are in daily attendance on the average for the school year. That figure is multiplied by the \$520 figure. The assessed valuation of the district is then deducted and this total is multiplied by .90 which determines the amount to each district for each student.

One of the key figures is the daily attendance record of each district. While some educators, particularly in Chicago, would prefer the general enrollment figure, it is believed this figure can be blown up, not reflecting the true attendance in the district.

In Illinois the state is providing for 34.4 percent of the educational funds spent by school districts in the current school year. That figure is 6.4 percent below the national average, placing Illinois 34th among 50 states.

In total per pupil spending, federal, state and local, Illinois ranks 24th among the 50 states, committing \$431 for each child in attendance. The states which spend more per pupil include New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Michigan.

Maine Grads Survey Figures

A recently completed follow-up study of the 2,292 members of Maine's 1969 graduating class shows that 71% of them are continuing their education beyond high school. The class had 1,333 graduates, or 67%, continuing in college - 1,109 in universities or four year colleges and 224 in junior colleges. About 4% of the graduates went on to business, trade, art, dramatic, nursing or other special schools.

The annual study was made by the Office of District 207's pupil personnel services coordinator, Merlin W. Schultz. This year's statistics are based on a 99.5% return of student responses. Only 11 of the 1969 graduates could not be traced for the survey.

Of the college-bound students, 93% chose midwestern colleges, with an increasing number of students going to Illinois universities and colleges. About 75% of the college-bound entered schools in Illinois this past fall, with the great majority of them - 84% - going to tax-supported institutions.

Northern Illinois University again received the largest number of the graduates, with a total of 155, followed by the University of Illinois at Urbana with 143, and 61 at the university's Circle Campus in Chicago. Other popular Illinois schools are Western Illinois University with 90 Maine graduates and Southern Illinois University with 71.

Maine Grads Survey Figures

A recently completed follow-up study of the 2,292 members of Maine's 1969 graduating class shows that 71% of them are continuing their education beyond high school. The class had 1,533 graduates, or 67%, continuing in college - 1,109 in universities or four year colleges and 424, or 28%, in junior colleges. About 4% of the graduates went on to business, trade, art, dramatic, nursing or other special schools.

The annual study was made by the office of District 207's pupil personnel services coordinator, Merlin W. Schultz. This year's statistics are based on a 99.5% return of student responses. Only 11 of the 1969 graduates could not be traced for the survey.

Of the college-bound students, 93% chose midwestern colleges, with an increasing number of students going to Illinois universities and colleges. About 75% of the college-bound entered schools in Illinois this past fall, with the great majority of them - 84% - going to tax-supported institutions.

Northern Illinois University again received the largest number of the graduates, with a total of 155, followed by the University of Illinois at Urbana with 145, and 61 at the university's Circle Campus in Chicago. Other popular Illinois schools are Western Illinois University with 90 Maine graduates and Southern Illinois University with 71.

6. Tree stumps must be cut in 3 foot lengths and 1 foot in diameter.

7. Refrigerators must have the doors taken off.

The percent of students attending junior colleges - 28% or 424 students - is an increase of 4% over the previous class. The two most popular junior colleges are Harper, with 294 Maine graduates, and Triton with 67.

The most popular out-of-state school again is Wisconsin State University at Whitewater, with 17 Maine graduates compared to 41 last year. The University of Iowa has 16 Maine graduates, Valparaiso and Purdue 15 each.

The survey also shows that 25% or 579 graduates, are employed full or part time and 2% or 40 graduates, are serving in the Armed Forces. The number of graduates obtaining employment upon graduation rose considerably - from 469 to 579. The remaining 2% of the class, or 38 students, are in the categories of being married and staying home (housewives), unemployed, traveling, deceased or not located.

Hospital Initiates New Security Force

Lutheran General hospital, Park Ridge, now has its own internal security force. Previously, hospital security was provided by private firms contracted by the hospital.

During the day the security officers are stationed in the lobby and parking lot areas and at night they patrol all of the hospital's buildings and grounds.

In addition to providing protection for the hospital, security officers are also concerned about safety and accident prevention according to Ivan Anderson, director of safety and security at the hospital.

"They look for burned out lights, bare wires, faulty equipment and other safety hazards while on duty. They also check fire extinguishers regularly and may become involved in educational safety programs."

The new officers were specially trained in hospital security. They know every department of the hospital and its functions and know when each area should be locked, Anderson explained.

They also received training in human relations and in handling people in a hospital environment.

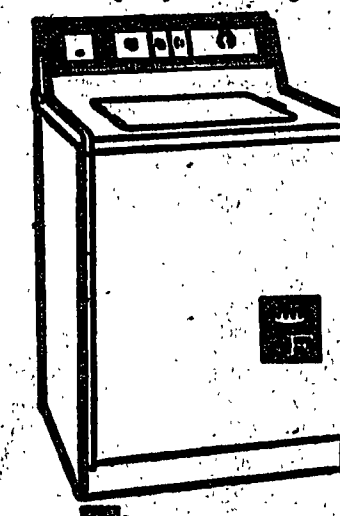
"A person's personality often changes when he comes to a hospital," Anderson explained. "For example, a husband rushing his expectant wife to Lutheran General for their 1st baby might not care if his car is parked in a fire lane. But for reasons of safety, the car cannot be parked there. It is the security officer's duty to help direct the husband in hospital procedure, but also politely ask him to remove his car after the wife is under the care of hospital personnel."

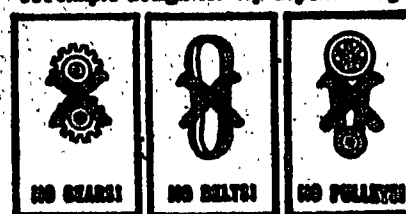
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
