From the Left Hand

While many of the school districts in our areas have non-contested elections Saturday elementary district 63 and high school district 207 in Maine Township have spirited competition.

In district 63 we hope residents will join with us in voting for Bill Gurolnick, the president of the school board, who is among the finest officials we've seen in public office. He is an enlightened dispassionate public servant who represents the very best qualities for such service. The grammar school campaign, though spirited, is really much ado about nothing. School district 63 has been in excellent hands for years, and the progress it has made, despite its continuous money problems, is the greatest testimony you can give to its officials.

In the high school election in Maine Township we'll be voting for Sylvia McNair, a Nilesite who has served on the district 63 board the past 6 years. Sylvia, who was chosen by the caucus in the district, is receiving some flak and resistance from the Park Ridge area. Park Ridgeites have long been in control of the district. And while such a point may indicate we're somewhat provincial, it nevertheless should be made. It has been our impression the school board at the high school tends to re-act, rather than to lead. The controversy over whether or not a student could wear a peace button in class was a classic example of the Park Ridge thinking which exists on the Board. When the student was thrown out of her class for wearing the button the school board acted after an attorney representing the student began to take action. It was clearly an unconstitutional act to dismiss the child, but the Board was non-committal long after it should have acted. One Board member even indicated to us they didn't want to "make waves" in the district, thus explaining their inaction.

We foresee a volatile decade ahead of us when student demands will be of greater intensity. For a Board to sit back and wait for the problems, rather than to anticipate them and prepare for them, are reasons we feel Maine High needs more vigorous candidates. The days of the sleepy-country club-don't-rock-the-boat attitude are in the past. Enlightened imaginative people are needed to live with the dynamics of our fast-changing society.

In supporting Gurolnick and McNair we use the rationale they're the only candidates we've seen in action at many meetings thru the years. They've proven their abilities in a school district which has been overwhelmed with problems for many years. They've met these challenges. It is unfair to contend the other candidates are not qualified. But we believe it's important to support proven candidates, whose past successes should be indicators for a successful future.

On that snow-laden night last Wednesday only 60 persons turned out for the "Meet the Candidates" night at East Maine school. If you subtract the spouses and newspaper people there, there were not more than 35 interested non-partisan residents present. This creates a genuine problem for school board candidates in particular, since their ability to garner votes is dependent on such exposure. During this period, candidates who we may have upset in past years, become exceedingly friendly, and others give us an extra smile or two, they might avoid during the rest of the year.

One candidate's wife has blamed us personally for many of the failures in the community. When a Niles park referendum failed, which she was working for, she sounded off because we didn't take a positive stand on it, and blamed us for its failure. When she supported a Des Plaines candidate against Nick Blase for committeeman 4 years ago she again showed much bitterness because we didn't support her candidate, who is a friend of ours. In both cases we stayed non-committal, not supporting or opposing the issue or the candidate. But in her despair, she thought the local newspaper should be a good punching bag for her frustrations. Now, the lady is involved again, and we're afraid we're in for another round of vituperation if her candidate fails Saturday.

Public Works Stresses Sewer Maintenance

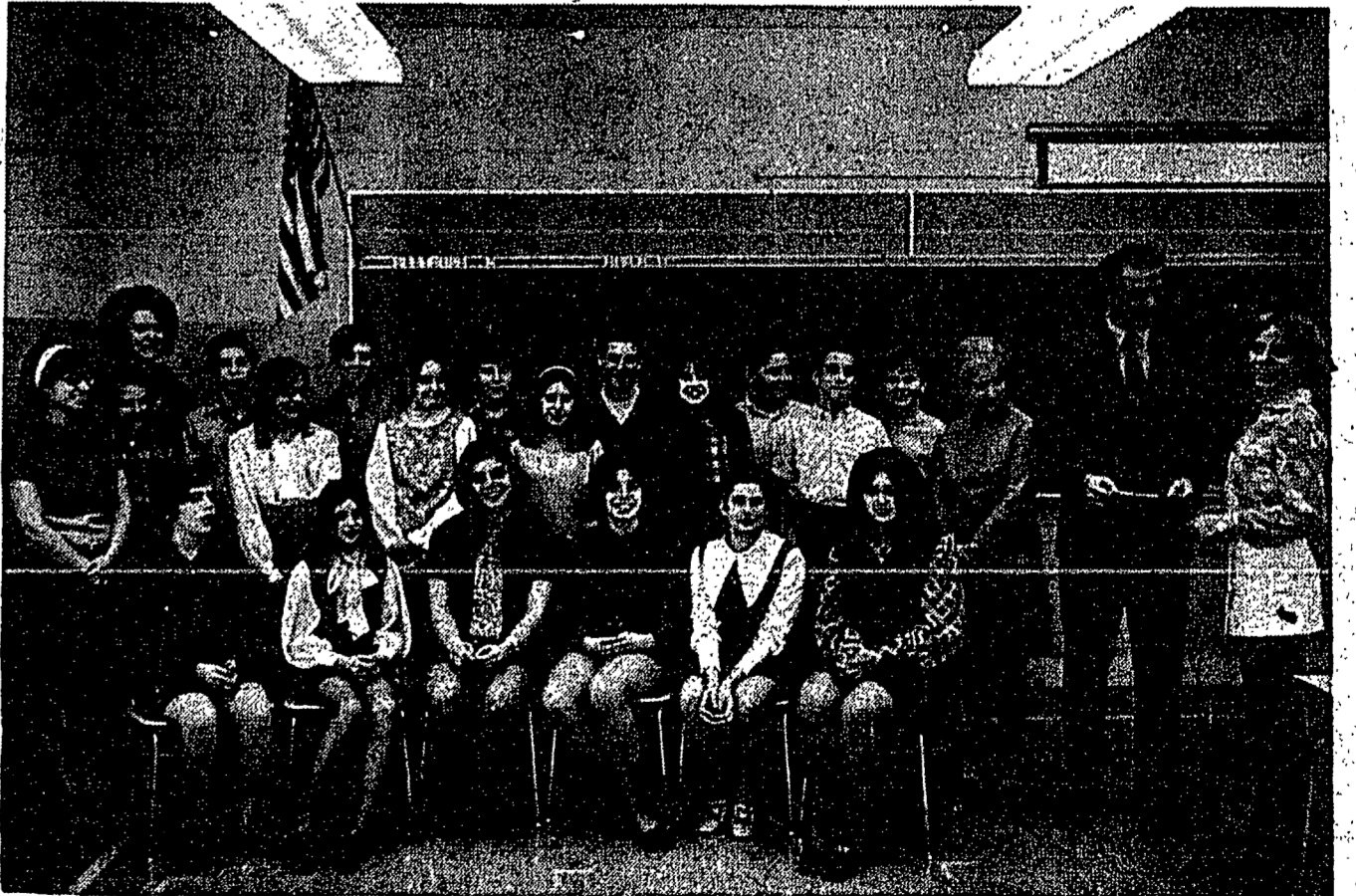
With the spring rains ahead, many Niles residents will find that their sewer lines from the street into the home are in need of rodding.

Caucus Method of Recommending Candidate

The selection of candidates for the High School Board of Education is a task too important to be left to chance, says Fred Minkus, Chairman of the District 219 Caucus. Unless there is an orderly, non-political method of selecting potential school board members, two possibilities tend to exist. One, a Board of Education whether it be good or poor, tends to perpetuate itself; and two, since there is no legal procedure for selecting a well-qualified candidate, the extrovert or a spokesman for a disgruntled group or a person with a political "ax to grind" is elected.

Caucus selection of candidates for School Board is a method by which a broad cross-section of citizens in the school district meet to canvass, screen and nominate qualified persons to become candidates for school board. It is the most democratic method as it has a "grass roots" foundation within the community which it serves. The

caucus system has been used extensively in Illinois since 1917 and the vast majority of school boards are selected thru the Caucus system. The Nilehi Caucus was formed in 1951. This year there are 41 civic organizations actively participating in the Caucus comprised of P.T.A.'s from both public and parochial schools in the district, Property Owners Groups, Rotary and other service organizations.

All candidates applying are interviewed. Up to 4 candidates for each board vacancy are presented at a meeting of all Caucus delegates. All delegates select one candidate for each vacancy. Nominating more than 1 person for each vacancy would only split the unified efforts of the caucus and would tend to discourage well qualified persons from becoming candidates if a contest is involved within the caucus. More than one Caucus candidate for each vacancy actually defeats the final purpose of caucus procedure — to secure the best available citizens as members of the Board of Education.

Two things must be remembered . . . the caucus system does not prevent individual citizens from becoming independent candidates. Secondly, P.T.A. cannot endorse candidates, caucus supported or independent, but has the announced obligation to disseminate information and educate its members on qualifications of candidates and issues involved.

The school caucus system is most successful when the citizenry is not only fully informed of the objectives of the school caucus but has sufficient confidence in the system to support its candidates. Don't abdicate your responsibility, says Fred Minkus, who hopes you'll vote April 11 for John Carlson and Angeles Foulakidas, the Caucus candidates.

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Makela Speaks on Dist. 207 Issue

In a school board candidates forum co-sponsored by the Des Plaines and Park Ridge League of Women's Voters, Roy O. Makela, AIA Architect, incumbent East Maine Caucus candidate for Maine Township High School District 207 Board of Education pointed out that some candidates report nation-wide concerns as though they were local issues.

Makela reported that the spiraling economy and escalating cost make adequate financing of education a board concern; interpreting the needs of modern youth which provide high quality educational experiences is a board concern; communications with the many publics in Maine Township is a board concern; education as a means to preventing drug problems among Maine students is a board concern. But in fact the real issue in this campaign is maintaining a responsive and knowledgeable Board of Education which can effect needed change in an orderly manner. "My record as a board member for the past 3 years indicates responsiveness to the community and the gain of knowledge in the entire District operations."

During the past 3 years, Makela said, his role as Chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee of the Board allowed him to use his professional experience as an architect to aid in the creation of more than \$15 M in additions and alterations to the 3 existing buildings and the development of a 4th Maine Township High School. Makela's close personal involvement was reflected in his statement "I would like to serve on this Board as the exciting education specifications that went into these construction designs become realities. Many changes in education are now possible due to the new construction."

Makela also reported on his current role as President of the High School Student Activities Corporation. This is the non-profit corporation that governs the policies and expenditures of the various student activity program in the Maine High Schools.

Another role, which Makela outlined in this presentation, related to his serving as representative of the 207 Board to the North Shore School Boards

Con-Con Committee. This committee is in the process of interpreting Northwest Suburban Chicago education problems to the Con Con delegates. This is ongoing involvement in which Makela stated he was in from the beginning and would like to see through to the completion. Among the many other experiences which indicate service to education, Makela related were his work as Vice-president of the 207 Board this past year, his interest in teacher negotiations for the past 2

years and his active service with parent groups and community organizations.

My past 3 years as a member of the Board of Education of the Maine Township High School District have been most stimulating and challenging. I wish to serve a second term as a Board Member in order to serve education in the Maine Township High Schools with the special knowledge and insight of current concerns I have gained during the last 3 years.

Grazian Warns Drug Use Increasing

In a statement issued early this week, Leonard R. Grazian, candidate for the Maine Township High School Dist. 207 Board warned the use of drugs by adolescents across the nation is reaching epidemic proportions, and unless solid anti-drug programs are instituted now, the epidemic could spread throughout the Dist. 207 high schools.

Grazian said experts agree drug and narcotic use among high school youths is increasing rapidly. "It's been stated," Grazian said, "the use of hard drugs (heroin) is not a problem in Maine Township. If that's true, are we going to wait until it is a problem before we establish a preventive program?"

The 46 year old father of 8 charged drugs are available to the area's youth. "Don't ask the parents or the school," he said, "ask the kids." He added, "If you ask a kid for just the truth, he'll give it to you. If you press him or threaten him he'll hold back. If you ask for names or groups, you'll get no answers."

Grazian said he talked to youths who told him some pupils show various types of drugs openly in the schools. "The reason it isn't detected by teachers or administration is because such detection calls for an expert," Grazian cited an area on the West Coast where such members of the school staff are referred to as "Bomb Experts," persons whose job it is to detect narcotics possession and use. He added where such programs have been used

successfully, such detection is usually handled by the staff experts and the parents.

"This is the type of program I'd like to see established in this school district before we reach the danger point," the lawyer and chemical engineer said.

"Unfortunately," Grazian continued, "many parents living in the 'upper-income' suburban areas feel the use of narcotics can't be a problem in their children's schools. This is not true. In fact, the use, it appears, rises with the income level of the area."

Grazian suggested skeptical parents visit the forest preserves and notice the many brown paper bags that the glue sniffers are using. This, he contended, is the beginning. He also contends that many high school youths can tell you second hand is easy to obtain at 25¢ or less a capsule; that marijuana sells locally for 50¢ or less; that amphetamines and dexedrine are easily obtained for \$75 per thousand on the black market, and the going rate for LSD is \$1. Among other drugs included in a long list which authorities claim are available to teen agers are dexamyli, benzadrine, methadrine (speed), barbiturates, tinal, mambutol, phenobarbital as well as the hallucinatories. Grazian said the hard drugs are beginning to appear in the area.

"I'm not blaming anyone," the candidate said, "but I'm trying to call attention to an area in which I believe the 207 board can move to make improvements in the district. Let us not be apathetic to this danger. Let us institute a positive drug control program in this area and let us do it now."

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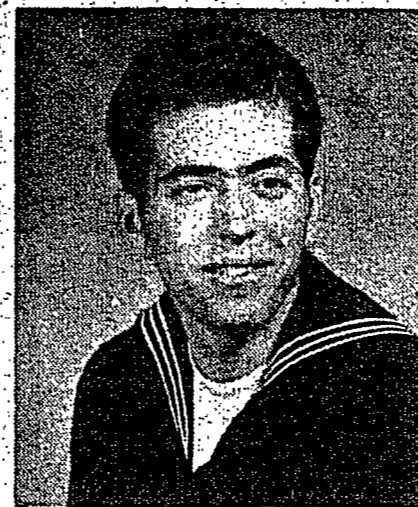
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Seaman Griseto Returns To U.S.

Household Detergents A Pollution Source

The phosphates in the household detergents Chicago area housewives buy were cited today as partly to blame for water pollution by Chester P. Majewski, a Metropolitan Sanitary District Trustee.

Ninety percent of all detergents and household cleaning products contain phosphates as a basic ingredient and these phosphates cause algae and other aquatic plant life growth, resulting in a reduced oxygen level which kills fish, causes stagnation and creates other problems, Majewski said.

Manufacturers do not use the substitutes for phosphates which are currently available, Majewski said, because they insist the American housewife will not accept products which do not include the phosphate cleaning agents.

Trustee Majewski said he is working to get manufacturers to use ingredients which will cause less harm to the environment but if voluntary compliance is not forthcoming he will ask for a ban by legislative bodies on the use of phosphates.

Asking housewives and other interested citizens "Join me in pledging to fight phosphates and free our waters from harmful ingredients that pollute our environment," Majewski said he

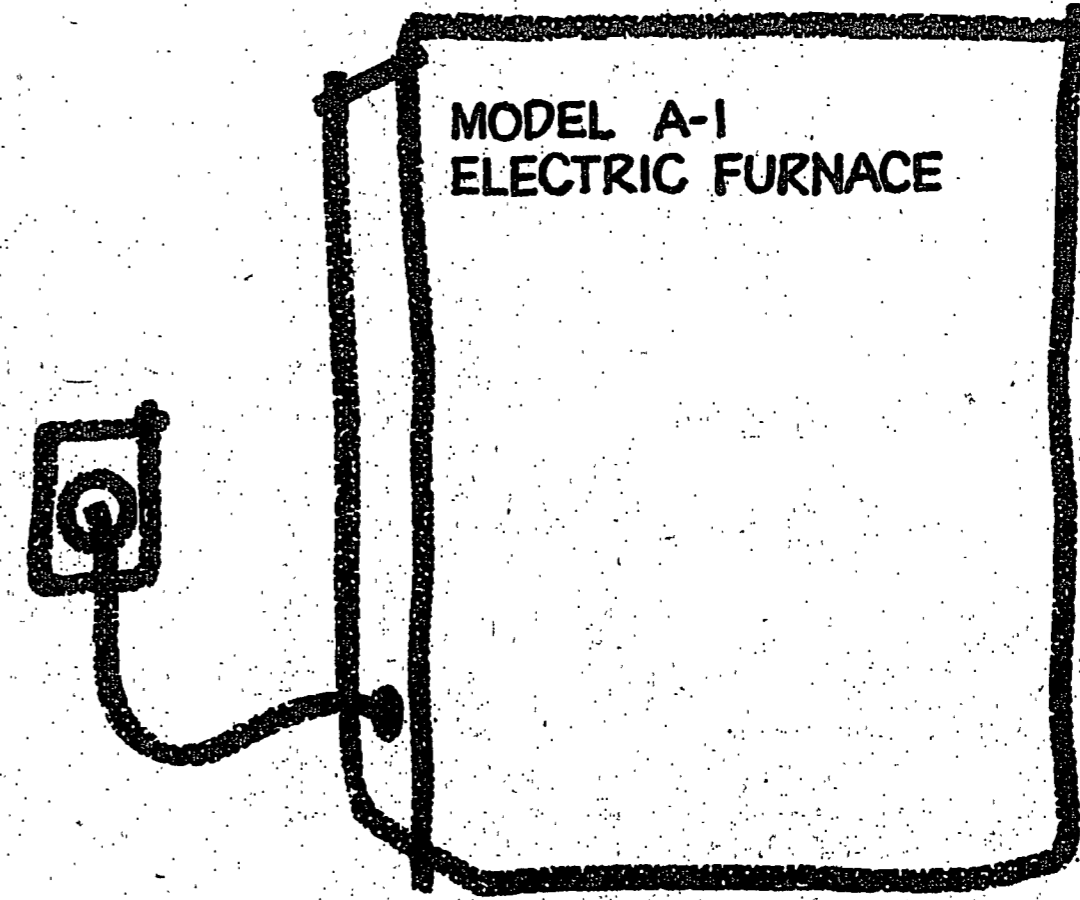
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Arlene Nidetz, Dist. 63 Candidate

There she was an elected officer for four years (secretary, 1st vice president and president) and is currently the president of River Ridge Council of PTA's which encompasses school districts 62, 63

She was secretary of the School District #63 Coordinating Council, a member of the nominating committee for the Volunteer Bureau, a member of the IPTA Golden Jubilee Scholarship committee and a participant in the project "Green Tuesday" which was developed by the IPTA and the Illinois Association of School Boards to bring public attention to the plight of Illinois public schools and the need for a substantial increase in state aid to public schools.

Mrs. Nidetz's personal convictions of voluntary service to and participation in community affairs prompted her to testify before the delegates to the Constitutional Convention when they held their hearings in Arlington Heights. She has long felt that the unbearable tax burden placed on the local taxpayer was unjust and that relief must be sought for in this area. 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EEE Committee Candidates

Why did Barbara Zywicki, John Oles and Gordon Payne refuse to attend the meeting held at EastMaine Junior High school on April 1? Wasn't it supposed to be held for the purpose of presenting the candidates to the community in an impartial manner under neutral auspices? What are the facts?

First, the so called Citizens Committee for Better Schools is a one-man organization made up of the self appointed Chairman Gary Herrman, who admitted that he was the only remaining member of a group which was last active over ten years ago. When asked the reason for the meeting, he refused to state anything except that he had been "asked by the district to call the meeting." It is clear from the attempt made to use the school children to publicize the meeting that the real sponsors of the meeting are the Board of Education members who are seeking to maintain themselves on the Board with their hand picked candidates.

Secondly, the bad faith of the convener of the meeting and his hidden associates is clearly shown by the peculiar "notice" received by Mrs. Zywicki and Messrs. Oles and Payne, who are the ONLY candidates for the Board of Education who will clean up the mess created by the Board of Education. Our attendance at the staged meeting was announced by Mr. Herrman to the press before he even bothered to contact us. Only after the rumors of the meeting became known to us, did we receive an illegally delivered notice of the meeting by someone who wished to hide his identity. The notice we received was dated April 1, 1970 - the date of the meeting itself! The real intention was at the last moment to force the candidates of the Committee for Educational Excellence with Economy to attend a rigged meeting.

Thirdly, the ground rules laid down in the meeting notice clearly show that the meeting was to be rigged for the benefit of our opposition. ONLY questions relating to the "qualifications" of the candidates were to be allowed. Mr. Herrman stated that he would be the SOLE JUDGE as to the questions submitted to the candidates. Obviously, our opposition was not going to permit themselves to be embarrassed by having to discuss the real issues posed by our candidacy.

Does any parent or taxpayer think that Mr. Herrman would permit any questions relating to the real issues? Some of the

It is our feeling that while the taxpayer may be able to afford the extravagances of these choices, our children cannot afford educational deterioration that is the end result. Although Mrs.

Nidetz is a caucus choice, it chosen to be a candidate only for the purpose of making the remaining candidates look good. To do this those controlling this caucus had to come up with a good, qualified candidate who was not a part of their machine. It is our feeling that under these circumstances Mrs. Nidetz would be a fine addition to the board and would not be an extension of the controlling apparatus.

Using the same line of reasoning we feel that the EEE Committee is also made up of many well meaning people and as such have come up with two good candidates in Mrs. Zywicki and Mr. Oles. However, this committee can fall into the same trap that this caucus did, namely the supporting of candidates solely on the basis that they are organization choices and must be supported even though the choice was not as wise as it might have been. I might add here that my wife and I were purged from this organization by a so called executive board only because we could not in good conscience support one of their candidates. While I do not believe this act is indicative of the committee as a whole I do believe the same forces that created the controlled caucus in District #63 may well be at work in this new organization.

For somewhat the same reasons, plus his close contact with the young men and women of our high schools we would recommend the Reverend Graham for member of the board of District #207.

I feel that we should stress here that the recommendations expressed above are our own and hope that they will in some way enable the individual voter to make his own decision, for in the final analysis he is the one who will ultimately pay for the correctness of his decision.

The Maine-Niles Junior College offers a magnificent opportunity for the related grade school districts and high school districts to get together with the new facility on 1) definition of area needs; 2) assessment of area resources (program, personnel, physical plant) against those needs by a private specialist such as Greenleigh Associates or a not-for-profit organization currently unencumbered by consultant relationships with participating districts; and 3) collaborative problem solution, pooling resources whenever possible.

A cursory examination of the Illinois School Code uncovers no prohibition of this approach. If there is any statutory or regulatory prohibition, it should be removed forthwith. However, Illinois government being what it is, specific enabling legislation may have to be sought.

The educational apparatus is doing something of a job in Maine and Niles Townships, but whether program, personnel, physical plant or planning is under consideration, some question may be raised as to whether the entire process is as efficient or effective as it might be.
