End O' The Month Meanderings....

The old Bugle hasn't added any combat stars to its battle-worn colors in quite a while. We believe it's time we churn up our 40 year old Royal typewriter and get involved where the action should be.

Two weeks ago the township government's annual meetings took place in a rather cloaked atmosphere. In Maine Township none of our communities were notified the meetings were being held, and reports floating back from Des Plaines contended the hall was stacked against outsiders who are not friendly toward the township establishment. At these one-a-year meetings the old town hall voting process takes place in which the majority of those present determine the policy for the township government.

This year additional tax levies may be placed on all tax bills because past years' revenues may no longer be forthcoming. A 2% rebate on property taxes paid in the townships gave them money to spare in operating their fiefdoms. This year a court ruling knocked out the rebate which may result in a \$3 to \$5 tax addition on all tax bills, both in Maine and Niles Townships.

The case favoring township government is defensible for rural areas which are mostly unincorporated. But here in our urban areas these governments have long outlived their usefulness, and the need to actively eliminate them should be undertaken. Niles Township has no unincorporated area outside of forest preserve areas and Maine Township areas receive negligible benefits. In their budgets highway maintenance and welfare costs are absurdities for our communities. Yet, because of resident indifference and ignorance, these no-longer-needed governments continue to function in areas already over-burdened by too much government. The overlapping of county, township and village governments makes the outmoded township bodies unnecessary here.

Black smoke spewed from the forest preserve area Saturday afternoon just east of Lehigh and south of Beckwith in Morton Grove. It was interesting how many autos pulled off to the side of the road and pollution-minded riders showed much concern. It was a fair example of how concerned citizens, when informed and aroused, become involved. Morton Grove's police and fire cars were quickly on the scene but the concern of the curbside viewers attests to the awareness of citizens, and the effectiveness of the anti-pollution activity in the country.

Niles trustee Ed Barkowsky will be moving outside the village this summer leaving an opening which will be filled by a selectee of Mayor Blase. This will leave Ang Marcheschi as the senior trustee on the Board. He is now in his 8th year. In bygone years trustees in Niles had longer political longevity. But since the Blase era, beginning in 1961, no public official has served more than 2 terms except Blase himself, who is now in his 10th year.

Because of the opposition of Marcheschi to Blase last year it is conceivable Blase might try to knock off Ang next year. If successful, it would mean Keith Peck would become the senior member of the trustees, and he would only be in his 6th year.

OKAY SHOPPING CTR., HI RISE ANNEXATION

Trustee Keith Peck was the lone dissenter Tuesday night as 5 Niles trustees joined with Mayor Blase in okaying annexation of the Dempster Plaza Shopping Center, on the north side of Dempster and the west side of Greenwood, a second annexation was also approved for a corridor from Greenwood to Deer rd., on the south side of Emerson and north to Cathy Ln., which includes 12 residential buildings including three 12 story apartment buildings as well as park property owned by the Golf Maine Park District.

Mayor Blase said expected legal action will likely take from six months to a year, before a final decision is reached regarding the annexation. Attorney Wilhelm Leventer, representing the North Maine Fire District, said the cutting off of these areas from the newly-formed fire district would cut off revenue necessary for the maintenance of the district. He cited state statutes making such action illegal. Niles village attorney said it was his opinion such an annexation was legal and proper.

Hartzell Issues Statement on #207 Board Election

The following is a statement read by Niles board member Wesley Hartzell at the April 20 meeting of the District 207 Board of Education concerning the recent school election:

Mr. President:

I think it's in order to express appreciation to the citizens of District 207 who in large numbers involved themselves in last week's election of school board members. It is a good thing when many citizens take the trouble to ascertain the issues and come out to vote. That such a turnout occurred on a day when the weather was terrible is a further tribute to their interest in good schools.

They are also to be commended for maintaining, while they voted, the board's geographical representation. Those citizens who refrained from becoming candidates because their election might have disturbed our geographical representation are due special thanks.

It is gratifying to have all the candidates' issues that certainly need to be examined by this board. The ideas contributed by the unsuccessful candidates are especially welcomed. Mr. Grazian's thoughts -- in particular, that a great deal of attention must be devoted to the problems of drugs -- and Mrs. McNair's concerns over the rights of students and the necessity to recognize their growing maturity in new ways -- I am sure will be taken up by the board.

One thing only about the election . . . and I am happy to say that it did not, to my knowledge, enter into the statements or public campaigning of the candidates . . . could be construed as negative or destructive. This was the implication that there is a great deal of hostility over our schools between communities in the district and that there is, or was, an attempt by the board members of one or two areas to dominate the thinking and voting of the other members in some unspecified manner.

If the people who make this charge had taken the trouble to find what actually goes on in board and committee meetings and in the schools they would know this is not true. I can say that in my four years on the

board nobody has sought to coerce or persuade me to vote against the interests of school children in my particular area.

The effect of this kind of an attack upon board members is inconsequential, however, when measured against its possible effects on the district as a whole. The attempt to set communities against communities, parents against students, and students against students, could be disastrous for our young people were it to succeed.

This does not mean, of course, that inequalities in our schools will not arise. But one advantage of area representation on the board is that all members are ceaselessly examining the whole system to make sure the quality of education is equal in all our schools. However, the correction of any inequalities will not take place at all if communities and board members are constantly shouting at, and accusing, each other. Fortunately we have a board which

attempts to settle its differences on the basis of logic, reason and a desire to serve all the students.

If our schools are to progress we must go forward together or we will not go forward at all. We must have the entire community's support, or we will lose it all. I have every confidence we have and will continue to have that support.

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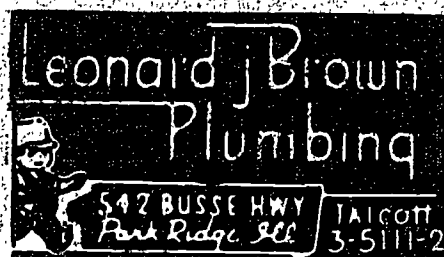
Bill Barth, Jr. in Vietnam

The team began the season Nov. 1 at Wheeling High School winning 6 of 8 varsity debates, 7 of 8 junior varsity debates, and 4 of 8 novice debates. Team members, Harvey Morris and Bob Feldhake, won the top and second place Junior Varsity Championship Debater awards.

The following week the Maine East team continued to win by taking the West Suburban Conference championship with an undefeated 6-0 varsity record. Jeff Kluge, senior debater and team captain, won the Top Varsity Debater award. The novice team tied with Lyons for the Conference Championship, both compiling a 5-1 record.

Success continued with the team battling "500" at the traditionally tough Evanston High tournament. The junior varsity won 6 of 8 debates at the Northern Illinois university level of competition, while the varsity team captured the third place trophy at the tournament. Jeff Kluge again won one of the top debater awards.

Shifting the novice team to the junior varsity level, the junior varsity to the varsity level, and breaking in a new

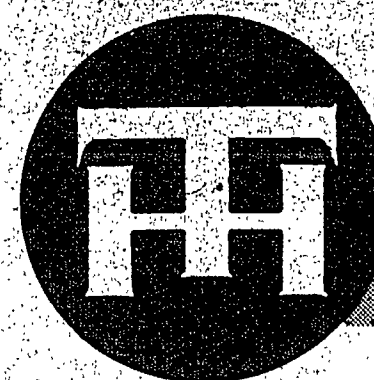

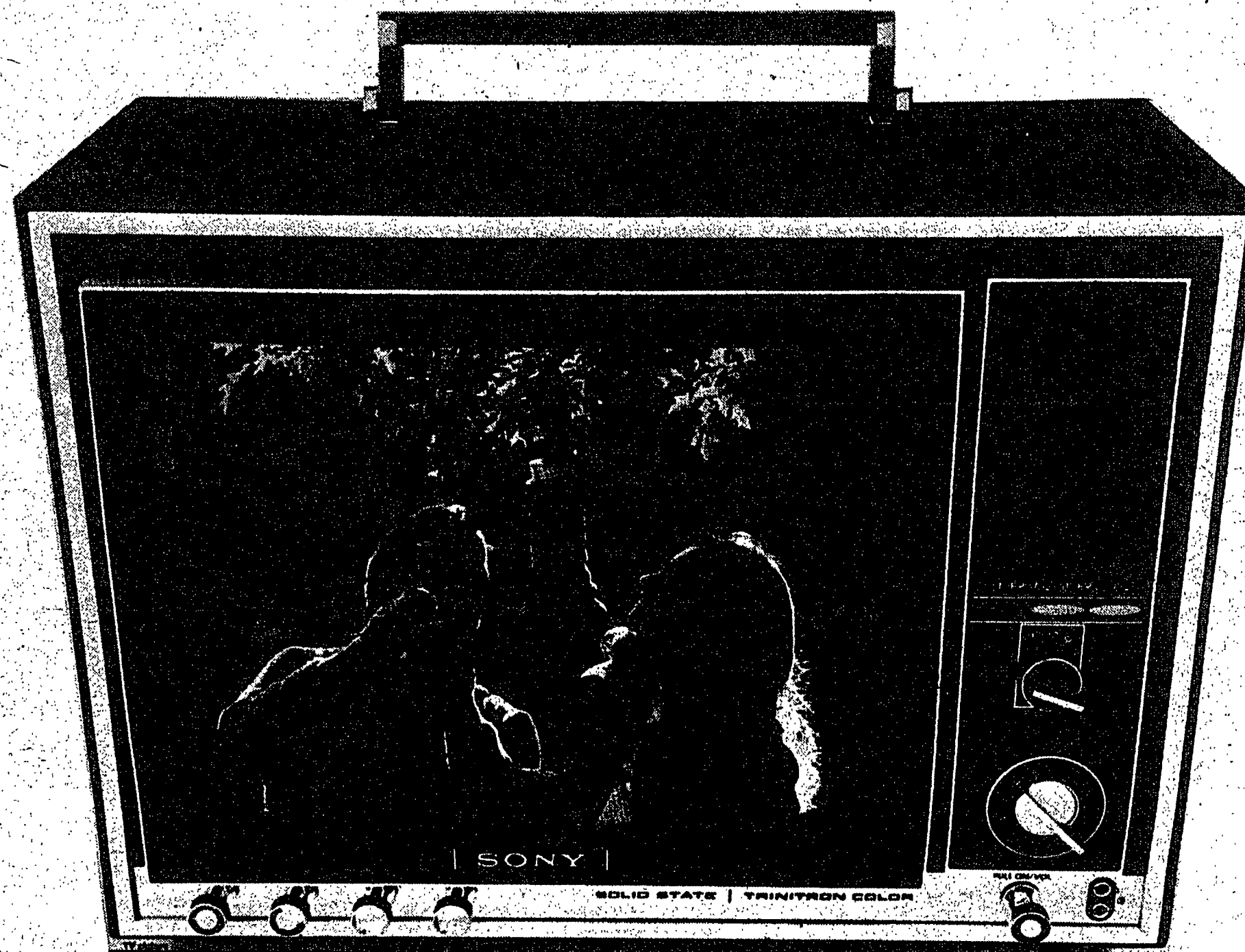
The season officially ended at the National Debate Tournament held at Evanston on March 22. Maine debated its way to the quarter finals boasting a fifth tournament record of 4-2.

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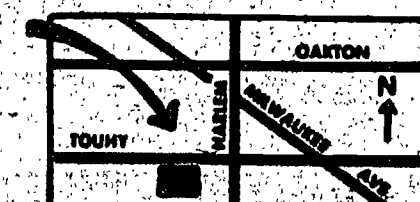
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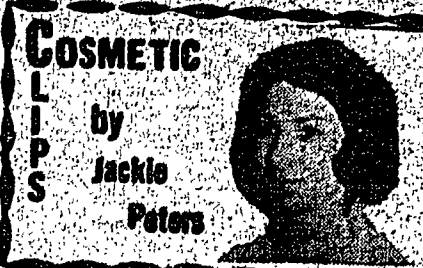

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Glaucoma Screening Unit in Niles May 6



Todd Bavaro, president, Lions club of Niles, announces to the residents of Niles that the mobile glaucoma screening unit operated by the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness will be screening, without charge, for unsuspected cases of glaucoma on May 6, Wednesday, from 1:30 to 5 and 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. The unit will be stationed at Niles Administration building, Milwaukee and Howard. This project is sponsored locally by the Lions club of Niles which is interested in promoting a large turn-out for this important screening.

This marks the first time a mobile glaucoma screening unit has been brought to this community and local residents are urged to take advantage of this unusual opportunity to have their eyes tested for glaucoma. The test will be given without charge to all residents of the area who are 35 and over. The purpose of the screening is to find unknown cases of glaucoma which can lead to blindness if not discovered and treated promptly.

The test is painless and takes just a short time to complete.

Glaucoma is a leading cause of blindness in Illinois and is most often found in those 35 and over. If undetected it can eventually lead to blindness. It is estimated that there are 90,000 cases of unsuspected glaucoma in the state. Glaucoma may exhibit no symptoms in the early stages according to Derrick Vall, M.D., a Director of the Illinois Society for the Prevention of Blindness. That is why it is so important for those over 35 to be checked for this disease.

Glaucoma can be present without the victim suspecting that he has an eye disease which could eventually lead to blindness. If not found and treated promptly, it is for this reason that the glaucoma screening unit is being brought to Niles.

There is a dramatic increase in the incidence of glaucoma in the state, due in part to the increasing life span. That is why the Lions club of Niles is making a special effort to alert all those 35 and over to the danger of the disease.

These students rank with the top 30 science students out of the 128 superior student scientists in the state who participated in the program.

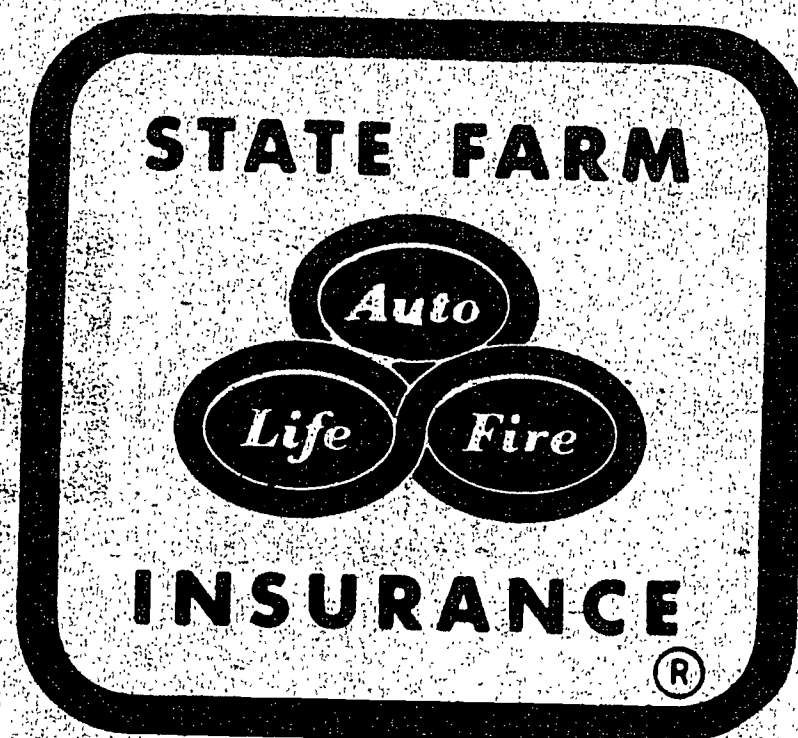


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Kites Galore in Annual Park Derby

matter was brought before the Village Board once more. Mayor Bode raised the question of paving the alley in back of the building, but it was finally decided to block the alley by planting hedges and thereby gaining two more parking spaces, bring the total amount of parking spaces to 41. The board agreed to concur with the Plan Commission's recommendation at that point. The next case involved a Special Use permit requested by the American Oil Co. to remodel and improve their station at 5801 Dempster. The Plan Commission said they recommend issuing this permit since the occupants agreed to the suggestions of the Beautification Committee and would subsequently agree to all proposals and stipulations made by the board. The board agreed to join with the Plan Commission in granting the permit if the following stipulations were met. 1. Removal of the two cottonwood trees. 2. Board approval on choice of signs, and adherence to the picture submitted. Mayor Bode commended Mr. Lutz and his committee on their fine work.

Chief Norman Glauner announced that our three new officers, Kezios, Kubas and Davis will be attending Northern Illinois university starting Monday. Fire Chief Chris Hildebrand said the Fire Dept. handled 28 calls last month and that exams were being held tonight for Firemen. He also said Capt. Huscher was in Lutheran General hospital under observation.

John Hilkin said a suit has been filed against Wells Mfg. because of their air pollution problem. In addition to the 2 annexations Niles also upped its liquor license quota from 40 to 41 pouring licenses and from 8 to 10 package liquor stores approving licenses for the existing stores in the shopping center.

In objecting to the annexations Trustee Keith Peck cited these annexations are the first steps toward additional annexation. He asked what benefit annexations are to present Niles residents and what will be the eventual cost to its citizens. He said before such annexations take place a thorough study should be made, noting the costs of such action, and what water, sewer, and street plans are needed there. He thought Niles would not be able to maintain its present Class 3 fire rating (the unincorporated area presently has a low 7 rating) and thought the ultimate population of Niles would move up to 75,000.

Some of the problems cited in the unincorporated area were the poor construction of buildings there, increased fire hazards from the poor construction and the general degeneration of the entire area in the crowded unincorporated area.

Park Commissioner Jack Leske, saying he was speaking only as a citizen of Niles, also voiced objections to the move. He said at one time Niles Park District was considering annexing much of the area there and the major developer, Morris Suson, was first, for annexation, then, against it, which he implied contributed to the Niles Park District's deciding against annexation. Leske said he felt, "What is good for Suson is not good for Niles." Leske asked what is the purpose of annexing.

Mayor Nick Blase took the lead in the annexation push and told Leske, "The shopping center is the 'sugar' in the annexation," indicating there are positive and negative factors to such annexation. Blase believed if further development of the area is to take place "maybe it would be better inside an incorporated area" so it could be better controlled. Blase, rising to Leske's

objections, said, "No government is bad government... In time we must eliminate all unincorporated areas. We can no longer put our head in the sand..."

Blase also stated several times this is only the first step in the annexation. There will be several public hearings in the future.

Trustees Richard Harczak and Gruenwald both emphasized Niles must look to the future. Harczak cited Niles gets about 40% of its sales tax revenue from Golf Mill Center which means into Niles treasury from the center. Gruenwald cited the additional \$200,000 revenue from the new center which will enrich Niles. Gruenwald commented a town must continue to grow.

Peck, still adamant in his objection, said Niles will be almost obligated to take all of the unincorporated area. He talked about a freeway which might go down Golf rd., perhaps 5 years from now. He said such a creation would cause a divorced area in Niles.

Blase, quietly opposing Peck's objections, said the Zenith Corporation's proposed industrial complex north of Central rd. should be considered and the annexation "leaves an avenue open" (for possible annexing the industrial area). Blase said he didn't mean to sound too hokey but the pioneers in this country didn't stop pushing ahead, inferring Niles should never lose a similar spirit.

When the vote was taken Harczak made the motion for both annexations and only Peck opposed them.

Surprisingly, only 50 people were quietly in attendance at a meeting which has far-reaching meaning to Niles future.

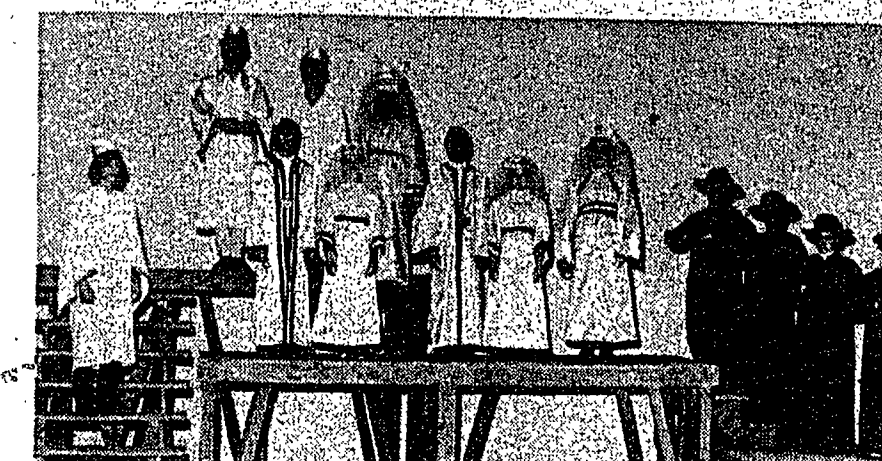

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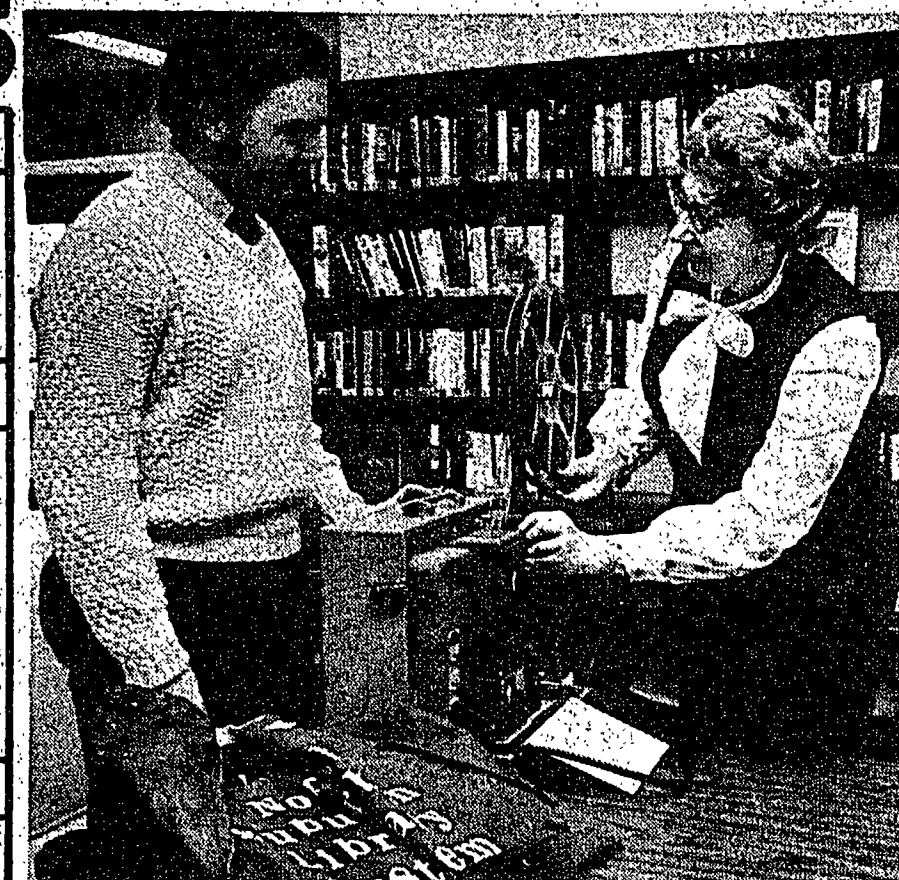

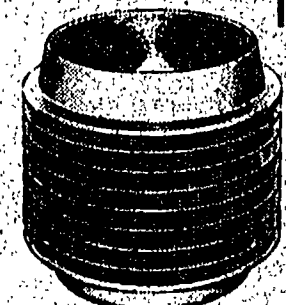
