From the Left Hand Measles Inoculation Program

In mid-America it was an unbelievable week. The guys in the coffee shop would have joined with the construction workers on Wall Street if they'd been there in beating up the kids.

One boy in our block in Morton Grove, a most gentle young man, was beaten up by the military on his campus. A mother of a Niles boy said her son was eating hamburgers in McDonalds on his campus when stick-wielding state policemen attacked them. The boy said he wanted to stand his ground, since he didn't do anything, but he joined the other kids in running from an obvious beating.

A faculty member we were with over the week-end said he was pessimistic. He was afraid the White House wasn't listening, or if they were, really didn't care what was being told them from the campuses. He also related the reports about student strikes closing his school weren't true. He said so many stories concerning the kids aren't true that a general cynicism exists among them since they no longer have much faith in the words of the establishment.

Saturday our number one daughter marched to Grant Park from the Civic Center, and we were proud she was taking a stand. Our number one son, meanwhile, was also downtown, lunching in a restaurant, when a young teen came and made a loud derogatory remark about the policemen eating there. He stood tall by letting her know her remark was uncalled for in loud and clear tones.

At one restaurant we were at, we were told "your profession can't be believed since they didn't report about the put down of radical leaders" at the state university. When we tried to explain 300 universities were presently involved in shut downs, and reporting everything that happened at 300 schools was an impossibility, it was answered with a blank stare.

Moving in closer to the action we moved onto the Northwestern campus Thursday afternoon. One short street was barricaded and perhaps 3 or 4 campuses manned the barricades. There was a blond-haired boy, who was making an ass of himself, letting out war-whoops, scampering up and down the metal boxes along the barricades, and generally acting like he was hopped-up or boozed-up. And there was a very pretty teen-age girl sitting atop the rubble, swigging from a gallon bottle, which we guessed was a wine bottle. And there were cameras being shot everywhere as kids idly moved around the barricades. Down the street, there were many hundreds of students laying in the sun, and waiting for a speaker to tell them what was being planned for the remainder of the afternoon. There was lots of talk. Students and faculty were gathered in tens of small circles discussing very quietly what was happening on campus as well as around the world. There were loads of differing opinions and they were all discussed very quietly. Everyone seemed to want to listen as much as they wanted to talk.

At 3 p.m. the head of the student group said there would be a meeting at Dychs Stadium later in the afternoon, but students desiring to pass out pamphlets would form at the far end of the campus. All was orderly, as though everyone was hypnotized by the beautiful spring day.

When we left to return home we drove down our lawn-smooth street and wondered how many of our generation really understood what was going on. Lawn mowers were purring, and there was lots of garden activity. That Peggy Lee song, "Is This All There Is?" kept playing in my head, as I saw middle-aged suburbia tending their gardens.....

After seeing the kids 5 miles to the east, and then returning to the lawn tenderers, and the rose growers, I had a sad feeling our generation wasn't listening.....or worse.....really didn't care.

Set Up Consumer Fraud Division

OK RECORD CASH BUDGET \$2,909,110

Village Trustees okayed a record cash budget for the fiscal year beginning May 1 of \$2,909,110. This is not the total of all expenditures since last year's money appropriated was \$3,853,563.

Included in the upcoming year's financial increase are village salaries which went up about 10%.

Other new items include the village paying 50% of Blue Cross costs for employees, the leasing of a new ladder truck for the fire department, additional lighting and landscaping for the new administration hall, a \$30,000 fire lane behind the Lawrencewood townhouses and a \$30 per month increase for trustees which brings their salary for 2 meetings a month to \$60.

In other actions Niles will have a Consumer Fraud Dept. where interested residents can file complaints in Niles for fraudulent solicitation on advertising. Village clerk Frank Wagner said representatives from the state would be available to check into such frauds. Mayor Blase said the cost for such an office would be negligible since Clerk Wagner would man the office and the state's efforts would be a state cost, rather than a village one. Presently, the state has a similar office in Schaumburg. Actually, the village is making village space available to the state in exchange for the state's personal efforts in Niles.

In still other action the increased requests for fences being raised from 4 feet to 6 feet will be studied by the zoning board and the village board. Trustee Ang Marcheschi thought such fences, particularly in townhouse areas, are dangerous and are an obstacle in the event a fire takes place. While 3 requests for variances were sent to the ZB the results of past actions will be studied with the likelihood of a new amendment regarding fence heights.

Trustees approve, giving themselves a raise. They presently are paid \$15 per meeting which normally meet twice monthly. Blase announced a \$30 per month stipend should be added, technically as members of the Board of Local Improvements, which meets after village board meetings.

Blase said Niles officials receive less than neighboring officials. Morton Grove trustees receive \$25 per meeting weekly, while Skokie officials receive \$75 a meeting or \$150 a month. Only Trustee Keith Peck voted against the raise. He said such a raise should be voted before an election, which we assume meant should not become active.

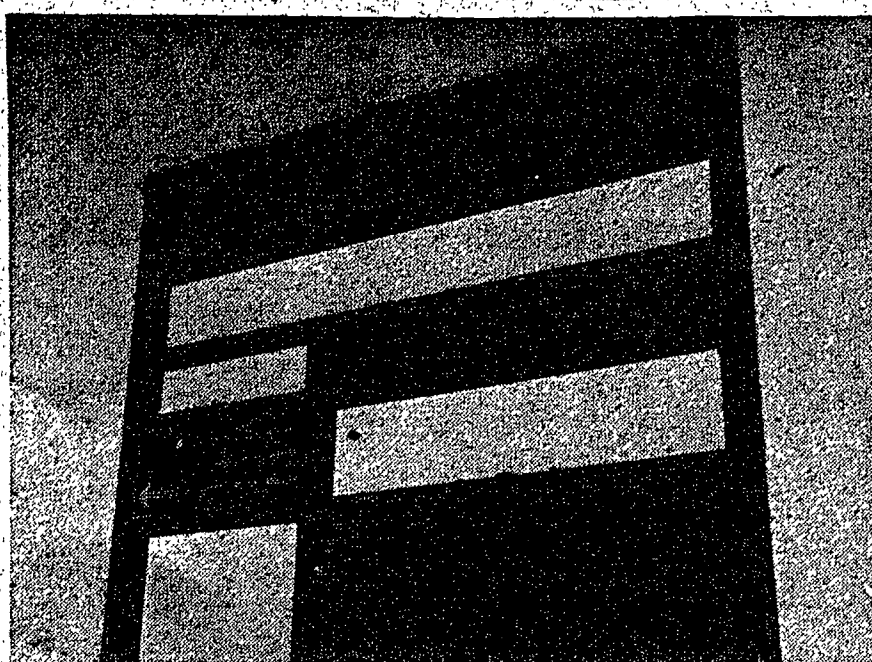

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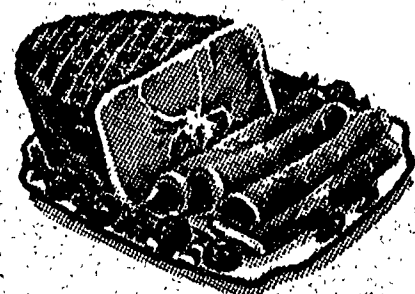

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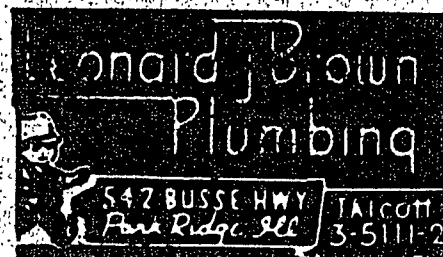

**Poppy Day Proclamation**

Buddy Poppy Day is officially coming to Niles next May 21, and Mayor Nicholas B. Blase, by official proclamation, has urged all Nilesites to support this gesture of homage to their veterans.

Poppy Day is celebrated nationally each year under the sponsorship of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Proceeds of the

one-day campaign are used exclusively by disabled and needy veterans, or their widows and orphans.

In his proclamation, Mayor Blase said, "I urge all patriotic citizens to wear a Buddy Poppy as mute evidence of our gratitude to the men of this country who have risked their lives in defense of the freedoms which we continue to enjoy as American citizens."

Last year, Niles VFW Post #7712 collected over \$4300 in the campaign, and Frank Klein-kemper, post chairman of the Poppy Day committee, said that this year, with 30,000 poppies for sale, they will try to have a banner year. He said that 75 volunteers have already signed up for the effort.

Rock Cantata at Notre Dame

A University Student Speaks Her "Peace"

Dear Mr. Besser,

To the Niles community:

I am a junior at the University of Illinois-Champaign campus. I am not a "student radical," that is, radical in the connotation that the news media has termed it to be; I do not advocate rock throwing, burning of buildings, or infringement upon anyone's right of private property. However, I am in favor of this first nationwide strike of college students and am very concerned about the issues at hand, but am also disheartened by the lack of reaction to the strike.

The strike was called in protest to: 1 - U.S. involvement in Southeast Asia, most recently the U.S. invasion of Cambodia. 2 - The killings of 4 students at Kent State university by National Guardsmen.

Although other minor issues developed at various universities, these are the two main ones that all U.S., as well as foreign, colleges support.

I was provoked into writing this letter for two reasons. First, I write because of unnecessary, or what I hope is unnecessary, violence on the part of law enforcement officials as well as on the part of students. The students I talked to were in agreement with me that we do not condone violence and hope the small minority who have lost faith in the democratic processes will think twice about the right of the individual and mostly the value of human life. I hope more people will look to the large majority who favor change in a peaceful manner and the, for the most part, peaceful strike at the Champaign campus before they yell "bums" as some have done. At this time I should like to make clear the strike in Champaign was organized by students, not by outsiders as some people believe, and I am sure the situation is similar in other universities across the country. We are concerned students who feel the immorality of the Indochinese war should be stopped and we as citizens have the right to peaceful assembly. Thanks to the support of 130 volunteer law students and several law professors in accordance with the majority of students in support of peaceful demonstration, the University of Illinois has been fortunate in avoiding confrontation with law enforcement officials. However, violence is the stuff of the news media. Before you make a value judgment please look at the hundreds of schools that have had peaceful demonstrations in an attempt to gain support of the public and the elite who rule this nation. You won't find this vast majority of schools on the front pages of your newspaper.

Secondly, I was most appalled at the apathy for want of a better word, of the working class, that is, the "silent majority." I doubt many people in this country want a war; I do not think that anyone wants to see more people murdered and more land devastated. But what have you done? We, as students, demonstrate, we do not know what else to do except show our numbers. I hope that is all we have to do; but we are doing something! However, you, the American middle class, sit back watching the 10 p.m. news and say "that's terrible," but what have you done? You feel as citizens that your property rights are being infringed upon,

but are you citizens? As I see it the citizen has a responsibility to live up to also, and I ask you "who are society's 'bums'?"

Four students were killed this week. Yes, there was some violence at Kent, but the crowd that the National Guardsmen shot into was a crowd of students; a small majority throwing rocks, a group assembled peacefully, and a few students walking to class. If a sniper was heard why wasn't the sniper shot at—why were four honor students senselessly murdered. Unfortunately this tragedy can happen again and it can happen anywhere to anyone. How many of you have children in college? Are you concerned about their welfare and their right as citizens? From the public response, obviously not. We are all responsible for the deaths of these four, and those most responsible are those who have quietly sat back and have done nothing. You've let students do your protesting for you and now you let them die for you. Four human beings have died, simply because they didn't like a war in Cambodia. All we ask is GIVE PEACE A CHANCE!

If you are at all concerned about these issues please write your Congressmen, the democratic processes cannot work if no one uses them. Congress has never been so split and will be anxious to hear your views. If you're not concerned—get concerned—do it now!

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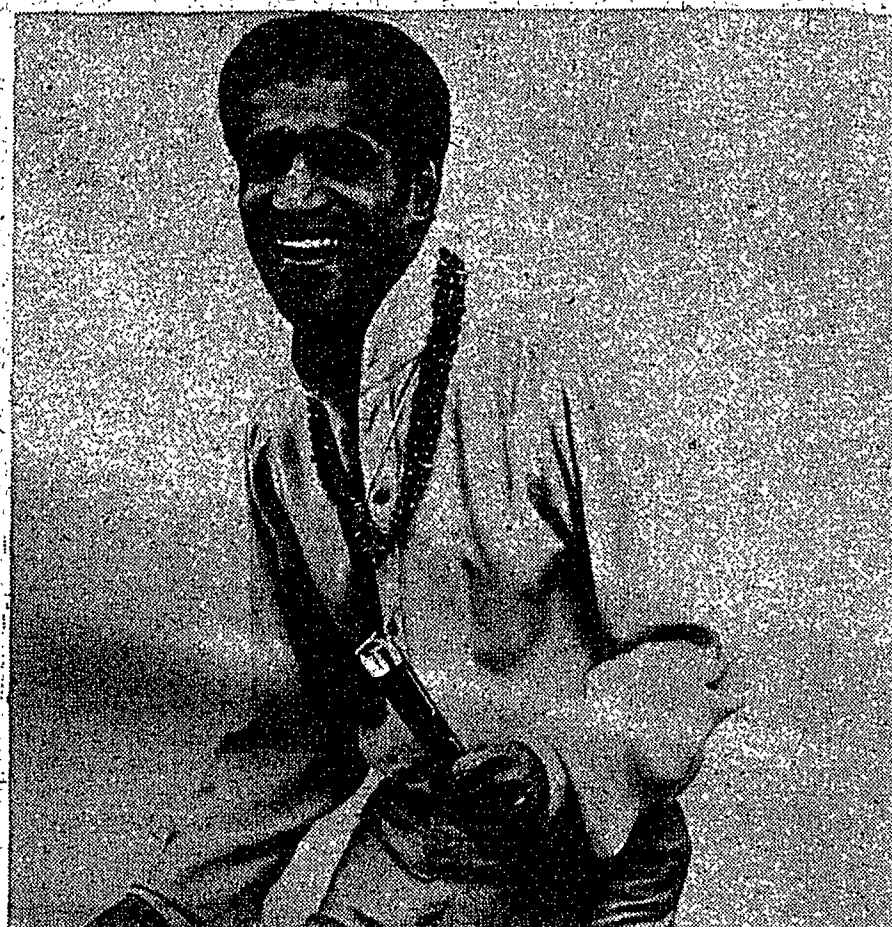
