

Trustee Ang Marcheschi thought such fences, particularly in townhouse areas, are dangerous and are an obstacle in the event a fire takes place, While 3 requests for variances were sent to the ZB the results of past actions will be studied with the liklihood of a new amendment regarding fence heights.


.....Trustees approved giving themselves a raise. They pre-sently are paid \$15 per meeting which normally meet twice monthly. Blase announced a \$30 per month stiperd should be added, technically as members of the Board of Local Improvements, which meets after village board meeting actions.

Blase said Niles officials receive less than neighboring officials, Morton Grove trustees receive \$25 per meeting weekly, while Skokie officials receive \$75 a meeting or \$150 a month. Only Trustee Keith Peck Voted against the raise. He said such a raise should be voted before an election, which we assume meant should not become active Continued on Page 19

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### The Bugle, Thursday, May 14, 1970 LETTERS TO THE EDITOR A University Student Speaks Her "Peace"

To the Niles community: I am a junior at the Uni-versity of Illinois-Champaign campus. I am not a "student radical," that is, radical in the connotation that the news media has termed it to be; I do not advocate rock throwing, burning of buildings, or infringement upon anyone's right of private property, However, I am in favor of this first nationwide

strike of college students and am very concerned about the issues at hand, but am also. disheartened by the lack of reaction to the strike. The strike was called in protest to: 1 - U.S. involvement in Southeast Asia, most recently

the U.S. invasion of Cambodia. 2 - The killings of 4 students at Kent State university by National Guardsmen.

Although other minor issues developed at various universities. these are the two main ones that all U.S. as well as foreign, colleges support.

I was provoked into writing this letter for two reasons. First. I write because of unnecessary, or what I hope is unnecessary, violence on the part of law enforcement offi-cials as well as on the part of students. The students talked to were in agreement with me that we do not condone violence and hope the small minority who have lost faith in the democratic processes will think twice about the right of the individual and mostly the value of human life. I hope more people will look to the large majority who favor change in a peaceful manner and the, for the most part, peaceful strike at the Champaign campus before they yell "bums" as some have done. At this time I should like to make clear the strike in Champaign was organized by students, not by outsiders as some people believe, and I am sure the situation is similar in other universities across the country. We are concerned students who feel the immorality of the Indochinese war should be stopped and we as citizens have the right to peaceful assembly Thanks to the support of 130 volunteer law students and several law professors in accordance with the majority of students in support of peaceful demonstration, the University of Illinois has been fortunate in avoiding confrontation with law. enforcement officials. However, violence is the stuff of the news media. Before you make a value judgment please look at the hundreds of schools that have had peaceful demonstrations in an attempt to gain support of the public and the elite who rule this nation. You won't find this vast majority of schools on the front pages of your newspaper.

Secondly, I was most appalled at the apathy, for want of a better word, of the working class, that is, the "silent majority." I doubt many people in this country want a war; I do not think that anyone wants to see more people murdered and more land devastated, But what have you done? We, as students, demonstrate, we do not know what else to do except show our numbers, I hope that is all we have to do; but we are doing some-thing! However, you, the Ameri-can middle class, sit back watching the 10 p.m. news and say "that's terrible," but what have you done? You feel as citizens that your property rights are being infringed upon.

but are you citizens? As I see it the citizen has a responsibility to live up to also. and I ask you "who are so-ciety's 'Bums'?"

Four students were killed this week. Yes, there was some violence at Kent, but the crowd that the National Guardsmen shot into was a crowd of students; a small majority throwing rocks, a group assembled peaceably, and a few students walking to class. If a sniper was heard why wasn't the sniper shot at-why were four honor students senselessly murdered. Unfortunately this tragedy can happen again and it can happen anywhere to anyone. How many of you have children in college? Are you concerned about their welfare and their right as citizens? From the public response, obviously not! We are all responsible for the deaths of these four, and those most responsible are those who have quietly sat back and have done nothing. You've let students do your protesting for you and now you let them die for you. Four human beings have died, simply because they didn't like a war in Cambodia. All we ask is GIVE PEACE A CHANCE!

If you are at all concerned about these issues please write your Congressmen, the democratic processes cannot work if no one uses them. Congress has never been so split and will be anxious to hear your views. If you're not concerned-eget concerned-do it now!

Over the week-end of the 2-3 of May, the Midwest Fenc-ing Sectional Championships were held in St. Louis. Illinois Fencers, especially the Under 19 group, did quite well in this two day competition.

In the Adult division, Tony Zombolas took 1st place in foil to regain his Midwest Chamto regain his Midwest Cham-pionship title. John Nishimura from Circle Campus took 7th. In the Epee, Dider VonOppen took 7th and Mr. Berndt took 5th, In Sabre, Larry Dolph took 7th and Bob Walsh, 6th. In the women's division, Joan Cammack took 1st place Cham Cammack took 1st place, Chalotte Remenyik took 2nd and Bessy Cureton took 4th for a near clean sweep.

In the Under 19 division, girls division. Mrs. Debby Phillips took 7th, Pat Schmoyer took 6th and Miss Wellbank took 9th, In Epee, Steve Mashl took 3rd place. In Foil, Mike Cornwall took 1st place and Dave Littrell took 2nd, Two other Illinois boys made the semi-finals Tom Fillipp and Alan Acker.

Steve Mashl, Mike Cornwall and Dave Litell will compete in the U.S. National Fencing Championships to be held in New York City this summer by virtue of finishing in the top 3 of their respective weapon.

Steve Mashl, a novice in the espee had to face four collegians plus another high school student in the finals. After losing the first two, he had to win the final three to place.

By far, the most exciting was

the foil competition. All four Illinois boys advanced past the preliminary round, Al Acker and Tom Fillipp were eliminated in the Semi-Final round, Cornwall and Littell both won their first match, Littell defeated Cornwall but Cornwall came back to win his remaining 3 matches to tie Littell with a 4-1 at the end of the final round. A fence-off between the finalists decided the Midwast Under 19 Foil Championship title in favor of Mike Cornwall 5-3.

The fact that the Illinois Division did so well speaks highly of the calibre of fencing in this area, Steve Mashl was fencing in his second weapon and still placed. Steve is a senior at Notre Dame High School. Corn-wall graduated from Notre Dame H.S. and now attends the Univ. of Notre Dame where he lettered as a freshman and had the highest percentage on the var-sity team (.800). were born with defects because their mothers contracted German measles while pregnant during the 1964-65 epidemic.

There is now available a vaccine to prevent rubella. The primary target for vaccina-tion is the child. Young boys and girls are main sources of rubella infection. If enough of these children are vaccinated the rubella virus can be wiped out of circulation.

The Cook County Department of Public Health is making this vaccine available to all Suburban Cook County children between the ages of one year through third grade, during the week of May 18. The vaccine will be given FREE of charge to all eligible children who have a signed consent form, or chil-dred accompanied by a parent, The Morton Grove program will be given on Tuesday, May 19.

Dr. John B. Hall, Director of the Cook County Department of Public Health, urges all parents to have their children immunized against rubella.
