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

were being violated since they couldn't have a voice in a matter in which they have a financial investment. Others said they were happy living outside a village and one of the reasons they chose to live there was they preferred it and bought their homes there because it was an unincorporated area.

Attorney Wilhelm Levander. representing the North Maine Fire Department District, said he would file a 2nd suit against this action, just as he had over the previous annexation. Alper was originally hired to study the Tam O'Shanter property for park use, even though he did not have previous experience in park matters. He was recommended by former commissioner Lou Schreiner and all but Jack Leske concurred in Schreiner's recommendation. While Alper may be eminently qualified in most
projects, the errors of the last year have been costly to the entire district. Alper will be paid about \$30,000 for the Ballard debacle and the plans even though the new architect will have to be paid for creating a new project. While soil borings and similar work by Alper will aid in the new project, it can be said that most of the \$30,000 has gone for nought. But more important, while Nilesites are paying taxes for the non-existent sports complex, it is at least a year away from completion.

Repeating an old bromide of ours, since the taxpayers are footing the bills they're entitled to know the whole picture. During the same era when Schreiner and Chamerski were commissioners the ill-fated Tam O'Shanter action cost the Park District another \$40,000 which also went down the drain. Adding that amount to the present \$30,000 Alper payment, you can see where poor judgment by public officials cost every taxpayer in the district.

Being ever-optimistic we think this new era with Norman and Barclay is a positive turning point in the district. At long last Niles Park District has professionals in park matters running the show. And while the growing pains have been agonizing we're convinced Niles future Park District facilities and programs may have been worth the wait.




