I've found out a truth which I'm sure many of you've known for many years. It's simply you say good-bye to your kids a little bit at a time, as the years slip by.

Tonight our number 3 child graduates from grammar school. And while I don't want to hold back the clock, still I wish it wouldn't move quite so fast.

Until last week-end she was a little girl. While everyone says "this child looks like that one," and "she's going to be just like her sister," still her Mother and Dad know this isn't true. She's not like anybody, just as the other 3 kids are quite different from one another. I was nurtured on Glenn Miller and soft oozy schmaltz which was muted and sweet... Charley Spivak trumpets and blended saxophones which accompanied such euphonious names as the Modernaires and the Mellow Larks. But the graduate has her sound with names that must read the Cacophony Chorus, the Garbage Can Drum Beaters and the Ersatz Noise-makers.

'Old 45' and The Graduate have other generation-and-a-half gaps as well. For instance, it's a little thing, but as they say, it's the little things... Like, "Hey graduate, where's my pen?" It's the third one she's grabbed this week and it's my one tool of the trade. Without it I'd have to go back to those ten cent ink-stainers, or even to a pencil.

For another example I'd like to say, take my shirts... but if I did, you can be sure she grabbed them long ago. Take that grey knit sweater I bought at a knitting mill in Vermont last year. Well, you can be sure she took that one long ago, too.

I could mention the telephone, but best I keep the blood pressure down. I guess these kids are more refined these days. Back in the 30's and 40's you'd go over to a guy's house and yell, "Ohhh, Joeeeee." Or you'd whistle. Or you'd just wait out in front or in the gangway or in the backyard for him. But this classy Miss Suburbia does it much more genteely. She uses the phone. If she wonders what Jan is wearing to school on Arbor Day... telephone. "I saw Bob with Sue..." telephone, telephone, telephone. (That's worth 3 calls). Homework... telephone. It's sort of a game. If she gets home early the phone never rings. It couldn't because she's on it. usual, and 'Old 45' is there, he becomes an answering service. For instance, take the time we were having dinner some months ago. For a real laugh 'Old 45' answered her phone and told the caller, "This is a recorded message. The graduate is eating dinner. She will return your call after 7 p.m. At the sound of the beep you can leave your message..." That was pretty funny. The graduate's caller giggled so long she hung up without leaving her name. During the next half hour every acquaintance of the graduate since kindergarten called to hear funny 'Old 45' and his recorded message.

There are memories which are precious and private but if she'll forgive me I'll mention just one. After a 4 day routine check-up in the hospital I came home to a deserted house. But when the 10 year old pre-graduate heard I was home she flew across the street with tears in her eyes, and I got kind of misty over a very silly reunion.

Well, last week those Farewell Blues began to hit home. At 6 o'clock a little guy, all freshly pressed and brushed down, with a box under his arm, came into call for the graduate. Normally, I'd put him at ease by telling him he has to be fingerprinted. But he out-mugged before he can escort one of my daughters. But he out-poled me, and I just sort of mumbled a gayer hello than I was feeling. And as they say in the movies, "Here, she comes" and she walked down the steps in a light fluffy thing with roses all over... and lots of brown curls stop those 2 brown eyes... and for that ever-brief moment, I wanted to stop the clock.

Tonight, I opened the refrigerator and those pretty white carnations still looked fresh, tied up neatly with the red ribbon. And across the table sits Number 3, the graduate. And while she rushes to get going because tonight is the big night. And while she rushes to get thru with dinner, and looks longingly at that damn telephone, I'm trying very calmly to tell her to take her time. After all, what's the rush?

LW Residents Reject Free Fire Lane

RECORD BUDGET UP \$400,000

Approving a record \$4,229,802 expenditure for the present fiscal year Niles trustees okayed its appropriation ordinance Tuesday night, which is \$400,000 more than last year.

A breakdown of moneys expended would show \$903,496 will go for the operation of the police department, \$657,027 for the fire department, \$763,861 for the public works department, \$1,018,844 for water works, \$61,942 for the engineering department, \$59,012 for the family service department and \$59,867 for the building inspection and health departments.

The money which is expended by the village from the general corporate fund is 59% of the total appropriation.

A breakdown of these moneys shows Niles receives \$180,500 from village property taxes. Money received from the state for its sales tax refund comes to \$1,360,000. The village utility tax, which is levied on telephone and utility bills comes to \$335,000. The new state income tax return is \$176,000. Money received from licenses is \$122,500. Permits, inspections

and fees total \$103,500. Money from court fines and special police charges are \$125,000. Miscellaneous income is \$112,150.

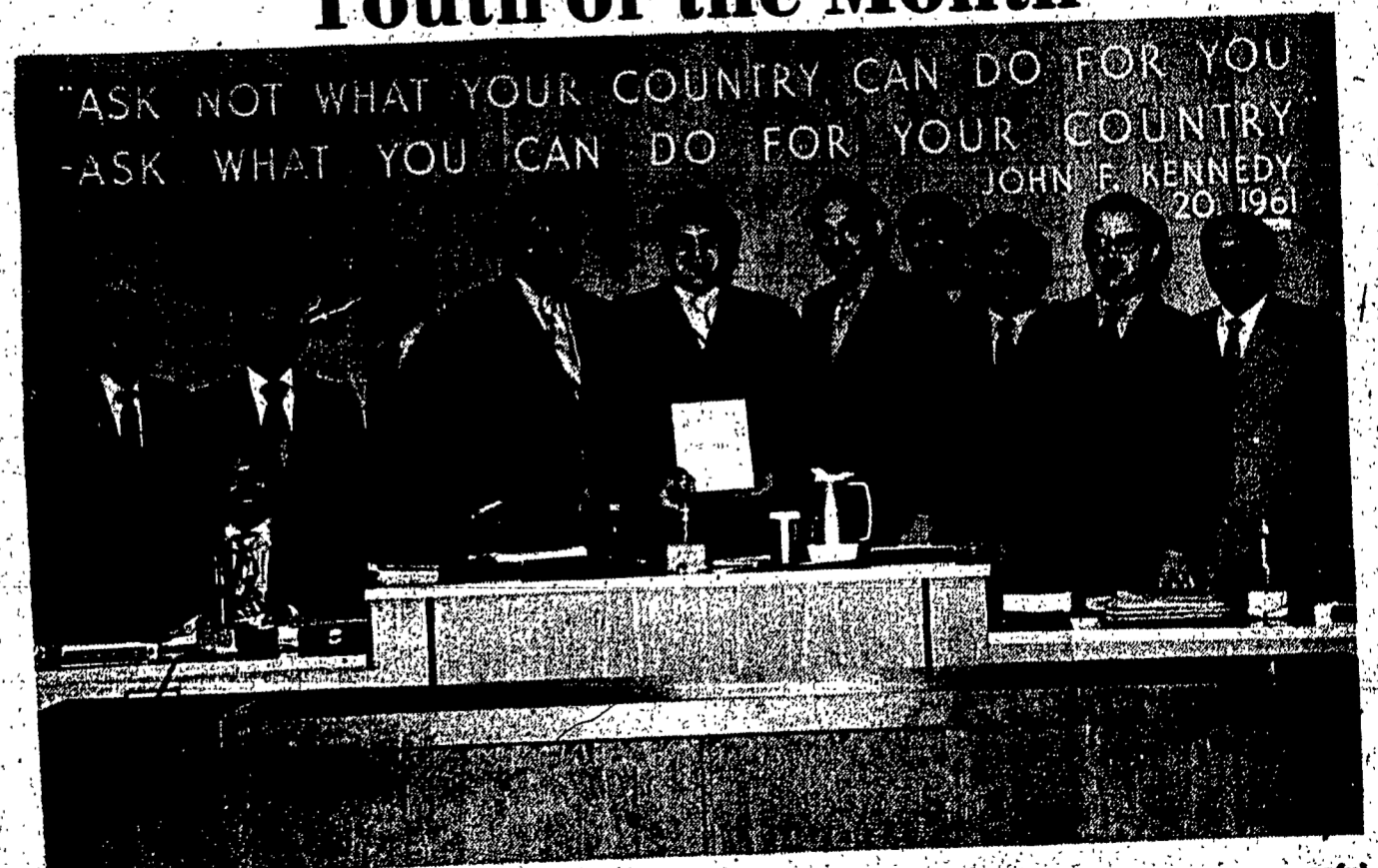
In addition to the general corporate fund expenditure of \$2,514,650, which comprises 59% of the total \$4,229,802 appropriation, Niles will spend in excess of \$1,000,000 for its water works operation, comprising 23.9% of the appropriation. Garbage disposal costs \$142,500, 3.37% of the total, and money for this operation comes from real estate taxes. Social Security and money for the police pension fund is about \$80,000 each. General obligation bonds costs are \$68,832, and this figure will drop to about \$34,000 after this year. Vehicle tax comprises 26% of the appropriation and the road and bridge fund is \$78,800 which also comes from real estate taxes.

In other actions Tuesday night trustees complied with the request from residents who live in the townhouses east of Lawrencewood not to build a road behind the buildings, to be used for fire emergencies. Niles is

All of the classes listed here are open to non-members.

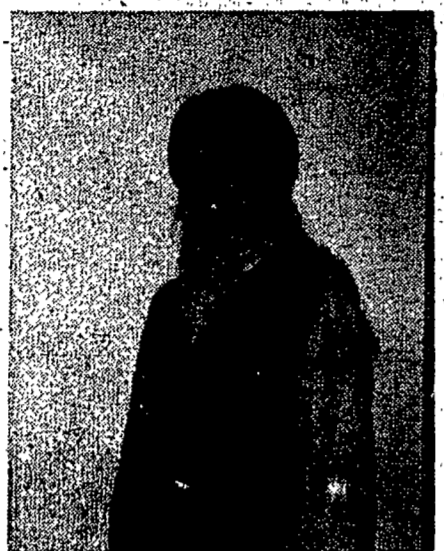

Maine Township Special Education Program

A Maine Township Special Education Summer Program will be available this year for children of kindergarten age through third grade who need special instructional help in reading and speech development as well as in other basic areas. This federally funded Title I Cooperative program, a part of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, is designed to provide services that will help raise the educational attainment level of these children to that appropriate for children of their age.

Assistance will be given the children to increase their language development and communication skills through reading, speech and language arts. Help will also be given in other basic skill areas as needed. Motor coordination training will be given by qualified physical education instructors; other supportive services will include speech therapists, psychologists, a nurse and qualified teacher aides.

A second phase of the Summer Program will be special help and instruction for students of all grade levels who use English as a second language. This is not limited to Spanish speaking students. Instructional teams will work to assist these students so they may function at maximum potential both in and out of school. About 50 students are expected to be served in this phase of the program.

About 200 students are expected to be served, including those from non-public schools. While the major focus will be on kindergarten through the third grade level, referrals will be accepted for children from grades four, five and six programs.

"We, in this area, can't seem to get any serious action from the village except that during a flood a call to the Public Works Department will bring somebody out to survey the situation which will inevitably result in a few pokes at the sewers, departure of the crew, and no change in the water level or conditions affecting future flooding.

My comments should not be construed as being directed at the crews or personnel of the Public Works department, who, as a matter of fact, should be highly commended for their diligent efforts throughout the year. My complaint is with the Director of Public Works and village engineers whom I feel have never made any real effort to analyze the problem and offer a solution.

Editor's Note:

Public Works Superintendent Ed Bacher told The Bugle there are 3 water intersections at Kedzie and Odell. Kedzie, from Okato to Odell, Odell, from Main south, and from Monroe north, all are pitched to this corner intersection. Ed said the error was made years ago by the former engineers who pitched these streets in this manner.

There are now reducers placed in the catch basins which reduces the water flow thru an 8 inch pipe to one equivalent to a 4 inch sewer. While this causes the water to remain on the streets for about an hour it prevents basements from being flooded. Ed said he is willing to bet you have not had the problem of a flooded basement.

While the water may remain in the street for an hour there, he said three streets pitching to one intersection takes place in several areas in Niles, resulting in a similar problem.

Park Pool to Open Saturday

The Park District Swimming Pool will open at 1 p.m. Saturday, June 13 and will be open for 80 consecutive days through Aug. 31, according to Gerald Sullivan, Park District President.

Pool season tickets have been on sale since Monday, June 8 at the Park District Office, 7877 Milwaukee ave., between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. In addition, all persons wishing to enroll in special pool programs such as learn-to-swim, diving instructions, competitive swimming, etc., may register at the same time and place.

Park officials report that the 1970 pool fees have been modified in an effort to provide better service to the pool patrons that in most cases they are lower than in previous seasons. Family rates are \$15.00 for resident families plus \$2.00 for each child up to a maximum of

\$25.00. Individual season tickets, regardless of age are \$10.00. All non-resident season tickets are double that of residents.

Daily pool fees are 75 cents for residents and \$1.50 for non-residents. In previous years, there were separate daily fees for elementary and high school students as well as a different fee for adults. In addition, there were different daily fees for weekdays and holidays. To eliminate this confusion and to speed up admittance procedures, park officials established the more simple and convenient fee structure.

The 1970 pool program offers a variety of activities such as

public swimming seven days a week, swimming instruction for both children and adults, competitive swimming and diving, synchronized swimming, diving instruction and adult swim nights.

Rabbi Schreier Beth Ami Leader

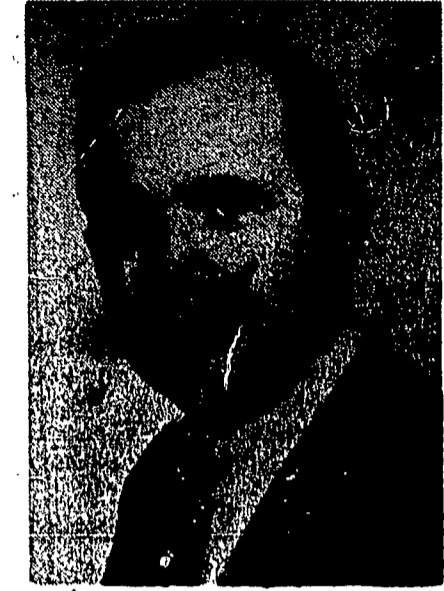
Congregation Beth Ami proudly announces the appointment of Rabbi Irving Schreier as its spiritual leader.

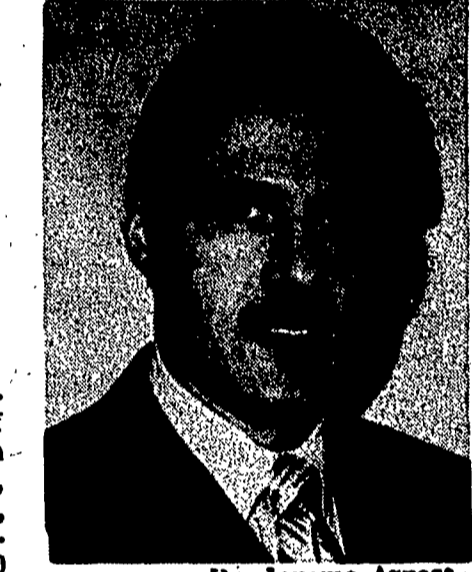

Ed Kauffman, 7739 Nordica and Don Peffer, 7733 Nordica cited reasons for opposing the construction. They said the petitioners objected because the road would be unsafe for children, the road is accessible to all "sorts of people," would cause car traffic from Oakton to Howard, moving vans and garbage trucks will make use of it and "increases the chances of burglary."

Trustees headed by Keith Peck sat in disbelief the residents were against an aid which they believed was intended to safeguard the families there. Unbelievably, they listened while one resident, Jerry Ehrenreich, 7775 Nordica, said he was concerned with a ecology problem, implying such a road would disturb the animals which are fast disappearing from their natural habitat.

Manager Ken Scheel explained the first 5 minutes of a fire is most critical and the road to the east of the townhouses would make it easier and faster for the fire department to service the area. He said it was intended the road would be chained off except when used by the fire department.

With an air of dismay trustees complied with the residents by rescinding their previous plan for a road. Mayor Blase, shaking his head in disbelief, said the argument by the residents was the "wierdest argument" he has heard in the 9 years he's been on the Board.

Nominated students are voted upon by all junior and senior students and all faculty members.

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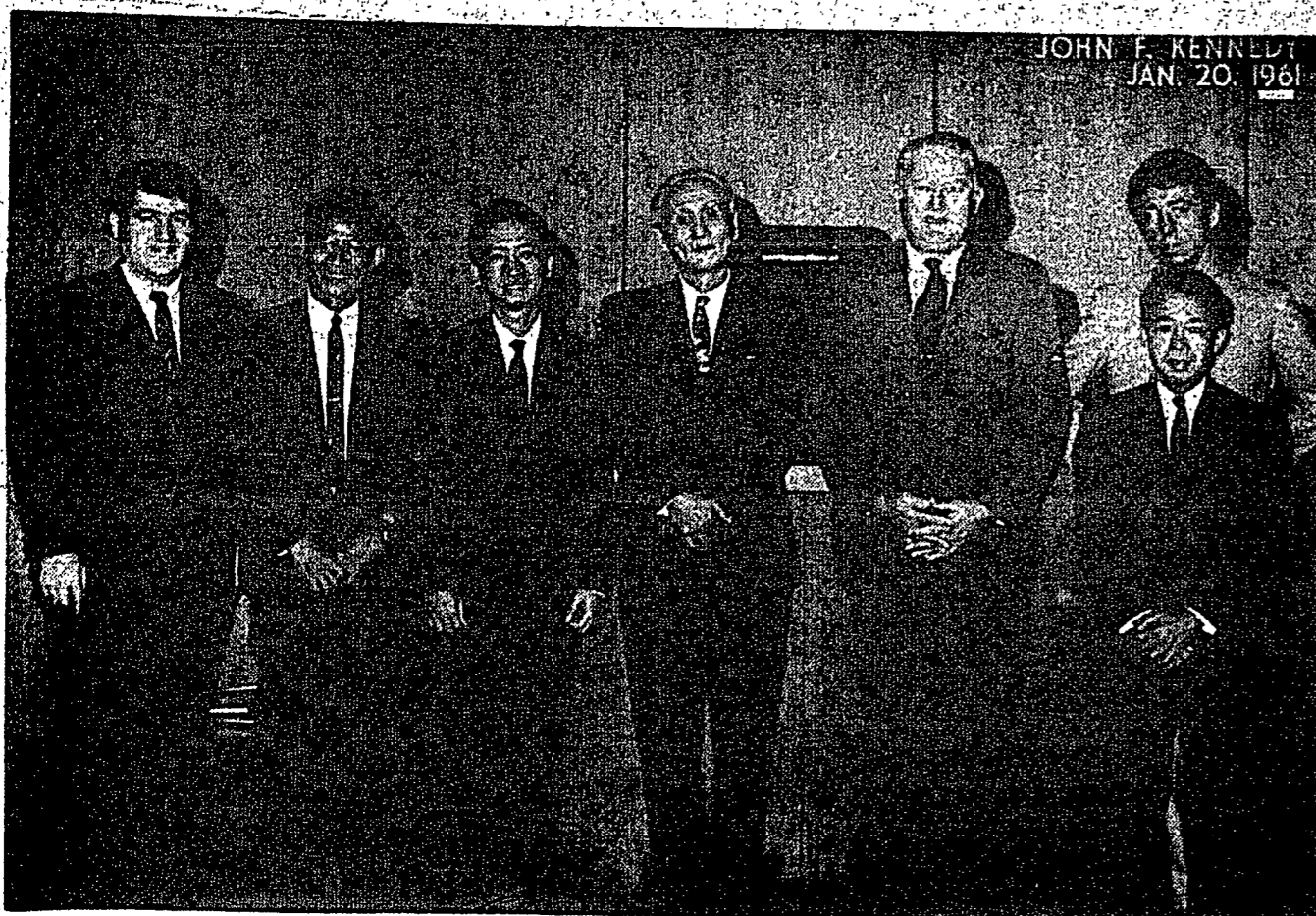

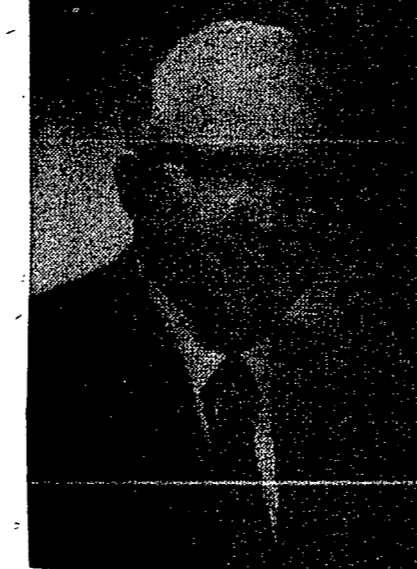
