I've found out a truth which I'm sure many of you've known for nany years. It's simply you say good-by to your kids a little bit t a time, as the years slip by.

Tonight our number 3 child graduates from grammar school. And while I don't want to hold back the clock, still I wish it wouldn't move quite so fast.

Until last week-end she was a little girl. While everyone says 'this child looks like that one,' and 'she's going to be just like her sister, still her Mother and Dad know this isn't true. She's not like anybody, just as the other 3 kids are quite different from one another. They all live under the same roof, and they're the progeny of the same source, but that's the end of their sameness.

While Dads in particular like to think of their daughters as sof willowy flowers, gentle and fresh, and fragile and warm, this graduate brings back the memory of music . . . the kind with a beat, which drives 'Old 45' to the wall. I was nurtured on Glenn Miller and soft oozy schmaltz which was muted and sweet . . . Charley Spivak trumpets and blended saxophones which accompanied such euphonious names as the Modernaires and the Mellow Larks. But the graduate has her sound with names that must read the Cacophony Chorus, the Garbage Can Drum Beaters and the Ersatz Noisemakers.

'Old 45' and The Graduate have other generation-and-a-half gap as well. Frinstance, it's a little thing, but as they say, it's the little things. Like, "Hey graduate, where's my pen?" It's the third one she's grabbed this week and it's my one tool of the trade. Without it I'd have to go back to those ten cent inkstainers, or even to a pencil.

For another example I'd like to say, take my shirts . . . but if I did, you can be sure she grabbed them long ago. Take that grey knit sweater I bought at a knitting mill in Vermont last year. Well, you can be sure she took that one long ago, too.

I could mention the telephone, but best I keep the blood pressure down. I guess these kids are more refined these days. Back in the 30°s and 40°s you'd go over to a guy's house and yell, "Ohhh, Joecece." Or you'd whistle. Or you'd just wait out in front or in the gangway or in the backyard for him. But this classy Miss Suburbia does it much more genteely. She uses the phone. If she wonders what Jan is wearing to school on Arbor Day . . . telephone. "I saw Bob with Sue . . . " telephone, telephone, telephone (that's worth 3 calls). Homework . . . telephone It's sort of a game. If she gets home early the phone never rings. It couldn't because she's on it telephoning. If she comes home, like ten minutes later than usual, and 'Old 45' is there, he becomes an answering service. F'rinstance, take the time we were having dinner some months ago. For a real laugher 'Old 45' answered her phone and told the ago. For a real laugher Old 45 answered her phone and fold the caller, "This is a recorded message. The graduate is eating dinner. She will return your call after 7 p.m. At the sound of the beep you can leave your message . . . That was pretty funny. The graduate's caller giggled so long she hung up without leaving her name. During the next half hour every acquaintance of the graduate since kindergarten called to hear funny 'Old 45' and his recorded message. corded message.

There are memories which are precious and private but if she'll forgive me I'll mention just one. After a 4 day routine check-up in the hospital I came home to a deserted house. But when the 10 year old pre-graduate heard I was home she flew across the street with tears in her eyes, and I got kind of misty over a very silly

Well, last week those Farewell Blues began to hit home. At 6 o'clock a little guy, all freshly pressed and brushed down, with a box under his arm, came into call for the graduate. Normally, I'd put him at ease by telling him he has to be fingerprinted and mugged before he can escort one of my daughters. But he out poised me, and I just sort of mumbled a gayer hello than I was feelng. And as they say in the movies, "Here, she comes"... and she walked down the steps in a light fluffy thing with roses all over and lots of brown curls stop those 2 brown eyes . . and

for that ever-brief moment, I wanted to stop the clock. Tonight, I opened the refrigerator and those pretty white carnations still looked fresh, tied up neatly with the red ribbon. And across the table sits Number 3, the graduate. She's kind of anxious to get going because tenight is the big night. And while she rushes to get thru with dinner, and looks longingly at that damn telephone, I'm trying very calmly to tell her to take her time. After all,

what's the rush?

LW Residents Reject Free Fire Lane

Approving a record \$4,229,802 expenditure for the present fiscal year Niles trustees okayed appropriation ordinance Tuesday night, which is \$400,000 more than last year.

A breakdown of moneys expended would show \$903,496 will go for the operation of the police department, \$657,027 for the fire department, \$763,861 for the public works department, \$1,01,844 for water works, \$61,942 for the engineering department, \$59,012 for the family service department and \$59,867 for the building inspection and health de-

The money which is expended by the village from the general corporate fund is 59% of the total appropriation. A breakdown of these moneys

shows Niles receives \$180,500 from village property taxes. Money received from the state for its sales tax refund comes to \$1,360,000. The village utility/tax, which is levied on telephone and utility bills comes to \$335,000. The new state income tax return is \$176,000. Money received from licenses is \$122,500. Permits. inspections

from court fines and special police charges are \$125,000. Miscellaneous income \$112,150.


In addition to the general corporate fund expenditure of \$2,514,650, which comprises 59% of the total \$4,229,802 appropriation, Niles will spend in excess of \$1,000,000 for its water works operation, comprising 23.9% of the appropriation. disposal costs \$142,500, 3,37% of the total, and money for this operation comes from real estate taxes. Social Security and money for the police pension fund is about \$80,000 each. General obligation bonds costs are \$68,832, and this figure will drop to about \$34,000 after this year. Vehicle tax comprises .26% of the appropriation and the road and bridge fund is \$78,800 which also comes from real estate

In other actions Tuesday night trustees complied with the request from residents who live in the townhouses east of Lawrencewood not to build a road behind the buildings, to be used for fire emergencies. Niles in-
