per hour was \$9.11 or \$2.20 per hour more than the money taken in from passengers. The Golf Mill route has been

transporting 5,037 passengers per month over a 311 hour period monthly.

Niles Mayor Blase, perhaps playing the devil's advocate, told Schuemann the transportation industry, and particularly the bus companies, is a most unimaginative industry. He said it was a backward industry and asked him, "What have YOU done besides raise rates?" Not satisfied with the rather flustered busman's answer. Blase asked Schuemann, "Have

you tried to help yourself?" Blase implied profit and loss statements of large companies often camouflage profits and asked Schuemann what salaries the officers of the company receive. Schuemann said 4 officers receive only \$40,000 salaries with no stock options or other hidden benefits. He said the president of the company receives \$10,000 annually.

Schuemann cited the 2 and 3 cars per family as reasons people in this area don't use buses more. He said the convenience of the automobile obviously results in residents' preferred use of autos.

Noting past efforts to improve service Schuemann said United as the first Chicagoland company to use air - conditioned buses which were operating here 14 years ago, at a cost to the company of \$35,000 each. He said the company has not had any new equipment in the past

Emphasizing what 'he was all

about Schuemann said, "We can't afford unprofitable routes operating at a loss. If you want to keep these lines on you will have to help."

Schuemann said the company is presently 2-1/2 months in arrears in paying its bills. He said the \$1.6 million dollar revenue annually if offset by 1 million dollars in payroll. \$100,000 in insurance, before other costs are paid.
