Summertime — and the livin' is easy.
Places to go . . . people to see . . . things to do . . . and a good place to chow down . . .

We asked some of the natives this week to recommend their favorite watering spots, etc., and we came up with the following:

Ron Friedman (Booby from Booby's Restaurant). He first recommended White Fence Farm in Lisle, Illinois by Route 66 as a favorite restaurant. He said it's a great family place, inexpensive, and specializing in great chicken and corn fritters. His second choice is Glonatti's in Forest Park which Ronnie contends is the very finest of restaurants. He noted it's not likely you would be able to make a reservation on week-ends due to the crowds. Booby, a great chili lover, also suggested Bishop's, which provides a 60 cent bowl of this delectable at 7300 W. Roosevelt and 1800 S. Damen in Chicago. For entertainment Ron prefers Mr. Kelly's which he says is reasonable and enjoyable. He mentioned the Empire Room in the Palmer House has top entertainment but is too expensive.

Iz Farber, who teaches at the Illinois Chicago Circle, has a love affair with the Diana Restaurant-Grocery Store-Delicatessen in the 1100 South Halsted block. It's a great Greek Restaurant which specializes in native foods, and has the noise and the atmosphere which was used as a setting in the recent movie, "Dream of Kings."

Niles Mayor Nick Blase recommends the Consort Room of the Continental Plaza which he said is a great place to spend an evening replete with dancing and violins. Nick also recommends the Japanese Steakhouse on Ohio Street and contends an even finer Japanese restaurant is the Benihana on Walton Street. The food is prepared in front of you and is a delightful place to spend an evening. Nick mentioned he spent an evening taking a boat ride at Wacker and Michigan and enjoyed the beauty of viewing Buckingham Fountain, a pleasure which many haven't enjoyed since their younger days.

Lorraine Makela, wife of Maine High School Board president Roy Makela, is a great theatre-goer and recommends several of the local summer productions here in our area. She mentioned the Morton Grove Theatre is producing "Man of La Mancha," and noted Maine East had 3 plays a couple of weeks ago which were excellent. In the food department Lorraine recommends the Cafe Chablis on North Avenue, which has great onion soup, as well as fish with almonidine. For family eating she recommends The Hapsburg Inn, a 10 minute ride northwest on River Road, which feeds its customers from its own gardens, and has wonderful German food.

Elaine Hartzak, wife of Niles trustee Rich Hartzak, also said the Consort Room was a favorite of hers, very elegant, expensive, but a great place to spend an evening listening to Franz and the violins. She also recommended the Arlington Park Towers has an elegant room for entertainment atop the towers near the race track. She said the food was fine and the crystal chandeliers lend an extra touch to a lovely room. For Italian food she suggested the 7 Hills on Lincoln by Peterson. She said the "rolls were out of this world" noting the oregano and garlic which are in the rolls.

If you're in a driving mood this South Sider recommends Phil Schmidt's is among the better fish eateries in Chicagoland, located about 110 south just east of Indianapolis Boulevard. Another far south side eatery is the Homestead, specializing in hickory-smoked ribs at about 125th and Vincennes. On the far north side, a moderate-priced dinner with an overly-abundant buffet table of appetizers is a specialty at the Holiday Inn where the old Villa Moderne stood on North Edens. The smoked oyster, shrimp and chopped liver are but a small beginning of the appetizer-laden buffet. Still heading north, Ravinia charges \$2.50 to gain entrance to an evening of music. Some of the more elegant box suppers include martinis and champagne, which can be seen as accoutrements to the suppers which are spread on the lawn there.

So eat hearty and enjoy the summer...by going somewhere you haven't previously visited or renewing an acquaintance with an old friend which is still there to be enjoyed.

Car Registration

Illinois automobile owners are about to receive a convenient reminder concerning 1971 passenger car registration. Pre-printed applications are presently being processed and, in the next five weeks, will be received by nearly 4,300,000 passenger car owners in the State.

Eleven men from the Post Office staff are working with personnel from the Secretary of State's Office to post the applications. In the first 4 1/2 hours of processing, 60,000 pieces of mail were handled for direct dispatch by train and truck.

Mr. Powell stated that those drivers wishing to retain their 1970 license numbers will have their applications at least 30 days prior to the Sept. 30 deadline for reassignment.

Mailing of the 1971 plates will not begin until about Oct. 15, and Secretary Powell warned motorists that 1971 plates may not be legally displayed on vehicles until Dec. 1, 1970.

After any necessary corrections are entered, applications need only be signed, notarized and returned with the fee and 1970 registration card. Fees are \$18 for cars up to 35 horsepower and \$30 for those over 35 horsepower.

Road Repairs Underway

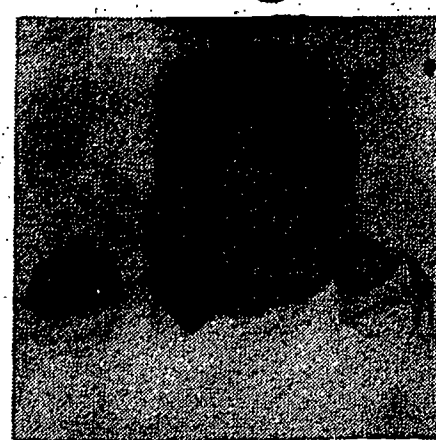

"70, \$6.91. In 1970 the cost per hour was \$9.11 or \$2.20 per hour more than the money taken in from passengers."

The Golf Mill route has been transporting 5,037 passengers per month over a 311 hour period monthly.

Niles Mayor Blase, perhaps playing the devil's advocate, told Schuermann the transportation industry, and particularly the bus companies, is a most unimaginative industry. He said it was a backward industry and asked him, "What have YOU done besides raise rates?"

Not satisfied with the rather flustered busman's answer, Blase asked Schuermann, "Have you tried to help yourself?" Blase implied profit and loss statements of large companies often camouflage profits and asked Schuermann what salaries the officers of the company receive. Schuermann said 4 officers receive only \$40,000 salaries with no stock options or other hidden benefits. He said the president of the company receives \$10,000 annually.

Schuermann cited the 2 and 3 cars per family as reasons people in this area don't use buses more. He said the convenience of the automobile obviously results in residents' preferred use of autos.

Noting past efforts to improve service Schuermann said United as the first Chicagoland company to use air-conditioned buses which were operating here 14 years ago, at a cost to the company of \$35,000 each. He said the company has not had any new equipment in the past 5 years.

Emphasizing what 'he was all

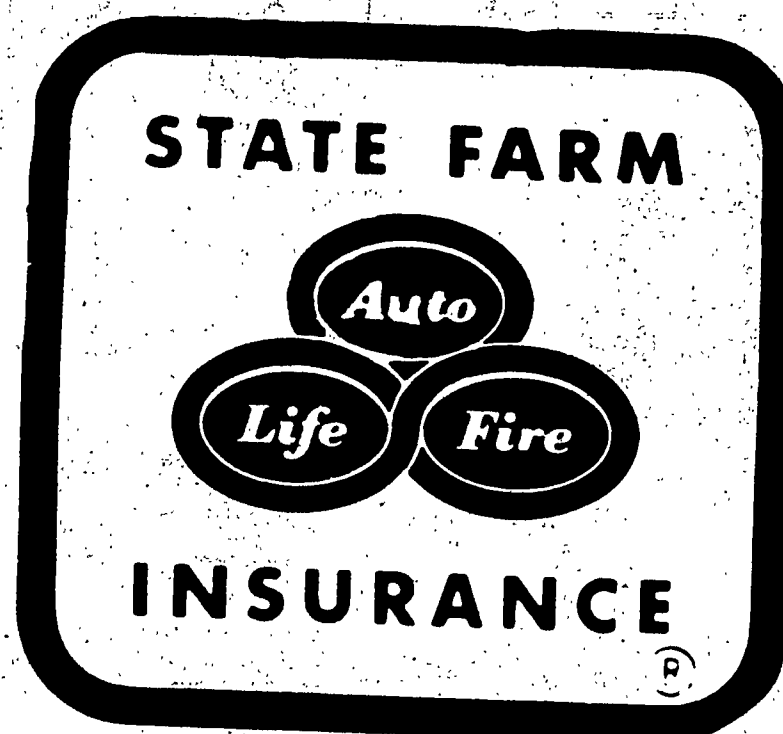
about" Schuermann said, "We can't afford unprofitable routes operating at a loss. If you want to keep these lines on you will have to help."

Schuermann said the company is presently 2-1/2 months in arrears in paying its bills. He said the \$1.6 million dollar revenue annually if offset by 1 million dollars in payroll, \$100,000 in insurance, before other costs are paid.

Blase said Niles would get together with surrounding communities in an effort to solve the problem.

After Schuermann left village attorney Dick Troy said 2 state laws have created transportation districts. In 1959 the Mass Transportation Act which allows government bodies to run systems without a tax levy, receiving money from revenue bonds and government subsidies. In 1968 the Urban Transportation Act enabled governments to exist after the passing of a referendum, as happened with the recent action in Chicago in which a district voted for a new downtown subway and the tearing down of the present elevated structure in the loop.

This explanation preceded a resolution by Tr. Pete Pesole that Niles initiate action requesting a unified mass transportation system under county jurisdiction and run by the county board. Because the resolution had already been prepared by the attorney without any previous discussion Tr. Keith Peck objected to the quick action, and after Tr. Rich Haczak asked the action be delayed until the next meeting Pesole withdrew his motion.

Edison Increase

Kent Cambridge Scientific,

Company Leases in Morton Grove

Revised rate schedules providing for the first general increase in Commonwealth Edison Company electric service charges in 12 years were filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission.

The new rates will raise electricity charges on the order of 4 1/2 per cent for some 2 1/2 million Edison customers and enable the company to increase its average monthly income by about \$1 1/2 million on the basis of current sales. For most residential customers, the increase will be in the range of one to 2 1/2 cents a day, according to the company.
