During the earlier part of the evening a vice president of the United Motor Coach Company sought help from Niles, stating the losses the company has been absorbing will force it to cutback on bus services, specifically closing down the Golf Mill run between the shopping center and Chicago's northwest border at Milwaukee Avenue. He said the run was running about \$700 monthly in the red, forcing such action.

There's little doubt Niles could well afford to pay the monthly fee to keep this one line running. But obviously, using public moneys for such a stop-gap effort, would not solve the overall transportation problem in suburbia.

The bus company's veep also mentioned inner city lines in Park Ridge and Des Plaines are also losing a great deal of money, hinting the curtailing or eliminating of these lines may be im-

While Pesole's proposal the County set-up an overall mass transportation district may well be the answer, the political implications, plus the myriad of complex problems connected with such a plan, would not alleviate the problem in the immediate

While it is doubtful public officials are anxious to bail out a private company, it is obvious the residents plus the business community do have a vested interest in public transportation. And since the sales tax return to Niles from the retail community exceeds \$1,000,000 annually, certainly the village has an obligation to aid the retailers, as well as its residents. Thus, combining the interests of those most affected, we wonder aloud, if a joint public subsidy from a rich town like Niles, plus a private contribution from the retailers and shopping centers in the community, might be coupled with a hard-hitting campaign on the part of the company, which might be a mini-answer to this vast problem. What if the bus company was to diligently adhere to schedules during the coming months? And what if every resident was to receive a monthly hour by hour schedule of the bus company's routes? And what if the bus company was to receive temporary approval to run routes down Greenwood, Main, Monroe, Oakton, longuil and Haward Streets housily and run an intermediate route. Jonquil and Howard Streets hourly, and run an inter-village route to all the shopping centers, banks, retailers and service outlets in the village, meticulously adhering to a schedule at a fair price? Would residents make use of the service? And would retailers truly benefit by such an investment?

Such a trial run in Niles, for a 6 month period, might truly give the bus company a fair example of whether or not they can maintain, at a profit, short run bus service in suburbia.

There's little doubt we former bus riders are now in families which have 2 cars accessible for most of our needs. But how many times a day in each of our suburbs Mom and Dad drive their offspring to areas where no bus service is conveniently available? If buses were only 2 or 3 blocks from the home-base, and were on time, and stopped at points close to the main areas in the community, perhaps public use of these conveyances would

We former bus riders are no longer oriented toward relying on mass transportation. Yet, the need is there, and when the service is available, and is perfunctory and consistent, the public will make good use of it. No better example of this use need be sought then to look east to Skokle where the Skokle Swift has been successful. It fills a need, provides a much-needed service, is fast and provides consistent service. It is a fair example where private cars are put aside in favor of public service.

While the public body, and private merchants may not agree such a partial subsidy from their pockets will enhance all concerned, we believe a trial effort, may re-orient former bus users to returning to the bus lines.





We are having trouble with grease in our sewers. The way to eliminate most of this is to save your coffee cans and lids. and when you are done frying put the grease in the can and not down the kitchen sink. When the coffee can is filled, put the lid on it and put it in the gar-

Grease is the biggest head-ache to the sewer department. It finds its way out to the sewer lines, mixes with detergents and soaps, and forms a very hard, concrete-like substance. Our men are constantly rodding and cutting chunks of this material out of the lines.

Those of you who use disposals, please use them properly, that is to say run plenty of cold water through the dis-posal long after the grinder has consummed all of the material. Otherwise the material will not flow but rather packs up in the sewer. This can be costly to you and the village.

When using disposable dia-pers, tear the absoring paper off and flush away, throw the plastic part in the garbage, not

People with floor drain should remember to keep ti trap filled with water. This will prevent sewer odors from coming into the house.
