From the Left Hand Accepting Voter's Registration of 18 Year Olds

At Niles last village board meeting trustee Pete Pesole offered a resolution which will likely be approved at next week's meeting stating the County Board should create a County-wide mass transportation district.

During the earlier part of the evening a vice president of the United Motor Coach Company sought help from Niles, stating the losses the company has been absorbing will force it to cut-back on bus services, specifically closing down the Golf Mill run between the shopping center and Chicago's northwest border at Milwaukee Avenue. He said the run was running about \$700 monthly in the red, forcing such action.

There's little doubt Niles could well afford to pay the monthly fee to keep this one line running. But obviously, using public moneys for such a stop-gap effort, would not solve the overall transportation problem in suburbia.

The bus company's veep also mentioned inner city lines in Park Ridge and Des Plaines are also losing a great deal of money, hinting the curtailing or eliminating of these lines may be imminent.

While Pesole's proposal the County set-up an overall mass transportation district may well be the answer, the political implications, plus the myriad of complex problems connected with such a plan, would not alleviate the problem in the immediate future.

While it is doubtful public officials are anxious to bail-out a private company, it is obvious the residents plus the business community do have a vested interest in public transportation. And since the sales tax return to Niles from the retail community exceeds \$1,000,000 annually, certainly the village has an obligation to aid the retailers, as well as its residents. Thus, combining the interests of those most affected, we wonder aloud, if a joint public subsidy from a rich town like Niles, plus a private contribution from the retailers and shopping centers in the community, might be coupled with a hard-hitting campaign on the part of the company, which might be a mini-answer to this vast problem. What if the bus company was to diligently adhere to schedules during the coming months? And what if every resident was to receive a monthly hour by hour schedule of the bus company's routes? And what if the bus company was to receive temporary approval to run routes down Greenwood, Main, Monroe, Oakton, Jonquil and Howard Streets hourly, and run an inter-village route to all the shopping centers, banks, retailers and service outlets in the village, meticulously adhering to a schedule at a fair price? Would residents make use of the service? And would retailers truly benefit by such an investment?

Such a trial run in Niles, for a 6 month period, might truly give the bus company a fair example of whether or not they can maintain, at a profit, short run bus service in suburbia.

There's little doubt we former bus riders are now in families which have 2 cars accessible for most of our needs. But how many times a day in each of our suburbs Mom and Dad drive their offspring to areas where no bus service is conveniently available? If buses were only 2 or 3 blocks from the home-base, and were on time, and stopped at points close to the main areas in the community, perhaps public use of these conveyances would improve.

We former bus riders are no longer oriented toward relying on mass transportation. Yet, the need is there, and when the service is available, and is perfunctory and consistent, the public will make good use of it. No better example of this use need be sought than to look east to Skokie where the Skokie Swift has been successful. It fills a need, provides a much-needed service, is fast and provides consistent service. It is a fair example where private cars are put aside in favor of public service.

While the public body, and private merchants may not agree such a partial subsidy from their pockets will enhance all concerned, we believe a trial effort, may re-orient former bus users to returning to the bus lines.

We would happily join in a campaign to "Go United Motor Coach, And Leave The Driving To Them."

Dist. 63, 64, 67, 71 Students
Would Remain at Parochial Schools

BREBEUF SEEKS HALF DAY PUBLIC SCHOOL AID

St. John Brebeuf School Board in Niles sent a letter to school district 63, 64, 67 and 71 July 30 suggesting a dual enrollment program for its approximate 1,288 students. Modifying the concept of a dual enrollment the Brebeuf plan suggests non-public school students be considered as public school students for a half-day each school day and would be taught by non-public school teachers who would be considered and employed as part-time teachers of the public school district for that same half-day. According to the Brebeuf Board no additional taxes would be needed for the plan, the additional money being allotted from state aid. Part-time salaries of non-public teachers for the half-day and a nominal rental fee for the parochial school facility was also suggested in the proposal.

These criteria immediately precluded consideration of any plans for a complete closing of St. John Brebeuf school, or even the closing of the school for two to four months at the beginning of the school year as had been suggested in various quarters. Dual enrollment, that is, St. John Brebeuf students being considered as part-time public school pupils, showed some merit. However, dual enrollment as generally defined still posed some problems. The logistics of transporting our approximately 1,250 students into four school district daily, the problems of space availability in the public school rooms, and

We are having trouble with grease in our sewers. The way to eliminate most of this is to save your coffee cans and lids, and when you are done frying put the grease in the can and not down the kitchen sink. When the coffee can is filled, put the lid on it and put it in the garbage.

Grease is the biggest headache to the sewer department. It finds its way out to the sewer lines, mixes with detergents and soaps, and forms a very hard, concrete-like substance. Our men are constantly rodding and cutting chunks of this material out of the lines.

Those of you who use disposals, please use them properly, that is to say run plenty of cold water through the disposal long after the grinder has consumed all of the material. Otherwise the material will not flow but rather packs up in the sewer. This can be costly to you and the village.

When using disposable diapers, tear the absorbing paper off and flush away, throw the plastic part in the garbage, not down the toilet.

People with floor drain should remember to keep it trap filled with water. This will prevent sewer odors from coming into the house.

MG Days Parade To Feature USAF Band

Parade Chairman Dick Meter stated that the Morton Grove Day's parade on Sunday, Aug. 16 will climax the Village's Diamond Jubilee celebration. The parade route will be Dempster st. from Edens Expressway to Linne Woods starting at 1:30 p.m. Marty O'Martin, Parade Marshal, announced that the Air Force Reserve Command Band, one of the oldest and most renowned bands in the USAF, will be one of the units participating. The Commander and Conductor of the Band of the Air Force Reserve is Capt. Edward S. Bridges, a veteran of 13 years as an Air Force band leader. During that time, United States

Air Force bands under his baton have appeared in every country on the North and South American continents and in several countries of the Orient. He has performed for the late President John F. Kennedy, and former President Lyndon B. Johnson, as well as numerous U.S. congressmen and state governors. Prior to his assignment to Robins Air Force Base in March 1966, Captain Bridges commanded the United States Air Forces Southern Command Band based in the Panama Canal Zone. During his stay there, the USAF Band made repeated good will tours throughout Central and South America, thrill-



ing audiences numbering in the millions. On these tours, Captain Bridges made all introductions and announcements in Spanish, which he speaks fluently.

The USAF Band regularly appeared before high government statesmen and military officials, and Captain Bridges was personally presented to the presidents of several of the Latin American Republics. During this assignment, Captain Bridges composed a march containing sounds characteristic of both Latin and North America to serve as a "musical link between the Americas," and it won immediate acceptance as the official march of the United States Air Forces Southern Command.

Captain Bridges is intensely interested in public school music, having served as guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator in many parts of the United States. He is affiliated with Music Educators National Conference and is a charter member of National Band Association. He has performed with several symphony orchestras near bases where he has been stationed.

Highway Litter Proves Expensive

The Chicago Motor Club-AAP passes along these disturbing figures reflecting the costs of removing highway litter. Recently completed cost analysis show that the Illinois Highway Department spends an average of \$119 per mile each year for litter removal.

The litter is composed of 59 per cent paper, 14 per cent cans, 8 per cent plastics, 6 per cent bottles and 13 per cent miscellaneous items.

The result is an annual expenditure of \$3 million Illinois taxpayer dollars each year to remove the debris, according to Director of Public Works, William F. Cellini.

Each empty beer can represents a state expense of 63 cents to pick up, collection and disposal.

Texas taxpayers contribute \$3 million annually for cleanup.
