If we have the picture closely in focus the Niles Park District mini-revolution by lifeguards and maintenance crew is a symptom of the sudden change in the district.

This Spring the district hired Webbs Norman at a \$17,000 salary to run the entire park program. Norman had originally been hired as a swimming pool consultant in hopes of improving the profit structure at the swimming pool. However, when the district sought a recreation director the commissioners thought Norman, Oak Park's director, might well be the man to take over the Niles job. When he was hired at a salary several thousand dollars above the previous director, it could be assumed Niles was paying for more experiese than it had ever had before.

There's little sense in denying Niles was in dire need of acquiring as much professional opinion as possible. The past Tam O'Shanter flasco, which Commissioner Jack Leske said had cost the park district more than \$40,000, plus the recent Ballard Park mess, pointed to the need for professional services. When Niles chose an architect for the Grennan Heights, Oakton Manor, and Administration buildings and the Ballard Park complex, it hired a firm whose experience in park buildings was non-existent. The subsequent problems with the buildings, plus bids for Ballard Park exceeding \$350,000, manifested Niles Park District was blundering at taxpayers' expense. While taxpayers are in their second year of paying for non-existent recreation facilities, the errors of the past are being paid for by every Nilesite.

In addition to these obvious errors, the direction of the recreation program in past years has been in weak hands. Interference in past years by commissioners, who tied the hands of the recreation director, made a strong unified program almost impossible. More recently the very weak director showed little direction, allowing programs to exist with little help from the top.

After 15 years of hit and miss administration Niles has finally hired a no-nonsense guy, who is thoroly professional and who administers through his department heads.

The past week we've spoken to several workers who've been highly critical of Norman, accusing him of being indifferent to their problems, and stating if they didn't like their jobs they could pick up their paychecks and leave immediately.

While Norman denies such actions perhaps such intolerance or arrogance is true, which certainly reflects poorly. But considering the looseness of the past year's leadership, the conflict between the workers and Norman seems from here to be due to the sudden businesslike attitude of an administration, which heretofore has been non-existent.

Part-time maintenance/help/were told this week they're thru working at the end of this week. In previous years they worked until school started, but this year they're let go with little notice. According to Norman, he's working on a tight budget, and he's been hired to operate as economically as possible and in as businesslike a manner as possible.

Lifeguards complained their staff was reduced to 8 persons this year resulting in an over-burdened schedule for them, without compensation. According to Norman, the swim program received a top AA rating from the County, acknowledging the program meets top safety standards. He said Morton Grove's Harrer Park pool is 30% larger than Niles, having 8 rather than 6 lanes, and they have 1 more guard manning that pool, which also had an additional

Norman noted last year's Niles swim operation cost more than \$21,000 to operate over revenue taken in. He said Niles can no longer subsidize such a deficit, since it now has greater fixed costs with its additional facilities. He said he was first brought into Niles to iron out the pool problems here and he felt the 25 person staff in 1969 was overstaffed. He said the present 17 person staff (not all full time) was more reasonable.

He mentioned this year family memberships are up from 591 to 629. He said last year there were personal problems at the pool that had to be ironed out and while he was very careful not to point a finger at anyone, he noted there were complaints from parents who would not send their children to the pool because of them. He quickly noted the pool staff has done a "good job" alluding several times to the outstanding work the pool guards do, and emphasizing the personal problems mentioned, had nothing to do with the guard

In pointing to his job as director he said his approach to the job is to have competent people as heads of all departments. He added, "my job is to understand and improve" upon efforts presently being made. He noted the problem of leadership and public relations were the major problems confronting the district.

Niles received much publicity for the recent marathon it ran and Norman was not too enthused about the effort. It was created and manned by the teens, and there's little doubt the long vigil, which included sleeping at the pool, exhausted many of the guards, who put in their regular work at the pool, in addition to this extra effort,

Norman said there is much emotionalism surrounding the miniuprising, and changes in the district will come slowly since he is up against long established traditions, which have been at work in the

> In meeting with both the lifeguards and the maintenance crews there's little doubt they've been bruised by the abrupt behavior from Norman. His brusqueness ("you can pick up your paycheck . . .") certainly can't be commended. And his businesslike approach toward the youngsters, who've had a job in past years in which the supervision has been loose and indirect, shocked them when they suddenly are confronted by the impersonal behavior of the adult world all of us meet everyday in our business dealings.

Some criticism has come from residents who seem to resent conduct High Holiday services at the \$17,000 salary Norman receives. And somehow the salaries of the guards, and the maintenance workers who make \$2,75 an hour, certainly does not reflect they're not being fairly paid for students doing part time work.

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

.0843 to 1970's .0750. The street and bridge fund decreased from last year's .0466 to .0415. The police and firemens' pension funds both decreased the same, from last year's .0450 to this year's .0421. The debt retirement fund was reduced from .0169 to .0152. Totaling all the funds including the social security fund they total the .364 tax levy for the village's

coming year.
