From the Left Hand Blase-Vrettos Nuptials

When school-time begins we always consider this season as the beginning of a new year for us. With the kids back in school, and vacation-time behind us, it's a time we buckle down and begin pursuing issues of importance locally.

Past issues pursued, but often rebuffed, are still paramount in our mind. The need for elected village managers in Niles and Morton Grove, and that old bogey, public transportation, both are up at the top of our list. But to succeed in these pursuits it's our job to arouse the populace to action, and then support whatever action is necessary.

When we first started The Bugle in Morton Grove we weekly, and sometimes weekly, badgered public officials over the need for a full-time fire department. Our comments made waves at the local MG firehouse and we were invited there to "explain" ourselves before some of Morton Grove's finest. The paid-on-call men felt our criticism reflected on them and their subsequent remarks at the meeting let us know in no uncertain terms we would be better off if we stayed in Niles. But in the future months the much-overdue full-time fire department became a reality, and the needling, badgering or just plain commentary was partly responsible for its coming into being.

The village manager issue is really of greater importance to the community because the running of the plus-million dollar budgets in these communities, is tied in with the people running the village. Morton Grove's League of Women Voters made a 2 year study of such a need and made a strong recommendation a village manager post be created. The old timers on the MG Board unanimously rejected the idea, in as blatant a disregard for the will of the people they represented, as we've ever seen. Not one public official said one favorable comment pertinent to the exhaustive study.

In Niles an appointee village manager was selected. And while the move has been a good one, nevertheless it was only a half-way measure, since the Mayor and the Board completely dominate the manager.

Niles village manager appointment was really a bone thrown to the natives. It eliminated the manager as a political issue, and at the same time the power of the elected officials was not diminished. And the name of the game is "power", both in Morton Grove as well as Niles. Neither Board is voluntarily interested in turning over power to a manager, making the actions of an appointee subject to a veto from the elected officials.

A fair example of this so-called "power" concerned an action last week in Niles. The Chrysler Company desired to change Niles building code so its Milwaukee Avenue building at Maryland Avenue would only have 60% masonry, rather than 100% as the code requires. Mayor Blase and friends said Milwaukee Avenue is Niles front door and it's important it look its best at all times and thus turned down the request. Yet, if you move down the street to Norbert's on Milwaukee Avenue you will find a huge building just installed which has 0% masonry. According to Blase the building is only a temporary structure, and like others in the Niles Township industrial area, it will eventually come down. In the case of Norbert's Blase said it will remain there only 1 year. Well, technically, the explanation is correct. But, if the owners of Norbert's who have been active in the community, have aided Blase in past elections, the building of the temporary structure on Milwaukee Avenue certainly raises an eyebrow. And the building of such an expensive building for only 1 year lends suspicion it is likely to be there for many years.

In seeking an answer to this problem the village manager told us exactly what Blase said. But if the manager post was elected by the residents then the manager could have made an independent recommendation which did not have to coincide with Blase's words. And it would be quite likely there would be a more consistent opinion. If Chrysler can't have a 60% masonry building then certainly another merchant can't have a 0% masonry building, even if it's suggested it's only temporary. In this case the manager had no independence to act in the best interests of the community, but had to express himself consistently with the political Mayor.

The example is a good one, and speaks for the need of an independent manager.

and spent \$30,754. In a breakdown of pool action Norman reported 629 family season tickets were sold this year against 591 last year.

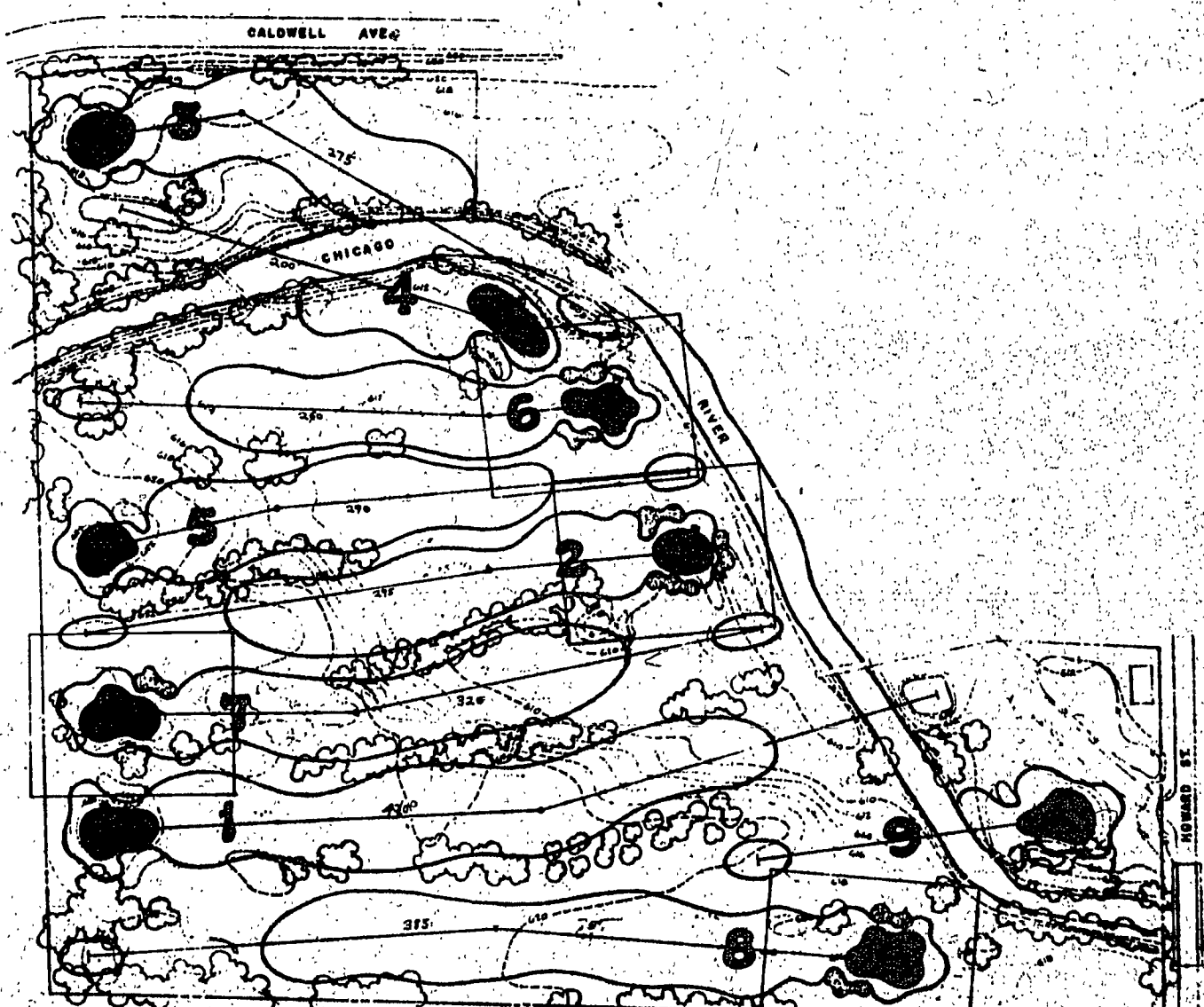
In a breakdown of pool attendance Norman reported 53,480 persons used the pool this summer; 39,732 in the afternoon and 13,748 in the evening.

Twenty-eight sessions were closed and the daily average attendance was 796 persons, 567 in the afternoon and 229 in the evening. Twenty-four days the temperature exceeded 90 degrees, and 9 days attendance topped 1,000, with a record 1,185 one day and a low of 15 one evening when the temperature dropped. One hundred-thirty persons participated in the swimming instruction sessions.

In still other actions Commissioners authorized the expenditure of not more than \$2,000 for the Kirk Lane Park for a sled hill at the Waukegan Road park. Recreation director Webb Norman said 800 to 900 yards of fill can be obtained free and 300 to 400 yards of top fill will be purchased.

Illinois LWV

Endorses Constitution

The recommendations of Illinois Sixth Constitutional Conventions were presented to the 300 delegates of the League of Women Voters of Illinois on Tuesday, Sept. 1, Mrs. Raymond E. Robertson of Hinsdale, President, presided at the all day conclave at Arlington Park Towers.

The 300 delegates voted unanimously to endorse the new document. They also endorsed three of four controversial proposals to be submitted separately to voters: abolishment of the cumulative voting, merit system for selecting judges and voting age lowered to 18.

Delegates to what the League called the "C" day were selected from the 83 local Leagues in the state on the basis of the membership of each group. Included in the delegations were the new 18 year old members as well as 25 year veterans of the Con Con campaign.

The League has worked 25 years to bring about a constitutional convention and has followed the work of the convention since it began in Dec. 1969. During the convention the League presented the results of its detailed study of the state charter in the form of research papers and statements on the position taken by its membership to the committees of the convention and to the delegates.

Mrs. John Adams, President of the Morton Grove - Niles League, attended the "C" Day Assembly, along with Mrs. Kurt Keller, Mrs. Ramon Hanson and Mrs. Roy Makela. Both Mrs. Keller and Mrs. Hanson are former presidents of the Morton Grove League, who have taken an active part in Con-Con.

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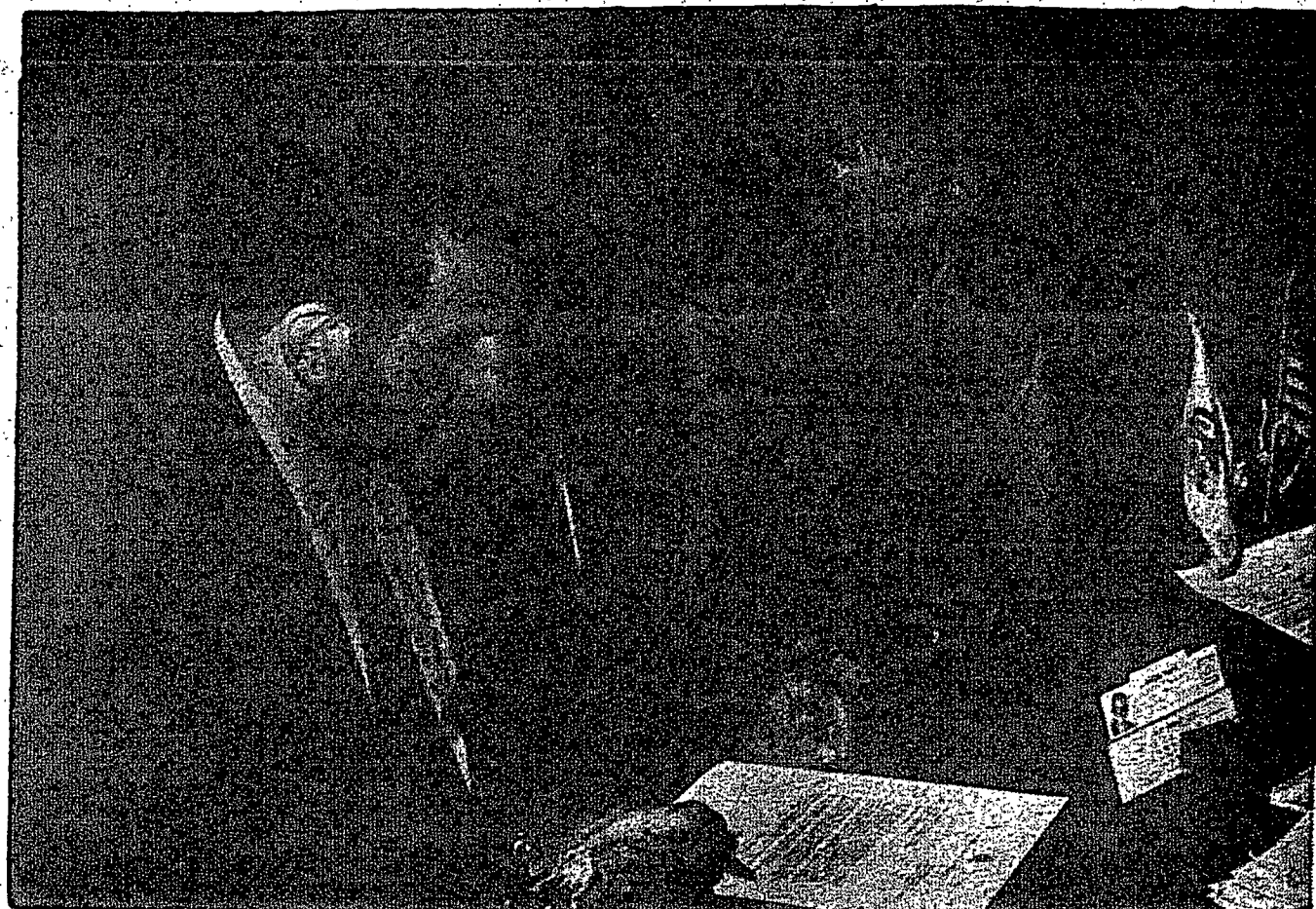

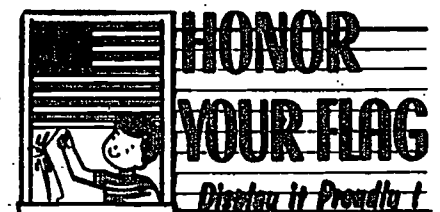
Dear Sir:

These studies will enable scientists to evaluate accurately the effects of thermal pollution from a nuclear reactor.

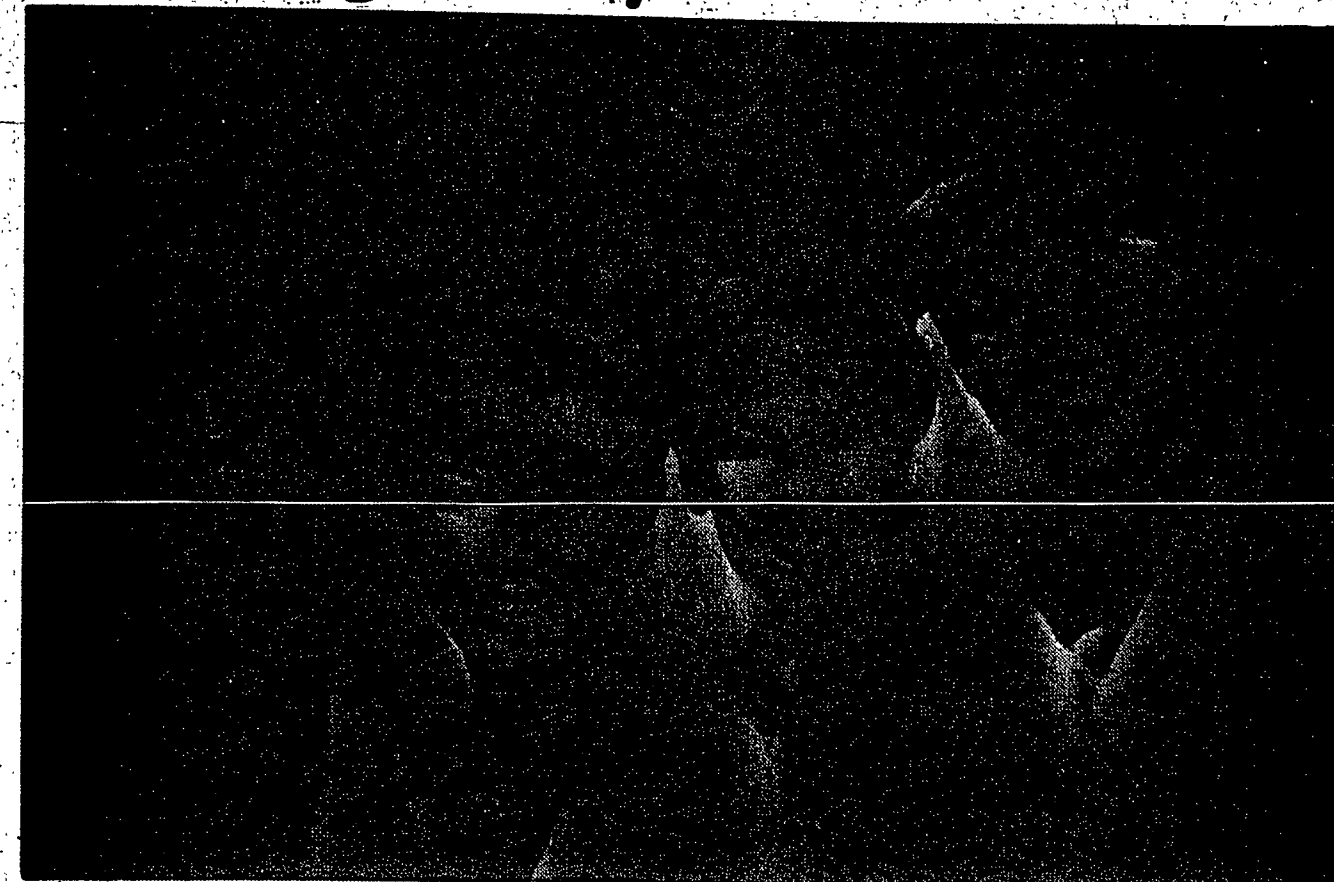

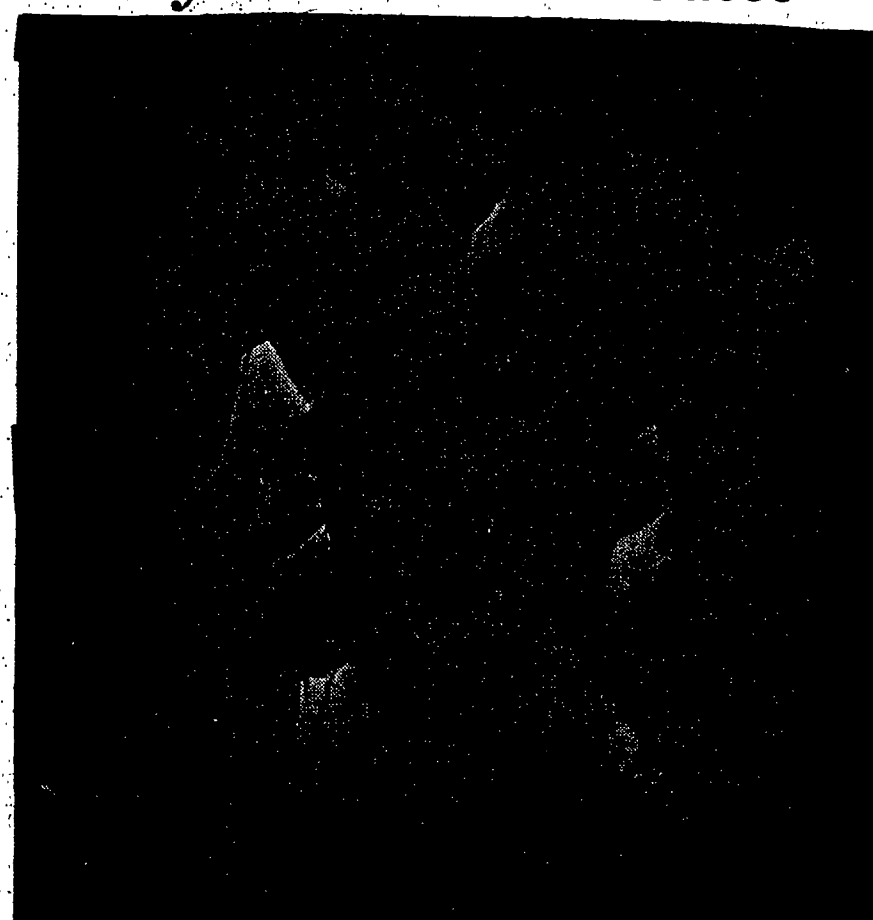
