## From the Left Hand Voter Registration Oct. 5

With our telephone bill this week was a notice Skokie residents are no longer paying a 5% utility tax. Since next-door neighbor Morton Grove knocked off the tax as the result of last year's election - it's obvious to ask the question why Nilesites must pay this tax.

Based on recent census figures Niles' 30,921 residents receive the benefits of about a \$1,200,000 sales tax return annually. In Morton Grove 26,621 residents receive an approximate \$600,000 return. A breakdown of these figures would show Niles receives about a \$40 return per resident while Morton Grove receives approximately \$23. Thus, Nilesites have a greater sales tax return than its neighbor and still pay an additional utility tax which averages roughly \$35 per family.

The elimination of the utility tax in both Morton Grove and Skokie resulted in part because all villages now share in the state income tax. It is estimated our 2 villages receive about \$200,000 annually from this new money source.

If a family average of four people is considered then Niles receives about \$68 more per family from sales tax than its neighbor and also pays \$35 more per family for the utility tax for total revenue of \$103 more per family.

To lessen the tax burden Nilesites do pay less for property tax to the village than their neighbors but the difference does not make up the \$103 difference. Niles estimated village tax will be .364 per \$100 assessed valuation plus a .142 library district rate totalling \$50.60 for a home whose true value is around \$28,000. Morton Grovites will pay \$80 for a comparable home which includes the library district.

Adding the sales tax plus the utility tax and subtracting the assessed tax difference Niles is receiving about \$73 per average home more than Morton Grove.

When village election time rolls around politicians in these areas all point to the relatively low village tax rates as points which show how economically they're running these communities. But considering the flow of monies into the villages we're suspect a great deal of money is not being used as well as it might be. When Niles officials approved the \$714 monthly subsidy for the United Motor Company it indicated it's quite easy to find an extra \$8,500 annually to expend on projects which haven't been thoroughly studied. Not too long ago Niles authorized an expenditure of upward of \$20,000 for a fire protection lane behind the Lawrencewood homes. And while both monies being spent may be considered good investments the arbitrary manner of spending, without due deliberation, points to the looseness of expending money, compared to a community which finds less means for obtaining money.

Certainly, as manager Ken Scheel pointed out, the tremendous increase in salaries and pension fund commitments have skyrocketed the costs in running these local communities. But when you see a community such as Niles, which resisted most ideas for building 2 and 3 story buildings for multiple dwellings, turn around and spend \$40,000 or more for a snorkel fire truck, then you have to wonder about spending policies. The snorkel purchase many years ago is not pertinent in studying today's money problems except it graphically illustrates the shortcomings of spending by bureaucracies.

## Marcheschi Named Lions Candy Day Chairman

The Illinois Lions Council of Governors has announced the appointment of Lion A. G. "Ang" Marcheschi, 7943 N. Nore, Niles as State Chairman of the Lions Candy Day for the Blind. Since its inception in 1952, the annual Candy Day Campaign has raised and distributed more than \$5,000,000 to organizations aiding the blind and visually handicapped.

This year, Candy Day is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 9. The statewide goal has been set for \$700,000.

Nick Bavaro, 7139 W. Breen, Niles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Todd Bavaro was another recipient of the Niles Youth Commission's Outstanding Youth of the Month Award. Nick received his award from William Sterling of the Commission for his outstanding achievement and involvement in both Village and school activities. Nick graduated from Niles North High school in June of 1970. He was chairman of the Niles Youth Congress and chairman of the Dance Committee for 3 very successful fund raising dances. He served on the paper drives and performed with the group that entertained the Indian children and patients at the St. Francis Hospital Pediatric Ward. He was involved with the presentation of the State Flag to the Village of Niles, a member of the St. John Brebeuf Teen club, a member of the Niles Little Theatre, starred in Finian's Rainbow at Maine East High school and in Oklahoma at Regina Dominican High school, was nominated by Niles North to represent the school in the WMAQ TV tryouts for the New Performers and in many more activities too numerous to mention. In the fall Nick will attend Robert Morris college.

Railroads Urge  
Creation of  
Public Transit

Chicago's six suburban railroads went on record today urging the Illinois legislature to create a public transportation agency to operate or control all forms of surface passenger transportation in the six-county region of northeastern Illinois.

As envisioned in a policy statement issued by the railroads, the new agency would incorporate all surface passenger transportation facilities and operations, public and private, in Cook, Lake, McHenry, Du Page, Kane and Will counties. Included in the system would be the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), the suburban operations of the Chicago and North Western, Illinois Central, Milwaukee Road, Burlington Northern, Rock Island and South Shore railroads; local bus lines and arterial highway planning in six counties.

The prime function of the new agency, called Chicago Metropolitan Area Transportation System (CMATS), would be to operate or control all forms of surface passenger transportation and establish planning and priorities for the total mass transportation needs of people in the entire region. Only a single agency, the railroads contend can avoid the costly duplication of services and competition for public funds which now exists between approximately 20 public and private agencies. One agency must coordinate all elements of transportation.

"The CTA's financial crisis, the financial difficulties of several local bus lines and commuter rail lines and the new competition of CTA's Dan Ryan and Kennedy rail service are but the first stages of transit problems that will increasingly plague the overall transportation capabilities of the various means of mass transit in Chicago.

"We have three choices: opposing subsidies to CTA for further extension of competitive median strip transit lines (such as to O'Hare Field on the Kennedy; and further south on the Dan Ryan); demanding subsidies to permit the continuation of our services; or of proposing a rational approach to solve the total urban transportation problem. We choose the last of the three," say the railroads.

"The need is urgent to allocate public monies in the most effective way possible. The Chicago area simply cannot afford the inefficiencies of piecemeal plans, stop-gap subsidies and transit agencies competing with each other for less-than-adequate public funds. The Chicago area will get a proportionate share of the available federal funds only if it can demonstrate that it knows how to effectively use such funds through coordinated transportation.

"In the final analysis, the beneficiary of coordinated transportation planning and operation, which only a single agency such as CMATA can provide, will be the public which pays for all personal transportation whether it is good, bad or mediocre.

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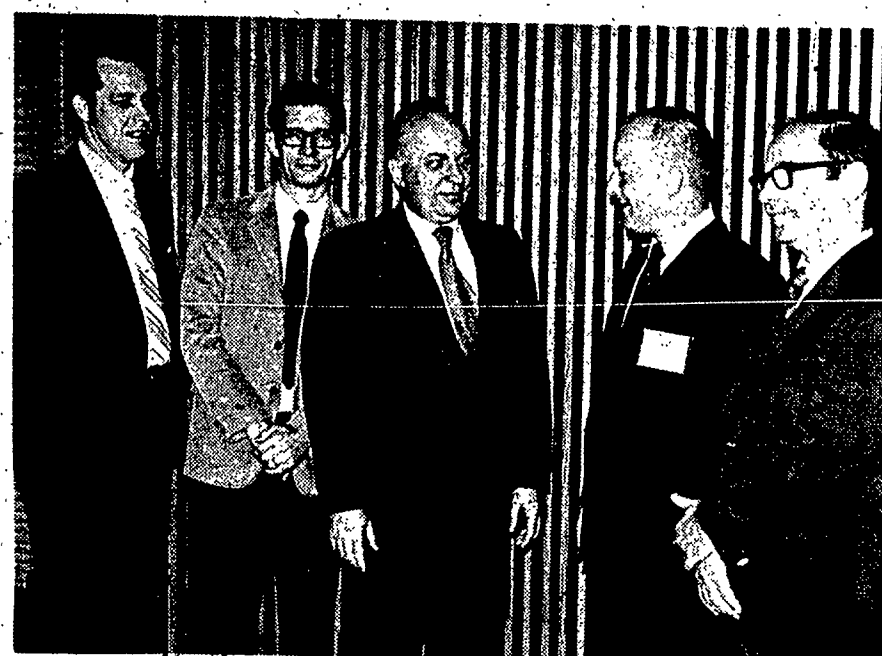

### TUBERCULIN SKIN TESTS

Tuberculin skin tests are very useful in school children. When a negative test becomes positive it means that this person has inhaled live tubercle bacilli, which produced a primary source of tuberculosis in the lungs and generally, but not always, will result in a mild form of the disease.

The person who has passed the causative germ must be found. His lungs are alive with tubercle bacilli. When found, he will be hospitalized and treated to bring the disease under control.

They have found that in small towns and cities, by testing children in schools, they can search out the carrier the child has come in contact with.
