

The new district will have 3 transportation district trustees appointed to the board. While no salary is anticipated Niles officials set a \$100 monthly maximum salary for each of the 3 trustees. Gruenwald noted there is the possibility the subsidy plus these salaries may bring the monthly cost to more

In creating the district it will enable the village to pass on Motor Fuel tax refunds to the district which will then pass the money on to the bus company. Niles has about 6 or 7 bus routes running thru the village from outside areas

Niles Mayor Blase, who led Des Plaines and Lincolnwood okayed similar subsidies. He said he thought Wheeling would also take action (this reporter attended a Wheeling meeting September 14 and officials were first made aware of the problem, and were not then seriously



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

Railroads Urge Creation of **Public Transif** Chicago's six suburban rail-

roads went on record today urging the illinois legislature to create a public transportation agency to operate or control all forms of surface passenger transportation in the six-county region of northeastern Illinois. As envisioned in a policy statement issued by the railroads, the new agency would incorporate all surface passenger transportation facilities and operations, public and private, in Cook, Lake, McHenry, Du Page, Kane and Will counties, Included in the system would be the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), the suburban operations of the Chicago and North Western, Illinois Central, Milwaukee Road, Burlington Northern, Rock Island and South Shore railroads; local bus lines and arterial highway planning in six counties.

The prime function of the new agency, called Chicago Metropolitan Area Transportation System (CMATS), would be to operate or controll all forms of surface passenger transpor-tation and establish planning and priorities for the total mass transportation needs of people in the entire region. Only single agency, the railroads contend can avoid the constly duplication of services and compettion for public funds which now exists between approximately 20 public and private agencies. One agency must coordinate all elents of transportation.

"The CTA's financial crisis, the financial difficulties of several local bus lines and commuter rail lines and the new competition of CTA's Dan Ryan and Kennedy rail service are but the first stages of transit problems that will increasingly plague the overall transportion capabilities of the various means of mass transit in Chi-

cago. "We have three choices: opposing subsidies to CTA for further extension of competitive median strip transit lines (such as to O'Hare Field on the Kennedy and further south on the Dan Ryan); demanding subsidies to permit the continuation of our services; or of proposing a rational approach to solve the lem. We choose the last of the three," say the railroads.

"The need is urgent to allocate public monies in the most effective way possible. The Chi-cago area simply cannot afford the inefficiencies of piecemeal plans, stop-gap subsidies and transit agencies competing with each other for less-than-adequate public funds. The Chicago area will get a proportionate share of the available federal funds only it is can demonstrate that it knows how to

tion. . In the final analysis, the beneficiary of coordinated transportation planning and operation, which only a single agency such as CMATA can provide, will be the public which pays for all personal transportation whether it is good, bad or mediocre.



questing the joining of sidewalks by having sidewalks constructed on both sides of the streets in question. The petition stated that: a) there was danger to children who had to walk in the street and thru mud on many occasions; and b) at night cars park there and dump cans beer and other debris around. Trustee Hilkin said he thought something should be done and the matter should be given serious consideration. However, Herbert Houndt said that no funds were available at this time for such construction which would cost about \$2000. Mayor Bode suggested that perhaps some sort of arrangement could be worked out with the village paying half and the concerned citizens the other half. No final decision was reached at this time.

Herb Weinthaler, a businessman from the Marmora and Lincoln shopping center and speak-ing for others at that same location, said there was a big problem with juveniles who persisted in hanging out there. Many people have been discour-aged by the presence of these youngsters and somtimes the driveway is blocked by their presence. So far, when these offenders have been brought to court on charges of loitering, the judge has released them and nothing is solved. Prosecutor Brenner suggested that the businessmen identify the offenders and Chief Glauner was asked to have one of his men patrol the area.
