Dist. 63 Reports to State At the Oct. 13 Board meet-

ing, East Maine School Dist. #63 Board members, Mrs. Irene Luck and Mrs. Arlene Nidetz presented the report, 'Equal Taxes for Equal Effort' that was given to the Illinois School Problems commission held at Maine South High school on Sept. 17.

In their report, Mrs. Luck and Mrs. Nidetz stated: "Because of the inadequacies of the assessed valuation in various school districts, it is believed that an adjustment should be made in the state aid formula to give more aid to districts where the taxpayers are paying the high school tax rates."

Therefore, Mrs. Luck and Mrs. Nidetz recommended to the Illinois School Problems commission "that an additional 7% of the weighted Average Daily Attendance figure be given to the school districts which are in the top 5% of all districts for total school district tax rate and an additional 3-1/2% to those districts in the next 5%. PURCHASE COMPLEED

At Tuesday night's meeting f the Park Board, Attorney Gabe Berrafato reported that purchase plans for the trailer park site have been completed. The Gemco Co., who are planning a Jewel - Osco - Turnstyle type shopping complex on the Milwaukee Ayenue site are awaiting approval of their final construction plans, and as soon as they are received, groundbreaking will take place.

Attorney Berrafato also stated that he had met with of-ficials of School district 63 regarding the acquiring of easement property for storm water drainage at the Ballard Park complex. A resolution was passed by district 63 and approval was given to the Park district for the use of this

Grading work and the razing of the existing building on the property in the Betty-Chester area has been started. The Fire Department has requested the use of the house on the property for training programs for firemen. They have assured the Park district that no actual burning of property will take

Development of the Little Tam golf course has started this week. Four new greens and five new tees are needed to complete the nine-hole golf course. Since 20,000 yards of fill will be required, prices are being checked on this at the

Groundbreaking ceremonies took place on Saturday, Oct. 10 for the Ballard Park Recreation complex. Removal of the numerous trees on the property has been started. The trees were checked by a landscaper and 33 of them were found to either be dead or hollow and decayed in the interior. The ice skating rink will be 85° x 185° and will have a skater capacity of 750.

Automobiles are more dangerous to pre-school children than influenza. pneumonia, diphtheria and smallpox. Twice as many children are killed by accidents as opposed to germs.

Yearly, accidental deaths claim thousands of boys and girls 1 to 5 years of age. Motor vehicles account for one-third of these deaths. Many children are killed darting from between parked cars or crossing busy streets.

Accidents such as these may be avoidable. First. the youngster does not realize what he is doing and secondly, the driver does not have time to stop. One of the stated purposes of the Sixth Illinois Constitutional Convention was to provide for greater protection of individual rights. Their intent was ingreat measure fulfilled in the Illinois Constitution 1970 Bill of Rights. The Convention voted to retain

intact the sections pertaining to Inherent and inalienable Rights, Religious Freedom, Freedom of Speech, Right to Assemble and Petition, Rights After Indict-ment, Ball and Habeas Corpus, Self-Incrimination and Double Jeopardy, Ex Post Facto Laws and Impairing Contracts, and the Quartering of Soldiers as stated in the 1870 document. The sections covering the right to free elections and the subordination of the military were retained but transferred to the articles covering Suffrage and Elections

and the Militia, respectively. The committee assigned to develop the Bill of Rights under the able leadership of Elmer Gertz, was also assigned the responsibility for drafting the Preamble. To the 1870 Preamble the committee added as a goal for Illinois "to eliminate poverty and inequality; assure legal, social and economic justice; provide opportunity for the fullest development of the in-

Many of the sections of the 1870 Bill of Rights were expanded or slightly modified. One section was reworded for clarity and modernization of language, one eliminated, and five new sections were added.

To the Section on Searches and Seizures, the Convention added what is probably the strongest provision in any State
Constitution by adding protection for the individual against
unreasonable "invasions of privacy or interceptions of communications by eavesdropping

devices or other means." This protection of the citizen against Big Brother was further strengthened by adding to the Right to Remedy and Justice the word "privacy" in addition to person, property, or reputation as medies in the laws.

The Due Process and Equal Protection clause was retained but to it was added "nor be denied the equal protection of the laws" thus giving formal expression to a principle al-ready well recognized and applied in the State. Persons who are arrested

for the commission of a crime

shall, under the new Bill of Rights, be entitled to a prompt preliminary hearing to estab-lish probable cause. This provision should act as a spur to the Illinois court system to reverse the present tendency to incarcerate individuals for an unreasonable number of months prior to determination of their guilt or innocence. In addition. a provision to prohibit the im-prisonment of an individual due to failure to pay a fine provid-ing he has been afforded adequate time to make payment, in installments, if necessary, has been added. Hopefully the disparity between the affluent and the poor who come before the law should be somewhat diminished under this new principle. In these provisions that deal with the rights of rim-inals, a most enlightened penal provision was added calling for penalties to be determined according to the seriousness of the offense and "with the object of restoring the offender to useful citizenship." The at-titude of society and subse-quently the penal system of in-

carceration as revenge perhaps will be changed to making re-habilitation of the offender the penal systems primary goal.
Trial by jury is a right retained as "inviolate" but the
Convention deleted the clause dealing with trials by justices of the peace which was of doubtful validity since the adoption of the Judicial Article in 1964. "These blessings cannot en-

dure unless the people recognize their corresponding individual obligations and responsibilities, is now a part of the state-ment of Fundamental Prin-ciples, thus affirming the fact that citizens in a democracy not only have rights but must shoulder the responsibilities of

The Right of Eminent Domain was changed to clarify and mod-ernize the language leaving the intent intact, and the archaic section on Railroads contained in the 1870 Constitution was

A new addition to the Bill of Rights was a prohibition of discrimination in employment and the sale of property. This section has perhaps the best self-executing provision of any State Constitution. These rights are enforceable without legislative action but the General Assembly is given the right to establish "reasonable exemptions" and provide additional remedies. The prohibition of discrimination in the sale and rental of housing is already the law of the land by U. S. Supreme Court decision. The reference to dis-crimination in employment has been constitutionalized as a statement of principle what has been State law for many years.
A companion provision declares that "equal protection of the laws shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex."
And in this same vein, a new section was added to prohibit discrimination against the hardiscrimination against the handicapped in the sale or rental of property or in the hiring and promotion practices of any em-

There are two controversial sections, the one on "individual which is new and the other on the "right to bear arms." The statement regarding the former is a "constitutional sermon condemning derogatory references to in-dividuals and groups." The lat-ter makes the right to bear arms "subject to the police power." The authors view this wording as granting rights not as considerable as some hope

and others fear, nd others tear, Finally, the Bill of Rights stipulates that the enumeration of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by individual citizens of the State.

To quote Elmer Gertz, Chairman of the Bill of Rights Committee. "In a revised of stress."

mittee "In a period of stress, and strain, our proposed new Bill of Rights pays tribute to individual rights and extends them in a most heroic manner."

The League of Women Vo-ters, a nonpartisan organiza-tion, after study and consensus of its members, urges registered voters to vote in favor of the adoption of the Illinois Constitution: 1970.

Referendin

The District 64 Board of Education adopted the annual budget for the 1970-71 school year on Monday night, Sept. 28, and scheduled a tax rate referendum for the Education Fund for Tuesday, December

A rate increase of 35 cents per \$100 assessed valuation will be requested in the Dec. referendum. Projected deficit in the Education Fund at the end of the current school year is \$1,138,910*.*

The proposed increase of 35 cents will just barely keep the present deficit from getting larger, according to Board member Ronald Holmberg.

Present rate for the Education Fund is \$1.67. The requested increase would raise it to \$2.02. Ceiling for the Education Fund is \$3. The Board has approved levies for 1970 with the estimated total tax rate of \$2,465 per \$100 assessed

All Board members agreed that the need for the tax in-crease in the Education Fund was evident in the 1970-71 bud-There was a difference of opinion on timing of a re-ferendum, with the majority be-leiving that the referendum should be held as soon as pos-

was that, if the 1970-71 budget was adopted without a tax increase in the Education Fund, planning for the 1971-72 budget and educational program would be drastically affected.

Factors which would affect the financial picture of the Dist, next spring, such as salary negotiations, state aid, non-public schools, would only compound the need, Mr. Holmberg said. The majority of the Board felt that not asking for the tax increase now would just forestall the inevitable.

REGULATING PARKING IN CERTAIN AREAS WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF NILES, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS

WHERAS, it has been determined that it is advisable to designate certain vehicular traffic lanes located in certain shopping areas within the Village of Niles, as fire lanes; and

WHEREAS, the owners, operators and managers of these certain shopping areas have agreed with the officials of the Village of Niles of the advisability of the fire lane designations. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and

Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows: SECTION 1: That the following locations be and the same are hereafter designated as fire lanes:

(a) The vehicular traffic lane immediately adjacent to and running along the entire front of the shopping center, now known as "Dempster Shopping Center", located at Dempster and Greenwood, Niles, Illinois;

The circular traffic lane immediately adjacent to and running along the entire front of the three apartment buildings, known as the Kingston Apartments, located at 8801-8809-8815 Golf Rd., Niles, Illinois.

SECTION 2: That parking of all vehicular traffic shall be and the same is hereafter prohibited in the vehicular traffic lanes hereinabove designated as fire lanes, in Section 1 of this

SECTION 3: That the Director of Public Works be and the same is hereby authorized and directed to emplace signs as

"NO PARKING FIRE LANE. VIOLATORS WILL BE TICKETED".

in the areas designated in Section 1 of this ordinance. Further, that the emplacement of these signs shall be so emplaced so as to be conspicuous and visible by operators of vehicular traffic within the areas designated in Section 1.

SECTION 4: That any person found guilty of violating any the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined a minimum of THREE (\$3.00) DOLLARS to a maximum penalty of TWEN-TY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS. (Section #21-259-Penalty Section

SECTION 5: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.



After Maggie re-registered and I re-registered for the third time, Mr. Barrett sent us both new voter registration cards finally listing our home address correctly and putting us in the right precinct. It's inconceivable that a simple change of address, which should have required only a few minutes, involved so much unnecessary time and effort over so many months," Atcher says. "During the campaign, I've met hundreds of other persons who told me about similar experiences with the Cook county
